The Executive shall at once cause the canalization works in Riachuelo, by making a loan of 21 feet English depth tide, and a hundred metres at the bottom.

In order to carry out said work the Executive is authorized to negotiate a loan home or for one million five hundred and fifties, emitting bonds of 1 cent, interest and 3 percent, cumulative amortization at par by drawing.

The Government is authorized to raise this loan here or abroad, and also to make the same in the exterior.

The product of said loan

shall be exclusively employed in Riachuelo Works.

All the Riachuelo Works are done, and to be done, out funds realized by this loan, specially hypothecated to the extent of this loan, its interest amortization.

The revenue derivable from present works and those to be carried out shall be exclusively to the service of this loan, in case of deficit, same to be made good out of the general revenue.

The Government is authorized to make the works on its own account, or to call for contracts by the bids from individuals or companies.

MONTEVIDEO

Dean Dillon, Fathers Curley, Malady, Flannery, and other clergymen assisted, and the little chapel was crowded to its utmost capacity. Seldom have so many Irishmen assembled in the camp as on this doubly sad and solemn occasion.

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The Britannia's Mails

London, February 25th
 Mr Gladstone, after dining with the Prince of Wales at Marlborough-house on Wednesday evening, left there in his brougham shortly after eleven o'clock. Instead of driving up to the front door at No. 10, Downing-street, the right hon. gentleman directed his coachman to set him down at the back entrance in St. James's park. In leaving his brougham Mr Gladstone tripped and fell, owing to the slippery state of the pathway. His head coming in violent contact with the garden door step. He was at once raised and assisted into his residence, and was found to be bleeding copiously from a wound in the back of the head. Dr Blake, of Princes-street, Westminster, was immediately sent for, and at once dressed the wound, which was a deep incision of an inch and a half in length. He advised the right hon. gentleman to retire to bed, and remained in attendance until a quarter past two in the morning, when Dr Andrew Clark arrived. In consultation it was not deemed advisable to alter the treatment. Mrs Gladstone and Miss Gladstone remained in attendance during the night. Early in the morning Sir James Paget had a consultation with Dr Clark, and visited the patient. The treatment already decided on by Dr Blake was not, however, altered. Notwithstanding the injuries he had received Mr Gladstone slept well during the night, and was anxious to be allowed to leave his bedroom and return to his duties in the House of Commons, for which he expressed himself to be fully competent. Submitting, however, to medical advice the right hon. gentleman was induced to abstain from political duty for at least four days to come. At the request of Dr Blake Mr Gladstone retired to bed immediately after his wound had been dressed, and after the visit of Sir J. Paget yesterday morning the traffic of carriages was stopped in Downing-street. Lord Granville, Sir C. Dilke, Lord Kimberley, the Duke of Argyll, Lord Northbrook, Mr Bright, the Speaker, the Lord Chancellor, numerous foreign Ministers, the Duke and Duchess of Wellington, Mr A. M. Sullivan, M.P., the Bishop of London, the Earl of Kenmare, Lord R. Churchill, Sir Stamford Northcott, and Lord Hartillery were amongst the visitors during the day. Doctor Clark visited Mr Gladstone twice during the day and reported the right hon. gentleman as going on well, and that no danger need be apprehended as to his condition. In conjunction with Sir J. Paget, he has deemed it advisable to give a strict injunction that the Premier should not be allowed to resume Parliamentary duties for at least four days. The right hon. gentleman has been confined to his bed since the occurrence of the accident, but he has been permitted by his medical advisers to see his secretaries and to give directions as to his correspondence. Although all the members of the Cabinet have called in Downing-street Mr Gladstone has only been able to see Lord Spencer and Mr Forster. During the evening the right hon. gentleman slept well. Her Majesty the Queen telegraphed early in the day to ascertain the condition of the right hon. gentleman, and Mrs Gladstone replied that her husband was progressing favourably. Several times during the day inquiries were sent from Marlborough House, and the Prince of Wales called personally at Downing-street. So strict was the arrangement made by the police for the stoppage of traffic in Downing-street that the Chinese Minister was compelled to alight at the end of the street.

The Prince of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh left London last evening, en route for Germany, whither they proceed in order to attend the marriage of Prince William of Prussia and Princess Augusta Victoria, which takes place on Sunday at Berlin.

The Late Thomas Carlyle, at a small preliminary meeting held at the Rectory, Chelsea, on the 23rd inst., it was resolved: "That it is expedient to raise a memorial to the late Thomas Carlyle; that such memorial should consist of a statue, to be erected on the Thames Embankment, opposite Cheyne-row, and should permission be granted by the Dean of Westminster, of a bust to be placed in the abbey; and that a public meeting be invited to assemble at an early date to consider the best means of carrying into effect this proposal." Due notice will be given by advertisement of the date and place of public meeting. In the meantime the Rev. G. Blant, the rector of the parish, will be glad to receive the names of any persons who may wish to join the movement. Should sufficient funds be forthcoming, it is intended that the statue should be the well known one by Mr. Boehm.

The Empress of Austria.—The Empress of Austria has enjoyed several days' splendid sport with the Cheshire and North Staffordshire hounds this week. Monday she was out with the South Cheshire hounds at Wilksley. On Tuesday the weather put a stop to sport. On Wednesday she met the members of the North Staffordshire Hunt at Wroo, while yesterday she was present at the Ash Steeplechases. The Empress rode ten

miles to the hunt on Wednesday, and was in the front rank in one of the most brilliant two hours spins of the season. The Ash Steeplechases were arranged in connection with the North Shropshire, the North Staffordshire (North and South), and Sir W. W. Wynne's hounds. The course, which is situated at Ash, about four miles from Whitchurch, and ten from Combermere, H. M.'s hunting-box was one of about four miles of fair hunting country, with nine stiff fences. While arrangements were being made for the first event Her Majesty rode on to the field on a magnificent full-blood horse, accompanied by her attendants. Count Lichenstein accompanied her Major-General on the road, and described the nature of the fences to be negotiated. Her Majesty then took her hunter over them, clearing one after the other in charming style. When she reined in her steed the large company gave a loud cheer, which her Majesty acknowledged by a graceful bow. She then rode off to a hillock at some distance, taking ad the intervening fences flying, which commanded an excellent view of the race, and it was from here that she watched the results with interest. Among those present were the Marquis of Stafford, Lord Combermere (who officiated as steward), Sir Vincent Corbett, Lord Hill, Lord Cole, the Earl of Crawford and Balcarres, and other members of the various hunts interested. Mr. Clement Hill won the North Shropshire Hunt Steeplechase with Fiddle, Mr. James Major won the Cheshire Hunt Steeplechase with Vivian Grey, Mr. White with the North Staffordshire Hunt Steeplechase with The Sportsman, while Mr. T. Jackson, jun., pulled off Sir Watkin Wynn's Hunt Steeplechase with New Oswestry. An objection was lodged against Vivian Grey, on account of the rider dismounting before entering the paddock. The weather though cold was delightfully fine.

To the Editor of the Times,
 Sir,—The papers of to-day report interviews in Paris between some of the Irish members and Rochefort and other well-known leaders of the Revolutionary party in France. If such reported interviews are correct, I feel bound, even at the risk of misinterpretation, to take the very earliest opportunity of raising my protest as an Irish member against a proceeding which is calculated to lead the public to suppose that such a course of action is approved by the Irish people or in harmony with the Irish Catholic traditions. I write as an Irish representative of strong Nationalist sympathies to say that if the sentiments imputed to those who interviewed Rochefort be correct, I, for one, completely dissociate myself from them, and I emphatically and distinctly repudiate the attempt to make out any connexion between those who myself are seeking to redress the admitted grievances of the Irish people and those who support the Commune in France and have made themselves conspicuous throughout Europe for their advocacy of Republicanism, atheism, and Revolution.
