All consignments of less than 5 arrobas will be considered as parcels.

**STATE OF AFFAIRS IN ENTRE-RIOS.**

Since the second disbandment of Gen. Urquiza's army, last October, people have almost forgotten to cast a thought on the province of Entre-Rios, and the Captain-General was supposed to have resumed his favorite occupation of gardening: last week, however, we heard of his shooting several fellows for attempting to desert from the infantry battalions recently formed at San José, and this seems undoubted, as the 'Porvenir' excuses such severity, in these terms:

"There are three infantry battalions (1,500 men) at San José, and Gen. Urquiza, having received supreme command in Entre Rios from the President of the Republic, has been obliged to make an example of these fellows, just as Gen. Mitre did at Concordia by shooting deserters, to enforce a strict discipline. How strange of the B. Ayrean press to censure this severity, when the very same papers condemned Urquiza for debility in not repressing the mutinies of Basualdo and Toledo!"

The spirit of hostility towards the allies seems undiminished in Entre Rios, if we judge by the biting sarcasm and open insult levelled against the Brazilians in the columns of newspapers, but the calculations on the events of the campaign are more apropos: the 'Porvenir' says:

"Let us turn our eyes to the Paso de la Patria, where the enemy will make a stand, on the far side of the Paraná: and much as we hope that the Argentine flag will be borne in triumph through the dense forests of Paraguay we must remember that the hazard of war might turn against us. There Lopez will stake his last chance and fire his last shot, knowing that if we once cross the Paraná his fortress of Humaytá is out-flanked. The whole strength of the enemy will be centred there, and we may expect to sustain great loss in forcing a passage."

It is not like walking a tight-rope, for our men will be exposed in the long and arduous passage of the Paraná. Thank God! the allied army counts nine thousand brave Argentines and Orientals who will carry all before them in the face of death and danger, for they never turn their backs, however overpowering the odds against them."

The new Governor of Corrientes, D. Evaristo Lopez, is flatteringly spoken of in the same journal, and treated as a decided protégé of Gen. Caceres.

Letters from Concepcion, 9th inst. report the news of a mutiny among the Correntino forces. Colonel Urquiza was at dinner with the chief of the frontier, at Federacion, when a courier arrived in all haste announcing the approach of a body of Correntino Nat. Guards to the frontier of Entre Rios: these fellows stated they had deserted en masse, after a hand-to-hand conflict with the Brazilian allies from whom they carried off a number of horses and some provisions: 6 Correntinos and 18 Brazilians were killed. It was said Gen. Urquiza had received despatches to the same effect, but it was not known whether the mutiny was among the forces of Caceres or of Rogera.

The 'Uruguay,' 13th inst. states that the Foreign residents of Concepcion have drawn up the programme of a Sala de Comercio which will be shortly established. Gen. Virasoro arrived from Concordia on the 12th.

The registry of sheep-marks has been prolonged till Feb. 28th. The 'Uruguay' calls for the infliction of the prescribed fine of \$200 silver on the Deputies absent from the Chamber,

owing to whose remissness the Legislature could not be assembled on the 1st inst. although very important matters are waiting for deliberation.

**EDITOR'S TABLE.**

There is nothing in Argentine literature that equals Mr. Billingham's poetic description of the view before Consul Parish's house. Marcos Saastre, and Marmol are beaten hollow by the graphic style of our fashionable city auctioneer. We willingly rescue the following romantic paragraph from the passing notice of a household auction:—

"The panoramic view before the door is unequalled, and has been tastefully enhanced by the verdant beauty of the willow foliage, planted by the genius of Cazon. This leafy wilderness is bathed in the rippling eddies of the majestic Plate, and hides from view the arid sands of the Gas-house beach, which formerly extended from the slope of the acclivity to the margin of the river, and is now lost in the enchanting grove that covers all the intervening distance. Again, when the eye tires of the tranquil monotony of Nature in her greenest garb, the constant running of the Northern Railway trains relieves the paucity. Each hour the snorting engine dashes through the grove, puffing up a white column of the purest steam, which forms a fantastic contrast to the bewitching verdancy of this Sleepy Hollow, whilst the 'tout-ensemble' of the scene is completed by the feathered songsters flooding the grove with melody and holding the delighted senses spell-bound. A rhyming contributor has sent us the following:—

Oh! Billingham (or 'Vilinhors'—for Fame Sounds the heroic syllable both ways; Buenos Ayres filling to conquer your great name, Puts it down to this feckless phrase— Buying or selling she will laugh the same)— You have earned commissions by much apprise: Advertisements like yours should any man call garish, The Auctioneer would rise and 'knock down'— Parish.

Now we ask our readers if there can be anything more sublimely romantic than the foregoing description, and if our esteemed friend, Mr. Billingham, does not get a splendid bid for Mr. Parish's mansion, the fault certainly will not lie with the auctioneer.

The Espigador left yesterday for Corrientes, taking up a large cargo, a great number of passengers and a quantity of specie. The mails were unusually heavy, and as the postman was taking the mails to the boat he nearly fell through the 'hole-in-the-mole,' to the great amusement of crowds on the beach. When will the mole be kept in proper repair?

The election frauds are still the subject of much comment, at most of the country towns the voters completely outnumbered the population; every day new returns are coming in, and one of our colleagues charges the camp authorities with the most wholesale fraud. It is indeed lamentable to think that our public men should be pitchforked into their posts by such scandalous electioneering tricks.

The National Government has at last moved in the Municipality question, and ordered another meeting of electors on next Thursday the 25th inst. It is to be hoped that at the second meeting no such conduct will be tolerated as at the first, and probably the best means to ensure order is that the chair be taken by Dr. Rawson in propria persona.

The new gazometer at the Gas-house is at last finished and in working order; we hear it greatly praised as a master piece of workmanship.

Great enquiries are made as to what about the new American steamers between this Port and Rio to connect with the New-York and Rio line. We are not in a position to give our readers any information on the subject, beyond the fact that a gentleman connected with the Company has arrived from New-York, to make preparations; the subsidy, however, granted by the Argentine Government is thought in New-York to be too small.

Buenos Ayres is the only spot on the globe where horse-flesh can compete with steam, successfully: on the Boca road, the diligences are always crowded, and carry more passengers than the Railway; this is because the Diligences only charge \$3 and the railway \$5: a very important difference for the working-classes at the Boca.

We forgot yesterday calling attention to the error incurred by "foreigner" in his communication about Bolsondividends: as we understand, it only \$25,000 has been taken from the year's profits for the Reserve-fund.

Respecting the samples of Fray Bentos gold, we cannot inform our friend 'Rowland' if they were analysed: they were never returned to us.

We have to contradict the rumor of an American war-vessel being about to go up to Paragúay, and can positively state the contrary.

The Post Master General has favored us with a reply to the complaints about irregular delivery in the north partidos: owing to the lateness of the hour we hold it over till to-morrow. We quite agree with Mr. Posadas that the fault is not his, but that of Congress, which refused to exempt postilions from military service.

Apropos of the loss of the Stella pilot-boat of Lobos Island, we are informed shipwrecks now promise to be of monthly occurrence, as Mr. Lafone has shifted the light some 6 miles, to East-point, where vessels coming in cannot see it.

The people in Europe seem to have a very exaggerated idea of the strength of the allies, for they keep shipping to the River Plate soldiers' shoes, pantaloons, jackets, etc., in enormous quantities. In Montevideo and Buenos Ayres there are soldiers' boots enough for Napoleon's army; swords, muskets and bayonets arrive in almost every vessel, but as the battles are few, though the campaign is long, the supply of arms first given to the regiments lasts longer in Corrientes than the Tigre merchants suppose. To-day one of our city auctioneers sells under the hammer five thousand soldiers' pantaloons, which arrived from France in a rather damaged condition.

On next Sunday the small steam flour mill at the Caballito will be sold by auction, the purchase money to be paid in three, six and nine months: but the great auction of the day is Mr. Parish's, which will take place on the 30th inst. Mr. Parish is about to make a trip to Europe. We wish him a pleasant voyage and hope he will soon return to Buenos Ayres.

We have received another powerful article from our talented correspondent Canelones, on the subject of the future of the Banda Oriental. We regret sincerely that we cannot publish it, but as the present is a very inopportune moment to raise any question between Orientals and Brazilians, we are compelled to decline publishing the article in question.

Our Squadron Correspondent seems to have completely given us up. It is now nearly three weeks since we heard from him. We suppose that he is so busy preparing for a fight that he has no time to write.

From to-day the Government pays the monthly quota to the families of the soldiers in the war. Parties entitled can obtain their money by applying at the Government-house in Calle Moreno.

In the Partido of Junin, quite close to that town, there is a square league of land for sale or to rent, and it will be sold cheap.

The Italian steamer Clementina has at last arrived with a some three hundred emigrants. She will leave this port on the 24th of February next, bound for Marseilles. It is a very remarkable fact that these independent lines of steamers meet with good public support, and are doing much good for the country. It is really a shame that Congress has not voted a small subsidy to each line, which could be reimbursed by the Government getting out some of Ascasubi's recruits.

On last Sunday night a German gentleman happened to be standing at the door of the Café Colon, when another respectfully dressed man ran by, pursued by an officer with a drawn sword. The officer cut the poor man terribly, and probably would have run him through, but that the poor man caught the sword in his hand, which caused a fearful wound. Our friend with some others just stepped forward in time to save the man's life. All parties were walked off to the Policía, but the officer, as a matter of course, got off scot free. The plea offered was that the poor man was one of the escaped

soldiers from the Retiro: but nothing can justify the officer for his conduct, and the sooner the swords are taken from the 'vigilantes' and officers the better.

The Esterine candle manufactory in the Calle Larga, Barracas, will commence working on the 15th of February.

In Don Pálemo Huergo's quinta, facing Standard Hall, there is a magnificent Eucalyptus, the tallest one in Barracas.

Messrs. Vandervelt, Brothers, inform us that business with the camp this year is very good, and their thistle-cutting machines, iron troughs, &c., are now all in vogue.

The new station at the Boca Railway will be a two-story house, of very large dimensions. As yet, however, the people at the Boca support the diligences. At the Tres Esquinas the contractor is building a brick station, which will look very pretty when finished.

Some of our friends at the Tigre and San Fernando complain about the great want felt for a late train, in the evening, to town. It seems that the latest train leaves for Buenos Ayres at 6 o'clock p.m., thus depriving people of the pleasure of driving out there with a friend. We hope the Manager will consult the public convenience and put on an 8 o'clock train in the evening.

Mr. Burgess, the renowned Australian traveller, who left per Cordova for Europe, has taken passage in an American clipper in Montevideo, bound for the West Coast of Australia.

An Australian capitalist who has come out here purely to buy land, has left for Azul, and purposes crossing the pampa down there to the Bahía Nueva Colony.

The Chilean war it seems has played out the postal contract between Government and Sr. Sauze. It seems that the number of letter-bags was so great that an extra coach was necessary. Sauze very naturally applied to the Government for a further subvention. Posadas declined, and the consequence is that the contract has been rescinded. We suppose the mails now will be carried through the country on horseback.

The Spider has arrived down from Corrientes. We salute the captain and officers. They must have suffered much whilst up there, from the intense heat. We hear that the heat in Corrientes this year is admitted to be greater than any previous year; and as for Paraguay, the whole country can only be compared to a baker's oven.

The Chilean mails are expected to-day, per Ibiuay, although it is feared now that Sauze has given up his contract with the Government that the mails will not come so regularly.

It is a sad fact that the only cotton grown this year in this province is at Standard Hall and Mr. Huergo's quinta; the little plants are now in flower and look like 'the last rose of summer' amongst the other garden plants. Mr. Elizalde, the Minister, and Mr. Fernandez, the leading broker, both intend to plant cotton in their quintas this year.

The railway row in Quilmes still continues. There is nothing doing in the way of railway works the other side of the Barraca bridge, to the great annoyance of our friends in Quilmes. A meeting is talked of, which will probably wake up the Government to the wants, wishes and requirements of the free and enlightened citizens of Quilmes.

**INTERESTING FROM HEAD-QUARTERS.**

The 'Tribuna' correspondent writes from Corrientes, under date 12th inst. as follows.

Everything is at a stand-still. The belligerent armies maintain the same positions. The Brazilians under Generals Osorio and Netto have their tents stretched over a great extent of ground, about 3 leagues from the city. The only force at Paso la Patria is that of Gen. Hornos, the bulk of the Argentine army being at Ensenadita, about 5 miles this side of the Pass. Gen. Caceres is stationed about a mile from the village of San Cosme. Gen. Flores is about the same distance from Itati, at a place called Yaguari, and has been joined by Col. Garcia's San Martin regiment: it is said Gen. Mitre recently saluted this officer as General Garcia;

he is much liked in the army, and his corps has not had a single desertion since the outset.

The Paraguayans maintain the same position on the other side of Paso la Patria, and shew themselves every day with 8 or 10 canoes full of armed men. We have recently put guards all along this side to prevent their usual midnight visits.

The Brazilian fleet is here still at anchor, anxiously awaiting the arrival of Admiral Tamandaré to commence operations. The officers and sailors are full of enthusiasm, and burning for the signal to advance against Humaytá; but, as the operations will probably be combined both by sea and land, our friends in B. Ayres need not expect any news of importance for a month or six weeks. Those who say anything else talk mere 'bosh', for the carpenters are only now building the first of the 'balsas' ordered for passing the army over the Paraná.

On the night of the 10th a great alarm was raised in the Argentine army. A cavalry picquet was bringing in a deserter of the Nat. Guards, when the fellow tried to escape, and the soldiers, set off in pursuit shouting "kill him! kill him!!" The Cordoba Libre batt. took alarm and turned out, which spread like wild-fire through the camp, and in ten minutes the whole Argentine army was under arms. The alarm was soon discovered to be unfounded, and the author of it put under close arrest.

The Chacabuco arrived on the 10th with the Tucuman contingent and 5th batt. of the Line, the Paçon having brought a few days before several forces from Rosario: all these corps marched out on the evening of the 11th for head-quarters at Ensenadita.

The Brazilian transport Yaguarebe left on the 12th for Montevideo, taking down some hundred Paraguayan prisoners of General Flores's army. The Mearin has not yet returned from La Paz. The powder-explosion in the Brazilian camp was a trifling affair: only 4 or 5 killed and a few wounded; the powder which blew up consisted of the charges of some guns that got wet in crossing the Riachuelo, and which were drawn in order not to lose the balls. We are still landing ammunition for rifled cannon and siege mortars in large quantities.

The only local topics are President Mitre's letter to Somellera, which was at first believed a forgery but which His Excellency now admits, only condemning Somellera for publishing it, and the agitation about the new Gov. who is a poor elod-hopper of little promise or pretension. Pampin renounced the post of Vice-Governor in a very insolent note, and Dr. Vidal has been chosen in his place: the Doctor is a general favorite. Governor Evaristo Lopez has invited Dr. Benitez to act as Minister of Government, and he has only accepted on condition of being allowed to name his colleague for the Finance Department.

**THE TACUAREMBO GOLD-FIELDS.**

**SCOTCH MINING EXPEDITION.**

Fray Bentos, Jan. 15th, 1866.

Messrs. Mulhall: Gentlemen,—

Some time ago, in 1863, I sent you a sample of gold, or what was thought to be gold, to be analysed, and you gave it to the Government. Please to inform me, if possible, if it really was gold? As the person that gave it to me was killed about a year and a half ago, and I find that none of his family knows anything about it; now if it was gold the place is easily found, as we know where it is within a league or so.

On the 18th of last month three Scotchmen and one Englishman left this for Cuñapirú, and on the 8th of this month two more Scotchmen left this for the same place, provided with letters of recommendation to the owners of the ground, and instructions, with information requisite, to go to the spot, and all that is wanted is expert hands to extract it. The person that heads this party is an expert miner from New Zealand, besides another from California.

Gold filled California, Australia and New Zealand with a laborious population, and you may depend that gold will fill this part of the world also, and in the course of a month or two you

will find that Cuñapirú is worth changing or fighting for. The Brazilians are well aware of this, for some years back, and at present they are not only private owners of the ground, but the local authorities are all Brazilians, and all questions at law are taken to Santa Anna. Moreover, the police of Santa Anna runs over the whole district: mind you, no one has told me this; I have seen the whole thing with my own eyes, gold included. Therefore, I conclude that Cuñapirú, or, I may say, a great part of the country of Tacuarembó, will bring the Orientals to their senses—gold is a great stimulant!

**BRAGADO AND 9 DE JULIO.**

**ARREST OF THE ASSASSIN 'ZORRO.'**

The Justice of peace of Bragado has recently captured the notorious malefactor nick-named El Zorro, on the estancia of D. Daniel Amadeo: this fellow has four times escaped from prison, and long been the terror of the partidos of Bragado, Chivilcoy, Nueve de Julio, and Junin: his outrages on the wives and mothers of such neighbors as had to absent themselves from home are innumerable, and he is also charged with the murder of some Basque settlers. He has twice deserted from the army, and as no prison or penal settlement can long hold him, it is expected that if he be sent for frontier-service he will in a few weeks be back again at his old calling of blood and outrage.

The neighbors are glad to hear of his arrest, and we believe a petition will be forwarded to the Juez de Crimen praying that society may be rid of this monster which is the scourge of the western partidos.

On the 5th inst. D. Edelmir Moura was officially installed first Justice of the Peace in the new partido of Nueve de Julio, in presence of D. Julio Naon, Justice of peace at Bragado, Padre Leonetti and several of the principal neighbors, who complimented Sor Moura on his appointment. Several enthusiastic toasts were given and Sor Moura stated that he counted on the co-operation of all good men in the fulfilment of his duties.

**MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.**

The Minister of Interior has issued a decree, dated 17th inst. in reference to the schism at the last session, disregarding the protest by the minority, and convening a second assembly, as follows: Department of Interior.

B. Ayres, Jan. 17th 1866.

Whereas from the note of the President of the Electoral College, 13th inst., and also from the protest of the minority, 15th inst. it appears that after commencing the election of Municipal members the proceedings were interrupted by the retirement of the minority owing to a difference of opinion about the legal qualification of one of the parties elected, whereupon there was not a sufficient quorum to continue—

'And whereas,' Istly, it is contrary to our Republican institutions, and to our method of legislation, that a minority, however pretending to superior judgment, can so influence the vote of an assembly as to nullify the legal decision of the majority, which would impede all legislation, by simply withdrawing and leaving the rest without a quorum, which would destroy all administration, based on the will of the majority.

2ndly—That the Electoral College summoned by law had to decide by the vote of the majority, as in all similar assemblies, all incidental questions as to its electoral functions, wherein the minority would simply have the right to lay down their views of the matter, but in no instance to oppose an invincible barrier to the fulfilment of an act to which it was legally summoned as part of the corporation.

3rdly—That even supposing the majority gave an erroneous interpretation to the Municipal law, by allowing a Gas share-holder to be eligible as Municipal member, such error could at any time be remedied by the divers means laid down in said law, especially in Art. 37, quoted by the minority, which defines certain qualifications that must be established in due form when the

Municipality is definitively organized; but by no means can a minority constitute themselves as judges to condemn both the party elected and the majority who have given him their votes.

4thly—That as the election was interrupted in this manner, it could not be carried out on the day appointed by Art. 4., although the electoral colleges remained duly organized, as well for this act as for others they may be called on to perform, according to same law, during the course of the year.

5thly—That the want of a Municipality is felt to be every day more urgent, not only in parsuance to law, but to protect and administer the interests of the public.
