NEWS FROM EUROPE.

SEA-FIGHT IN THE UNITED STATES

Southern steel-frigate triumphant,

SENSATION IN ENGLAND. THE ENGLISH LEAVE MEXICO.

France & Spain beet on conquest. The Italian garrison going to Rom The Pope about to resign.

By the Mississippi, we have dates from Europe up to April 14th, which arrived in Rio Ja-noyro by the Oncida, and were ansmitted to Montevideo by the

Tocantins.
We translate from the Diarie of Rio, May 5th :-

The most important news is from Mexico and the United Stafrom hierarco.

On February 19th, was ratified the Convention of Soledad, by the three allied plenipotentiaries and President Juarez. The French, English and Spanish ferces occupied Jehuncan, Oxizaba, and Cordoba. A penceful issue was expected; when the English packet (March 1st.) brought new The French generation. packet (March 1st.) brought new-instructions. The French gene-ral immediately declared the Convention null and void; while the English Admiral, on the contrary, fulfilled his stipulations by order-ing all his men to embark, except about 100 marines.

The Mexicans prepare for an active resistance. President Junrez has outlawed all persons assisting the allies, and declared in state of siege the towns of Potosi, Vera Cruz and Zamaulipas. The various provinces were organising large contingents of forces to de fend their country.

In the United States was witnessed on March 8th, a sea-fight, at the mouth of James River, which seems to involve most se rious consequences not only towards the Republic, but even throughout Europe and the whole world. A few days provious was sighted, abreast of Monroe Oldint, a vessel almost totally submerged: she was coming from Norfolk and hoisted the Palmetto flag. She looked like a house f just peoping over the water's e. It was the Merrimac a edge. It was the Merrimae a large 42 gun frigate, built by the States in 1858, which had fallen into the hands of the Southerns into the hands of the source in with the Norfolk argenal. This vessel is completely steel-clad, and carries some Armstrong guns, brought from England aboard the Nashville. The Northern fleet Nashville. 'The Northern fleet comprised three large steam fri-gates: the Minnesota, St. Lawrence and Rounoke, anchored in Hampton port, and two sailing ships, the corvette Cumberland ships, the corvette Cumoercana and frigate Congress anchored at the mouth of James River.

P The Cumberland fired a broad side into the Merrimac striking her very precisely, but the balls glanced off into the river. The atter scarcely deigned to answer the salute, sending a few stray shots at the Congress, and passing her rapidly to attack the Cum-berland. The Merrimac received the whole broadside of the ene-my at 110 yards' distance; but the discharge, according to an the discharge, according to an eye-witness, fell as harmless as hail-stones on a zine roof. At 40 yards' distance the fire of the Merrimae struck the Cumberland

The invinceble Merrimae at once made for the enemy, but got aground likewise: from this posi tion she was rescued by the other Southern vessels, when, (it being 7 P. M.) she retired under the Confederate batteries.

Next morning the Merriman went down river to attack the versary alongside the frigate; is was the cuirass-battery Monitor built by Captain Ericeson. The cannonade at a mile apart, with out doing any damage on either side. In less than an hour and a

half they were alongside, and then ragad so terrible an encounter that both vessels were enveloped in smoke. Two balls from the in smoke. France.

The Corps Legislatif began to discuss the Budget for 1863, whi-ch amounts to 2,000 millions of ch amounts to 2,000 millions of francs. (80 million storling). The army is reduced 32,000 men, and 2,260 horses sold. The central committee of S. Vincent de Paul. refusing to accept a President named by Napoleon, has been suppressed.

The Japanese ambassador arrired at Paris with phonipotentiary diplomas, on April 7th. He will visit the London exhibition, and return home via Berlin, St. Petersburg and Siberia.
The Bank of France has redu

ced its interest from 4 to 31 per cent. Victor Hugo has publish ed two volumes of his work: Les Miscrables, which has caused immense agitation in the literary world. The rioters of Paris (2m world. The rioters of Paris (2nd March) were mostly set at liberty but some were confined in the Mazas prison. The press was pla-ced under new restrictions of great

The Papal question is in eternal statu que. The journey of M. Lavallette, French ambassador at Rome, who goes to Paris, has given rise to many conjectures. It is said he has declared it impossible to continue relations, so long as Gen. Goyon is French commander; the latter is very friendly towards His Holiness and the ex-King Francis, Rumour names General Niel as his successor in the garrison, but Thouvenel has contented himself with directions to Goyon, ordaing him to be vigilant in arresting brigands on the Papal frontier. Lavelletto returns to the Eternal City.

There are vague reports that the Roman garrison will shortly be, in part, composed of Sardinians, but we have no positivo evidence.

The French Government have intimated their intention of withdrawing their troops from Rome, and the Pope has delegated the management of Church affairs to three Cardinals -one Italian, one German, and one English (Cardinal Wiseman).

The Pope and published an Allocu ion on the 25th March, in which he distinctly states that the temporal power could not be considered a dogma of faith, but that, in the actual state of affairs, the independence and freedom of the Head of the Church was absolutely necessary.

Francis Il is in Rome, and has through the Courrier de la Girondi signified his intention to remain there. and to enjoy the same hospitality as was extended to the Bonaparte family for thirty years; and he incists upon his right, first, as a property-holder, and secondly, at having a Roman title (Duke of Coreo).

The greatest disorders exist in Naples, and crimes and robberies are of daily occurrence. Political disturbances were also prevalent, to remedy which Victor Emmanuel nurnosed shortly making a trip to the southern capital to quell such disorders.

The rain commenced at six league or two round about the town of San Nicolas, and along the coast of the Arroyo del Medio, helf way towards Pergamino, is good; but everywhere else is had indeed, causing the eattle to flock in myriads on my ground, where, but for the late rains, they would not have left me a blade of Not only did Ageno cattle flock in, but owners in person, with their rodeos, would plant themselves on the edge of my land, and overwhelm me with their animals; and, in spite of my continual complaints to the Juez, nothing was done-there being no law here, or at least, no enforcement of it on the part of the Jucces : so that I. who had pasture sufficient for my animals, even though it had not rained through all the winter, would have been forced, on this eccount, to leave my place or suffer a great loss.

We had a terrific storm on the 29th ult, which well nigh blew all one flocks into the Parana, in spite of on violent exertions to prevent it, causing us the loss of nearly half our lambs However, that's better than a secs.

Semething should be done to prerent people with small ground keeping large stock, which of course car only be done at the nei hbour's expense, who has a large piece of ground, as is the case with myself.

My next neighbour has 200 var frent and three-quarters of a lengue deep. On this he has 3000 sleep, 400 nows and 500 mmes, and, beside he rents his fondes of the same land to two other parties, who have each a very nearly equal number of animals,

My ground comprises more than square league : of course these animals cannot be kept in so narrow a compass, and will naturally come to my place missing up to the present:

We have een visited by a storm on the 30th last month, composed of a huricano and the most terrible rain I over saw folling, lasting from half past 12 until 9 at night, without the least abstoneut either in wind or rain: It has ot only deprived us of an increase, but swopt all before it, killing and drowning immense quantities of sheen. Most all the flocks of this locality, are being found in and around Giles; some who lost flocks numbering from 2 to 3,000 each flock, are beginning to reurn with points of from 500 to 1006 shoep; as to the remainder, they could account nor the least hopes of ver doing so. You must know what it is for sheep to be driven or swopt away a distance of from 6 to 8 league: of course falling in with flocks of the same mark. Low camps were innu dated to a depth of from two to three fact of water. No such thing as an arroyo to be seen : all one perfect shoot of water. In short I can only give you but a very faint idea of the catastrophe. All I can say is, that it was heart-rending in the extreme to look on the immense quantity of dead sheep and lambs, which were extended all over the camps, after the flood fal-

o'clock to the morning, and continued so, without any soverity, until halfpast 12: instantaneously the wind shifted to the south-west : then came the harricane, which lasted until nine at night. People who were so fortnnate as to have their sheep to the south side of their corrals, came off beet, so they had the storm to favour them in shutting in. When the blow commenced, I had the flock of owe and lembs shout two squares distant from the corral, but, unfortunately, to the north side. Of course I thought to make the corral at once to shut their but all my efforts were in vain; nor was I able to give them a turn, or get my horee to face the storm. However, I held my ground for about a quarter of an hour, by which time the wore beginning to inundate, all the lambs getting drowned in hundreds

As soon as I saw that-knowing it necless to calculate on an increaseediately came to the conclusion that it was time to look out for the principal. At the same time, I abandoned the ewes and lambs, and set off in search of the capon flock; and my poon, who, by that time, had been driven about half a league, and on the brink of being ingulfed himself, and the flock, into the Moyano river, Had

I arrived ten minutes later, the flock would have been drowned. Now that I saw the imminent danger, I know there was nothing to save them but the most heroid courses. I kept onournging my man not to fail, who by that time was in a most exhausted state, Noverthelors, we held them or the ground, in spite of the burriesne and tremendous rain, which was in-
