**RAINING-THE-WIND COMPANIES.**

The free banking fever has again set in. Governor Flores has dictated a general banking law in Montevideo, and Mr. John Dam has, with the aid of Governor Oroño, done almost the same in Rosario. In a few weeks we expect to hear of some other gentlemen up in the provinces imitating their example, and before the year is out there is every probability we shall have the Oriental and Argentine Republics flooded with paper-money. It may be asked where will all the capital come from, but as far as we can judge by Mr. John Dam's joint-stock concern, specie capital is an antiquated notion, and now exploded in the River Plate. Capital for banking purposes consists of anything which can be regarded as a tangible security—thus a gold watch, a cartload of wool, an old coat, or a strip of land on the frontier, or any or all of these constitute what is called capital.

The articles of association of the new Rosario Bank are before us; it may be that we have misinterpreted them, but candidly speaking we must say that we are surprised so practical a man as Governor Oroño would sanction the formation of a bank, dub it with a name, and even give it a charter before a single copper of the nominal, proposed or specified capital has been subscribed for. It speaks badly for the future of these countries where the men in power lend themselves to such a business. The nominal capital of this proposed bank is one million of patacons, but the bank can begin operations when a fifth of that capital is subscribed for, namely two hundred thousand patacons.

If the articles in question provided that all subscriptions to the stock should be paid for in gold, we should find no fault with the scheme, but judging the concern by the articles before us, we feel confident that this Bank of Rosario, with a nominal capital of one million, and a subscribed capital of two hundred thousand dollars, can begin business with a real capital of nothing—for instance—

A. B. subscribes for one hundred shares to set the bank going. Money being very tight, in order to pay for those shares he mortgages his property, whatever it may be, to the bank, and in return gets his shares with the usual certificate. Thus in one day the fifth of the capital is subscribed for, and yet not a dollar paid in. People will say that such a scheme was never thought of by the founders of the bank, but we think article 11 fully bears us out, which says, "that the bank may sell, or give as guarantee, all securities such as mortgages, shares, pagarés, &c., whenever the bank may find it expedient so to do." Now, it is clear, from the tenor of this article, that all the securities given to the bank in payment of the shares, can be transferred or sold by the bank; ergo, when the bank wants to raise a little gold or silver, so as to enable it to emit three times the amount in its notes, the directors have only to pledge the securities which they hold and borrow, no matter at what interest, the necessary specie. There cannot be the slightest doubt, that if the promoters of this bank are so disposed, they can thus comply with every article in their charter; and thus without one farthing of paid up capital, commence operations, and emit bills to three times the amount of whatever Bolivianos they can borrow.

It may be that in countries like these, no other feasible means of starting a bank presents itself; but, we must say, that we look with suspicion on a scheme which originates on credit, is

carried on on credit, and runs every risk of getting smashed on credit.

The Flores free banking law bears more the stamp of care, prudence, and even honesty, although there is a marked want of protection about it also. We opine that henceforth all banking laws should begin with the following article:

"All banks started in any part of this Republic must pay into the national treasury the full amount of its capital, one-third in gold, and two-thirds in National Bonds, at a margin of 20 per cent. below the lowest market price which said bonds sold for during the previous six months, such bank then shall be authorised to emit bank notes for its full capital. The treasury department to return the gold to the bank when receiving in lieu its equivalent in bonds or other marketable securities.

If Messrs. Dam and Flores would adopt this plan, there would be no room for the sinister doubts which are at present entertained respecting their banking schemes; in fact, we have had so much of banks, with a colossal nominal capital, and a pigmy paid up one, that it is time a stop be put to such dangerous raising-the-wind concerns.

Neither Oroño nor Flores, nor even our friend Dam, know much about banking; the less they meddle therefore in such matters the better—

**FRENCH MAILS SAVED.**

**GREAT TE DEUM.**

LOSS OF THE ROYAL SOVEREIGN CONFIRMED. Standard Office, Montevideo, Monday, Feb. 27.

Montevideo has for the last three days been a prey to that inevitable excitement and exultation which generally succeeds a great victory achieved by one strong faction over another. The minds of a people who for more than a year past have been incessantly accustomed to the din and excitement of war, must be estranged gradually and carefully from this habitual feeling so pregnant with evil, to one more gentle and more peaceful. I suppose such to a certain extent will have been the idea of the Government in instituting these fêtes, which are supposed to be in celebration of the triumph of the "colorados," but which I think are really meant to restate that feeling of security and confidence which is so indispensable to the very existence of a Government. As I informed you last week, on Saturday was to have taken place the great Government manifestation, to celebrate the re-establishment of order and complete pacification of the Banda Oriental. Every thing was got up to render the affair as imposing and solemn as possible. This evening was to have been dedicated specially to the enjoyment of the citizens of Montevideo. Friday was a beautiful day and gave promise of a bright morning, but how often are we deceived; on Friday night it blew a regular gale of wind accompanied with torrents of rain, which lasted till near eight in the morning. This untoward event effectually put an end to the Te Deum, processions, and all other amusements proposed for the day. You can hardly fancy what a disappointment it was to the public. Every one was prepared and had their mind made up about the weather's being all that could be wished for the occasion. Towards mid-day the day cleared, but it was then generally known that the Te Deum was put off till the morrow, a very wise measure, as I doubt very much that people could have enjoyed themselves on Saturday, it was such a cold bleak day. The rain on Saturday morning was exceedingly heavy, and must have been pretty general, the sky presented a most lowering aspect and foreboded a continuance, which, however injurious it might have been to the amusement of the Montevideoan citizens, would certainly not have been so to the country. Towards evening the weather again became threatening, and fears were entertained for the morrow. A heavy mist fell, but for merely a short time. This however did not put off the evening's entertainments. The Bell-ringers at the Solis Theatre and a masked ball at the San Felipe both passed off with the greatest calm. The masked ball

was attended by immense numbers, among the most prominent individuals were the two sons of the Governor, both exceedingly sprightly young gentlemen, especially the younger; he is called Edward. The young gentleman made himself rather remarkable on this evening by 'pitching' into a fellow about twice his own size, for some very slight reason. It was laughable to see the uncontrollable anger of the young lion; at some later period I shall give you an ample description of him and his elder brother. During the night it again rained heavily. Numerous private balls were given to celebrate the occasion, and came off remarkably well.

Sunday morning looked unpromising; the day broke cloudy and threatening, but towards nine o'clock the sun shone out and the clouds cleared off. Even at this early hour the streets commenced filling, every one making 'tracks' for the Plaza. All that money could buy was displayed in the magnificence of the dresses and the uniformity of the forms. The Cathedral was magnificently adorned, no expense having been spared to render the spectacle worthy of the occasion. Towards 12 all the celebrities were assembled. The Governor, Ministers, Consuls, Generals, all ranged according to their relative positions. The Governor and his Ministry attended, all in civilian's attire: Sr. Paranhos, Admirals Chagnon, Elliot, H.B.M.'s Consul, Mr. Lettson, and an immense number of officers.

The Cathedral was crowded to suffocation. Every one in the city appeared to have congregated around the Plaza; it was impossible to move.

The 'Te Deum' was intoned at 12 o'clock; a hundred voices burst forth in thanksgiving for that greatest of blessings which the Creator can bestow on a people—peace. It was truly an exciting scene, the loud song of thanks, the brilliant lights, dazzling uniforms, and crowded church. Two sides of the Plaza were lined with troops.

The 'Te Deum' being over, General Flores, Sr. Paranhos, and several others moved towards the great door. A likeness of the group was admirably struck off by a photographer. Then commenced the ringing of bells: a volley of musketry saluted the Governor, the great guns were discharged, and amidst the din created by bells and artillery the great crowd dispersed itself. The greatest order prevailed throughout the whole time.

I omitted to mention, that amongst the many notabilities present was our worthy countryman, Mr. McColl. On the whole, it was a most imposing ceremony. In the evening illuminations commemorated the great event: fireworks lit up the Heavens with their strange hues. The 'Campanologos' again performed, and bands of music went about serenading the great men who had more or less accelerated the establishment of peace. A 'masked ball' again took place in the San Felipe Theatre, so you may perceive there has been no lack of amusement here for the last two days.

An order has been promulgated by Government to the effect that all payments of the Bank shall be in specie, after the 15th of next June, thus rescinding the decree of the 7th January, which rendered paper a legal tender.

Two English vessels have been wrecked off the coast of Rio Grande, the 'Royal Sovereign' and the 'Fanny.' It is said that H. B. M. vessel 'Sharp-shooter' will proceed early this week to render any assistance that may be possible to the said vessels. Two Brazilian transports arrived in the harbour this morning; they bring 1640 men, who I suppose are destined to form part of the army which is to 'open up' (?) Paraguay. They have brought us later intelligence about the 'Bearn.' It would appear that the vessel is a complete wreck; the crew and passengers took to the boats when she struck, saving the mails and money. The money, on their arrival in Bahia, was deposited in the English Bank; the mails were forwarded by the English packet. At first it was stated that nothing had been saved except the lives of the crew and passengers, now the mails and specie, and I suppose when the French packet comes we shall hear that the cargo has been also partially recovered.

An American vessel arrived this morning, but no later news from the States. The French packet has not yet arrived.

**EDITOR'S TABLE.**

The villa, or rather city, of Mercedes was enlivened the other day by a party of gentlemen from town, who put up at the new Hotel in the Plaza, called the Hotel Globo, in front of the "Standard" agency. We hear the most satisfactory account about the treatment which our friends received at this Hotel, and have no hesitation in recommending it to the public. Since the opening of the Railway to this important country town, a new impetus has been given to business. The Basques cannot make bricks fast enough to meet the demand, and all the poor women in the town are busily employed making sacks for the grain which is daily arriving to be forwarded by train. New houses are going up so fast that shortly all the quintas will be cut up into building lots; and rents have so increased that house property in Mercedes to-day yields from 9 to 12 per cent per annum. The Villa Lujan has, as a matter of course, suffered by the opening of the road to Mercedes: it is now no longer the important town it once was, but we are informed by some of the residents of that place that although no new houses are being built, nor streets opened, the 'chaçara' business is steadily increasing; and from the extent of land now under tillage, there can be no doubt that the grain crops of Lujan will become of great importance. Sheep-farmers are beginning to see that these lands so near town are not so adapted for pastoral purposes as formerly, and that lands so valuable are better for tillage, than sheep-farming.

The Indians have made another raid into Santa Fé, but owing to the vigilance of the frontier troops, they were chased, and the cattle which they were sweeping off has been re-taken.

There is a great fuss in Corrientes at present about a troop of mules, 900 being got together, to be driven across the Gran Chaco, by an Irish gentleman to the province of Salta. The Corrientinos take the greatest interest in the affair. As to the present, no white man has dared to make such a trip. If our countryman carries out his plan he deserves to be rewarded by the National Government.

There is a system of espionage going on at the Boca which is causing the greatest annoyance, and most repeated complaints. It appears all the luggage and small parcels sent coastwise undergo a more scrupulous search than even the trunks of passengers in Paraguay. We are told that it is necessary to manifest every single article which a box contains, and that if by any accident a pound of tea or a small paper of sugar is omitted, the whole box is at once condemned. This searching business is now carried to such an extent that positively there is no sending boxes or trunks on board at the Boca. We have been requested to call attention to this matter, as the nuisance is perfectly intolerable.

Chascomus shooting parties are now becoming quite fashionable. We learn that another party is at present out there popping away at the ducks and partridges in the neighbourhood. We are promised a full report by a friend.

The far-famed Flying-fish is at last about to go up the river. We understand that she leaves in a few days for Asuncion, but have not heard when her mails close. The Flying-fish is such a very strongly-built steamer, and has such powerful engines, that she would prove a formidable vessel in war. The Brazilians may yet regret not having got her.

Mr. Rom's new paper, the 'Eco de Comercio,' appears on Saturday. We are happy to learn that it has already a very wide subscription list.

Our readers may remark that we now publish the taking rate of exchange. We do so at the request of many of our subscribers, who are anxious that all persons coming to this country with a little money should get the full value of their sight-drafts. A leading broker has kindly promised to favor us with the rate, and requests us to say that, at the rate which he gives us any person by applying to him can get their drafts (if first class) cashed. We dislike meddling in other people's business, but, none can deny

the imperative necessity of our cautioning new-comers on this subject, when we tell the public that yesterday a gentleman stated in our office that a young man who brought out a credit for £180, the other day received in nett cash £153. Such a shave as this is truly monstrous, and, as far as our influence and ability go, we are fully determined to put a stop to it.

The examinations commenced yesterday at the British Grammar School of Santa Lucia, Barracas. We regret having been unable to accept Mr. Pongard's invitation to the interesting Concursus, which will be continued to-day and to-morrow, and attended by the principal professors in this city.

The 'Tribuna' mentions a disgraceful trick by some fellows who sent round an invitation to the funeral of D. Juan Dillon, the worthy Justice of Peace of Merlo, who is we are happy to say in the enjoyment of excellent health. Only last Friday Mr. Dillon was received with great rejoicing by the people of Merlo on his removal from Merlo to the new Partido.

The police reports mention the murder of a young man in the Calle Parana on Sunday night, and a youth drowned off the Mole on Saturday; but nothing about the poor man apparently murdered by the 'serenos' in the Old Market.

It is rumoured that the Government has purchased the Ranger, but we have strong reason to doubt the exactness of this report: the Ranger is a first-rate little steamer, and would be a decided acquisition to the Argentine squadron, but we fear the Minister of war thinks her too dear.

The shareholders or friends to the Olden beef business are to meet to-day on 'Change. We hope it will be a little more orderly and parliamentary than the last general meeting at the Bolsa. Olden beef is selling well at home, and if good care is taken in the packing, might be made a magnificent staple.

The steamer which leaves for Montevideo this evening takes down the supplemental mail for the packet.

**THE WRECK OF THE FRENCH PACKET BEARN.**

Two Brazilian gunboats arrived yesterday with details respecting the loss of the steamer Bearn. She left Rio Janeiro on the 18th of February, p.m. sailed Abrojos on the 26th at 5.30 p.m. being much behind her time. The captain in order to pull up, and being also deceived by the high tide, kept too near shore [within 12 miles], and none of the officers nor even the pilot, who has made the voyage 33 times, perceived the danger.

On the 27th they sighted land, which they at first took for Cerro San Paulo near Bahia, but soon they calculated it must be Islaños. They did not however alter the course, and at 8.45 p.m., when the passengers were amusing themselves in the cabin the vessel struck on a reef, causing an immediate panic. The confusion being somewhat abated, and the captain failing to get her off by backing the engines, a boat was lowered to sound.

It was then tried to get the steamer into a small cove, lest she should break her back, but the sea rolled mountains high, dashing over the vessel, and in this awful state the passengers awaited dawn, for the night was pitch dark, and they did not know how far they were from land. They wanted to take to the boats, which was certain destruction, but luckily were induced to remain, and at daybreak the ladies and children were safely landed. A tent was constructed to shelter them from the rain. Some found shelter in the adjacent woods, and a few were received in the huts of the poor fishermen. They were divided into companies of 6, with a cook for each, who gave out the rations, including a bottle of wine and two of water per diem.

In this sad plight they remained until March 3rd, when two steamers arrived from Rio, with the French Consul, to their rescue. Very little of the cargo can be saved. The captain and crew, excepting 4 officers, proceeded to Bahia. The wreck occurred at Punta Castellanos, 20 miles south of Cerro de San Paulo.

**RIVER PLATE MAGAZINE.**

of varied interest and light reading. Dr. Burmeister's annals of the Museum (continued) treat of the Macrauchenia Patagonica first discovered by Darwin in 1834 on our southern coast, and afterwards by Bravard who perished in the Mendoza earthquake, but whose drawings have luckily survived.

The Pope's encyclical letter is given in full with the Syllabus.

"Mate" is an essay on the Paraguayan tea, shewing that its use is daily becoming unfashionable in Buenos Ayres: also the method of its collection and preparation.

Scenery of the Upper Uruguay, is from an unpublished novel called Ohoma, and full of tropical imagery and gorgeous word-painting.

An essay on Beauty is worth reading, but not original.

Two valuable papers on Mataderos and Saladeros: the first enters a protest against the barbarous method as used in Buenos Ayres, of killing cattle for the market; and states that a Spaniard eats 5lb. of meat per annum, a Frenchman 10, an Englishman 30, a Londoner 50, a Parisian 54, a Porteno 500, and a Gaucho 2,000lbs. Sor. Cambaceres a native of Paris is said to have put up the first Saladero in Buenos Ayres [1829], but surely Dowdall and other Irish or English residents were before him in the business. The estimate of Saladero peons at Barracas (12,000 men) also seems incorrect.

**FLUVIAL COMMUNICATION BETWEEN CHILE AND THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.**

It is a good sign that every day new efforts are devised to conquer the barrier of the Andes which separates this country from the Pacific. Mr. Wheelwright first proposed a railway near Copiapó, which was superseded by Lieut. Cox's discovery of an open pass near the head-waters of the Rio Negro: then Mr. Meiggs more boldly projected a railroad direct from Buenos Ayres to the capital of Chile, and Mr. Carpenter set himself about the more feasible plan of a carriage-road through the Cordillera to be open all the year round.

We have now an interesting report from an engineer of Valdivia who casts all the above projects into the shade, by asserting the discovery of a fluvial communication between the two Republics:

"The cañique Paulino Patrino de Paltos, with an Indian named Camin passed in 1860 through the Rancho gorge, at the invitation of the Argentine Indians to make an excursion into Patagonia. They picked up a large quantity of horned cattle, which broke loose and were lost while being conveyed to the Chilean markets. Finding the Rancho pass closed by the snow (for it was in August) and knowing that the road would not be passable until October, they took a Northern route to Lake Nontue, in the level country of the Pampas. Here they met Caicho, an Indian from Panguipulli, along with Leanea of the Rihine tribe who had arrived there in a canoe from Rihine. The four embarked then in the canoe at Pihucos on Lake Nontue and after three days navigation safely reached Lake Rihine in Chile. The river was everywhere deep and tranquil, at intervals stretching out like a lake so that the opposite shore was hardly visible: there were no rapids or waterfalls, and the coast throughout was so accessible that the voyagers could go ashore and pass the night."

LIVERPOOL STEAMERS TO BRAZIL AND THE RIVER PLATE.

We congratulate the trading community connected with these countries on the success which has attended the operations of the two lines of steamers which have been running for some time from Liverpool—one direct to the River Plate, the other calling at Brazilian ports. Some of these steamers have made the passage direct to Montevideo in 33 days, and homeward in a similar time, but the latter cannot be so well depended on, the vessels having sometimes to call for fuel. They have been well supported by shippers, and they also carry a good number of passengers, especially to the River Plate, where the tide of emigration is beginning fairly to set in, and it will soon be accelerated by the operations of a powerful company, possessing advantageous land concessions, which will ensure a steady, regular trade in emigrants. The Herschel, belonging to Messrs. Lamport and Holt's line, brought home last week the whole of the saved crew and officers of her Majesty's ship Bombay, and lauded them comfortably at Liverpool, saving the country a considerable sum by this prompt operation, for had there not been a steamer large enough to bring them the delay and expense by sailing craft would have been very great.

SOUTH AMERICAN BEEF.

It will be seen from the extracts which we give in our columns that the press continues to follow up this question in a manner that cannot fail to attract attention to this new article of food—so much required by our large consuming population—and at this inclement season, when soup kitchens are in operation for supplying the poor and needy, a trial of this cheap beef is especially desirable. It only entails a little trouble in the cooking, which soup kitchens in particular are enabled to bestow, with the large quantity they make, and the consumers of the soup would then have a practical illustration of the quality of the beef, and encouragement to use it afterwards. A supply of this beef can be relied on to any reasonable extent; and when we consider that it not only benefits our people, but also increases our exports to South America of manufactured goods, the objects to be attained are of paramount importance. We recommend Poor-law Guardians and all others interested in the welfare of our labouring population to try these experiments forthwith.—River Plate Mail.

COTTON IN SOUTH AMERICA.

We must confess to much disappointment that South America has yet done so little in augmenting our cotton imports, and that, instead of fighting and squabbling with each other, the attention of both Governments and peoples has not been turned to this very simple mode of enriching themselves, and adding materially to the prosperity of their respective countries. If anything could stimulate to exertion, we should have thought the four years of American civil war, with almost a total cessation of supplies of cotton from that quarter, coupled with the high prices in our market, would have done so;

but we cannot see that such has been the result. Brazil has certainly increased her production, and some of the smaller States have made laudable efforts; but on the whole the result is discouraging. We recommend to the notice of South American Governments the articles lately inserted in the 'Times,' showing the marvellous advancement of Bombay, almost entirely from its cotton operations, and although it cannot be expected these golden days will last for ever, there is enough to show that the production of cotton must be a source of permanent wealth to whatever country undertakes the cultivation of this article. There is no part in the world where cotton can be more easily grown than in South America, provided the Governments will take the needful steps to urge it on the people, such as has been the case in Egypt, in Turkey, and elsewhere; nor in the absence of such measures can they expect people of their own free will to plant and push cultivation, as the rural populations are, generally speaking, apathetic, and content to remain in the old beaten track. If the Governments undertook to supply seed, to furnish information, and to offer even a small premium on every bale of merchantable cotton exported, there can be little doubt that a large quantity would be forthcoming, but we cannot learn that any such steps have been adopted. The Argentine Confederation and Paraguay alone are capable, under proper stimulus, of producing a large quantity of cotton, and the sooner they set to work the better for themselves and for us. They may plead the want of hands and the absence of enterprise amongst land owners, but the prize is worth a great sacrifice, and every possible inducement should be held out to the latter whilst the opportunity is afforded them by the protracted struggle on the Northern continent, instead of frittering away their resources, and occupying the time of their people in frivolous squabbles. Sheep farming has been a lucrative occupation in the countries we allude to, but so would cotton farming, and we firmly believe that large districts of South America may be readily converted into cotton-fields which at present are utterly useless.

MISCELLANEOUS.

On Thursday evening a fight took place in a house in Montrose, between two men armed with red-hot pistols. Whatever the cause of their using such dangerous and terrifying weapons—which Bailie Nicol Jarvie of old wielded so well at the Clachan of Aberfoell—the result was that one of the combatants had a hole burned through his eyelid and an incision made into his eye-ball, by the point of the fiery weapon.

On Friday morning, as a cab was passing along the Rue Montmartre, Paris, within a few yards of the Bourse, a detonation was heard inside, and the coachman stopping, found that his fare had shot himself with a pistol in the region of the heart. He was taken to an hotel, where he lies in a dangerous state. It seems that he was a young man staying with his mother on a visit in Paris, and who was driven to desperation by the refusal of his parent to consent to his marriage.

Dom Fernando of Portugal, the father of the reigning king, has just sent to the Society of Aquafortistes de Paris a proof etching exhibiting great ability. It represents a funeral oration pronounced by a cat over a deceased brother; around the bier is a crowd of other cats expressing their grief in various ways; some wipe their eyes, some look upwards with resignation, while others seem transfixed by despair; but all stifle their sobs, and listen to the orator, who is seated with intense gravity on a tub.

I hear that at a recent ball at the Tuileries a young English lady (Miss Lloyd) made an enormous success. She is pronounced to be the most beautiful blonde ever seen, and this present year of grace is to be christened by our gallant neighbours after her. They say she is "as white as wheat!" The angelic sort of beauty, not rare among us, astonishes our friends on the other side of the Channel, where their beauties are of an over-expressive, burnt, black-eyed, demoniacal description. According to the 'Independence Belge,' of the 1th instant, the works of

the New Opera House have been interrupted by an incident. It has been discovered that a corner of the Grande Hotel, on the Boulevard des Capucines, will mask the facade of the new building. Overtures have been made to the proprietor of the hotel, which is known to be in the hands of M. Periere, with a view of removing the offensive portion of the pile of building in the way, and he has demanded no less a sum than twenty-four million francs. The arrival of letters at Barris from Saigon, Cochin China, was recently delayed by a singular incident. The native who acts as courier being some time overdue, the commander of the place sent a detachment to see what had become of him, when, after an hour's march, the troops found the unfortunate Indian perched at the top of a high bamboo, while two enormous tigers were at the foot rolling over the letter-box. The courier was then released from his uncomfortable position and enabled to continue his journey.

Business was very dull on 'Change' to-day, and specie ruled firm, although on time patacoens were weaker than even yesterday.

The question between Mr. Burr and the River Plate Bank still is the topic of the day. The letter in this morning's 'Standard,' signed 'A Foreign Resident,' has met with the most general approbation; we feel bound to say, however, that there were two leading English merchants, and one English broker on the Bolsa who took Mr. Green's part, and but that the information which we received from one gentleman is of a private nature, and likely if published to be contradicted, we would willingly acquaint the public with a few facts which may, to some extent, place Mr. Green and his bank in a more favorable light before the public.

The wool brokers seem disconsolate at the state of the wool market. Prices show no improvement, and we cannot quote prices higher than 90 or 95.

The new banking law in Montevideo was discussed on 'Change,' and merchants are of opinion that it completely precludes the possibility of the London and River Plate Bank becoming a bank of emission in that city. We hold that it is manifestly unjust, on the part of the Government, to make this prohibition, as it cannot but serve the country to allow Mr. Rading to import gold from England, and issue his notes in conformity with the law; the legal residence of the bank, although de facto in London, can, for the purposes of availing of the law, be made de jure in Montevideo, and although the stockholders cannot be expected to leave England to reside in Montevideo, still the bank in question can, we suppose, give sufficient security to the Government to protect the public against any loss. The River Plate Bank in Montevideo can never do any very extensive business without the right of emission, and it is but reasonable to suppose that the Florent Government will, in dealing with this question, act fairly and equitably towards Mr. Rading's bank.
