Mr. Forrester asked the Secretary of the meeting to read General Roca's note to the gentlemen named as his committee, that would show everything.

The Chairman ruled the matter out, as the note in question was not directed to the Cámara, but to the peace committee, and here the matter dropped.

such as ours, nor shall we intrude on a subject that must be discussed in other and calmer times; but when public order is disturbed, the fair fame of the country imperilled, when peaceable citizens are stopped in the streets by guards and patrols, the same as if the country were declared to be in a state of siege, and asked to produce their 'papeletos,' it is high time to cry out and ask how much longer is this wretched state of things to last?

Strong in its right, the Provincial Government, and its first attempt has been crowned with success, a large quantity of arms having been introduced to-day at the residence of the Executive of the Capital.

In the opinion of the Provincial Executive the responsibility of this election views, and the National Government, for its unjust resistance, and unprecedented bad faith, but the Government wishes to have your opinion on the subject, which is the subject of this communication.

We are threatened with decomposition and anarchy, and all manner of mischief is being done to the people with their arms, the Executive with its will, and your Honorable House as its ally.

Then came the events of last September, when the existence of the Province Government and also public order were threatened, and the Government, seeing that arms were absolutely necessary, to keep order, bought a small quantity, and permission was at once given to pass them through the Custom House, but when a similar permit was asked for larger quantities, the National Government issued a decree interpreting the Customs Law to lay down that the Province had no right to clear any goods of any kind without paying duty.

We then asked permit to pass a small supply of ammunition, which was granted, the duties were paid into the Treasury to order of the National Government, but the National Government itself had always shown great willingness to see for the Province, which the Provincial Bank gave it, but on this occasion refused to send, from mere caprice.

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Then came the events of February, and our relations became strained, and the Provincial Government made another attempt and asked permission to clear some percussion muskets, but the Minister of War returned no answer; so here we have \$100,000 worth of arms belonging to the Province (embargoed in the Custom House).

It was no time for hesitation, B. Ayres was treated in this way, while arms from the Parque de Artillería were sent to the Interior Provinces. More still. Some of the provinces, such as Entre Ríos, while our arms were lying in embargo, were allowed to buy 700 carbines, from Messrs Getting, and Messrs Bonnberger, which were dispatched free of duty and sent up in a National war vessel. So the Executive then resolved to use its right, by force if necessary. No matter what may be said, as in the case of the Province, the Province has a right to keep deposits of arms, for the National Guards, to preserve order and assist the police when necessary.

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COUP DE BOCA

The Spaniards have a proverb which runs 'Por la Boca muere el Pez,' and the occurrence in Wednesday morning suggests that, if this country is to be ruined, it is the Boca that will effect it. In moments of such intense excitement that the scathing sarcasm of the Englishman, thirty years ago, looking out of his window in Calle Reconquista, and asking 'What Governor is to-day?' comes back to memory, and we throw down the bulletin with the details of the humiliation. Are we advancing? Are we progressing? Or is all that we write of this splendid land mere mad elation, a night of mistle, or a Bola meeting to light welcome our Peace Commissioners back, when almost in the dead of night, into a Plaza Victoria is turned, into a Champ de Mars, and Colonel Arias, at the head of some Provincial troops, turns out, to march his men to the Boca? There is something so startling in the whole affair that, if we collect the circumstances that surrounded it, we must naturally conclude that the circumstances are delusions, and things are so far from what they seem that a fipny drummer or an excited Bombero may plunge the whole nation into civil war.

THE SITUATION

In complimenting President Avellaneda with his 30 years' full and admirable ability in producing a situation which even the small boys in the street cannot advantageously, we must remind ourselves that the Republic is not any other country could do the same. To hold a ball of fire in your hand without being burnt, to drive the ship of State on the rocks without shipwreck, are no ordinary feats—and yet it breathes sarcasm to congratulate public men on the misfortunes of their country, and to advise them to rig their lives out of us all.

MEETING REFLECTIONS

The Bola meeting on Monday night is the subject of rude comments, not only by a wide circle of merchants who received no notice whatever to attend, but also by many who assisted at the meeting and expressed their regret at the desultory discussion about the proposition of the Peace Committee's powers. Mr. Sanjibual, the informant of the committee, seemed as fatigued after the trip as if he had come from Rosacomon, not Rosario; and his speech, recounting the interviews between the Committee and General Roca, had but one point in it, and that was that the General would not allow his name to be made the pretext of civil war, and that whatever the decision of Congress would be, Argentines should respect it. None of the other members of the committee thought proper to improve on Mr. Sanjibual's rather laconic report, and, if we except Mr. Forrester, no one present attempted the least expression of opinion on the issues between the two parties, and which had led to the peace mission on which Mr. Sanjibual had made his report.

ROSARIO

The great Argentine, Berytho, who Riveros was never much appreciated by the interior provinces. It was enough that he was a Porteño, like the illustrious Portenos, to make the provinces view him with suspicion and dislike. This feeling has not died out yet; and it will be some time before Rivadavia will be national hero. The curious incident that occurred in the National Senate a few days ago proves the truth of my remarks. Senator Voles, of Cordova, and Senator Argento, of Santa Fe, not only voted against Durand's benefit, worth 2700 of the elite of this city lung on her account, that another hulla-ballo was raised in the Senate, and a grating rattle of the artillery passed through our streets made even the girls in the dress circle start. 'Hallelujah in a cock!' Our hulla-ballo, which brings such words so apropos to our mouths at the moment. And when the baritone came to the foot-lights, 'Fino Mezo,' there were others heading out for the Chacarita with Krupp steel guns, singing to far different music the same in the dress circle.

Every statement of the period has admitted the impossibility of such a situation, and the foreign relations of the country are not on such a footing as to remove the suspicion that the divisions of Argentina will be availed of by our neighbors...
