THE MAY FESTIVALS.

It is many years since the fetes of the revolution have been so poorly attended as this year. Not so much owing to the weather as to the impending war, a spirit of dulness seized our city, and the Club Progreso ball on the night of the 23rd was miserably attended, the gentlemen consoling themselves over a good supper for the absence of the ladies.

On the morning of the 25th several Basques and Italians from the suburbs came into town, but the respectable classes of citizens and foreigners were nowhere visible. The Te Deum at the Cathedral was sung with the usual pomp, but owing to an unlucky mistake in the hour, the corps diplomatique did not arrive in time. The British minister came first, and the others after. Among the visitors was the Duc de Penthièvre, son to Prince Joinville and nephew to Dom Pedro II. The Ministers, Consuls, Generals, &c. looked well in their gilt uniforms, but the number of ladies present was miserably small and of demi-monde.

The review in Plaza Victoria could only boast of about 600 soldiers, a company of artillery and the new regiment the 9th of the Line, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Calvete who was so conspicuous some time back by his quarrel with Senator Piñeyro. The various companies who defiled before the Policía, while Pres. Mitre surrounded by the cabinet ministers and foreign diplomats saluted them from the Municipal balconies. A luncheon was laid out in the council-room, and just as the illustrious guests were about to take their seats it was observed that the Brazilian minister, Sor. Leal, suddenly retired as if from a fit of sickness. It was however soon learned that a Brazilian gunboat had just come in with urgent despatches, and all sorts of un favorable stories were invented on the moment, which we do not think proper to report.

The merry-go-rounds were full of children, and a woman danced on a tight-rope over the points of knives. The fetes were however shorn of their brilliancy by the small number of people in the Plaza and most of them belonging to the "great unwashed." The absence of Mr. Wells the aeronaut was also felt. In the evening there were fireworks with the motto "25 de Mayo 1810."

SKETCHES FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.

NO. V. GOYA. General Paunero's last despatch, 19th inst. verifies what we predicted in our chapter on Rincon de Soto, viz that the allies would be unable to remain north of the Santa Lucia river if the enemy advanced in force. We now learn that the Paraguayan army, composed of 10,000 infantry, 6,000 cavalry, and 19 pieces of cannon, on occupying Bella Vista pushed forward without delay in the direction of Goya; and Paunero finding himself unable to oppose them with a small body of 1,200 troops and 5,000 badly-armed gauchos, embarked with the former on board Gomensoro's fleet, leaving the irregulars to escape by land.

It is not yet known whether the allies have chosen Goya or Esquina for their rendezvous, but seeing the impediment which the river Santa Lucia will offer to the advance of a land-army unembarrassed with baggage and artillery it is more likely that Paunero contacted himself with falling back on Goya, which is in many respects the most important town in Corrientes, and therefore worthy of especial description.

Goya is exactly half-way between Buenos and Asuncion, and is 25 leagues higher than Esquina, or about 220 leagues from Buenos Ayres. It stands one league from the Paraná, on a stream which takes its name from the town: this stream in low water is not navigable for vessels drawing more than four feet of water. The town was built in 1820, the site having previously been a cattle-farm belonging to a Portuguese whose wife's name was Gregoria or Goya, and here vessels used to call for beef since the close of the last century. Capt. Page estimated the population in 1863 at 7,000, but our notes in 1862 give a smaller figure: of these a large proportion is made up of Italians, Basques and French. A new church was built last year at a cost of \$150,000 silver, which may give an idea of the wealth of the inhabitants, for it has become a proverb "there are no poor people in Goya," and such is the activity of the place that it is nick-named "the little Buenos Ayres."

league-thinks destitute of foundation, that a dispute had arisen in La Paz between Colonels Beron and Quiroz, each of whom had 300 men, and that a fight was anticipated between them. Our correspondent in that place, Dr. Gibbins, has written us nothing about this, so we believe it false.

Our own private correspondence from Parana will be found in another column. The foregoing we extracted from the Parana newspaper, 'El Litoral.'

The houses are of brick, the streets 20 yards wide, and the town is well lighted by oil lamps at every 50 yards. The richer estancieros keep their carriages and have two story houses. The plaza has a handsome column 50 feet high, and the Policía, national schools and public offices are fine buildings. There is a newspaper called La Esperanza. The principal trade consists in hides, cheese, oranges and wool, and all the river-steamers have more traffic here than even with the city of Corrientes. Among the foreign residents are Dr. Newkirk and Don Pedro Campbell; the latter is much spoken of by Messrs. Robertson in their work on Corrientes and Paraguay.

Goya is of no value in a military sense, being too far from the Parana, and cut off by the Santa Lucia from communication with the northern parts of the province. If entrenched and barricaded it might be easily defended against long odds, but an invading army and navy might advance southwards without interruption, or anxiety for its flank. The land is in general low, and marshy near the Parana which is here about a mile and a half wide. The Guardia or custom-house is a well built house raised on poles at the confluence of the Arroyo de Goya with the Parana. We have already stated that the river Santa Lucia is some eight miles north of Goya. The country southwards to Esquina offers much difficulty for army movements, being intersected by the rivers Batel and Corrientes, and all the low land is an impassable marsh stretching away to the banks of the Parana. Here the allies may establish a safe rendezvous as the Paraguayans durst not penetrate into such broken ground with unfordable rivers on their rear, and in the presence of an enemy everyday increasing in strength and numbers.

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES.

PARANA.

We have received the 'Litoral' of the 23rd.

General Paunero at latest dates was at Esquina, and the Paraguayan army was pressing down by forced marches, had approached close to Esquina, and then, our colleague states, retired.

The Italian schooner 'Elegante' which sailed from Asuncion on the 5th inst. brought the news that Lopez was expected at Humaita on the 11th, where 3000 men without uniforms were awaiting him. The Elegante arrived in Corrientes on the 20th, and the captain remarked that the Argentine flag had disappeared, and the Paraguayan flag flying everywhere. The Paraguayan troops were suffering from the severity of the weather. Our colleague estimates the total Paraguayan force in Corrientes at 17,000 men.

The Brazilian fleet was at the Rincon de Soto up to the 21st inst.

Coriolano Marquez had been brought down in this vessel and was said to be about to enlist.

A Paraguayan deserter is said to have arrived at Urquiza's camp, and informed the General that Robles had the city of Corrientes fortified.

General Galaza has been appointed to command the Entre-Riano army of reserve.

Col. Ibarra, chief of the army 'procedores' had arrived in Parana with a few soldiers. Colonel Gimenez had also arrived.

The whole National Guard of the province is mobilized, and the four Pizarros have volunteered to raise some regiments to fight the Paraguayans.

On Sundays and feast days the National Guards are to drill.

General Rojo had arrived on the 15th, and proceeded northwards on a mission for the Government.

A subscription has been started for the purpose of paying for soldier's uniforms, &c.

The police had broken into some man's house, who was making great noise about it.

The Government had taken out 80 prisoners from the Carcel, and handed them over to the commander to put into the regiments.

The National Guard was beginning to arrive in the city from the camp.

The Chief of Police was in another newspaper war, in consequence of one of his 'comisarios' having knocked down a child. The father brought the case before the Chief, but he got no relief, and, consequently attacks the Chief in the newspapers.

The cold weather had made its appearance, and many insist that never before in Cordova was such cold experienced.

The houses in the city are being whitewashed. There was much excitement caused by the desertion of an officer named Medina, and a partido was sent out after him.

The Legislature had not yet met, to the surprise of all. The war against Paraguay is very popular, and several persons have volunteered to march.

SAN JUAN.

The Paraguayan war is as popular in this as the other provinces, and the National Guard had been called out. The Governor's trip through the mining districts is likely to result in some important measures.

In the Villa Independencia, and in the Valley Fertil, the Government had revoked all the mining licenses granted and not worked on. The bridge over the Caucete will shortly be commenced at the Pass of the Rincon Cercado. New Government schools were being established in San Pedro and Pampa Vieja.

Churches were to be built in these towns, and subscriptions were being made for this purpose.

In Jachal the Government had ordered the construction of 15 stone bridges, on the principal roads leading to that village.

Dr. Joaquin Godoy has been named professor of mineralogy in the National College.

Kerosene is being introduced into San Juan and tax oil lamps disappearing.

Rickard's mining works were pushing ahead: Mr. Hourtley is the manager.

MENDOZA.

The absorbing topic is a new Joint Stock Bank, with 100,000 fuertes capital. Meetings had been held, and, in fact all that was wanting to start the concern is the capital.

The 'Constitutional' states that the National Guards which were called out and served some time ago, have not yet been paid. Sr. Martinez, who was the agent of the Government, stated he had no money to pay them. A naked madman was going about in the streets.

The Government had called out the National Guard, and a strong feeling against Paraguay was displayed.

LATEST FROM PARANA.

Since the Esmeralda left Goya no news from there. Some skirmish or surprise has taken place; there is not a doubt about this.

The river is fast rising. Small craft are arriving from Paraguay, but bring long dates—the English gunboat Do-

torel at Corrientes. The Italian gunboat left here last Sunday.

Urquiza has marched with 5000 men, sending the rest to their homes.

CATAMARCA.

The Government had called out five regiments of the National Guards, and appointed all the officers. The province is very patriotic, and 'down with Lopez' is the watchword.

There is nothing else particular from the other provinces; all our exchanges teem with anathemas against Paraguay.

LATEST FROM ROSARIO.

GENERAL GO-AHEADISM AND FAILURES.

GRAND BALL.

The Paraguayan war has not damped the spirit of the Rosarinos; all is gaiety and sound here. The Government has put the screws on the 'gauchos' by introducing the passport system; all the costureras, and they are a legion here, are busy making uniforms for the soldiers. On the 26th there will be a meeting of Agote and Imbert's creditors, the estate won't give much, and on the 2nd June the creditors of José Nunez and Co. will also meet. The heirs and representatives of two live men are called on to appear; the notice is really afflicting to read; Felipe Santiago and Du. Segundo Gallo were captured by the Indians and taken off; the courts now call for their heirs to take care of their property. The creditors of Don Augusta Spitska are also called to meet; so you see if we have nothing else in Rosario we have failures by the score, but yet all people say Rosario is going ahead. The rain has made the unpaved streets almost impassable.

The American news has caused great joy here, and we all hope to hear by next mail of peace being restored. Enlisting is the order of the day; the cuartels are getting full and soon the Santa Peciños will be ready to march. The Argentine war-steamer 'Buenos Ayres' arrived here on the 23rd. She is towing up two steamers laden with soldiers, 350 men; they go up the river to join Paufero.

The grand ball for the 25th of May comes off to-night at the Hotel La Paz, every lady in town that has a good dress goes; in fact all the town will be there, and as there are numerous foreigners at present in Rosario; it promises to be the greatest affair since Captain Bruce's celebrated picnic, when the major made that extraordinary speech.

Beyond all question, the greatest people here are Wild and Perkins. They are into everything; they have more sheep and land for sale than even Parker, and now offer to lend money on bond and mortgage, and even, I believe, on personal security. No news about the war.

L. L. D. Yesterday was a sort of half holiday. The 'Ibicuy' arrived at the Tigre, but only brought mails from the Paraná: the news not being published in supplements, as a matter of course, all sorts of rumours were prevalent. We have nothing from the seat of war, save a dispatch from Parana from our own correspondent which we publish. The 'Mersey' leaves to-day: the 'Lili' will take the passengers on board. Several of our friends leave for Europe: we wish them all a pleasant trip, and hope to see them soon back.

The arrival of a Brazilian gunboat from the squadron in the Paraná threw the town into the greatest anxiety. On Thursday, about one o'clock, owing to the very low state of the river, the gunboat had to stop in the outer roads, but the moment she anchored, a boat put off from the mole carrying dispatches for the Baron Tamandaré. Scarcely had President Mitre left the Cathedral and gone towards the Policía, when he received the news of the arrival of the gunboat. The Brazilian Minister was seen to hurry from the Policía, and the President soon after departed in his carriage for the Government house.

Mr. Oliden has received a most flattering letter from Mr. Neill of London respecting his beef which sells well in England. Mr. N. states that besides the Morgan Co. there is another one started for the preservation of beef without salt, that various experiments have been made in England attended

with the greatest success: this fresh beef company is a joint stock concern with good capital. Mr. Oliden, we understand, is in treaty with the Argentine Government for the sale of his secret: he asks only twenty thousand patacones cash and the balance after the war is over.

The letters of General Paunero, published by the 'Tribuna' on Thursday, throw the onus of not fighting completely off Gomensoro, who it appears is anxious enough to fight the Paraguayan squadron, but cannot in consequence of the unprotected position of General Paunero and his men. Parties who have recently arrived from Paraguay, state that the Paraguayan squadron will not wait for the Brazilians, but has strict orders to look for the enemy and fight.

Great doubts exist as to the meaning of General Urquiza sending back some of his troops and letting them out on furlough. We learn from parties who have recently come from Entre Rios, that he only liberated about two hundred men, who were, for the most part, 'capatazes,' and more serviceable to the country on the different 'estancias' than in the regiments.

On Wednesday evening there was a grand dinner party in honor of the Queen's birth day on board the packet; several patriotic toasts and speeches were given and made. On the same night one of our leading English merchants gave a magnificent ball; dancing kept up till daylight.

The arrival of General Santa Cruz, Urquiza's son-in-law, has caused much surprise. Various rumours are current as to the nature of his visit. We hear on good authority that he comes merely to request of President Mitre the greatest dispatch, as the enemy is said to be advancing towards the Uruguay.

There is a rumour in town that the Brazilian army stationed at Paysandú has received orders to march to Concordia, as the Paraguayan force which seized Santo Tomé was said to be coming in that direction.

The River Paraná is at last rising to the great joy of the Brazilian Admiral, who, we hear, will proceed at once to Corrientes in the 'Tacuari.' This vessel is built like a Ram, is of very powerful construction, and draws only five feet of water. She is anchored quite close to the mole, but no visitors are allowed on board.

Down on the beach they say that a private company has purchased the steamer 'Gertrude': the sum paid is not known.

The National Guard of the camp has given very favorable results: the men are all in now: the Government only called 2,000, and about 2,500 have been got together.

The 'Nacion Argentina' attributes to Sir Walter Scott one of the sayings of poor Richard's almanack, by the eminent philosopher Franklin. This is almost as rich as making Dublin the capital of Holland, and nearly rivals the description of cattle-slaughtering in South America, lately published by Chambers's Journal.

Don Juan Cano and Don Maximo Elias, two of the most wealthy native 'estancieros,' have died this week. The former gentleman was a native of Mendoza, and one of the Directors of the San Juan Mines; the latter was Juez de Paz of the Mar Chiquita, and met considerable opposition during his office from the 'estancieros' in that partido.

THE DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES.

GRAND JUVENILE FETE AT COLON.

For the first time during our long residence in Buenos Ayres, we attended yesterday the distribution of prizes to the children of the state-schools. The exterior of the Colon theatre was decorated with flags of all nations, and so early as eleven o'clock there was a crowd of ladies in the portico waiting admission. The number of tickets being limited this year to 3,000, there was much better order preserved, and the policemen and commissaries only assisted as a matter of form. At the hour of noon the doors were thrown open, and a rush took place at the Casucula, the ladies oversetting policeman, ticket-taker, and all other obstacles, but at the other doors the greatest order was preserved.

For some time the house looked very thin the Pit and Casucula alone being full, but presently the ladies invaded

the gallery of the 'gods', and as the appointed hour drew nigh the boxes were gradually occupied. When President Mitre arrived, nothing could exceed the splendor of the coup d'oeil; the girls of the state-schools tastefully dressed in white with blue sashes occupied ten rows of an amphitheatre formed on the stage: the ladies of the Sociedad de Beneficencia sat in double line in the centre, and at the top of the stage was a throne erected for the lady-President, Mme. Carreras, over which were suspended the banners of triple alliance, Brazilian, Argentine, and Montevidean, while further behind was a trophy of national flags. The orchestra was directed by D. Dalmiro Costa, and on commencing the Argentine Hymn the whole house rose and remained standing till the end. The effect was really magnificent: over 3,500 persons fashionably attired and including all the beauty of the capital were massed together almost in a compact body, and in the President's box stood General Mitre in uniform, with Governor Saavedra, vice-president Paz, Ministers Rawson, Costa, Dominguez, Cardenas, &c. The Brazilian envoy, Octaviano, occupied the 'Tribuna' box.

A little after 1 p. m. Mme. Carreras read a memoir (utterly inaudible), after which Mme. Nouguy, secretary, read the annual report. The four pecuniary prizes to deserving females, for filial and maternal affection, industry, and good conduct were given in an impressive manner, after which the various schools were called up, some 10 or 15 of each receiving silver medals. We observed several of the little girls wore two or three medals gained in previous years. The regularity, neatness and intelligent look of the children did much honor not only to their mistresses, but to the city which boasts so promising a new generation. Over 300 children were rewarded with medals, and the orchestra enlivened the monotonous though interesting ceremony with choice airs.

At length at half-past two the distribution terminated, and the spirit-stirring anthem of 'Old Mortales' again resounded through the house, this closing the function. But it was over half an hour ere the dense multitude could find egress, and the public hastened home somewhat fatigued by the length of the proceedings but much edified by so charming a spectacle.

NEW PATENT GRANTED.

NUMBERING THE HOUSES.

CIGAR MAKER BARBARITIES.

The little steamer 'Uruguay' seems to be never out of trouble; she lost the Union Jack by carrying Blanco soldiers, she has had more collisions than all the other steamers in the river, and now she has got into the law courts in consequence of her owners having been in too great a hurry to get her coals on board. It appears that a certain English merchant who has the largest stock of coal in Montevideo had been supplying coal to the 'Uruguay.' Shortly after she arrived in port a man was sent from the steamer to order coal on board, whether the messenger was impudent, or the clerk in the 'barraca' was in bad humor, does not appear; but certain it is that after waiting for hours and hours, the Captain sent again to the 'barraca.' Meanwhile the passengers were arriving on board, and the cargo being stowed, the Captain became impatient, and left the ship to see what was the matter; he met the coal merchant and complained of the delay; the merchant heard him out, and then told him that he did not intend to send him one pound of coals on board until he was paid for those already sold and delivered. The Captain thundered, and a warm interchange of compliments ensued; the result was that the Englishman put on his hat and walked out: in fifteen minutes the steamer was 'embargoed.' Then was the real uproar: the passengers had all to come back, as in the 'embargo' they were not included. The demand has been since paid, and Mr. Artega has taken an action against your countryman for heavy damages. If the case goes before a jury it is difficult what will be the verdict, as since

the 'Reforma' trial no reliance can be placed on juria. Every one here sides with the English merchant who only asked for his own.

There is the D— among the tailors; here meetings, strikes, rules, and what not. This trouble has been brought on us by some of our very fashionable young men getting their clothes made at home and sent out by the packet. To such an extent is this carried, that some of our merchants are going about most shabbily dressed, alleging that the vessel with their pantaloons has not yet arrived. Our tailors declaim loudly against this practice, and a petition is being got up which will be signed by every tailor in town, praying of Governor Flores to protect them, and condemn every box of clothes made to order. My idea is the Governor will protect them.

Mr. Benjon has applied to Government for a new and improved way of cleaning the streets, closets, &c. The minister thinks that it is practicable, and the patent will be granted, but the great patent at present under discussion is that for numbering the houses; some say tin, others tiles, and a few believe that the numbers should be on wood: the baldoza man will probably win, he offers to put up sky blue badges with the numbers, but has not yet fixed his price, if he gets the contract it will greatly improve the appearance of the streets.

There has been a chasque from some frontier place, I believe it is called Yagnaron; here the 'blancos' are in power, the Brazilians have fled; they say Caraballo is ordered off to this out of the way place with orders to send all the revolutionists in to Montevideo in irons.

As there is no society here for the prevention of cruelty to animals, people can do what they like with their own: a cigar maker has been brought into notice by his cruel conduct to one of his apprentices; he beat and flogged the poor boy so terribly that his mother hardly recognised him; the cigar man was hauled up and escaped being sent to fight the Paraguayans by paying a rather round sum to the afflicted parent.

The artillery has received orders to march, but nobody knows where to; it is thought that they will proceed along the banks of the Plata until they arrive in front of Buenos Ayres; and then the gunners will commence practising with their long range guns on the vessels in the outer roads; one of the guns is said to be very powerful, and few of the artillerymen with families feel disposed to fire it off; it is the same make as the one which burst in the mill and knocked down the big wall by the report some few months ago in this city.

The Ball at the Club Libertad is the great talk of the day. The billiard-tables have been taken down, old chairs removed, and the whole place turned inside out; but the ball promises to be very brilliant, as all the Blanca girls in town have accepted the invitation.

The Italian Minister is gone up to Buenos Ayres to see about arranging with Mitre for a short lease of Martin Garcia. Rat Island is very small, and M. Barbolani thinks that as your Government is in want of money, probably the Finance Minister would be disposed to rent the island on getting a few year's rent in advance.

There is a small printing-office offered for sale by Astengo: it will be sold cheap for cash, and would just suit the 'Weekly Whistle,' if the editor could scrape up the cash; but that's the rub. Astengo would sell on time, and the cases have no w's, as the type is a Spanish font.

It is no longer necessary to ask who are the Paraguayans? for if one is to believe the reports current, these extraordinary people are everywhere. One day we have them surrounding Concordia, the next sweeping everything from Rio Grande; and now the story is that 12,000 Paraguayan have made their appearance in the province of Salta, and are carrying all before them. Verily, if one is to believe all the reports going, Flores, Mitre, and Don Pedro are all done for, and had better prepare for a trip to Southampton. Yesterday morning, whilst standing at the Telegraph-rooms I heard it said that when Lopez comes down to Corrientes he will be proclaimed Emperor,

as Solano L.' Somehow it sounds well, even more euphonious than Napoleon I.

The 'serenos' have at last been established at the Cordon, and, strange to say, all the robbers have evaporated; the people at the Cordon are in the greatest glee, and have demonstrated the greatest hospitality in sundry drinks, &c., to the agents of the law. Pleading for nothing is the custom here now. Ramirez, who defended the 'Reforma,' was ordered to be paid 200 national dollars as his fee, which he most illegally declined. Several parties, when they heard this, were most anxious to employ him. If this lawyer was in Boston, he would get more briefs than he could pile up in his office.

LOSS OF THE LUSITANO.

FULL PARTICULARS. Yesterday we received our Rosario exchanges and in the 'Cosmopolita' of the 20th find the following interesting details respecting the shipwreck at the mouth of the Guazu.

The Commander of the Veloce reports to his Consul as follows:—

"On the 14th May, in the Martin Garcia Canal, at 10 1/2 p.m. I descried a vessel on the Playa Honda, she was the Oriental schooner Lusitano with her flag half mast. We cast anchor and I sent a boat off to offer aid; she was two days lying there and making water. The Captain of the schooner thought she might be got off, and sent in our boat the mate to the Island of Martin Garcia to look for a vessel to take away the cargo. Hardly had my boat got back when it came on to blow very hard, and the Veloce had to drop her second anchor, the wind being favorable very soon the Lusitano got afloat, but shortly afterwards she rolled over and went right down in 8 metres of water only, the tops of her masts being visible. The crew clung to the spars but the waves and wind were so strong that they were in imminent danger. From my gunboat I could see the frightful plight of these poor fellows but could render no assistance, owing to the waves and wind. We waited patiently to see if it would calm to put out a boat to save them. At half-past four p.m., with full steam on, I weighed anchor, and went close up to the unfortunate vessel, and sent a boat off which happily saved the following persons:—Francisco Giusti, Santiago Canarotto, Luis Rebe, Agosto Chamele, Luis Gausier. The Captain, Bartolo Dossoni, was lost when she first went down; he was a native of Genoa. On the 18th of May I landed all those I saved in Rosario.

NEWS FROM BRAZIL.

On the 9th was sent to Santos in the Presidente, a complete park of bronze cannon, on the La Yitte system, with 100 boxes of ammunition, &c., and a camp fougro, to be sent on immediately to Matto Grosso. On the 11th a similar park with munitions, &c., were forwarded by the Santa Maria with the same destination.

On the 11th the Tocantins brought from Maranhao the 5th battalion of Infantry.

The Minister of war has forbidden the medical examination of recruits in open court yards, as had been practised in some cases.

The corps of Voluntarios da Patria from the Court will be known as the 2d and 4th, those from Bahia as the 1st and 3d, those from the province of Rio de Janeiro as the 5th, and 6th, and that from San Paulo as the 7th.

Sr. Jose Pinto de Oliveira, a merchant of Rio, having sent a present of a box of dry goods to the 1st Adjutant of the Arsenal of War, Major J. J. de Lima e Silva, who declined to receive it and informed the department of the offer, the Minister of War has issued orders forbidding the reception of any tenders from Sr. Oliveira or the firm he represents, and the entry of this person into the Arsenal.

Decree No. 3,412 creates in the Municipalities of Montes Claros and Guaiubiy, in the Minas Geraes, a Superior Command of national guards, formed of three battalions of infantry of four companies each, 94, 95 and 96, of the active service, a large company of the same service called the 3d, and a sec-

tion of two companies, numbered 29 of the reserve.

The three battalions will be organized in Montes Claros, and the Company and section in Guaiubiy, and will hold their parades in the places designated by the President.

With regard to the application of shop-front shutters to warlike purposes, there was lately a most novel and singular application of the principle by the Spanish Government, who had constructed in London, a series of revolving "steel mantelets" for the protection of the crews of their vessels of war, when proceeding up the Moorish rivers. The pirates were in the habit of picking off the men on board, from ambushades on the banks; and to prevent this ball-practise, those mantelets—made of steel strips, about three inches wide, and strongly hinged and curved, so as to make the balls glance off—were hung at the sides of the vessel. When not in use, they were rolled up and stowed away. Of course, they were not intended to act as defences against an Armstrong gun!

On the 19th the steamers Cruzeiro do Sul, Paraná and Principeza left Rio for the south, the two first carrying to Montevideo the 3d battalion of Voluntarios da Patria, the 3d of Artillery and the 5th Fusiliers of Line, in all about 1,470 men and officers; and the Principeza taking to Rio Grande the 5th battalion of Voluntarios da Patria, consisting of 678 men.

As usual the Emperor and his suite were present at the embarkation, as also the Minister of government. Great rejoicing took place both in Rio and Nietheroy (the 5th battalion of Voluntarios being the volunteers of the Province of Rio de Janeiro) and flowers were showered upon the different corps as they defiled through the cities. The steamers got under way at half past 3 P. M. amid the repeated cheers of the crowded steamers and boats around them in the bay.

NEW LINE OF STEAMERS IN THE PACIFIC.

A measure for establishing a monthly steam line to China has been approved by the Washington Congress. San Francisco is to be the port of departure and the vessels on their route to China will touch at Honolulu, and also at some port in Japan. The subsidy per annum is not to exceed \$500,000, which at the present value of the American currency will be equal only to £50,000. The schedule of time, it is observed, between London and China is now about 62 days; and it is proposed to make it by this route, when the contemplated Pacific Railway shall have been built, only 50 days. Further, it is remarked:—

"In regard to the practicability of maintaining a steam line between San Francisco and China, with encouragement from the general Government, there seems to be no doubt. The apprehended difficulties respecting the supply of coal on the Pacific have essentially diminished since the subject was first considered, and steamers now run with much smaller consumption of fuel. Besides, there has been in course of development among the nations of Eastern Asia an appetite for foreign traffic. They have numerous wants of which before they were unconscious, and they offer for export silk, tea, cotton, and other products in increasing quantities. The specie freight outwards and silk freight homewards promise to be the most remunerative. Added to this is a passenger traffic to the treaty ports in China, the ports on Formosa, Japan, and the Amoor River, while the eastward travel would embrace a large proportion of those having business with the Pacific coast of America, north and south. The distance from San Francisco to the south-eastern point of the Japanese island of Matsmai, which has been spoken of as a good place at which to touch, is 4,100 miles; to Cape Awa, at the southern end of Nippon, is 4,474 miles; from San Francisco to Honolulu, 2,100 miles; and to the Bonin Islands, 3,200 miles. The whole distance to Shanghai through the Straits of Matsmai is 5,373 miles, or about 21 days' steaming at 250 miles per day. This line once established, 90 days will be sufficient to make the circuit of the globe. As compared with the old routes, nothing will be experienced from the typhoons of the China sea, the hurricanes of the Bay of Bengal, or the fearful storms which prevail in the Straits of Malacca."

There was a sort of panic amongst the Bours to-day; the news by the Ibcuy it was said had this effect. The Bulls of course circulated the most extravagant rumours, but although few believed them, there was a decided anxiety to buy gold. The bonds were weak, offered at 38; a great many holders anxious to realize, in fact such is the feeling at the present moment that we should be surprised to see a heavy fall in these securities.

Paper very much looked for—some first-class discounted at 1 1/2. Interest both on gold and paper will, we feel certain, be higher before the end of June.

Exchange was more freely offered and very first class paper was to be had at 49; over £200,000 has been passed this month. To-morrow, Saturday, is looked forward to with apprehension by many brokers: paper is scarce, gold not to be had, and discounters nervous. The Banks, with the exception of Masu, are usual doing nothing to alleviate the pressure on the money market.
