









THE STORM AT ARRECIFES.

GREAT DAMAGE AND LOSS.

Yesterday an Estenciero from Arrecifes favored us with the following details respecting the storm, which appears to have been even more violent out there than in this city.

On the estancia in the same partido we hear the loss has been even still greater. There seem to be sheep mixtures on all sides, 'puestos' blown down, trees torn up, 'corrales' blown away for leagues.

At Mrs. Francisca Saavedra's estancia a splendid 'galpon' was blown down; and at an adjoining estancia a like accident happened.

At the magnificent estancia of Sr. Stegmann, two outhouses for the 'peones' were completely blown away; three hayricks destroyed.

On the road to the town some bullock carts laden with wool were blown clear over, but none of the peones or bullocks killed.

COLONIES IN SANTA FE.

The 'Tiempo' of the 17th inst. contains two more projects of colonization recently concluded between the Santa Fe Government and Messrs. Maurice Franck and Co., and Esteban Rams-Rupert, severally.

Messrs. Maurice Franck and Co. engage to establish two Colonies on the banks of the River San Javier, between the new 'Helvetia' colony and the estancia of D. Maximo Elias;

each colony to comprise at least 200 square leagues of land, in a superficies 5 leagues front to the river, by 4 deep. The Co. shall give each person at least 4 cuadras (16 acres) of land; and allot 400 cuadras for each town.

Don Estevan Rams-Rupert, concessionaire of the Salado navigation works, engages to introduce 3,000 to 5,000 foreign families of 5 persons each, the Government giving a league of land for every 4 families.

The above concessions were finally signed and ratified at Santa Fe, the first on Sept. 19th, the second on Dec. 4th 1865.

REPLY TO THE 'TAY.'

THE DUST STORM.

Quilmes, March 22nd. The storm on Monday evening blew down most of the church-steeple in course of erection, causing a loss of some 8,000 mje to the workmen, but they are rebuilding it.

P. S.—Last week, six men implicated in the Ibañez murder arrived here in irons from Ensenada (one of them wounded) and were sent into the city.

KING AURELIE ANTOINE OF ARAUCANIA.

The ex-King of Araucania and Patagonia, who recently published an interesting work on those countries and got up an universal subscription for the re-conquest of his kingdom, has just arrived in Paris from London.

In France, his dethroned Majesty is well remembered as M. Tonness, lawyer, of Perigneux; but the Parisians treat him with all the respect due to a monarch sojourning in their city, incognito.

King Aurelie Antoine has hit on a splendid opportunity, to recover his kingdom of Araucania and Patagonia: the war between Spain and Chile will much favor his plans, and there is no doubt that his appearance on Chilean territory will greatly hobble the Government of that Republic.

THE OVERSEAS GOLD MINES.

Canapers, Feb. 25.

To Mr. N. N. Sir, I must apologise for not writing sooner, but not having the convenience, I had to put it off from day to day until I could get ink, &c., and this being Sunday, and alone in the camp, and having got ink, I now write a few lines to say that I am well in health, but still poor in pocket, but trust before very long to be otherwise, as I believe this to be a good gold field.

Two men some time ago called on me here from Fray Bentos, they being strangers and no letter from you I had no dealings with them: they said they had no money, and of course they could not get a start on any gold field: it is of no use any one coming to look for gold, unless they have something to keep them for a time until they find something payable.

Please give my respects to Mr. N. and if he can spare me a few 'Standards' they would be most acceptable to read. I do not know what is going on, in this out of the way place, and I am often alone, and if it was not for the attraction of the Gold, I long for the comforts of something like those found in a domestic home.

I gave your letter to Sor. D. Porto who gave me permission to dig on his camp; but hearing there was none on his ground, [he having sold the portion of ground where some gold had been found] I came on here a distance of about from 3 to 4 leagues across the river.

ON 'CHANGE.

Specie closed weak to-day owing to the great demand for paper money—it is a mystery to all what has become of the currency: some months ago the great scarcity of paper money was accounted for by the demand from the wool papers, which is only purchased of the farmers in place, but now the wool business is almost over, no heavy sales are made, and yet paper money is as scarce to-day as when the Plazas were thronged with carts.

The price of gold on time is just as stiff as ever, although cash rates are much weaker. For June and July no large transactions can be effected.

In National Bonds there was but one sale at 42, which is an improvement on yesterday's prices. These securities are very firm; holders refuse to sell, as the interest will be payable in a few days.

The forged bank certificates caused almost a panic in the market to-day. Mr. Drabble holds one for one thousand patacons, Sr. Oedrich another for two thousand pata, and the house of Wanklyn and Co. another for a lesser amount.

In Exchange the market rates very quiet. The great scarcity of money, and the prospect of a still higher rate, has induced many takers to hold back. The total amount drawn for the packet does not exceed £160,000, exclusive of the £50,000 taken by the Provincial Bank, when it was supposed that at least the drawing for this packet would amount to £400,000 sterling.

This being Saturday there was nothing done in wool. Yesterday several English parcels were sold in the South Plaza at from 70 to 85. In the deposits also there has been some animation.
