GRATIOM TO CHILE.

For six last months or so, the shipowners calling at Montevideo, the way from Europe to Chile, were crowded with Spanish and Basques and some Swiss families, a bound for Chile. At first it was supposed that these families came to the late, and were booked in Chile, mistake to Chile. We even often effort in Montevideo to get the African passengers on board one of those steamers ashore, and like them "nobles viles" in a Plate, ad this very disgraceful fair was made the subject of immediate reclamation by the Chilean Government. But however followed, with such nice succession, and always with croats of emigrant passengers for Chile, that at last the authorities, both here and in Montevideo, found out their mistake, and now the news is out that all these passengers not only came out on the passage to Chile, but with free fares in their pockets for homesteads in the South of Chile, with free living room, free seats, free supper, and free everything for the first year, so, and only to be returned to the Chilean Government at the expiration of years; the land to belong to the man on the payment, at the end of the years, of as much per hectare.

Fifty thousand hectares in the District of Angol have been set aside by the Chilean Government for these emigrants, who already number several thousands, and very soon all the country on the Pacific slopes of the Southern Andes will be as thickly colonized and settled as will be the Province of Santa Fe; and our readers must remember that there is no finer agricultural district in all Chile, beautiful temperate climate, good fertility soil, easy communication, and next door neighbours to Nahuel Huapi, Bariloche, and other parts of the Argentine Republic, which we suppose will not be settled and colonized on before St. Bib's eve.

Verily Chile does every thing in earnest; and this emigration and colonization scheme, so quickly and quietly carried out, shows what a very superior people our neighbours are—

We hope our friends in Congress at the next session will demand of the Minister of the Interior the fullest guarantee about this Chilean system of colonization and emigration, and that the Senate and Deputies will not faint on mass" when they read the terms.

The BATTLE OF CASEROS.

Last Sunday was the 2nd anniversary of this celebrated battle which broke for ever the power of Juan Manuel Rosas in these countries, and gave birth to the liberties and institutions which the country at present enjoys.

Russia is on an inclined plane, and seems approaching another Imperial bankruptcy as in 1813. About a year ago Professor Bunge made an heroic effort to retrieve and remodel the finances, but this is a task always most difficult in despotic countries. He was forced to resign, and so out of joint with his colleague he still bears that of reducing their debt at the rate of 2 millions sterling every month. Despite of insane tariffs the United States advance with giant strides and sound measures.

Australia spent 22 millions last year or 150 shillings per inhabitant, which is more than 3 times as much as in the United Kingdom. The expenditure was 17 per cent. of earnings, but such is the diffusion of wealth in those colonies that taxation is not felt.

The Austrian Republic with an expenditure of six millions shows a ratio of 40 shillings per inhabitant, but this is not excessive. As the national earnings in 1882 summed up 61 millions sterling it may be said that the national expenditure is about 10 per cent. It is true the Provincial budgets are heavy, but the same is true in the United States. If we include National and Provincial, the total is under 15 per cent. of earnings, and few European countries are under this ratio if local taxation be included.

The Austrian expenditure compared to national earnings is 124 per cent., against 7 per cent. in United Kingdom. The reduction of military expenditure, since the loss of Lombardy and the disaster of Sadowa, has enabled the empire to improve its finances and got rid of some water. In Sunday's *Nacion* a very interesting account of this memorable battle is published which we recommend to the notice of our readers, and the writer gives a graphic description of the state of this city on the day after the battle, the 4th Feb. 1852, when for 4 hours the shops and houses in town were being sacked by the poneys and muzzines of the town—of course, for some of the readers the events of those two most memorable days in this country's history are as fresh as yesterday, but a generation has grown to manhood since Rosas fell, and the student of Argentine history has yet much to learn of the battle of Caseros, which in one sense was a Waterloo, and in another a Leuca.

The blood which was shed at Caseros was not spilt in vain, and we date from that epoch a new era.

It will be a light task, the outlook for Europe in 1884 is gloomy. The budget for 1883 showed nominally 78 millions £, but the real expenditure was apparently 55 millions, or 11 per cent. of national earnings. For a nation of poor peasants even this ratio is oppressive.

The Austrian monarchy shows an expenditure of 75 millions, equal to 40 shillings per head, and compared with the United Kingdom as follows:

Whoever witnessed the elections on Sunday would hardly endorse one of the reasons for which a London colleague considers this country as peculiarly attractive for Irishmen: "Elections are frequent and conducted in a lively manner, and revolutions are not infrequent." The elections on Sunday were the reverse of lively, in fact there were no voters to be seen, and we suppose they sent proxies.

A countryman in Brazil, who has lost his liver in that torrid zone, writes to us to say that he is thinking of coming to this country, and begs us to answer the following questions which we fancy we have rather often seen before:

1st.—Are situations for young men easily obtained in Buenos Aires, Rosario and La Plata?

2nd.—If so, which is the most flourishing town?

3rd.—If not, where else?

4th.—Do young men receive good salaries?

5th.—Are expenses heavy or moderate in the Plate?

6th.—Is the month of September a good time to visit the Plate?

We will publish to-morrow an article from a London colleague that will answer fully all our correspondent's questions; meantime we may reply No! to his first and fourth queries, heavy to his fifth, and awfully good time to his last. "Hasta mañana amigo!"

A reception was given at the United States Legation on Friday evening to the Captain and officers of the U. S. war-vessel Nipic, now lying in this port. The object was to give the officers an opportunity to meet their countrymen residing in this city. The gallant officers of the Nipic did the duties of the evening to the great satisfaction of the fair sex. Dancing was kept till long after ten o'clock. General Osborn, as usual, made himself conspicuous by his kindly attention to the ladies and gents. During the evening Captain Seely and officers invited all the Americans present to visit the vessel.

The Montevidean Chambers last week voted a life pension to Drs. Herrera and Arenas Lamas.

The lists of passengers in the papers fill columns, but the names are so outrageously spelt that no man could possibly recognize his own father, mother, or mother-in-law amongst them.

The celebrated Paris publishers Galignani & Fries have now in the press a work that is pretty sure to sell well here. It is a translation into Spanish of the Selected Works of Edgar Poe, by Don Carlos Olivera, and this gentle soul's well known abilities are a full guarantee that the coming work will be a treat for his countrymen.

The trotting match at Palermo on Sunday between Muro and Colorado was won by the former, although he gave his opponent a square start. The stakes were 2,000 pesos.

Galignani's company has won an immense triumph in Valparaiso, and, of course, all the "mashers," dandies and dandies of the city are off their heads about that precious lady Miss Preziosi. Dña. Juanita brings down the house every night.

The New York papers are not half as good as they used to be. The most awful and revolting crimes fill their columns, and the leading journals have leaders on the terrible development in the Union of the worst crime.

The police take no notice of the "polito" mafiosos, and it is getting worse every day. On Saturday and Sunday the annoyances in the tram cars were greatly augmented by stupid idiots, some bearded others not—squeezing at the passengers in the cars and on people in the streets as the cars passed by.
