ASSOCIATED PRESS TELEGRAMS

HABAS AGONEY

Paris, 6th.

Ordinary sessions of Parliament definitely closed to-day.

Marselles, 6th.

According to calculations made with regard to the number of deaths by cholera, it appears that there are 35 deaths daily. The greatest alarm prevails.

Rome, 6th.

In consequence of the re-appearance of cholera in Marseilles, the Minister of Interior has advised all Profects in the kingdom to enforce the strictest quarantine on all goods, etc., coming from all districts infected or under suspicion.

PRESS TELEGRAMS.

Marselles 6th.—The panic arising from the reappearance of cholera has caused many families to abandon their homes in terror.

The papers have received notice not to mention any ravages committed by the plague. It is stated that within the last two days 80 persons have fallen victims to the terrible plague.

Madrid 5th.—The plague is spread with alarming rapidity in Cartagena. Cholera has broken out in the prison causing great havoc.

Madrid 6th.—The official bulletin announced yesterday 4282 fresh cases and 1570 deaths.

In this city cholera is rife amongst the poor.

Albany 5th.—Over 60,000 persons visited the remains of General Grant. One hundred persons at a time were allowed one minute to see the body.

London 6th.—The Times, in a leading article to-day, states that England sympathises with her sister America, while the northern and southern states join hands over the tomb in sign of friendship and grief.

The flags on all the yachts are half-masted in honor of the deceased warrior and statesman.

Albany 6th.—Governor Hill has decided to place a marble slab on the spot in the Capitol where the remains of General Grant are being exposed.

Mount McGregor, 6th.—Gen. Grant's widow remains here and has not, for the present, the intention of going to New York.

London, 5th.—Owing to the rumors that the Afghans are concentrating forces in Pendjeh, the Russians have sent reinforcements to that point.

The Russians are about to build a new town in Merv, including citadels, fortification, etc.

London, 5th.—No confirmation has been received, either in this city or in St. Petersburg, of the report of an encounter between Russian and Afghan troops.

Tehran, 5th.—The Shah has authorised the construction of a military road through Persia, which will stretch from Bushire on the Persian Gulf to the Afghan border. England will participate in carrying out the scheme, which will furnish great facility for transporting troops from the Gulf in quest of Herat.

Berlin, 5th.—The article against French pretensions published lately by the N. A. Zeitung, has caused great

excitement on the Berlin and Frankfort Bourses.

If official circles it is thought that this article will furnish a motive for augmenting the war estimates.

The "rapprochement" of Russia and France, it is remarked, coincides with the increasing friendly relations of Germany and England.

London 6th.—Mr. C. W. Field, who in 1858 laid the first transatlantic cable, that between England and Newfoundland, gave a banquet yesterday on the occasion of the 27th anniversary of this important event.

Cables were quoted yesterday at 99s. Memphis 5th.—The residence of the Rev. Counter, a colored missionary, was surrounded yesterday by 200 masked natives, who repeatedly fired shots against the walls and windows of the house. It appears that Counter had been a member of a secret society, and having left it, had made important disclosures. This conduct, according to the rules of society, must be expiated by the death of the culprit.

Rosario, 7th.—The inauguration of the new Italian Chamber of Commerce has been fixed for Sept. 2nd.

The Municipality are making strenuous efforts to improve the sanitary state of the town.

Montevideo, 7th.—A subscription in aid of the cholera patients in Spain is being raised. Already a sum of \$100 heads the list.

It appears that the idea of establishing in this city the branch of the Italian Bank in this city is more favourably viewed than formerly. The Italian residents here will probably carry out the scheme.

Yesterday the police discovered two men in Pocitos, whose occupation, it appears, was to coin false money. All the necessary instruments for the trade were likewise discovered and also a certain quantity of silver. A woman is implicated in the affair. The delinquents confessed being guilty.

A morning paper states that it is possible the Buen Pastor Convent will be reopened.

It is stated that a decision has been made to prolong the railway from Isla Caballo to Santa Rosa in Salto, at which point the line will branch off to Uruguayana.

The arrival is announced of the Copota.

Nothing new in political circles.

Telegrams have been received from Paris under date, August 7th, announcing cholera in Marseilles and that quarantine has been enforced at Gibraltar.

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crees, or in the sanction of laws that did not create any special fund for their carrying out.

To meet such demands it was necessary either to apply the ordinary revenue to their payment, or to raise money in the market, which is the inevitable result of all such unprovided expenditure.

The statement which the Government presents to Congress comprehends the total liquidation of all the floating debt, up to the 31st May 1885.

The debt due to the Provincial Bank springs from the law of Sept. 1882.

The debt due to the National Bank is for a sum agreed upon by the Government for public works, pending the placing of the loans authorized by law of Oct. 1883 and June 1884.

The Public Works have cost, up to 31st May, last, 24,049,612\$ m/n. This amount is made up so: 11,446,800 the net proceeds of sale of 10 millions bonds of 30 millions loan, and 4 millions of the 12 millions Sanitary Works Loans and Riachuelo, and by 12,608,812

which completes the total sum already expended, and which Government is still owing to the Bank.

The Treasury bills, which constitute another branch of the floating debt, amount to 7,290,29,832\$ m/n, and the amount the Government has availed for short advances or guarantees in 1882, 1883, and 1884, is 21,550

Central Argentine Railway Shares, presenting a value of \$1,477,200\$ m/n.

The 80,000 National Bonds fully paid up are not hypothecated; neither are included the million of the Treasury Bills created by law of 1876, 24 October, paid by the Government and afterwards given in guarantee, and which guaranteed loan the Government has just paid off, and has ordered the Public Credit department to cancel the 21st ult.

Thus if we deduct the sum of 4,500,000 including interest due to the Provincial Bank, under the law of Sept. 1882, and the amount 11,090,865 due to the National Bank, for advances to pay the public works, the entire floating debt of the Argentine Government for the last 15 years, up to and ending 31 May last, amounts to \$13,052,241,69

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Art. 1st.—The Executive is hereby authorized to issue internal bonds, bearing 5% interest and 1% amortization, at 85 per cent. The operation gives the Bank more or less the same interest as that paid by the Government in account current.

In the appended Bill the Executive proposes to pay off outstanding of the Finance Office in bonds at par, according to many precedents in our legislation.

The debt of the Confederate Government was paid in this manner.

The Treasury Bills of 1876 were handed to the creditors at par, although their market value at the time was 72 per cent., and the Government paid only 80 per cent.

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Art. 2nd.—These bonds shall be handed in payment for the following debts:—

1 Debts due to the National Bank, up to 31st May last, and amounting to 11,090,865 750 m/n.

2 Debts due to the Provincial Bank, up to 31st May last, amounting to 4,500,000 \$m/n.

3 Outstanding in the Finance Office, amounting to 1,614,560.97 \$m/n.

Art. 3rd.—The debts due to the National and Provincial Banks shall be paid for short advances or guarantees in 1882, 1883, and 1884, and that of the Finance Office, up to 31st June last.

The outstanding in the Finance Office shall be paid in these bonds at par, with interest running up to the date of maturity.

Art. 4th.—Heretofore a tax of 1% is levied on the authorized circulation of all banks of issue, to begin with the 1st of August, 1885.

Art. 5th.—This tax on issue shall be officially employed for the service of these bonds, besides the general revenue of the nation.

Art. 6.—All expenses of the present law shall be met by same.

Art. 7.—It shall be communicated etc.
