LATEST FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.

ARRIVAL OF CAP. CALDWELL.

THE BRAZILIAN FLEET REPAIRING.

ANOTHER NAVAL FIGHT IMMINENT.

ALARM ALONG THE COAST.

The news published by our colleagues is not entirely correct, owing to the haste with which it was compiled. Capt. Caldwell arriving in the Victoria at a late hour on Friday evening. The following particulars are reliable:

The captain of the Victoria first learned of the dispersion of Urquiza's army when about 15 leagues above Paraná city. After calling at Esquina the steamer went up the river past Goya and Bella Vista to the Brazilian fleet which was anchored at Chimborel on the coast of the Gran Chaco a little lower down than Empedrado. The Amazonas and some other vessels still bear the marks of the recent victory, the flag-ship being yet without her bows, but Admiral Barroso is busily engaged making repairs with the elements at his disposal in the vicinity of the Gran Chaco. It is incorrect that the fleet was weighing anchor, when the Victoria left 11th inst., to go up and attack the ten Paraguayan steamers in Corrientes. It is also incorrect that the enemy has placed any obstructions in the bed of the river, below the Brazilian place of anchorage, and even the batteries so much of talked of as erected by the Paraguayans at every narrow pass seem not to exist or at least were nowhere seen by the Victoria although the captain kept a sharp look-out for a stray shot, as she carries the Argentine flag.

The whole available fleet of Paraguay, ten steamers, is now assembled at Corrientes, and this has probably given rise to the prevailing impression that Lopez meditates a second and bolder stroke at the Brazilian navy. The odds are, however, now even more against him than at the Battle of Riachuelo, the Brazilian fleet now counting 14 gunboats, not to speak of the Argentine flag-ship Guardia Nacional which acts as an advanced-guard. Meantime Admiral Barroso sent a vessel to reconnoitre the enemy, and it is probable this time the Brazilians will assume the offensive, as a splendid opportunity now offers for completely annihilating the enemy's navy without letting a single vessel slip through their fingers.

It is positively known that Lopez and Bishop Palacios are in Corrientes: the former has a grand carriage and a house finely fitted up; he reviews the troops constantly, and the Bishop pronounces two 'crusading' sermons weekly to animate his hearers against "the demagogues of B. Ayres." The main army at and near Corrientes is estimated at 24,000 men, including the 10,000 picked troops accompanying Lopez from Humaytá. We have no estimate of the artillery pieces.

Considerable alarm prevails along the coast, as people seem to think the enemy will make a second descent on the line of the Paraná; although this idea is premature, for Lobos continues moving about Empedrado and the defection of Urquiza's army already known at Corrientes did not cause any great movement southwards as was expected. In La Paz and Paraná the troops of those districts had returned from Basualdo: we hear of no excesses, or the disorder than the usual 'Mueras' and 'Vivas', but the inhabitants felt a little nervous.

Governor Lagrón writes to Sr. Mendos from Goya 11th inst., stating that he has received word from Gen. Castelnau of the Paraguayans again advancing southwards, having despatched

5000 men and some field-pieces on the 10th for Empedrado. General Hornos is ordered to sweep the county bare of cattle before they approach. There is no news from Tranquera de Loreto.

By latest accounts Gen. Paunero was still at Ombú Grande on the river of Corrientes, 12 leagues E. of Esquina: his division seems not to have been affected by the mutiny of Basualdo. When Arredondo's corps arrived this division would considerably exceed 4000 men.

We have no recent dates of advances of the Paraguayan army of Misiones: on the 5th it was at Guabisalet-Zapequé, a place not marked on any map, but probably near Paso de los Libres, where we last heard of the invaders.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The departure of Dr. Lawson, Minister of the Interior, and Dr. Elizalde, Minister of Foreign Affairs, for Concordia, was the great event of yesterday. It seems that President Mitre has determined to have his Cabinet close by him. Many persons regard it as a sure sign that the Commander-in-Chief contemplates something very serious.

The steamer Victoria arrived late on Friday evening. She brings little news of importance, beyond the flattest contradiction of the rumor, which was so current respecting the construction of new batteries along the river below the squadron. Captain Caldwell was up and states that there are no batteries whatever. On his way up, and when about 15 leagues above Paraná, he heard about Urquiza's army: it was known in Goya previous to his arrival. Béron and his men were in La Paz. The Paraguayans were in force at Corrientes, and had ten of their steamers in that port. It is to be supposed that the Brazilians will at once go up and cut these steamers out.

In Rosario a great foot race was about to come off between two English gentlemen. Notwithstanding the war Rosario is very gay. The regatta, which we published yesterday, was the absorbing topic in town, and now the foot race promises to be equally exciting.

Messrs. Sherman and Co., the well-known shipbuilders, we understand, have taken the hull of the old Villa del Salto into their hands, and purpose resuscitating the old steamer with the least possible delay.

Mails from the interior announce the arrival of the Rioja contingent at the Rio. General Mitre, at the head of all the contingents, was to have marched in a few days for Rosario.

Governor Oroño of Santa Fé, states in point blank terms that General Urquiza is in no way to blame for the conduct of his men, and Oroño offers to the National Government three thousand more soldiers from his province.

We read that the Brazilian Government has sent to the army of operations patent Indian-rubber bridges which on being inflated with wind can accommodate about one hundred men at a time. When not in use the Indian-rubber materials fit in very small space, which is a most desirable object.

Some of the Montevideo and Brazilian papers have called attention to the number of new false patriot quibbons in circulation. It seems at Puerto Alegre a gang of coiners is supposed to exist; some of these false ounces are now in Montevideo.

We have to thank the Rev. Mr. Goodfellow for the pamphlet published by order of the American Committee, containing the report of the meeting and his sermon on the occasion of Pres. Lincoln's death; it is nicely printed, and is most creditable to the German printing office.

That all the natives who refuse to work and frequent pulperias, have again migrated, since the news of a new levy of National Guards arrived outside. These fellows, the very men who should be made to serve invariably, escape, whilst the industrious native is forced from his home and obliged to march to the war. The Government is greatly blamed on this head.

To-morrow night the German Concert will take place at the concert rooms, 290 Calle Parana. The tickets are on sale at Mackern's. We hope to see the hall crowded.

A correspondent of the 'Nacion Argentina' writes that on the 9th of July groups of Entre Riano soldiers returned from Basualdo, shouting out 'vivas' and 'mueras.' The disaffection in the Entre Riano army has had no bad effect on the soldiers in Santa Fé.

Dn. Patricio Cullen has come to B. Ayres to have a conference with the Minister of War on the attitude of affairs.

We have to acknowledge the receipt of two volumes of the 'Registro Estadístico,' which we had not time yet to look through. The population of the different partidos, stock, &c., will however always prove interesting items to our readers.

The Paraguayans, we hear, are fortifying Empedrado, and making it a strong place. President Mitre it seems was expected at Mercedes, a central town of Corrientes. General Hornos is at Ambrosio.

The latest we know from Concordia is, that that President Mitre has cited the Entre Rianos for the 24th instant. General Urquiza is determined to get his men together again, and all doubts as to his loyalty are now silenced.

The Minister of War will not depart previous to the return of the other ministers. He has appointed Sr. Quintana his secretary.

Dn. Felipe Saravia who it may be remembered some months ago drove a troop of mules from Corrientes into the Gran Chaco, bound for Salta, has at last arrived safely with 600 mules. This is really important news, and deserves especial mention. We hope to see the particulars of his journey published.

Congress has at last ordered 5000 patacons to be paid to Don Pedro Lacasse a Frenchman, in payment of some claims.

Sr. Miguén's quinta at Barracas could not be sold the other day; the auction was adjourned, and will come off to-day, but the price asked will be difficult to obtain, money is so dear.

LATEST FROM SAN JUAN.

MINING NEWS.

Hilario, June 26th., 1865.

A tour of inspection to the mines of Espallata took me last week to the town of Mendoza. Eighteen months have wrought a most wonderful change; everywhere new churches, houses, streets and squares are in course of construction, many already finished, partly supplanting the ruins, partly extending the city towards the South and West. The houses are carefully built, neatly finished and painted, the streets well paved and clean: such a contrast to San Juan, where all the improvement ventured upon, is the annual obligatory white-washing of house-fronts all round. The Mendosinos must have been at work like bees, and if they go on at this rate, the town will soon be again the largest and most important as it now is the prettiest in the West of the Republic. Mendosinos talk politics a good deal; of the war with Paraguay only as far as it affects provincial interests, in stripping the province of a far greater number of men, and consequently working power, than the nominal contingent of 250 men at first seems to imply. The defence of the Southern frontier is now left entirely to the National Guard of Mendoza, and I am told there are 800 men employed on that service, which an agricultural province, whose population was decimated only three years ago, can ill spare. Peons are very scarce indeed many hiding away to avoid enrolment, the farmers, who now in the proper time for sowing wheat, require more hands than usual, can not get them for love or money, and predict high prices for corn and flour next summer. This year's vintage has not been very plentiful on account of severe hail-storms, wine therefore is dear, but the

quality excellent. I wonder that so few Englishmen and Germans settle in Mendoza, for they would find two things to their taste decidedly: the purest air and the nicest natives in all La Plata.

A matter of some interest here is to be found in a letter which the 'Zonda' gives, supposed to be addressed from Paris to D. Domingo de Oro, a mail who out of San Juan I believe enjoys great respect, but who by publishing so foolish an attack upon the English Company at present engaged in spending thousands in this province, proves himself anything but a friend to the foreigners here, and to his countrymen who profit by the impulse given to trade. Rickard as you well know gave publicity to a large series of assays of ores from different mines here at a time when he never dreamt of himself forming an English Company, for the express purpose of inviting European Capitalists to invest money in Argentine mines. Therefore the advice to send a numerous collection of specimens to Paris, apart from the improbability of that collection turning out a just and impartial sample of the generality of ores produced, comes rather late, and when the "Ecole des Mines" will fail to persuade the Capitalists of every European Nation enumerated by the confident letter writes to send the necessary millions before grander results than those hitherto obtained can be shown. Oro's correspondent evidently never reads your valuable paper and derives all his information from that fountain of knowledge the 'Zonda': else he would not dare to insinuate a charge unfounded and untrue, that the English Company seeks to keep the public at large in the dark regarding the mineral wealth so as to avoid competitors. It were in vain to favour the 'Zonda' with papers, for in plain English there is not a single person in San Juan who has mastered even the rudiments of the sciences of mining and metallurgy; they have eyes and ears, use them use them, here's a bit of a Bavarian saying:

Was braucht denn a Baner a Hut?
Für den is a Zipselhaub'n gut!

THE 'SORTEO' IN MONTEVIDEO.

The long announced and much dreaded Sorteo of the National Guard took place on Sunday last, and lasted from 10 o'clock to 3 p. m. The Second Battalion of National Guards was formed in the patio of the Government House. A small table was placed in their midst whereon was placed a unique crystal case, paper pens and inkstands. In the vase were deposited the names of the 570 National Guards that form the Second Battalion. The small crystal vessel containing the fates of so many patriotic citizens was of course the cynosure of all eyes. I could not perceive however, and the fact cannot be sufficiently lamented, the smallest spark of martial enthusiasm or military ardor. The downcast face of those who heard their name coupled with the fatal words 'No. 10 Sorteo,' proclaimed unequivocally their unwillingness to take an honoured place in 'the ranks of death.' The ceremony was prolonged to a late hour in the afternoon and altogether was fraught with a significance far from consolatory and but little in keeping with the enthusiastic demonstrations we have had of late in favour of the war against Paraguay.

The National Guard is far from being in a perfect state of organization. Every one seems to do more or less 'what is right in his own eyes,' and the absence of a good state of discipline is making itself painfully felt. It would seem that the national guardsman considers himself free from the restraints generally connected with the military service, and feels himself perfectly justified in approving or condemning the acts of his superior officer. The esprit de corps becomes therefore weaker every day, and the preservation of a proper amount of order in a body where such obnoxious principles are received is simply impossible. Thus we cannot hope to be able to count on the National Guard as an effective force in case of need.

I may mention a scandalous occurrence that has taken place in the last few days between the Adjutant of the 2nd Battalion of National Guards Don Bernardo Dupuy and an inferior office

—a sergeant I am told. This last not only refused to obey the order of his superior officer but struck Señor Dupuy with, it would appear, the intention to inflict a serious wound. I am told though I am unwilling to give credence to the assertion, that the culprit notwithstanding this flagrant act of insubordination is now at liberty.

Our Correspondence.

THE DUBLIN EXHIBITION.

From our Special Correspondent.
The Irish Industrial Exhibition has been opened under the most happy auspices, and I feel assured that the undertaking will prove eminently successful. That I am justified in this belief will appear from the returns furnished of the number of admissions at five shillings each person, during the first seven days of the present Exhibition, when compared with that of 1853.

Number of persons at 5s. each in 1853—1,598
Ditto ditto ditto 1865—2,417
Of course the above does not include season ticket holders, of whom there are upwards of six thousand! Additional steamers have been put on the lines between Liverpool, Holyhead, Glasgow, &c. The Railway Companies all over Europe have conceded to the visitors of the Dublin Exhibition return tickets at single fares. The hotels are already full; the lodging-houses rapidly filling, and our cabbies and juries are reaping a rich harvest. The importance of the Exhibition is duly appreciated by our citizens of every class; and for many weeks previous to the inauguration painters were at a considerable premium, such was the desire to renovate house fronts, and make everything bright and clean. I venture to say that some of your Dublin people, who have only been absent a few short years from the banks of the Liffey, would hardly recognize the lofty fronts, pointed roofs, pilastered entrances, and expansive plate-glass windows, which go to make the long lines of houses in our principal thoroughfares. Dublin, in fact, is becoming richer and richer every day in those nice refinements of architectural beauty which, in their entirety impress the beholder with a sense of magnificence and grandeur. Indeed it is only latterly that our noble public buildings are being fittingly consorted with edifices assimilating to their proportions and pure style of architecture. The opening of an International Exhibition in Dublin has certainly done a great deal in prompting the citizens to carry out the remodelling and beautifying their houses. From the centre of our city strangers traverse noble lines of streets on their way to the absorbing attractions of the hour—the Exhibition Palace and Winter Gardens. The first stone of this beautiful, chaste and noble structure was laid by the late Earl of Carlisle on the 12th of June, 1863, a vast concourse of persons being present on the occasion. Within this Crystal Palace, which has been constructed in the short space of two years, is comprised a winter garden, adapted for horticultural exhibitions, and affording a beautiful promenade in the bleak months of the year; concert halls, ball rooms, suitable apartments for banquets and other social gatherings; galleries for the display and sale of pictures and sculpture; departments for the display of manufactures and useful arts; a polytechnic museum and theatre for lectures—in fact our Crystal Palace (while of somewhat smaller dimensions) is actually an improvement on that of its great original at Sydenham, for it offers to the citizens of Dublin ready, diversified and cheap facilities for refined intellectual amusement, and invigorating, cheerful, and joyous relaxation. Standing on the grounds formerly known as the Coburg Gardens, the Palace presents a grand and imposing appearance. The building is divided in its material construction, one portion being built of stone, the other of glass and iron. The grand front faces Earlscourt-terrace, and is rich in architectural beauty, with its spacious piazzas, pedestal, slender Corinthian columns, supported on Doric pillars, windows in the Byzantine and Italian styles, and elegant colonnade. From the eastern, or grand entrance, the visitor enters the centre hall, 40 feet in width, and in height

18 feet, running the entire length of the main building, terminating in the glass structure, branching from which are the 'Foreign Courts.' I will furnish details of the contents of those courts when their arrangement is completed, for, up to the present, this department is somewhat imperfect. The Winter Garden, to my thinking, is 'the' great feature in the Exhibition. At present the spacious glass edifice is devoted to the purposes of the Exhibition, being boarded over. It is 470 feet long, by 84 in breadth, in height 60 feet, and 10,000 persons will find ample room for promenading. The structure faces ornamental grounds and a park, and has a large transept, with galleries leading to a commanding terrace outside. 'Annexes' [which are the only things detracting from the imposing appearance of the building] contain the machinery department, refreshment, reading, and smoking-rooms, with offices adapted to a variety of purposes. These 'annexes' bring me to the pleasure-grounds, occupying the site of the old Coburg Gardens, the only memento of those gardens remaining being a stately elm tree.

From the semi-circular terrace, which runs the entire length of the Palace, a fine view of the ornamental-grounds is obtained. Iron pillars support the facade, and at intervals bronze figures are placed. Flights of steps, at the foot of which stand large vases filled with exotics, lead to the grounds. An ornamental sheet of water, with fountains, a 'Fair Rosamond's Bower' or maize, and a cascade, are among some of the leading objects of attraction in the gardens. A beautiful archery-ground, extensive conservatories, architectural terraces, the geometrical grass garden, with circular basins, ornamental fountains, statuary, wares, and pannellings may be mentioned as adjuncts to this unequalled specimen of the genius of gardening. With this imperfect outline I conclude, leaving the courts and their contents until such time as they shall be arranged, when I will furnish full details of the produce, materials, and manufactures, immediately connected with South America, coming under my notice. En passant, the daily attendance of visitors within the past week has increased from 4,000 to 7,000, and there is every indication of still further additions to the throng.

ARMY CORRESPONDENCE.

The 'Pueblo' of Montevideo contains a very interesting correspondence from head-quarters, written by D. Leon Pallejas, which we abbreviate for our readers.

June 29th. Landed the artillery and some baggage, the rest going on to the Comandancia at Salto. To-morrow we leave Concordia for Ayui to camp alongside the Argentines. Gen. Flores superintended to-day the landing of our artillery, and [weather permitting] leaves to-morrow for Salto to draught some Nat. Guards into our diminished regiments. The Florida detachment only counts thirteen men.

The Tevero brought to-day from B. Ayres the 2nd National Guards: the Argentine forces are now complete, mustering seven battalions infantry, one of regular cavalry, and a corps of artillery, but the field-pieces, and most of the muskets, &c., are yet wanting.

Six p.m.—Two schooners with supplies from Montevideo leave for Salto, in tow.

June 30th.—It has rained all night, and our camp being on low ground near the river is converted into a morass. It is raining still, which prevents our marching to Ayui: we have many sick, whom we must send to Salto. Four of our men deserted last night, being probably hidden by the inhabitants of Concordia, who are hostile to us. The steamer San Roman has left for Montevideo.

July 1st.—Raining still; we cannot light fires, as the wood is damp. The troops are getting their pay for the last month, and will probably desert in numbers. This desertion is most alarming and disgusting.

At 1 p.m. Flores sent us two cart-loads of wood which was distributed like blessed bread among the five divisions, but was of little use, barely sufficing to roast off meat. The troops are dripping with water, and we cannot dry our rags.

A subscriber from the camp states

July 2nd. Bad weather again: intense cold. Fitted up an hospital in a rancho, but the medicine-chest has not arrived from Salto. Our German doctor is up to his knees in mud. At 2 p.m. the weather improved, and we got two more cartloads of wood. Waggons very scarce, and cannot be had at any price. If we get some from Banda Oriental to carry our sick and baggage we shall march to-morrow. July 3rd. Bitter cold morning; the river so flooded that we narrowly escaped drowning. Formed in line at 11 a.m. and started for Ayui, leaving our sick and baggage in Concordia for want of waggons. Passed close to the Argentine encampment. Suffered terribly during the night: frost very severe, no firewood but palm leaves. July 4th. Got up nearly frozen, cleaned our firelocks, saw Argentines on drill. At 1 p.m. drill and wash. July 5th. Rain during the night; awfully sharp morning: drill impossible. July 6th. Intense frost: drill in the afternoon. The Montevideo cavalry (700 strong) under Ramirez has arrived and camped hard by. July 7th. Awful frost: no firewood. Send over a league for a few palm-leaves. Argentines at gun-practice. Fifty-two cavalry dismounted for infantry corps. July 8th. Rifle-drill. Sent to Salto for arms and clothing. Wood and meat so far off that the soldiers are running all day, without a moment's rest. Half our men sick, from exposure and bad meat; no bread, rice or jam; no staff; no medical corps: something like the English in the Crimea. Sad life, the poor soldiers! July 9th. Great Argentine anniversary. President Mitre's grand review put off: raining in torrents. Bands of music sent to salute Mitre in Concordia, and the commanders, Conesa, Bustillos, Vedia and Garcia, of the camp. Carrying wood all day, under heavy rain; some of the fellows clear out. Dreadful rumors about Urquiza: his army broke up while he was coming to Concordia, and all the troops are gone to their homes. July 10th. Two steamers from Montevideo. The Salto division, 350 men, has arrived. General Flores has been in bed sick for two days, which alarmed us greatly, but he is recovering and will be here to-morrow. Generals Caraballo and Castro reviewed our men to-day for four hours, after which we sent to seek firewood. The want of waggons is lamentable. Our division will soon be ready to take the field, for these delays are dangerous, as we see in Urquiza's case.

department of the administration, has arranged that a mail bag shall be regularly dispatched for the army free of all charge. There is a report going the round of the papers, that Government is about to order the daily use of the uniforms for the National Guards. I have taken pains to get at the truth, and believe that as yet nothing has been resolved definitely. The subject, however, has been much talked of, and has caused a good deal of discontent. The measure, in so far as it is calculated to discover those who have yet held back from attending the call of the Government for each one to take his place in one of the Battalions of National Guards, is utterly nugatory. Sr. Fernandez again shook the market, by flinging one hundred thousand patacons for account of Government into the Bolsa. In the morning specie looked stiff, but the Government broker put all the 'bulls' to flight. Every possible version was given to the Ministerial trip: some even went so far as to say that the French and English Ministers had received instructions to mediate and restore peace to the River Plate; others that the Minister of War, Gelly, would shortly leave for Rio Grande, and a few that the Emperor of Brazil might soon be expected in Buenos Ayres on a visit. We learn from one of the Directors of the Provincial Bank that its vaults are overflowing, and that the bank is discounting largely. It is singular the great interest all take in the war, scarcely any other topic is now discussed on 'Change, and some of the foreign merchants who are busy all day at their counting-houses, are in the evenings occupied making 'hulas' for the wounded. This was stated on 'Change for a fact. It may possibly interest our mercantile community to learn that at last some silver has been exported from the far-famed San Juan Richard Mines: 60 bars have been shipped for England from Valparaiso, worth about £112 per ton. The S. R. Coriova has arrived in Bahia, all safe, where she is taking in cargo; we received a letter from the captain, which we will publish on Monday. Another gigantic loan, 200,000 patacons on National Bonds is mooted at a very high rate of interest: we believe the loan is not yet decided. The Mercury is not yet sold, although it was rumored on 'Change' she is about to be bought by some parties on speculation. Some brokers attach great importance to the despatches received by Government last night by the Victoria. We have seen the captain, who states that there is nothing new, but on 'Change' the 'bulks' circulated all sorts of rumors. Collections through town to-day somewhat better and money easier.
