Imports and Exports of Buenes Ayres.

Wo have just received the Curtomhouse Blue-book for the first six months of 1861, and it discloses facts and figures which every foreign merchant in town will take an interest in knowing. We purpose going through it estegorically, as the deductions which the figures in this book lead us to are of the greatest importance to all, 1st-The Import duties for the first six months in 1861 amount to \$37,553.-

2nd-The Export duties for the same period yielded only \$7,135.981. Here we have two most importan figures to go by, and their eno difference can only be accounted for in two ways-i. e, either that the export duties are low (which is not so). or that we are actually cons more than we can pay for. To arrive at a certainty on this head, it is neceseary to know the gross value of imports and exports.

Now, the tetal value of all imports for the same period, is \$235,188,000 mio, while the total value of expor is exactly \$143,939,000 mgs, which leaves a balance against this country of, say, ninely-one millions and a-

Clearly, therefore, the great dispasums, representing the gross import and export duties, arises partly from the difference between the imports and exports, and also from the staggering fact that we consume more than we pay for.

Disguise it as much as possible, this is the plain, simple truth. Not having any previous tables to go by, we can not say how long things have been going on this way; but, when we re fleet that the months specified in these tables are generally the busiest expor time in the year, when it is improbable that any considerable stocks of produes could axist for so long a period as six months, without finding its way to the European market, we must us ir, that the country, of its own in

trinsic resources, cannot pay its way. We know full well that, at certain periode, England, France, the United ates, co:, have the balance of trade against them; but it is only for a very short time. Before the year closes generally specking, the equilibrium is regained, unless in the case of some unusual distress or public disaster.

In looking over the list of imports we find close on six millions for trum peries; we find nearly five millions for topacco, although. Heaven knows there exists no finer soil or climate under the sun than Buenos Ayres, for the cultivation of this word. terprises which have taken place lately, in the islands of the l'arané, bear us out in the assertion that we pay ten millions a year for an article which, only through the grossest laziness, does not form one of our princinal exports

Seven millions and a-half per annum we have to pay for flour, wheat, and maize, which is equivalent to 2 112 per cent of our total exports, and should appear to our er,, and not dr., count, if things went properly, Chili, Montovideo, and even Cordova, export their own grain; but Buenos Avros, on the contrary, has to import this primary article for man's subsist. ence. If such importation areas from the fact of this being rather a manu-

facturing then an agricultural country. or that it was because of a fortuite scarcity, we could regard it as a pas-sing cvil. Neither excuse, however, can be alleged. The obvious conclusion is, that we are gradually tend ing to backruptcy, in buying from our neighbours what we could supply our selves with,

It believes the Government of the ountry to assist, emigration in every possible way, not merely in bringin emigrants to this country, but in help them to got an agricultural start.

The proposed Branch Banks, if pro perly carried out, may be regarded a move in the right direction; but candidly speaking, we have no faith in them, as we tear the rich estanriero, who can pludge his silver stirrups, spurs, maté and bombille, will always enjoy a preference to the hardworking emigrant, with 7 or 8 strong, healthy children. Plought the same. and farming utonells, seed and butlacks, should be regarded by the Hank agent as of more intrinsic value than even who'e redees of horned entile or mares.

Market report of River plate produce.

New York, February 21st 1869. The past month has been an unusually quiet one for trade, and particularly so in wools. We do not look for

much activity in merchandles genera lly until Congress shall have finally passed the financial bills now before them. The "House" bill creat ing five hundred millions of Tressury notes bearing interest, redcomable after twonty years, and one hundred millions demand notes" has been amended by the "Senate," making the demand notes a "legal tender" and receivable for all public dues, and convertible at any time into Treasury notes bearing interest, and also providing that all interest on Treasury notes shall be paid in coin. The "House" may not agree to all the amendments but it is hoped the til. will soon become a law, and reliers commerce of the uncertainly which for works has been hanging over it. Public opinion is generally in favor of the amendments and by the passage of the "taxation" bill soon to be reported, confidence, will be given to these issues. and the great resources of our conntry and willingness of the people to bear their share of the expenses incurred in putting down this wicked rebellion in the slave States, makes it moral'y certain that the Treasury notime of redemption arrives, and no great depreciation can in the mean time mke place in the demand notes. which will circulate everywhere and equalize domestic exchanges, although a depresiation is foured by some, and consequently inflated prices.

Exchange on London has continued to rule high, 114 to 115, and gold has been at a premium of 3314 to 4 113 per 8. This, with the extra insurance for war risk, adds materially to the cost importatione, and makes it more difficult to effect sales at satisfactory pri-
