THE WAR IN THE NORTH

SEVEN UNDER FIRE

THE FIGHTING AT ITAPIRU

Corrientes, March 30.

To the Editors of the "Standard,"

Gentlemen,

We went on board the English steamer Viper, on the morning of the 27th, bound to Paso de la Patria, having received reliable information that operations would begin that day to silence the battery of Itapiru. In our company were two mariners, Italian. We were provided with a canoe, and a pass from the Captain of the Port. The motive for being so was that we could leave the steamer at any time in case of grounding. At 11 a.m. the Viper was on the move heading north. At half-past 1 p.m. we reached the Tres Bocas. Here are five Brazilian corvettes at anchor in the mouth of the river Paraguay. A mile north, upon the Corrientes side, where we came to, were anchored the allied fleet—transports, pontoons, floating bakery, a Dutch and two Italian brigades and numerous "chatas." The steam transports twelve, armed Brazilian gunboats four, Belmonte, Paranhiba, Ygateme, and Apa, which were the broad pennant of Tamandaré. She was moored close to the shore. A little higher up, on the same side, were the iron-clads Barroso and Brazil. The Argentines formed the centre. The whole breadth of ground in front of the Paso was covered with Brazilian troops. Abreast on the Paraguayan side, within a quarter of a mile of the shore, where the fort Itapiru stands, the iron-clads Tamandaré and Bahia had just let go their anchors. It was now two p.m. A Paraguayan flag was hoisted at the fort. At the moment a heavy gun was fired, and the shot passed over the Tamandaré, "ricochetting" until it struck the bank close to the Apa, a distance of two miles from where it was discharged.

Both the iron-clads began to fire at the fort, which promptly returned, firing two shots for one at first. The report made, by the guns of the fort was louder than that of the Brazilians. Another such noise was never before heard in these parts. It took five seconds for the sound to reach the spot where the Viper was anchored. Again and again clouds of dust were seen to rise from the fort as the shot and shell from the iron-clads fell there, while they in turn were often hit from the fort. The cannonade continued until five p.m., when both parties, as if by mutual consent, desisted from firing, the Paraguayans having the last shot; 242 shot and shells were exchanged.

The iron-clad Tamandaré got under way leaving the Bahia alone. She crossed over and let go her anchor within a half-cable's length of the Viper, near enough to see that all was not right on board. At the grey of the evening the Belmonte and Brasil steamed to the Paraguay side of the river and anchored a half mile below where the Viper and other vessels lay. During the fray the Apa was struck three times; the most part of her crockery and glass-ware was smashed; one of the shots struck the paddle-box. Tamandaré kept his flag flying and was at his post with his spy-glass. The Paranhiba, in attempting to cross, grounded, she was also struck. It was a dead calm day, the thermometer at 55. The five gunboats at the Tres Bocas did not move. At dark the iron-clad Brasil joined the Bahia. A little before the firing ceased three Argentine gun-boats came from above with slow speed and fired at the fort as they passed on to their anchorage.

March 28th. At two a.m. the watch reported two boats coming down the river coasting the shore, and had made a dash for the bank of the Paraguay side, abreast of the Belmonte. Day came, and one of the Viper's boats went to the steamer, in company with Mr. William Templeton, to ascertain what had been the result of the preceding day. We started for the Tamandaré. Here we could reach on board the iron-clad, the chatas had opened fire upon the Belmonte, their shot passing near our boat: still we persevered, until we came alongside of the Tamandaré. We saw ten ghastly shapes, "that once were men," in canvass winding sheets, and other two covered with flags. A heavy solid shot had entered one of the turret ports, which broke in many fragments as it came in contact with the casing of the port holes, killing those we saw lying dead upon her deck and mortally wounding Captain Barros her commander, a prominent officer, both of the lieutenants, purser, and captain's secretary, all since dead—some accounts say twice the number we have stated fell. It was now no time to investigate any further, we pulled around the iron-clad and hastened on board the Viper.

For the time being we wished ourselves at a thousand leagues from the Paso de la Patria; heavy solid shot came ricochetting a-head and astern of us, smashing into the transports. An order came from Tamandaré (which was not necessary) to make a move. The steam was up. In justice to the Captain of the Viper we must observe his steamer was got under way with as little bustle as if she had been unmoving from the inner roads (perhaps in a little less time.) There was no swearing heard, or anything said of religion or grog, by any one on board; her crew consisted of 38 men, all English. We were the first to move out of danger, long before the other transports, which were Brazilians or Argentines, did. In the meantime the Brazilian transport Princess, full of troops, was hit three times. The Riachuelo transport struck twice. Damage was done to other vessels that we had just left. All this mischief was caused by two doomed, little, fish-decked, chatas that had thus so boldly challenged to the fight the iron-clads Bahia, Brazil, and corvette Belmonte. The Paraguayans for two hours stuck to their guns with indomitable pluck, serving them with rapidity and precision, and it was not till one of the chatas was literally made a heap of shattered wood, while her consort was fairly "cleft in twain" that they stopped firing.

The Corrientino papers assert their crews ran for shelter to the woods. It might have been so. We were near enough to see every move, but saw no one running or walking, for the iron-clads persisted in firing after the "chatas" were destroyed: there were none left alive to run or walk.

What may have befallen the iron-clads we know not. The main-yard of the Belmonte was a "cock-bill."

It was now 8 a.m. Nothing more was done in the fighting way till noon, when a new Brazilian battery on a bluff north of the Paso, began shelling the fort of Itapiru, and continued to do so until sunset. No reply was made from the fort other than to hoist their colors. The adjacent camp was on fire far and near on the Paraguay side, supposed to have been fired by shells, which is probable. No more fighting.

March 29th.

The Paraguayans (just like them) fired a heavy gun at daybreak and at the moment began a furious discharge of congreve rockets, from different points, at the iron-clads, which lasted a half hour. The iron-clads did not return the fire. There was no more firing till noon when the Brazilians mortar battery began shelling the fort—the fort did not contest nor hoist the flag. It was late in the day; we shoved off in the canoe for Corrientes, to be in time for the Esmeralda, we were four hours in the passage down—the report of the howitzers was heard till we were near the city.

March 30th.

You need not doubt that Itapiru is made a pile of ruins, but there is very little dependence to be placed upon the Paraguayans they may gone inland where they are out of the reach

of the iron-clads. Still yesterday, the morning beat of drum and bag was heard from their side of the water as plain as if it was from Osorio's encampment. As the present hour there are within the circuit of two leagues of the Paso de la Patria 45,000 men, many herds of black cattle, every facility for passing stores, troops, and boats. It is probable an attempt will be made in the coming week to force the passage. The river continues to fall.

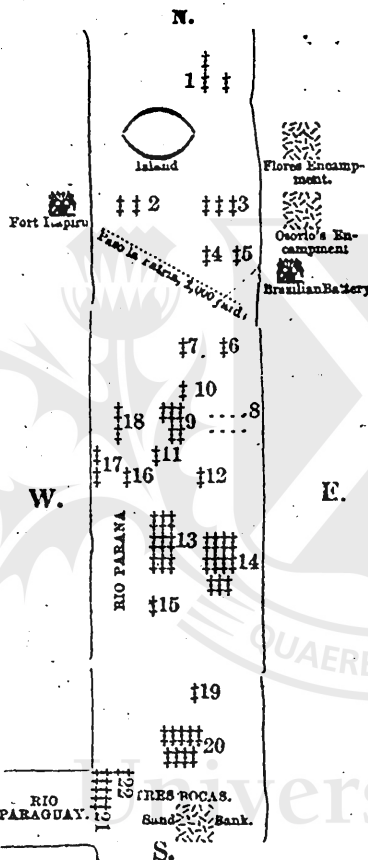

FORT ITAPIRU, THE IRON-CLADS &c.

SINBAD'S SKETCHES DURING THE FIGHT.

Our matchless correspondent Sinbad was present at the recent combats before Itapiru, and from the deck of the Viper took the following plans, which we endeavor to place before our readers.



NOTE.—The Argentine side of Paso la Patria, except an opening of 200 yards, is lined with thick jungle down to the water's edge: it is high land, and covered with rocks and stones at every place. On the Paraguayan side there is no stone, the coast is lowland covered with jungle, through which a road runs from the beach at the Paso, into the interior. There are no houses in sight anywhere, on either coast.

At the Paso la Patria there is a downward current of 2 1/2 miles per hour: where the Viper first anchored we found 17 feet of water, but where we moved to there was only 8 feet.

The Brazilian battery at the Paso was placed in position on the morning of the 28th, and began throwing shells at noon.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Esmeralda arrived yesterday from Corrientes with dates to the 30th, and "Sinbad" has sent us a very interesting diary of his stay at Paso la Patria, during the recent conflicts, as well as an elaborate plan, both of

which are given in another column. The foreign public will gladly award a vote of thanks to our worthy correspondent who still retains the pluck and activity of youth, notwithstanding the weight of three-score winters. We have to return our warmest thanks to the Captain of the Viper, for his kindness and hospitality to "Sinbad," enabling him to present our readers with the most graphic and reliable account yet published of the hostilities at Itapiru.

The rain has come again in liberal profusion, to the delight of the sheep-farmers. On Friday night the southern suburbs were enveloped in a dense fog such as usually seen in November in London, and the rain began before daybreak, continuing all the morning. It seems we are going to have a spell of very wet weather.

The Great Southern railway has been flooded in some parts, the rails being no longer visible. The Samborombon is now several hundred yards wide, and passengers yesterday from Chacomus say the whole country is under water.

The opera Company commenced the season on Sunday night. The opera produced was the celebrated 'Trovatore' which is always new, and the music fresh to the ear of the lovers of good harmony. Madame Briel surpassed herself in the execution of the music, and was applauded to the echo. The character of 'Azucena' was also well and carefully sung. Lelmi was in good voice, and is still a general favorite. The other characters were also up to the mark, and the opera appeared to give satisfaction to a crowded house.

Many of our readers will remember the eminent American engineer Mr. Church, who left this country and entered the Federal service, in which he has risen to the rank of Colonel. We had the pleasure, yesterday of seeing a letter from him in which he says: "I met Don Domingo Sarmiento and General Mitre's son at Senator's house last night. Mr. Sarmiento recently delivered a lecture before the Rhode Island Historical Society, which is being printed, and I will send you a copy." This shews how proficient Mr. Sarmiento has become in English.

Madame Altieri Oscar Pfeiffer arrived yesterday in this city by the 'Rio de la Plata' from Montevideo, to put herself under the tuition of Mr Charles Lambra, for a few weeks previous to her departure for R. Janeiro, and from thence she proceeds to the U. States, where she is likely to become a 'star' in the lyrical world.

The Italian opera promises to have a splendid season: the Colon theatre was crowded on Saturday and Sunday nights at the Stabat Mater and Trovatore, which were most successfully rendered, but some of our friends complain of the innovation of pianos in the orchestra.

Robberies are now of daily occurrence. We hear of several houses broken into, by means of skeleton keys, while the inmates were out, and also pocket-picking in the theatres and plazas.

The new French comic paper, 'La Guere,' came out on Sunday: perhaps owing to our imperfect knowledge of French, we are unable to see any wit in it.

The Governor publishes a decree, naming D. Benigno Macias as Justice of Peace in the new partido Tres Arroyos: he is to assume office on May 1st.

We learn that the best hotel in Concepcion del Uruguay is the "Entre-Riano," and that the 'Standard' is always found there.

Mails from Rosario, yesterday, mention another Indian invasion, and that Governor Oroño had despatched three bodies of National Guards to relieve Fort Esquina besieged by the savages.

The Santiago Government is going to lend active assistance to Governor Oroño in the expedition into the Chaco, which has for its object to drive the Indians far north.

The war in Bolivia is again reported over, but Gen. Melgarejo is accused of sending Indian tribes to devastate the Argentine territory, who seem to have carried off much booty.

Mr. Roever, the popular and clever photographer, leaves by the French packet for Europe, after a residence of

3 years among us. His establishment is carried on by another German artist to whom we wish the same good fortune as fell to our friend Mr. Roever.

In Cordoba, the ruffian who committed 28 murders, has been shot.

On Monday the Provincial Bank emitted the new \$20 notes, which are rose-color with a green back. Some new 1 dollar notes emitted are printed on damaged paper which breaks at the touch: quite rotten.

We have not been able to obtain further particulars about the Races: yesterday was so wet that we had no visits from any of our racing friends.

IMPORTANT FROM MONTEVIDEO.

RUMOUR OF DEPARTURE OF THE BROOKLYN.

WATER VERY SCARCE.

Hotel Oriental, April 2, 1866.

Water! water!! water!!! is still the cry in Montevideo. The only algebe in town that is well filled is that of the Oriental; the algebe was originally built by the Jesuits, and holds no less than one thousand pipes of water, it is the largest in Montevideo. The whole city and suburbs wear a scorched and parched-up aspect.

Judge Delgado and his daughter, Mrs. Gonzalez, the wife of the Argentine Minister of Finance, leave to-night in the Portelia for Buenos Ayres; the judge, during his stay, stopped at the Oriental, and drove through town with Mrs. Gonzalez in a handsome open barouche, which attracted great notice, and there are various rumors as to the judge's visit.

Cornwall Lodge is the name of a delightful country residence about to be built by one of our leading English merchants: the plans we inspected reflect much credit on Mr. Havers, who is evidently more of an architect than an editor.

The American Admiral will shortly leave for Buenos Ayres in his new flagship the Brooklyn; the Susquehanna leaves immediately for the States.

Dr. Don Lorenzo Torres arrived in Montevideo on Sunday morning. It is supposed that the object of his trip is to attend the races, or possibly consult Mr. Lettson on the probability of another storm.

A gang of robbers, some 20, supposed to be from Buenos Ayres, has been arrested by the Chief of Police. They succeeded in abstracting all the linen from the house of one of our best known foreign Consuls; they also robbed Gov. Vidal's house of jewellery worth 3,000 patacaos, but the diamonds have been recovered.

Mr. Richard Wilson has at last commenced to put the machinery into the old launch of the Bombay, which he has hauled up in front of his office door. The machinery looks well and compact, and the steam launch, when finished, will be the best in the River Plate.

Since the arrival of the French packet there has been one large sale of dry hides, 15,000, for the States, reserved price.

In wool, nothing done, but the amount on hand small.

Coal and salt both keep looking up. Money very easy, interest low, Exchange on England no rate at all, yet expected to fall somewhat.

Señor Don Felix Frias is still in Montevideo, stopping at the Oriental. He will shortly leave for Buenos Ayres. The 'Opinion Nacional' has 1,500 subscribers: Mr. Gutierrez, one of the proprietors, is here.

THE MONTEVIDEAN RACES.

GREAT PREPARATIONS.

A TRIP TO THE COURSE.

Montevideo is in the greatest state of excitement: business is forgotten, trade paralysed, and a sort of incipient Derby feeling experienced by even the rudest 'gauchos.' Coach-hire, as a matter of course, has run up to the most fabulous prices: every two or four-wheeled conveyance is called into requisition, and the Union diligences have actually been chartered by Mr. Hoffman to convey the Government and public 'employees' to the course. Early on Sunday morning it was known that one of the editors of the 'Standard' had come down specially to report the races.

This caused a stir amongst the committee men, and as there was still much to be done at the course, Mr.

McColl and others, the moment church was over, drove out to conclude the preparations. Determined to see for oneself the real state of affairs outside, we accepted Mr. McMillan's invitation to take a seat in his carriage. The race-course is distant from Montevideo about five miles, the road is good, in excellent repair, and nearly the half of it well-paved and Macadamized: the beautiful quintas and villas on either side give a pleasant aspect. We pulled up at Mr. Ompker's quinta, which is but a short way from the city, took him in, and drove on to the course.

When within about a mile of the course we came on a country 'pulperia,' and here we got out, in order to see some of the best horses, which were being trained behind the house in a sort of 'tuns corral.' A crowd of Montevidean Englishmen met us at the gate. In one corner of the 'corral' was a 'gaucho,' 'ringing' one of the horses. Neither the horse nor the man seemed well to understand the business, the brute kept kicking, the man whipping, and the dust flying. After slightly partaking of some of the refreshments spread on a small pine table in the corner of the 'corral,' we resumed our seat in the coach and drove on to the course. The top of the new unpainted pine-board stand-house looming in the distance soon convinced us that we were near the ground. The place was crowded with 'quinteros' and others from the surrounding 'chucras.' The course extends along the brow of a hill, and the view from the stand-house could not be more commanding: it reminded us greatly of the far-famed Curragh of Kildare. The stand-house is well-built, and we noticed that the committee paid more attention to the requirements of the ladies than our racing friends at Belgrano. A place for carriages is fenced in, in front of the stand-house, and the course is marked out by flag-staffs.

As far as we could learn there seemed to be a lack of public spirit; the estancieros remained outside, and neither sent in subscriptions nor horses, and the committee complained that their countrymen neglected them.
