LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

London, April 20th.

The Queen has telegraphed to the
Prince of Wales, stating that her health
has been much benefited by her stay at
Grasse.

According to a report from Delagoa
Bay, the Portuguese have fired upon a
steamer conveying some British pri-
soners to Mafeking, and have seized
the vessel and the cargo.

Mr. Henry Hicks Gibbs was on Sat-
urday returned without opposition for
the city of London, in the room of the
late T. C. Baring.

Mr. Gladstone has issued a circular
letter to the five Liberal candidates
who are contesting the constituencies
now vacant. He repeats his obli-
vions to the Land Purchase Bill,
