ASSOCIATED PRESS TELEGRAMS.

HAYAS AGENCY

RE-INSTALLATION OF THE LORD MAYOR.

Public opinion is often times more powerful than even the bayonets of the National troops. Mr. Alvear can take to himself the credit of being supported by both, and yesterday public acclamation re-installed the Lord Mayor, before the National Government decree to that effect was promulgated, or the public force of the country placed at his disposal. Mr. Alvear's speech could hardly be more complete, and the resignation 'en masse' of the whole Municipal Board, may possibly to some extent atone for an error which has brought discredit on the board, and increased popularity to its supposed victim.

Mr. Alvear has done so much towards improving this city, that if the Municipales wished to impeach, suspend, or try him for disobedience, or neglect of duty, they should have to remove him to La Plata, or Chascomus, or San Vicente; within the radius of

the Capital he cannot be tried, and we call attention to this fact to show how unerring the opinion of the people is in such matters. Mr. Alvear as Lord Mayor, has established for himself a reputation for energy, straightforwardness, and honesty of purpose, which nothing but his own good conduct, and the faithful discharge of the trust reposed in him could have secured him. On all sides, in every quarter of the town, his works, his improvements and his untiring labors are evidenced. The people, the Government and public opinion are all with him, and with such allies he may indeed laugh to scorn the vote of the Board suspending him.

At 2 p.m. the Plaza Victoria was crowded; the steps of the Cathedral were occupied by those who continuously preferred to watch the current of events from far. A large crowd was stationed in front of the Municipality; all resolutely dressed people. At a quarter to 3 o'clock Lord Mayor Alvear, accompanied by Dr. Pellegrini and three other friends drove up, cheered on every side. As the Lord Mayor ascended the Municipal stairs there was a rush to the door and the policemen were unable to oppose the human wall. In the Municipal saloon congratulations poured from all sides, and shaking hands took up a quarter of an hour. The crowd outside became somewhat impatient and clamored for the Intendente, who appeared at the balcony and was welcomed with deafening cheers; hats were doffed, handkerchiefs were waved, and the wild Plaza shook under the thunder of Long Live His Lordship.

The Lord Mayor then addressed the crowd:

Gentlemen.

Many thanks for this great and spontaneous demonstration; you prove to me that my efforts are appreciated that your trust has not been misplaced. Now more than ever, I cherish the conviction that, as Lord Mayor of the city, I have fulfilled my duty towards you all. I have no other aim than that of saving the public, and this demonstration of esteem and sympathy is a further stimulant to my humble efforts. Citizens! I will always do my duty; all my ambition is centred in your welfare; all my aspirations are to improve the Municipal condition of the town. Thanks—many thanks for your spontaneous and eloquent marks of esteem.

The President then named a Special Committee—Roberts, Mendeza, Arechaval, Golifarni and Bonifacio—to settle the matter at once in a "cuadro intermedio."

Aldean Alvea reported that the letter sent to a special Committee.

The President—"The letter will be read presently."

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Aldean Alvea asked if there were no other masters before the House, and the President said there were not. Dr Larroque, who had installed himself as Lord Mayor, said he would explain the whole thing when Mr Alvear's note had been considered.

Councillor Boniface proposed that the Council should, if necessary, sit till that day twenty months, to settle whether the Lord Mayor could veto his own suspension or not. Carried: "non cedo."

The Special Committee here reappeared on the scene and reported that although the law did not allow the Lord Mayor the power of a veto in his own case, yet, to show strict impartiality, they advised that his note be considered; that the Council should insist on the suspension, which was not a penalty but merely a preliminary to the formal accusation; that two months was not too long to suspend his Lordship, considering the gravity of the case, and that the Lord Mayor should be informed that his suspension or not, good, and he would be summoned formally later on, to answer the charges against him.

That the feeling of Argentine nationality may not be weakened, that you may help to put forward the Constitution of the acts of the National authorities. That Book of Rights, guarantees, powers and limitations, has provided a corrective for every act of the constituted powers. It is the Argentine People that elect the Deputies; the Legislatures of provinces elect the Senators, thus composing the Houses of Congress, which make, maintain, or modify the laws. It is the Supreme National Court of Justice that declares whether those laws are or are not in conformity with the Constitution. And, finally, it is the Argentine Senate, representing the provinces, that judges the President of the Republic, and either supports him in his high functions, or suspends him in the exercise of power. If we exact respect for our national constitution, and liberty fully enjoyed.

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When this precious report had been read, Alderman Alvea said he would like to hear the Committee's reasons for such a report, as they had not given a single one; he attacked each clause of the report, and refuted them all so brilliantly that the "barra" burst out into loud applause, which made the President so wavy that he ordered the Court to be cleared, but Dr Larroque to warn his heart and direct his intellect, that love of nationality which is another word for Love of Country.

In respect to Provincial policy, I have just learned that I will observe, and cause to be observed, the Constitution and the laws, and this is all my programme. I will carry respect for the rights which the Constitution accords to citizens and parishes as far as the spirit of the fundamental Constitution admits; further even that it is my lot to not only maintain at any cost the free exercise of those rights; as I will not only maintain at any cost the free exercise of those rights; I will not only guarantee the fullest liberty of speech and writing, of meeting, of having Municipal Horse Guards.

Alderman Alvea eloquently, but firmly, repelled all the charges made against him by Dr. Larroque. Dr. Larroque here left the hall, having received a message which he hastily interpreted as a promise of support from the police.

Messrs. Arechaval, Navarro and Reboredo were then named as a Special Committee to inspect the Intendente's books and see improvements wrought by his hands. From this very balcony I witness the success of the crowning efforts of many years: the "recobo" is disappearing; yesterday it stood, to-morrow it will be no more, and from this window the citizens will soon gaze on the immense expanse of the blue waters of the Plate—an immensely encouraging and with our future as a Capital as a nation.

Such improvements speak the man; and I hear the sentiments of the public by applauding these efforts, and requesting the Lord Mayor to repeat the post and to continue his straightforward line of policy for the benefit of the citizens."

Pellegrini's speech took the crowd by storm; cheers followed cheers, whilst fresh numbers swelled the crowd, and we may say that at half past three all the respectable citizens of the central part of the city were gathered round the Municipal Hall.

Yesterday's demonstration re-instating the Lord Mayor was as spontaneous as it was merited. Had no notice been given in the paper it would have assumed still greater dimensions, but few of us knew anything of it until the speech in the Municipality were over, and Mr. Alvear was on the sidewalk in the Plaza Victoria, arm in arm with Dr. Pellegrini marching for his house. In an instant a procession was formed, and some of the first men of Buenos Aires, of cosmopolitan character, evidently judicious and careful, should tolerate the election of a Municipal Board like the present one, that has shown all along its incapacity to manage affairs, and has finally brought masters to a crisis in this emergency. Henceforward, let every man drop his veto in the Municipal urn, that the city may have a representative Board to manage municipal affairs!" Then addressing Mr. Alvear he stated that with all his defects he enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his fellow-citizens. The last words were greeted with tremendous applause.

There was a call for Dr. Pellegrini, who came forward and said:—

Gentlemen.

This ovation is an encouragement; a well-deserved applause to merit and the brightest, most ambitious reward, that a public man could desire.

Lord Mayor Alvear well deserves it; on all sides you see improvements wrought by his hands. From this very balcony I witness the success of the crowning efforts of many years: the "recobo" is disappearing; yesterday it stood, to-morrow it will be no more, and from this window the citizens will soon gaze on the immense expanse of the blue waters of the Plate—an immensely encouraging and with our future as a Capital as a nation.

The latest "disparate" of the Municipalities is to put up, in their temporary quarters in the Colon Theatre, a costly marble slab to commemorate the 25th of May. The cutout is quite useless, considering that the Corporation are only in lodgings in the Colon for the present.

The *Scientific Review* has raised a question of ineffable delicacy that will set the whole civilised world by the ears, if not by the hair. Our contemporary declares that it is highly un-healthy for two persons to sleep in the same bed. Electricity is at the bottom of the mischief, as it one person be highly nervous, and the other the reverse, the latter will sleep all night soundly, whereas the other—electricity passing to his or her bed-low of inferior organization—will rise next morning in a thundering bad humour, and raise ructions in the household. This is a new problem for Sir James Hannan to solve in all the knotty cases brought before him. "Quis sabet" how many diverse cases Electricity has to answer for?

We are authorized to state that our correspondent "Herodotus" is correct in his remarks, in so far as the delays to the 6.50 p.m. train to the Boes are concerned, but that these delays are unavoidably caused by the late arrival of the express train from "La Plata," which is timed to arrive at the Central at 6.25 p.m. This train is a very heavy one, carrying from 400 to 500 passengers, and when a train of such magnitude has a late start, it is imprudent, for safety's sake, to make up time on the journey. The only way to remedy the evil which "H" complains of, would be to suppress the Boes train at 6.50, which we do not think would be agreeable to either the Boes passengers or "Herodotus."

The "La Plata" papers say that all the Government employees there who live in the wooden houses from the U.S. States find them decidedly easy and comfortable. This is gratifying news for their friends here. A large wooden house for a Loreto estancia is expected here from New York in a few days. We shall not be surprised to see these ready-made wooden houses become the fashion in the camp very soon. The Archbishop paid a visit to La Plata the other day, and was greatly surprised and pleased with what he saw.

The Minister of Interior issued yesterday a decree that will put an end to all the "bandera" nonsense that has been such an insufferable plague in this city. It provides that only the Government, the army, and the navy can use the Argentine flag that has a sun in the centre. On public feast days the citizens can hang out the Argentinian flag that has no sun in the centre. Foreign flags can not be flown on land, except at the Legations and Consulates. All this is quite right and proper, and we hope it will be duly enforced.

On account of the death of Senator Juan Bautista Martinez, the Provincial Chambers were closed on Thursday. All the flags in La Plata were half-masted. The Argentine Geographical Institute are calling for tenders for the publication of a map of the whole Republic. The two proposals made at a former call have been rejected.

The Comisario de Puerto Deseado has been ordered to buy the animals promised by the government to the colonists about to settle there. For every family there will be 250 sheep, 1 hog, 6 cows, 1 bull, two horses, 1 mare, fowl etc.

Under pretext of subscribing to a hospital, Juan Guegueliano was despoiled of 120 m.n. which it is needless to say never went farther than the collectors' pockets.
