SAN JUAN REVOLUTION.

The rockets that broke over our houses tops and re-echoed through our streets yesterday morning carried us back ten years in our political life, and opened cells of memory which we had supposed the grand progress of the country had for ever closed. Revolution in San Juan—Senator Gomez killed—Both Governor and Vice-Governor badly wounded—such were the headings of this blighting news from the provinces that stunned our ears yesterday morning in the crowded and thronged streets of the Capital. Ten years have elapsed since we had a revolution in San Juan; and in that long interlude the name of that rich province has been more associated with rich wines than with political disturbances. San Juan, the birth-place of our Argentinian Homer, has taken its rank

with some of the foremost and most progressive of our provinces. In a very little time the locomotive will reach it from Mendoza, and all the aiding elements of civilization be within its reach. Had the news come to us yesterday of an earthquake in Mendoza, or a flare-up in the Government House of Santa Fe, we should have been better prepared for the "bolotin." But revolution in San Juan finds us all back; and, although it would be an error to attach too much importance to the revolt, since in all human probability the revolution will be stamped out before it make further progress, still the scandal is perpetuated, and over the grave of the first victim, Senator Gomez, one sees on the whitewashed sepulchre of free institutions in this country and the coffinlid of Quiroga slightly lifted.

We who are mere tyros in provincial politics, can hardly credit the rumour that this event sprang from the first labors for the next Presidential election. It may be so, and possibly we are to be told that in every other province, when political opposition raises its head, we may expect the same events. But we find it difficult to accept the theory, and rather believe that the whole affair is a mere local squabble where by accident or on purpose all the provincial authorities would have been done for but for the timely putting out of the light by Doncel.

We give at foot the telegram with all the details at hand, so far, eliminating many rumors and reports, which, if true, would give colour to the revolution and new nails to Senator Gomez's coffin. What we must all regret is the frequency of these Presidential elections which experience proves are the bane of our political life.

It appears to be intended by the Government to be 16 instead of six years, the sooner such a reform be introduced the better.

There was great anxiety yesterday to hear from San Juan as it was rumoured the Governor had been kidnapped and some others intensely South American measures carried out, but the atmosphere is so charged with political electricity, that it is hard to say who makes the light or who holds the wires.

So far, the elections of Congressmen in the Provinces and here show a sweeping majority of what is termed the Liberal Party, an we imagine that next Congress the National Government will hold sufficient majority to carry out the great measures which it will be time enough to discuss when the San Juan affair is blown over and no sevener question before the public for consideration than the innocent meeting of the innocent editors to remove the Tramway abuse.

Desirous on the part of the Government to surround the colonies established there, of the people of the Duke of Roxburgh, other demesnes too of no less beauty and importance were visible, the clear green of the fields shading with the shadows of the woods, over whose crests the turrets and towers of the proprietors raise their heads.

Another system, however, of founding colonies on Government lands, consists in granting a concession of these lands to certain companies at a moderate rate, on condition of a colony being started thereon. This mode of procedure would undoubtedly give as good results as the former, if the authorities would oblige the contracting parties to fulfill to the letter the conditions set down in the contract, and, judging by the footprints and trails and portions of clothing and property found in the embankment of the New River Reservoir, he must have struggled hard for his life; and yet no sound was heard by firing darts in the ball-room hard by, or by sleep-walkers, or silly passengers. When his body was found, some feet from the margin of the reservoir, where it seems to have been carried out by the murderer, who must have known well the shallow and deep parts of the water, and is also a proof that Tower did not fall by accident of his own accord, his diamond ring was still fast on his finger, but his money was gone and also his watch. A cambric handkerchief tied round his neck was his own property; and it appears he was in the habit of protecting his throat at night with his handkerchief, although it might nevertheless have been used on this occasion by his assailants to silence him with or finish him off. I was going to finish my dismal letter with the compliments of the season, but I thought me that where you are it will be trifles not worth a peep. It has been pretty warm here I can tell you this Xmas. A paragraph has been going the rounds of the papers detailing the precise number of murders, suicides, trials, outrages on women, robberies with and without violence, dirtlessness and want of truth in telegrams, and the consequent tameness of the newspapers in this newfangled but festive season. I am reduced to murders; but the tale I have to tell is of interest, as it comes home to the bosoms of all who walk the suburbs of London by night. It is an old adage of middle-aged men—never speak to a woman in the street." Older men, and bachelors, say "never speak to a woman at all." And really it comes to that if a nifty young man of

20, in a merchant's office, in the receipt of £100 per annum, and well up with pearl pin and diamond ring, and just in receipt of £6 or £8, his balance of a quarter's salary, spends a whole ten shillings in New Year's Cards, and on New Year's Eve goes from his office to the house of a lady, a Mrs. Earle, in Stoke Newington, who for the "bolotin." 
