THE MURDERED SERENOS.

AWFUL SCENE AT THE POLICIA.
 Last week we commented in strong
 terms upon the barbarous murders
 committed in cold blood, as a practical
 joke, upon some poor aged Serenos,
 natives of Galicia. It was notorious
 that the miscreants guilty of these as-
 sassinations belonged to the Retiro
 barracks, where the 'España' states
 some of the wounded ruffians were
 actually received and tended. As
 usual these murders were left wholly
 unpunished, and when the Serenos re-
 fused to continue exposing their lives,
 the Police authorities attempted to
 force them. This ended in a scene on
 Sunday night when some poor Span-
 iards were killed or wounded.

Our sympathies are entirely with the
 Serenos who have been the victims of
 such murder and violence. If Argenti-
 nes were butchered with such impu-
 nity in any of the "rotten monarchies"
 of Europe, we should expect to see the
 Government Ministers put on their
 trial, and the whole country blush with
 indignation. The native papers have
 treated the occurrence as a trifle; and
 in order to put it properly before our
 readers we copy the following account
 from the *España*.

"Our readers are already aware that
 on the night of the 22nd ult. ten valiant
 officers assassinated an old Spanish
 sereno aged 70 years, and two nights
 later these same or some other officers
 shot another sereno in calle Florida.
 Several others were also set upon, and
 as the authors of all these enormities
 were left unpunished, most of the se-
 renos renounced their employment. Here-
 upon the Police seized several of them,
 and when the Spanish Minister was
 applied to for protection he issued a
 notice that any Spaniards continuing
 in the service as serenos would forfeit
 their nationality.

"An order was given from the Policia
 for them to pass list on Sunday even-
 ing, and such as resigned to give up
 their pike, lantern, whistle and insignia
 of office. Accordingly at 8 p.m.
 they were all assembled in the Plaza
 Mayo, and being summoned *en masse*
 were held out to them to continue in
 office at higher wages, but they un-
 animously refused, alleging their lives
 were not safe and that they would not
 forfeit their nationality.

"Some Spanish residents who hap-
 pened to be near the Policia, getting
 alarmed at the repeated cries of 'No'
 on the part of the Serenos and seeing
 the police-guard fix bayonets while
 some of the Commissaries cried out
 "to kill the groups in front of the Po-
 licia," ran off to summon the Spanish
 Minister: others were cut down with
 sabres, and one poor Spaniard was
 stretched at the foot of the pyramid
 weltering in his blood, while several
 wounded lay around. The Spanish
 Legation was soon beset by Spaniards
 clamoring for justice, and the Minister,
 D. Carlos Cruz, on entering his car-
 riage declared he would instantly call
 on the Chief of Police and Ministers of
 Government and "either get the as-
 sassins punished or demand his pass-
 ports. He told the Spaniards present
 to go quietly home and confide in him,
 and not to pass near the Policia or
 give any pretext for outrage.

"The Chevalier Cruz went to the
 residence of the prime-minister, and
 along with Dr. Rawson proceeded to
 the Policia. Here they addressed the
 serenos, and Sr Cruz directed them
 to continue at their posts until new
 hands could be procured, as the city
 could not be left unguarded at night;
 but they replied three several times that
 they would not again expose their

lives. There was then no alternative,
 and the serenos were dismissed, leav-
 ing their insignia behind, and receiv-
 ing a caution from Dr. Rawson that
 any group of more than three Span-
 iards found in the streets would be
 severely punished.

"Among the incidents of the distur-
 bance was the calling-out of the mili-
 tary from the prison, who loaded their
 muskets in presence of Messrs. Cruz
 and Rawson. Commissary Biedma
 knocked down a Spanish citizen named
 Manuel Ferreiro with the blow of a
 hammer, and a policeman then clove
 his head with a sabre: he died in-
 stantly. Order was restored about
 midnight, and the crowds dispersed.

"A poor Spanish waterman was set
 upon and robbed by a ruffian in calle
 Victoria on Friday last: the latter
 took refuge in the National Govern-
 ment-house, and the guard refused to
 allow the Police to arrest him.

"The Spanish war vessel Galiano ar-
 rived on Sunday: she is welcome."

ONE DAY LATER FROM LONDON.

THE NORTHERN RAILWAY REPORT.
 Yesterday we were favored with the
 'Times' of the 24th Aug., being the
 only one in town: it was sent up to an
 English gentleman here by Capt. Cur-
 lewis from Montevideo. With the
 exception of a notice in the money ar-
 ticle respecting the Northern Railway
 of Buenos Ayres, we find nothing else
 to interest our readers. The following
 is the notice we refer to:—

The report of the Investigation Com-
 mittee on the Northern Railway of
 Buenos Ayres recommends the prop-
 rietors to "withdraw their confidence
 from those who have brought the com-
 pany into its present position, and to
 elect an entirely new Board of Direct-
 ors." They give a clear outline of the
 concern and its mismanagement, the
 extravagant expenditure incurred, and
 the various financial operations with
 the contractors, Messrs. Croskey and
 Murray, while at the same time they
 show that the undertaking was inher-
 ently good, and that it has received
 considerate and honourable treatment
 from the Buenos Ayrean Government.
 In conclusion they express a belief
 that under proper management it may
 recover its position and yield satisfac-
 tory dividends.

The Isthmus of Suez Canal proper is
 not yet open: the vessel laden with
 coal passed through a side canal fed
 by the Nile,—to-morrow we will pub-
 lish the letter which has appeared in
 the 'Times.'

The Lords of the Privy Council
 have at last taken up the question of
 the cattle disease in England, and
 every effort is being made to discover
 some remedy or cure.

Cholera in Constantinople decreas-
 ing, latest returns 141 deaths per day.

The Cornish Girl, for Buenos Ayres,
 passed Deal on the 23rd.

NEWS FROM THE FLEET.

Guardia Nacional, Boca arriba
 de Goya, Sept. 29.
 To the Editors of the 'Standard.'
 Gentlemen,

The news around here is rather lim-
 ited, but such as has taken place
 since the sailing of the Esmeralda I
 shall detail to you.

Here we are still anchored at the
 Boca arriba de Goya. We are per-
 fectly sick and tired of this 'old hole'
 and the life we lead here, and wish for
 some movement. Our allies are a
 sleepy lot of customers, and if they
 took things as coolly in action as we
 do here, we should by this time have
 been waiting for the army at the town
 of Corrientes.

I had hopes by this steamer of giving
 you the details of another naval en-
 gagement, but as the Paraguayans
 have not taken it into their heads to
 attack us, I am sorry to say I cannot
 give you an account of another
 victory.

At 4 p.m. on the 21st instant a canoe
 came alongside, bringing a despatch
 from Goya for the old Colonel. The
 despatch was from Governor Lagrana,
 informing the old Admiral of the sur-
 render of Uruguayana. A victory
 without blood, without the loss of a
 single life.

We had a regular jollification. Few
 persons in the squadron went to bed
 that night with a sound head, not ex-
 cepting your friend, the Yankee offi-
 cer, who is really a temperate man.

On the 23rd ult. the ships in the
 squadron half-masted their flags in re-
 spect for the loss of the captain of the
 Yperanga, who died in your city.

On the morning of the 24th another
 canoe came alongside, bringing a de-
 spatch from Goya for the Colonel, in
 which he was informed that General
 Caceres had obtained another victory
 over the enemy, somewhere about
 Cuevas, capturing 200 men, many
 hundreds of horses, and horned cattle.

On the 25th one of our officers
 (Sub-Lieutenant Guerrero) came up
 from Goya. He told us he had been
 out to pay the Correntino troops a
 visit, that they were in fine spirits, and
 burning for an encounter with the
 enemy, but were in a shameful and
 shabby condition for clothes.

Since this fast piece of news from
 Goya, we have heard that the Para-
 guayans have evacuated the formid-
 able position of Cuevas, and are march-
 ing as fast as their heels can carry
 them towards Corrientes. This being
 a piece of news that can be fully be-
 lieved, I think that the Brazilian Ad-
 miral will now not think it imprudent
 to send the old Guardia Nacional up to
 see whether it is so or not.

The Guardia Nacional, although an
 old 'rattle-trap,' is certainly of some
 use. She is always ready to go cheer-
 fully wherever the others go, and alone
 as well, which she has done already
 in reconnoitering the batteries at Mer-
 cedes on the 25th of June.

With the same feelings of anxiety
 and even despair, you may say, with
 which we always watch the turning of
 the bank by the steamer that brings
 us news from loved ones at home, with
 the same feelings do we patiently
 await the appearance of our army over
 on this side. When it does come, then
 I shall certainly be able to give you
 interesting details of our doings by
 every steamer.

The joyful news of the surrender of
 Uruguayana has brought back [and is
 bringing others] families that had left
 this for Goya but a few days before. It
 seems that they suffer a great deal at
 the mouth of the Goya. Poor people,
 they certainly have to suffer many
 hardships.

All 'loafers' around cafes and ran-
 chos being natives, have been taken
 up for soldiers. It surprises me that
 this was not done from the first. This
 measure, on the part of the Govern-
 ment of Corrientes, has given the Ar-
 gentine army an increase of from 200
 to 300 men. Now you only see women
 and boys.

Several days ago two of our men, in
 a drunken fit [a carpenter and a quar-
 termaster], took it into their heads to
 run away. They stole a canoe and
 away they went. A few days after-
 wards, as they were going along an
 island, they saw a schooner coming up
 the river, and being afraid of being
 retaken they took to the jungle. They
 had not gone many steps when one of
 them, the carpenter [an Englishman]
 was seized by a tiger. The other fel-
 low, a German, instead of assisting
 his companion, took to his heels, and,
 as a good sailor, 'shinned' it up, at
 double quick time, a tree, from whence
 he kept shouting 'blue murder,' until
 he was heard by the men in the schoo-
 ner, who immediately sent a boat ashore
 to assist him. Having told the 'pa-
 tron' what had occurred, they armed
 themselves and went after the other
 poor fellow. They found an awful
 sight: all that was left of what a few
 minutes before had been a man in the
 prime of life, was a pool of blood, sev-
 eral pieces of bones nicely picked, a
 pair of boots with such parts of the
 legs that they cover, that is to say,
 up to the knees. This has been a good
 lesson to all who have intended, or
 may intend, to run away. To run away
 with the prospect of being devoured
 by a tiger, I think a very unpleasant
 undertaking. However, it is as bad one
 way as the other, when you come to
 look at it well. The undertaking if
 unsuccessful is certain death.

The Paraná is still falling gradual-
 ly. If it continues so, and the army
 does not make its appearance before
 the middle of next month, I doubt
 whether we shall be of much use to it,

as the vessels in the squadron draw
 from 9 to 14 feet of water.

The last few days we have had sev-
 eral stiff broozes from the south and
 south-east, accompanied by showers of
 rain and hailstones.

We have several men sick from feed-
 ing merely on soup and beans; and the
 Government will find out, to its cost,
 perhaps, the day we should come to
 boarding with the enemy, how much
 depends upon having the men well
 fed and in a strong and healthy condi-
 tion; and as far as we 'chaps' are
 concerned, why we shall owe our
 doings entirely to our trustworthy re-
 volvers.

The old Guardia Nacional is putting
 on a new coat, I mean of paint, which
 makes her look something like 'old
 times.'

The painting by the 'Old Admiral' of
 the affair at Cuevas is progressing. It
 will be a very fine sight; I suppose it
 is a present for our Commander-in-
 Chief or our Minister of War, General
 Gelly Obes.

I have noticed what the 'Standard'
 of the 21st instant says about the new
 English steamer Virago. I can assure
 you we should all be eternally grateful
 to the Government if they gave us a
 decent ship to fight with.

We are expecting a rifled gun for
 this ship. Had we had an article of
 this kind [on pivot] on the quarter-
 deck at Cuevas, we could have given
 our ragged friends a warm farewell. I
 was forgetting to say that the Para-
 guayan forces, as they retreat towards
 Corrientes, are burning and destroy-
 ing everything that comes within reach
 of them—

"Donde las dan las toman."

Such proceedings only make things
 worse for them at the end,

We have not seen a Paraguayan sol-
 dier for the last twenty days. This in-
 dicates some truth in the news that
 they are retreating.

On the evening of the 27th the little
 Italian war steamer Principe, arrived
 here from Buenos Ayres, and brought
 us the agreeable news of the Brazilian
 iron-clad Brazil having arrived at your
 city, and which would soon be on her
 way to join us. We hope she will
 come along at once.

The Principe went up the river yester-
 day. We watched her movements
 when abreast of the saladero of the
 Rincon de Soto, as we had heard that
 morning that a body of the enemy were
 there. We saw no movements to indi-
 cate the presence of the enemy.

I have given you all the news that
 we have around here for the present.
 I hope that by next opportunity I
 shall be more extensive.

THE PARAGUAYANS ADVANCING.

Rincon de Soto, Sept. 30, 1865.
 To the Editors of the 'Standard.'
 Gentlemen,—

To-day there has been a great uproar
 in Goya, as the Paraguayans are with-
 in two leagues of the town and the
 people are flying in all directions. To-
 wards the morning of the 30th news
 was received that the Paraguayans had
 come to a stand-still, neither retreating
 nor advancing, and up to the time of
 the steamer leaving (2 p.m. to-day) were
 still encamped two leagues off the town.
 They passed the Santa Lucia at four
 different passes, in four columns, but
 their numbers are not known.

We have no news about the Italian
 steamer Velocé.

The Paraguayan squadron is still at
 Las Cuevas.

Two passengers who arrived per
 Espigador went for a day's shooting
 at the Saladero, but have disappeared
 very mysteriously and it is thought
 they have been taken prisoners by the
 Paraguayans, but some say that they
 were spies. However, they both ap-
 peared to be very respectable men, one
 being an Englishman and the other a
 Frenchman. More about them in my
 next.

LA PORTENA COMING UP.

THE RUNAWAY OLDER.

HOSPITAL COMMITTEE REPORT.

October 3rd, 1865.

It seems that we shall no longer
 have to lament the unfrequency of steam

communication with your city, for
 what with the Rio de la Plata, the Ur-
 uguay, the Tevere, the Iron King, and
 lastly, La Portena, with other steam-
 ers of the Harrison Company, to which
 she belongs, and which we are told are
 expected before long to the number of
 five more, not only a daily departure
 of steamers from both ports may be
 easily sustained, but a lowering of the
 present high rates of passengers and
 goods may be confidently anticipated,
 along with correspondingly greater
 facilities for the travelling public and
 the mercantile interest.

Your compositors make sad havoc
 with our Montevidean Correspondence,
 and from time to time I am made to
 say curious things. In such cases the
 writer may be to blame for want of a
 clear handwriting, but I notice this lit-
 tle matter to say that you make me say
 that "the criminal had arrived at two
 o'clock," and as this follows the para-
 graph referring to the Carmelo mur-
 der it might be taken as marking the
 hour of the arrival of the ruffian in this
 city. What I did intend to say was
 somewhat different, and the simple
 statement was meant to convey the
 news that "the Carmelo had arrived at
 two o'clock." The parties implicated
 in the murder of Mr. Campbell had
 been brought to the city jail some days
 previously.

The affair of Señor Alcorce's mana-
 ging clerk is not so serious as at first
 stated. It appears that he forged the
 signatures of certain parties for about
 7,000 national dollars, and gave them
 to Señor Allende, the broker, to dis-
 count. The 'conformes' were disposed
 of in the due business way to the Mon-
 tevidean Bank and Don José Cibils,
 who it appears will be the sufferers un-
 less the measures taken to secure the
 apprehension of the delinquent meet
 with a success that is not, however, ex-
 pected. The parties interested have
 forwarded full particulars, with the
 portrait of the culprit, by the steamer
 Brazil, that left for Rio Janeiro on
 Sunday last, but it is feared she will
 not arrive in time to catch the South-
 ampton steamer.

The grand Club ball takes place this
 evening and our belles and beaux are
 making extraordinary preparations for
 the event.

The Commission named to examine
 into the state of the Hospital and as-
 certain what truth there might be in
 the charges brought against the Sis-
 ters of Mercy, have sent in their re-
 port, which has been published this
 morning. It is a clearly drawn up
 document, valuable in more than one
 sense; a complete refutation of the
 wanton charges brought by the writers
 in the 'Siglo' against a valuable insti-
 tution. Accustomed as one is to the
 constant want of impartiality amongst
 men whose better judgment is warped
 by party influence and sectarian prej-
 udices, it is noways surprising to find
 the abusive charges thus suddenly
 done away with, and the much injured
 Sisters of Mercy absolved on every
 count of the 'popular' indictment.

As Don Felix Frias observes, with
 great truthfulness of perception, that
 keenly satirical work, 'Paris in Ameri-
 ca,' might find an admirable prototype
 if it could find an author of a second
 edition entitled 'Paris in the River
 Plate.'

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Rio de la Plata arrived
 true to time yesterday from Concordia.
 She brought nothing particularly new.
 The rumors current about Entre Riano
 contingents seem to be all destitute of
 foundation. President Mitro is about
 to march to Mercedes, which is a cen-
 tral town in Corrientes, where he pro-
 poses establishing his headquarters
 about the 10th inst.

The Iron King arrived from Monte-
 video bringing mails and passengers.
 Our Correspondent's letter contains all
 the news. Money is easy, business
 good, and everything looking bright.
 The new bank, 'Banco Montevideano,'
 we are glad to hear is doing a splendid
 business; all the Government and ju-
 dicial deposits are paid into this bank;
 its shareholders embrace all the wealth
 and respectability of the city of Mon-
 tevideo.

Another disastrous fire has occurred
 and, as usual, no insurance, no fire-
 men, and no water until the place was
 burnt down. The fire was discovered
 about half-past four in the afternoon,

in a carpenter's shop in calle Santiago
 del Estero, between Potosi and Victo-
 ria. It soon spread; as the houses all
 about were wooden, they burnt down
 like straw, and then the corner store,
 or almacén, took fire, which caused a
 panic—the whole place was soon in a
 blaze, police no werc and the neigh-
 bors running about with buckets, etc.,
 looking for water. At half-past five,
 as we were going to dinner, the place
 was burning away magnificently. As
 a matter of course the whole concern
 was soon burnt down, the carpenter
 and almacenero being the principal lo-
 sers. Will our readers take heed by
 this and at once insure? In our ad-
 vertising columns the names of some
 of the best Insurance Companies in
 England will be found. The agencies
 are all leading commercial houses, the
 rate is not high, and insuring is a wise
 precaution against loss—so long as
 we have no water supply, no firemen,
 and such policemen.

On Monday a man named José Gon-
 salez was drowned off the mole whilst
 bathing some horses of the 'caballeri-
 za,' of which deceased was a peon.

The Iron King leaves to-day for Ro-
 sario. We are glad to learn that this
 steamer is doing a good business: she
 is a fine commodious little steamer ad-
 mirably adapted for the river traffic.

There is still much talk in the city
 about a Ministerial crisis, and yester-
 day it was rumored that some changes
 are about to take place at the Govern-
 ment House. We failed to discover
 the real cause of all this. Some say
 that the Captain of the Buenos Ayres
 is both the victim and the cause. We
 think it is high time to let the poor fel-
 low out, he has suffered enough for
 bringing us the news so fast.

Mr. Parish, our esteemed British
 Consul, will shortly leave with his fam-
 ily for England, on leave of absence.
 Mr. C. Santa Maria has been named
 by Earl Russel as British Consul 'pro
 tem.'

The Brazilian ironclad, Brazil, was
 to have arrived at Montevideo on
 Tuesday last, but as yet has not made
 her appearance. She all but went
 down on the Rio Grande coast and
 several of her plates got knocked off
 by the waves.

The Sereno difficulty still continues
 and threatens to be a very serious
 matter. We publish the bulletin of
 'La España,' which has caused such a
 noise. If the case is as therein stated,
 it is really scandalous, and we trust
 that the National Government will
 take the matter out of the hands of
 the effete Chief of Police, and at once
 have the affair shifted and the as-
 sassins arrested. Such matters often
 tend to endless trouble by not doing
 the right thing in the beginning. The
 murderers of the poor sereno, no
 matter who they are or where they be,
 should be arrested, tried and punished.

The news from Corrova is not at all
 satisfactory. The Governor of the
 Province seems to be in hourly expecta-
 tion of a disturbance. Col. Wilde,
 who was passing through Cordova
 bound to Rioja, has remained, at the
 earnest solicitation of the Governor,
 in order to put down any riot if at-
 tempted by the Pizarros.

We publish to-day, at the request of
 our talented Finance Minister, a refu-
 tation of the charges made by Mr.
 Smith, a shareholder of the Northern
 Railroad, against the Buenos Ayres
 Government. We may add that we
 are intimately acquainted with the
 facts of the case, and that the Govern-
 ment of Buenos Ayres have done ev-
 erything that was right and proper in
 the matter. In our next Packet Edi-
 tion we will advert to this matter
 more at large.

The Alberdi pamphlet is the great
 topic of the day: the politicians of the
 River Plate are astounded at the at-
 tacks of this talented Argentine which
 come from across the ocean. Alberdi
 is a decided Federal in politics and a
 sworn enemy of the Triple Alliance.
 People at home care very little for
 River Plate politics, and few can stom-
 ach long essays on River Plate affairs.
 The Rev. P. J. Dillon has been ap-
 pointed Professor of Philosophy and
 Dean of the 'Seminario Conciliar,' or
 Bishop's College. This is the first time
 an Irish clergyman has been preferred
 to such a post in the River Plate. Fa-
 ther Dillon, who is well known to the
 parishioners of Merio and a general fa-

voice in Buenos Ayres, received his education at the College of All Hallows, Dublin, and was ordained for this mission in 1863.

Our Scotch friends in Banda Oriental will be glad to learn that the Rev. Mr. McNeill, who has been for some time assisting the Rev. Mr. Smith, Scotch pastor in this city, in the administration of the Sacrament and other religious services, is about to make a missionary tour in the sister Republic beginning at Colonia. The want of a Scotch clergyman in Banda Oriental has been much felt, and we are happy to announce that the reverend gentleman to whom we allude will be ultimately stationed in one of the Departments so thickly settled with our industrious Scotch brethren.

We received yesterday, too late for publication, Mr. Armstrong's address to Mr. Thornton on reading the resolutions passed at the meeting of British residents, and that distinguished gentleman's reply couched in the most graceful and eloquent terms. Tomorrow we will give all these documents to our readers.

News arrived per Rio de la Plata that something has happened to the Pampero, and she put into Fray Bentos in distress.

Mr. Van Blarcom's wool circular received by La Porteña will be found in another column; it will interest our country friends.

Up to the hour of going to press the fire in calle Potosi was still burning. We regret to learn that the loss is very severe.

Respecting the new American steamer, La Porteña, we must contradict our colleagues and correspondent: Captain Harrison does not command her, and she does not belong to the proposed line of steamers known as Harrison's line, which as yet is in 'nubibus.'

NORTHERN RAILWAY.

We have been requested to publish the following by the Finance Department of the Province:—

To the Editors of the 'Standard,' Buenos Ayres, Oct. 3, 1865, Gentlemen,

In the 'Standard' of Sunday you have republished an article from the 'Money Market Review,' signed 'Henry Smith,' and as this article is a calumnious diatribe against the Government of Buenos Ayres, I request that you publish the following lines in justification of the Government of Buenos Ayres and for the sake of truth.

The charge brought forth by Mr. H. Smith against the Government of B. Ayres is, that having recognised the obligation of guaranteeing 7 per cent interest on a capital of £150,000 employed in the construction of the Northern Railway, it has not paid a single penny during the last twelve months.

If Mr. Smith has any interest in the Northern Railway Company, he must know that at the request of its representative here, Mr. Zimmerman, the road was opened by small sections, without the Government's guarantee, because it was opened to public traffic before its termination. The first section was opened on the 1st of December, 1862, and the line to San Fernando was opened on the 5th of February, 1864. But the company did not apply to the Government for the examination and valuation of the works until the 1st of September 1864.

The Committee appointed for its examination did not report until the 3rd of February 1865 and the Government after certain indispensable formalities, recognised the capital guaranteed by decree of the 12th April same year.

As the Governor, Sr. Saavedra, was impeded on account of his relationship with Mr. Zimmermann, Don Norberto Riestra, President of the Senate, acted for him in the decision of this business. By this simple recapitulation of dates it will be seen that the Government of Buenos Ayres has not paid up the guarantee, because the Government of Buenos Ayres had no obligation of any kind whatever until the company should have presented the works terminated and that these had been inspected.

If this should not be sufficient to satisfy Mr. Smith, let him read the following declaration of the Company's manager and he will be forced to acknow-

ledge his error or the calumny of his assertion.

Besides this it must be kept in mind that the Company's manager having always stated that the receipts of the road would cover the amount of guaranteed interest, it was indifferent to the Government of Buenos Ayres that it should be reckoned before or after the abovementioned date, since it was a nominal obligation. It seems that Mr. Smith believes that the Government is bound in every case to pay the shareholders 7 per cent on their capital which is a mistake.

Buenos Ayres, 23rd Sept., 1865. To His Excellency, the Minister of Finance, Don Luis L. Dominguez:—

The undersigned Manager of the Northern Railway Co. has the honor of acknowledging the receipt of his Excellency's note, dated the 21st inst., asking if there has been any application to the Government of Buenos Ayres for payment of part or the whole of the interest granted to the Company on the capital employed in the construction of the Northern Railway.

The undersigned, in answer to the above, begs to state that up to the present date he has made no demand on the subject to the Government of Buenos Ayres; firstly, on account of the suspension of the guarantee until the definite termination of the works, which was on the 1st of September last year; and, secondly because your Excellency in several interviews during the negotiation of the valuation with the Government, had expressed yourself in the sense that the guarantee would be made effective from the 1st of January of the present year.

As the term of one year has not yet expired, the undersigned has hitherto abstained from making any demand for the amount of guaranteed interest. May God preserve your Excellency many years.

LATEST FROM THE UNITED STATES.

WOOL MARKETS.

(Per Portoña.)

The past month has been a busy one in the wool trade, and a large quantity of wool has passed into the hands of the manufacturers. Dealers have also been purchasing more freely of both foreign and domestic, and we have to report a market firm, with a slight advance in prices. The unwillingness of the wool growers to sell at the prices offered by manufacturer's agents, has driven the manufacturers to purchase in the eastern markets, and desirable parcels have been freely taken at 60 to 70 cts. lb. for Michigan and Ohio, and 70 to 80 for Pennsylvania and Virginia. The stock of old wool is now much reduced, leaving but little desirable wool, particularly of the finer grades. The manufacturers have also purchased freely of fine foreign wools, as they could get stock for their mills in the Atlantic cities cheaper than in the wool-growing districts. We learn of but few sales of wool in Ohio; their pretensions being 70 to 75 cts. lb. In Michigan sales have been extensively made at 50 to 55 cts. lb., averaging for goods parcels 53 to 54c. lb. As soon as there is a disposition to meet buyers, there will be heavy transactions, as many are prepared to purchase whenever prices will enable them to do so. The stock of both foreign and old domestics not heavy, but there is a general impression that our own clip will be very large, which induces the manufacturers to keep out of the market as long as they possibly can. We see no reason to anticipate lower prices unless there should be a decline in the premium on gold; no other cause will be likely to put wool at lower figures. The trade is in a healthy condition.

Sales on time were active, 79,500 for Oct. 31 at 26 25; for the end of the year some small sales were effected at 26 25; the total sales on long dates amounted to 85,700.

In National Bonds there was only one sale effected, 12,700 at 42. The amortization of these securities will take place on Monday the 9th inst. The total amount to be redeemed is set down at 31,225 patacons.

There was some talk on 'Change to-day of a certain party having stopped payment and his bills being protested, but on enquiry we learn that it is an unimportant affair, and the result of some incautious speculations in bonds.

The new Argentine Fire Insurance Company is talked about and applications made by the agents for subscription to the stock. Not having seen the prospectus, we can form no opinion on the enterprise.
