REVIEW FOR EUROPE.

The battle of Curupaiti has complete

ly changed the aspect of the Paraguay an campaign; had the allies taken that fort, the road to Humaitá would have been open for them; but they were repulsed, and owing to the pecu liar state of the country thereabout the Commander-in-chief was obliged to embark his troops and retire to his old encampment at Tuyuty. The full particulars of this memorable fight will be found in another column. Until the allies receive powerful reinforcements they cannot attempt to take the offen sive, and from the tenor of letters received from headquarters by the last mail, it is not probable that at least for some months there will be another engagement.

Congress has been at last closed, having disposed of all the business of Session: the legislative retrospec affords very little room for remark. The new Custom-house law, we publish in another column, it is almost the same as last year. A new importaix of 5 per cent and export tax of 2 pe: cent is now in force; this additional tax has been imposed in consequence of the very heavy expenses of the war, the Government finding it impossible to make head way without this tax which cannot be regarded as excessive although its necessity is deplored. The Legislature of the Province of Buenos Ayres has been occupied dis cussing a new bill introduced by Gevernment to authorise the Bank of Buenos Ayres to emit in convertible paper money four millions of patacous. This bill has passed the Committee and Senate, and is at present before the Chamber of Deputies. The great scarcity of the circulating medium is actually felt by every one in Buenos Agres, and it is more to meet the requirements of trade now during the busy wool season than anything else, that the proposed measure is being passed. The Provincial Bank is in a very prosperous state, and has larger specie and paper money reserves on hand at present than in any previous year at this period. The value of the paper money has so much improved, exing to the immense receipts of gold from Brazil, since the sommencement of this war, that the present is considered a favorable opportunity to make an effort to put a fixed value ou the paper dollar of Buenos Ayres: the present price is 25 to the patacon, being the figure fixed some years ago by the Legislature, but until now never could be realised. 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
