## LATEST NEWS

PRESS TELEGRAMS.

The following systems of the latest news by telegram, from all quarters, is taken from our colleagues.

Rio 17th.

Loan of 10 millions will probably be launched in London, as it cannot be floated in Paris.

Exchange rising rapidly.

Many draws; no takes.

Montevideo, 18th.

Capataz of stevedores on board the Avon, a Frenchman, kicked to death by two Spaniards with whom he had a quarrel.

Press predicts that the question between Brazil and Argentina will end badly.

Tucuman, 18th.

Things look threatening here.

Free and independent electors preparing to vote with revolver bullets on the 31st.

Rosario, 18th.

Central Argentine Railway gave 149,385 pts in November; Expenses 61,819.

The emigrants who refused to go to Tucuman are loosing for work here.

## THE NEW LOAN.

The chief objection to the new Argentine Loan, now offering in the London market, is its insignificance. Had the loan been for \$10 millions sterling instead of £17,000, in all probability it would have been subscribed for, and taken up at once, but for the Argentine Government to enter the London market to borrow so small a sum as £817,000, is about as managing to its credit abroad, as if one of our leading merchants applied to one of our private banks for the discount of his own note for 25,000%.

When the news about this loan first reached this market, it was said that the hitch in the business was a protest to the stock exchange lodged by Mr Bayley on behalf of the 9 per cent Treasury Bond Holders, and although there is no question that Mr Bayley has made such protest, still, as will be seen by the following extract from a late number of the *Bulletin*, there are other and still greater difficulties surrounding this loan which are connected with Mr Bayley.

Our London colleague says the loan, like many others, has proved a complete failure, not from the London stock exchange refusing to give it recognition, but for the far simpler reason that the London bankers and the investing public refused to subscribe. All our clay colleagues are most indignant about Mr Bayley's protest, and the possibility of the stock exchange committing a foul quotation, but they ought to put the saddle on the right horse, and inform their readers that the hitch about the loan is not the stock exchange, but that the investing public stood

alright from the business.

The opinion in London is, that the Stock Exchange Committee will not refuse a quotation to the new loan, for the reason expressed by *Herpest*, and which we published the other day. But it is impossible to quote a loan that has not been subscribed or placed, and those who understand the London market will readily accept the views of the *Bulletin* that the "bona fide" reason why the loan has proved a complete failure is that the good cheer, the bright fires, and

"The Argentine Government have again appeared in the London Market as a borrower the last week, and have offered for public subscription £817,000 in six per cent. Bonds at 92½. We notice with surprise, however, that the old familiar name of Messrs. Muretta and Co. is absent from the prospectus, their place being supplied by Messrs. Morton Rose and Co. We have, of course, nothing but good to say of the last-mentioned firm, but are irresistibly compelled to notice the disappearance of the Murettas, considering they have been connected with nearly all previous financial arrangements for the Argentine Government.

As far as we can learn, the operation has shared the same fate as most other issues have lately, and been a complete failure. The public continue to stand quite aloof from all speculations or investments at the moment. It was, no doubt, well syndicated before advertised, and therefore in the course of time will no doubt be absorbed. Mr. E. H. Bayley, Chairman of the Committee of Argentine Nine per Cent Argentine Treasury Bondholders, who are at variance with the Argentine Government for withdrawing its decree for the amortization of those bonds, has given notice that his committee intend opposing a Stock-Exchange quotation for the same loan."

Washington, Nov. 24.

General Thomas Osborne, U. S. Minister to the Argentine Republic, here on a leave of absence, expresses the opinion that the troubles between the Argentine Republic and Brazil will end in war.

The Argentine Republic, he says, has purchased three monitors and two torpedo boats and has recently built one of the finest ironclads afloat.

The Argentine Republic has an army of 16,000 men, and a volunteer force of 100,000 men. The men are armed with Remington rifles and the navy with Krupp guns.

THE CRISIS IN FRANCE

LONDON LETTER

(From our own Correspondent.)

CAMBRIDGE.

Dec. 10, 1882.

You will have seen a great deal in the newspapers about the performance of Cambridge of the "Ajax" of Sapphoes, in the original language, with incidental music by the University professor. It is worth noticing, and was a treat to witness. The Hall in St. Andrew's street, commonly known as St. Andrew's Hall, had recently been converted into a theatre. For the occasion of the performance of "Ajax" a new proscenium, accurately designed from classical remains, was erected under the direction of Dr. Charles Waldegrave, a professor in the University, together with a thymele and other accessories of the old Greek stage, which added very much to the illusion. The scenery also of the Trojans was correctly and effectively painted.

The costumes were strictly historical and the performances, particularly that of the two leading parts, Ajax and Peter, or all the other subplots which could be offered them at home, viz., "the gloire" and prestige abroad.

They had a long, long "Carous,"
