The battle of Curupaity has completely changed the aspect of the Paraguayan campaign; had the allies taken that fort, the road to Humaitá would have been open for them; but they were repulsed, and owing to the peculiar state of the country thereabout, the Commander-in-chief was obliged to embark his troops and retire to his old encampment at Tuyuti.

Congress has been at last closed, having disposed of all the business of the Session; the legislative retrospect affords very little room for remark.

As yet the wool market of the new clip has not opened. Shearing commenced early, but owing to the weather was temporarily suspended.

There cannot be the slightest doubt as to the great business which this line will do, as Montevideo is a sort of scaport of Buenos Ayres, all vessels bound for this port, first calling there.

We have been visited with a terrible storm during the fortnight, causing much damage in port but trifling loss in the camp. The Boca Railway was stopped for a few days owing to the river washing over the track.

The American steamer Oriental, which had been around previous to the storm, was driven still further to the shore, and has proved a total wreck. The hull and machinery of this once magnificent vessel have been sold by auction, and realized \$70000 pats.
