THE GUARD-SHIP.

As if the sand-banks which surround this city were not sufficient inconvenience to the commerce and shipping of Buenos Ayres, a guard-ship has been stationed in the outer roads, which acts as a sort of blockading squadron. When we inquire into the cause of all the nuisances and inconveniences which harass every ship-captain, we discover that they are mainly owing to the fact that no one troubles his head about reform. The ship-captain who is gulled, fined, and fleeced, from the moment he anchors in the roads until he sets sail with his homeward cargo, takes no possible interest in a reformation which can only be productive of good when he will be thousands of miles from the Plate. He vents his fury in the shipbroker's office, or curses the captain of the port as he leaves the mole-head, but there the matter ends. No matter what his grievance is, he never thinks of giving publicity to his sorrows, knowing well that 'little said is easily mended,' and that if he figures in the 'Standard' the odds are that it will take him six months to get through the Custom House. For years and years the port nuisances have been going on increasing with the rapacity of officials and the studied neglect of the Government. Individually speaking, we have nothing to say against the Captain of the Port; on the contrary, most of our countrymen on the beach speak in the highest terms of him, and we, ourselves, have always received the greatest urbanity at his hands, but there are port nuisances of which he must be cognisant, and which it is his duty to have removed. The Guard Ship nuisance is constantly brought under our notice, and it is now our duty and desire to call the attention of the Government to the matter.

Among the many rules and regulations of the Port, the most stringent is, that all vessels coming from foreign ports, before communicating with the shore, must be boarded by an officer from the guard ship called the 'visit,' and also the Doctor. This regulation is both wholesome and good; all ship masters know of it, and as far as in their ability are willing to obey it, but frequently, from what causes we know not, the 'visits' are not to be found, the Doctor is away on board some convivial merchantman, and a vessel after a voyage of seventy days' duration is obliged to lie off for hours and even days, alongside the guard-ship, hermetically sealed up, waiting the arrival of the 'visit' or the doctor. The passengers on board are of course furious, obliged, although actually in port, where every kind of fresh provisions can be obtained, to subsist on salt-beef. The captain cannot and dare not leave his ship, and if, perchance, a boat with friends of some parties on board runs alongside the ship, none can go or come from the boat until the arrival of the anxiously expected officers from the guard-ship. We have been informed that last week a case occurred where the captain, after sending for the 'visit,' or doctor, and waiting a considerable time for their arrival, put off in one of his boats for the shore, and was at once ordered on board again for thus infringing the port regulations, and his vessel put in quarantine for three days.

Now we ask if ever anything more monstrously unjust than this was known? The passengers were actually imprisoned for the impatience of the captain or the sleepiness of the guard-ship officers. Our Argentine friends need not be surprised that foreigners had here with a prejudice when they were on the first entry into Argentine

waters subjected to such injustice. It is painful to hear the comments of ship-captains and others about the conduct of the port officials. We, for our part, regard it as our duty to expose the matter, and open the eyes of the Government people to the subject. Although fully alive to the facility and we might even say disposition, to quarrel with, and even slander Government officials, nevertheless it is humiliating to any one who has the interest of the country at heart, to hear that the best way to get the doctor or 'visit' on board is to send a present of a few hams or cheeses to the guard-ship. Far be it from us to accuse any of the port officials of bribery, but the cutting sarcastic jokes we hear at all sides on the beach at the expense of these officers is both unpleasant and annoying. If, owing to the greatly increased commerce of the port, the officers of the guard-ship are insufficient, why not increase the number? Better far the trifling expense of one or two 'visits' or doctors, than the incarceration of hundreds of emigrants, who after a long and tedious voyage, pant to be on the land.

We regard the 'guardship' delays as a most serious grievance, and as such we call the attention of the Government to it. Only last week a vessel that had entered port and anchored, was at once ordered to weigh anchor and come up alongside the 'guard-ship,' but all the power of the whole Argentine nation would be unable to make the captain obey, simply because his vessel drew too much water, and could not go within twenty squares of the 'guardship.' But if the mountain will not go to Mohammed, then Mohammed will go to the mountain; and, after a painful exhibition of arbitrary ignorance, the visit and doctor had to at last push off for the vessel in question.

As no vessel is allowed to communicate with the shore previous to receiving the visit and doctor on board, so also should the penalty be very severe for any unnecessary detention of a vessel on account of the absence of these officers.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Southern Railway is now out to within four squares of Chascomus. Our agent is in town; he says things look well out there; all the wool shearing; no wool sales; price paid for shearing from \$40 to \$50 per 100. Some of Mr. Fair's wool, from the Espartillar has arrived by train, and is on sale at the South Plaza. Some of Sr. Gandra's wool has also arrived by train; in fact, all the estancieros out about Chascomus are now availing themselves of the railway to send their wool to town.

The Esmeralda arrived yesterday early, bringing very important news and heavy mails. The Paraguayans are about to make a stand at Empedrado or the Riachuelo. The fleet has at last moved up the river. Our correspondent's letter gives full details. The Virago at last started on Monday evening for Montevideo, where she is to be christened the Paysandú. She will probably return on Thursday morning.

On Friday the Mersey leaves for Montevideo, en route for Rio, with the mails. We understand several leading English merchants depart in her. She will not return to Buenos Ayres, as the Arno is waiting in Rio to take the Mersey's place.

It is rumoured that several Buenos Ayrean officers, Conesa, Bustillos and Cobo, have resigned their commissions in the army and are about to return to this city. We are ignorant what importance should be attached to this matter.

Sr. Labastier, once the leading hotel keeper of Buenos Ayres has again resumed his old business, having taken charge of the Hotel San Martin at the corner of Calles Cangallo and San Martin. We hear this hotel very highly spoken of and recommend it to our readers.

A subscriber from Mercedes speaks in the highest terms of the Bank in that town, which he says is of the greatest utility and convenience to the people in that neighborhood. Dn. Diego Arana, the manager, is an affable, popular man; in fact the right man in the right place.

We read in the 'Paraná' that Mr. Forrest, whose cotton-establishment was recently burned down, has been named American Vice-Consul at that port.

Some passengers per Esmeralda are said to have reported that an Italian schooner (with an Italian naval officer on board) when passing the Brazilian fleet was ordered to lie to, but paying no heed a 70-pound shot was fired at her, and as she sailed clean away a steamer was despatched after her, which seized her and conducted her back to the squadron.

There is a great rush for Barracas this year; in fact, the Calle Larga is now, beyond all question, the most fashionable promenade about town. We hear that the beautiful 'quinta' on the top of the hill, known as Balcarce's 'quinta,' overlooking Mr. Pongeraud's collegiate establishment, has been taken for the season by the Rev. Mr. Ford, the English clergyman. The neighborhood of Sr. Lezama's, beautiful 'quinta' is a complete English colony, from Waterloo 'quinta,' at the foot of Calle Defensa hill, to the Barracabrige. On all sides are English residents. There are a few sweet places still to be rented in this delightful suburban locality: those of our readers who are looking for a place should lose no time.

Mr. Wheelwright is expected down from Rosario on Thursday next. The inauguration of the Argentine Central Railway being over, Mr. Wheelwright can now spare a few days to devote to the Boca Railway. It is believed at the Tres Esquinas that sooner or later half the houses in or about that place will have to be knocked down to make room for the three railways which will all pass or stop at this point.

The people of Buenos Ayres were surprised yesterday to see a most extraordinary shaped waggon pass through the streets, with Southern Railway printed on it. On inquiry we learned that this is one of the new waggons for the carriage of parcels forwarded by train, a sort of city express. Buenos Ayres is fast becoming more European than South American.

The sheep auction of Sr. Carranza's [Dn. Roque] which we adverted to, proved a decided failure. In fact, no matter how good the sheep are, it is difficult, we may say impossible, to sell 4,000 sheep under the hammer. Sheep are not like cases of dry goods; and the only possible way to facilitate the sale of sheep in town, is by getting up an establishment such as Dn. Mariano Billinghurst proposes. This will draw all the buyers in the country to one certain spot.

The Western Railway is, we understand, paying so splendidly at present, that an effort to make a branch road from Moron to Lobos is now on the 'tapis' in the Government-house. Some of the richest men in the country live in the Lobos district. The estancia lands are teeming with the finest and best mestiza sheep. We see no reason, therefore, why the mooted extension should not be carried out, particularly as the Provincial Bank has at present on hand an unemployed specie reserve of half a million sterling, which the directors find it perfectly impossible to invest, and it is believed that as the rate of exchange is falling, the bank will be obliged to enter the market as drawers to maintain the rate. The time seems therefore peculiarly opportune for a new railway investment, and none can offer more inducements than the proposed Lobos branch.

There is only one diligence which leaves this city for the country parts, and that is the Magdalena coach; but it is believed that some arrangements will be made for the starting of this coach from the Ferrari station on the Southern Railway.

Some enterprising Italians are at last about to start a 'confiteria' and hotel at the Boca station; and we hear that a Frenchman is about to open a first-class restaurant at the Tres Esquinas station.

An English merchant just returned from the Banda Oriental, gives us a most satisfactory account of how things are going on there. Estancieros all doing well, camps good, and shearing just commencing.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

OUR ENQUINA CORRESPONDENCE.

SINBAD ON THE WAR.
Esquina, Oct. 21st.

Gentlemen,— Since the date of our last, affairs are beginning to wear a more favorable aspect than at any period before this since the invasion took place. Our guests are leaving for their homes—the Esmeralda took more of them than she could well accommodate, others took their departure in ox-carts, or, what was never seen with us before perhaps, undertaking a journey on foot. Six months ago the poorest gauchito could boast of half a dozen of sound horses, now a beast fit to be saddled is no longer to be seen anywhere in our district.

On the 16th the Brazilian forces composed of eighteen battalions had passed Curuzú Cuatiá and were within a day's march of Mercedes. President Mitre was supposed to have reached Villa Nueva, where Paunero was encamped, and Flores was not far distant, while Emilio Mitre was passing the river Mocoretz: all were directing their marches towards the river Corrientes. The Argentines and Orientals would probably cross the river at one of its northernmost fords, and the Brazilians at Paso Nuevo or at the Pass of Santillan. The aggregate number of the combatants is computed to be above thirty thousand. They march upon a front of five leagues, they have long trains of baggage and commissariat carts, a large and well furnished park of artillery, sufficient camp equipage, good clothes, are well armed, in a word, far superior in every respect to the soldiers seen heretofore in these parts. They have a long and tedious circuit to march and much miry ground to flounder through, as well as dense jungles to struggle with, ere they arrive at the coast of the Paraná, to say nothing of two streams—which have no bridges or ferry-boats—they have to pass, which, when swollen are formidable rivers. The allies have a moderate supply of horses lately received from Entre Rios, which were duly paid for: they are sadly in want of tame oxen or other draught cattle but measures have been taken to have the want supplied, which will soon be done.

During this month continued rainstorms have prevailed, which retard the movements of the allies. Flores had moved north to the Garcia-cue. Careres was on the trail of the invaders, doing all a brave man could accomplish with very limited means. Urquiza, by the latest accounts, was near Concordia, and that he will remain in that locality, or at least come no nearer than Basualdo, is the idea here.

On the 18th the allied squadron left anchorage in front of Goya and proceeded up the Paraná. They were yesterday beyond Cuevas and in the vicinity of Bella Vista. There it is probable they will remain awaiting the arrival of the ironclads and the periodical rise of the river, which has again fallen and continues to do so. The beastly Paraguayans, instead of going to their own territory, as all here thought they would have done, have halted at Empedrado and are in force both by sea and land at the Riachuelo, which place they are fortifying. This news we glean from an Italian gunboat just arrived in our port from the north, and you may deem it authentic. This is the third time we were led to believe the invaders had given up their cause as hopeless, that their final evacuation of our Province was merely a question of a very short time, but now it remains to be seen if we are yet to be bled to death by a most unscrupulous enemy. In spite of every exertion it will take the allies many days, and even weeks, to come up with the invaders, and when they do so we hope they will bear in mind, the comies are but a feeble folk, yet make they their houses in the rocks, and further, whenever practicable, in their future transactions with the Paraguayans, in preference to steel and lead to make use of gold. Here it is bruited by the knowing ones that the price of Estigarribia was three hundred ounces, instead of fifty times that sum, which one of your colleagues asserted to have been the case.

The pay of a Colonel was thrown in as a 'yappa.'

It will be a gratification for you to learn that the goods and provisions sent per Espigador as charity from your city, intended for the destitute emigrants, have all come to hand in a good condition, have been duly taken care of, and are being religiously distributed to those who are needy.

Our old friend of the 'Esperanza' has had the hardihood to put his press and types in full blast for the third time. We wish him good success.

LATEST FROM CORRIENTES.

(From our private correspondent in the Province of Corrientes.)
Costa de Guayquiraró frontier of Corrientes—October 21st 1865.

To the Editors of the Standard.
My dear Editors.

I am most thankful you gave my last letter publicity. Truly is the 'Standard' the great South American reformer, which seeing an abuse hurls it forth fearlessly for reformation, be the consequences what they may.

For the last week we have had little new here or in the neighbouring Department of La Paz, things appear to go on in the same way, only we have less deserters or Indians on the move, yet many are hid in Montiel. Beron is in everyone's mouth to find out where he is, some say he is in the 'Chaco,' some, gone to Paraguay, while others assert he is hid in the woods, all trembling lest he should come to La Paz, as friend or foe. There is to be a meeting of the heads of the Department to take measures for its tranquillity, viz, Colonels, Queros, Mesleus, Denis, Panyagua, Oyuela, Carril, &c. but if as usual they only eat a 'ternero' or two 'con cuero' embrace each other, and exterminate every abuse, even to the very thought of crime 'mañana,' it will tend to so much.

We are positively informed that Dr. Gibbins of the English 'Estancia' is summoned to this congress, and we know that last week he was requested to take a command, to which he gave a flat refusal, as his first act would be to lynch some delinquents high in office which may cause a jealous feeling from punctiliousness, which to begin with.

Our great abuses here at present, which put even murder and robbery in the shade, are the men who purchase for Government, either on commission or to sell for their own account. These men touched with neither shame nor remorse appear in public displaying great pomp, zeal, and patriotism. These purchasers of supplies for the army, men who committing the most barefaced robberies, live in the greatest safety, and, whilst they proclaim their patriotism have myrmidons in every locality, stealing horses, tame cattle, and cart oxen, without distinction to either rich or poor, steal drive off and usurp any, and everything that suits them to the rendezvous of the Commissary, when the greatest thief, the greatest scoundrel, is considered the most 'guapo,' and the greatest patriot, and whilst many an industrious farmer misses the loss of his ox, or his horse, the Commissary triumphantly without 'guia' passport, or certificate of any description hurries his plunder to the army, where he sells or delivers it to General Mitre: the General no doubt ignorant of the ruin the Commissary has caused, or the maledictions anathemas, and curses that have arrived with those horses, and cattle, the property of the poor, and the needy; usurped or stolen by the myrmidons of the Commissary. Again in almost every branch of the service have we these complaints, whilst the soldier complains of the stoppages from his pay, he grieves that his rations are served out to suit the pocket of the Commissary.

We are satisfied of the great and sweeping reforms these abuses have undergone in every tangible mode and manner where President Mitre could interfere, but yet they exist, cruelly and flagrantly to the ruin of the service, the demoralization of the entire army, and the plunder of the Exchequer, serving only to enrich a few.

In every civilized service no department is more scrutinized or better paid than the commissariat's, to prevent abuses; consequently when discovered none should be more severely punished. No other country affords the fa-

cilities of South America, in rationing an army in all its branches: thus what can condouce more to a horror for service than when the citizen, finds he has not alone forcibly to leave his home, but during his service to his country, his property has been plundered, his cattle stolen, and swept off by Commissaries and their myrmidons? There is another abuse although a partial one, I would call your attention too, that is favouring some divisions and regiments, in preference to others, creating jealousy: of this I will give a proof of your countryman the Duke of Wellington's impartiality, never favouring even his own table, to the detriment of the youngest recruit in the army, whilst he was not alone most scrupulous but punished with an iron rod, even in an enemy's country, the smallest article procured without being duly investigated and paid for. In a time of great scarcity in the Peninsula the Duke's brigade was one day most generously rationed, and the Duke to his staff was eulogizing his Commissary. At the moment up comes the little man in a flurry to the Duke, bitterly complaining of Sir Thomas Picton, whose brigade had been only half rationed for some days previous. Sir Thomas had publicly threatened the Commissary that if his brigade was not completely rationed before 12 o'clock the day following, at one precisely he would hang the Commissary upon the nearest tree. "Did Picton use this threat," said the Duke apparently dumfounded. "He did your Grace," replied the little man, overjoyed at the turn matters were taking.

"Then," answered the Duke, "ration and without delay, for, as certain as Picton said it, he will do it." Off flew the Commissary and Picton was rationed early the following morning. The town of La Paz I am informed is in a constant alarm, of an invasion of Indians from the Chaco, or some bugbear of which even the authorities are ignorant.

An Alcalde named Sanches from the Nandaria has just arrived, declaring that 73 horses have been stolen from his 'chartel' whilst only 12 have been paid for: it is causing some uproar as the stolen horses are in a troop of some 1,200 forming by the Commissary about 6 leagues from the town, but dinner is near and it is supposed it will be settled, the Gefé Politico having a mollifying power of moistening all fiery animosities at that genial hour.

RETREAT OF THE PARAGUAYANS!

The 'Paraná' of Oct. 20th says: the accounts which reach us of the devastation committed by the Paraguayan army retreating from Cuevas surpass anything ever heard of. A 'chasque' arrived yesterday from Goya states that they not only sweep off all the cattle, but burn the farm-houses, cut down the fences and destroy the plantations. This man left Goya on the 13th, and reports the rear-guard of the enemy to be on that day crossing the Arroyo Empedrado. They had recently passed over 14,000 head of horned cattle at Paso de la Patria, and were driving 15,000 more in same direction.

There is not a cow to be seen from Goya to the Tranquera de Loreto, and General Caceres has to send all the way to Goya for beef for his men. It is necessary for the allied armies to push forward immediately, to save Corrientes, but they will find it a skeleton.

GOV. LAGRAÑA'S HEAD-QUARTERS.

Curuzú-Cuatiá, Oct. 12th 1865.

Dear Sir,
I am now on Governor Lagraña's staff here. The army marching from Concordia encamped to-day in sight of this town, and will probably remain here some days until General Emilio Mitre's division come up: he had al-

ready crossed the Mooretá. President Mitre crossed the Mirafay at Paso de las Yeguas, and General Flores is marching towards Mercedes.

IMPORTANT FROM THE URUGUAY.

HORRIBLE MURDER IN GUALEGUAYCHU. We have the papers from Concordia to the 22nd, and Concepcion 21st inst.

It seems some ruffians named Pe-reyra, at Benites' saladero, intended to murder one Segovia, whereupon the commissary went to arrest them and was instantly assassinated.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Montevideo, 23rd October. "Water, water, everywhere, And not a drop to drink," was the exclamation Coleridge put in the mouth of his Ancient Mariner, and I may parody the lines and say,

There is, positively nothing to say. Speaking of parodies, I may observe that the 'Siglo' takes off the 'Tribuna' in a most unwonted sarcastic manner in an article that pretends to be a parody of the 'Tribuna's' 'Defence of Government' leaders.

The news from the campaña is far from cheering. The immense number of criminals wandering through the the camp, the 'matrones,' who prefer their wild mode of life to more honest and less uncertain pursuits, and the lawless feeling inspired by the past civil war, find the authorities almost powerless to suppress the terrible excesses and crimes that are committed in the different departments, unfortunately, with impunity.

The police force is utterly unable to cope with an evil which has reached its present alarming proportions. The Government has done, and is even now doing, all it can to grapple with the momentous question. I really hope that we may hear of a diminution in the number of crimes in the country, which have now reached an alarming figure.

For the rest, in the political world everything is going on in the most placid state of unbroken monotony and tiresome absence of interesting episodes. The elements of ire and vengeance so lately evoked from out of our midst, and placed en scène in the Government House seem to have subsided into a very provoking state of calmness. The Demon of Strife has slunk back to his lair.

Business has experienced some small improvement within the last few days, but the present unfortunate state of the campaña must seriously affect sales for the Interior.

PUBLIC LANDS.

A public sale of two leagues of Government land will take place at the Public Lands Office on the 30th of November next. The land is situated in the partido de Loberia on the arroyo Quequen Chico, and no bid under 200,000 per square league will be admitted.

is given within twenty four hours after the sale. My belief is, that any man who wishes to keep the land at the auction price and remains twenty four hours without stating his intention will be twenty three hours and some minutes too late; the words in the text are: "en el acto de cerrado el remata." He who is satisfied that he can strain these words into 24 hours after the sale, will prove himself more anxious to be entangled in a lawsuit than most people.

On the other hand, there can be no gains in allowing the land to go to auction, for the lowest price it will be put up at is the price at which it is now offered to tenants; those who built their hopes on getting it cheaper for want of bidders at the auction will find out their mistake when it may be too late to remedy it; the first bids must be, the prices fixed by the Act of Legislature passed in November last, and if these prices are not obtained the sale will be withdrawn and the land sold privately, or by private sale whenever a purchaser is found willing to give these prices; but in no case can it be sold under the prices fixed by this Law. Now for the next point: the tenants who believe they retain a claim if the land they hold should not be sold at the auction will find it difficult to reconcile their belief with Articles 4, and 8, of the first decree issued after the parliamentary law. The tenant's claim is good up to the end of the year; after this date he has yet the option of keeping the land at the auction price, but he runs the risk of having to pay a high price without any probability of getting it cheaper than before it went to auction; and with the auction, whether the land is sold or not, his right of preference expires. Those who think otherwise will find that they rest on a broken reed unless the Law is thereafter altered; a parliamentary alteration is not probable, the Session is about closing and nothing of the kind has even yet passed through a committee of either house.

This question of no auction sale for want of bidders, seems to be the sheet anchor of some tenants; let us admit a case in illustration:—Mr. A. holds land and allows the time specified to expire; the land is put up to auction and there are no bidders; I, then go to the Public Lands and solicit the land in possession of Mr. A. which, on reference to the list of unpurchased lands held by tenants, is immediately made over to me. If Mr. A. wishes to keep this land, how is he to do so in this case? I presume his only remedy is to plead 'Mejor Derecho' in a law-suit against the Government, and not, under these circumstances, against the purchaser. Any one in search of this sort of amusement with find little difficulty in obtaining it.

I have reason to know that some tenants are under the impression they must purchase all they hold or none; this is not the case, the tenant may purchase half, quarter, or any quantity he likes of the tract he holds.

Subtenants are entitled to the quantity they hold, even without a contract from the head-tenants; in this case, they must procure a certificate from the Justice of the Peace and the bounding neighbors stating the quantity of land held by the subtenant, or, if this is not known the certificate must state the quantity of stock the subtenant has, the time he has been on the land, and the class of house built on the part claimed by the subtenant.

The headtenant's right, must present a certificate signed by the Justice of the Peace and the 'hinderos' stating that there are no subtenants on this tract; legally speaking this is not obligatory, but it is asked for, and if not presented, there is some delay; whereas with such a certificate in due form the Title Deeds are ordered to be drawn up immediately.

Disputes between head-tenants and subtenants will be decided in a verbal audience by the Minister of Finance; if this decision is not agreeable, each party must deposit half the value of the land in dispute until the Courts finally decide; if either party refuse to lodge the money his claim will be considered invalid and all the land in dispute will be sold to the other party.

THE HISTORY OF THE SPANISH EXPEDITION.

It is about two years since the Spanish squadron, consisting then of two frigates and a steamer, came into the waters of the Pacific. They were received with no misgivings, but, on the contrary, with the liveliest welcome. The Admiral and his officers were entertained at public banquets here and in Santiago; and a national pride was felt at the prospect of a cordial reunion with the mother country. The Spanish Admiral Pinzon, uttered some ungracious expressions, it is true, but these were received as splanetic rather than as tokens of ill will.

Then the Spanish Minister in this country complained that Chile had manifested a disposition inconsistent with neutrality; had favored Perú, had allowed men to be shipped for the Peruvian service, as well as provisions and coal; whereas Spanish ships had later on been refused supplies, and finally coal by public decree had been forbidden to be exported for the use of either party, because hostilities were de facto existing between them.

After these complaints had been discussed tartly for some time, the Spanish Minister rather suddenly stated that he was satisfied with the 'declarations' of the Chilean Secretary of State. The affair was considered at an end; and commercial affairs that had been seriously deranged, resumed their prosperous way.

Late events, however, have reversed all. Admiral Paraja, arrived on the 17th, sent in his despatch on the 18th demanding satisfaction and making threats that he should within four days proceed to extreme measures.

He received a reply, refusing to accede to these peremptory demands, on the 22d; immediately he forwarded an 'ultimatum' that hostile measures should next day be adopted; the remonstrance of the Diplomatic Corps obtained a delay of a few hours; and on the 24th the blockade was declared at 6 A. M.

Thus, in a week, has a hasty man representing a rash and unscrupulous policy, torn open violently a question that was considered by diplomatic forms to be settled, presented his ultimatum, declared hostilities, and established a "blockade of the ports of Chile."

The Government has been taken entirely by surprise. They had not imagined for a moment that Spain would repudiate the action of her Minister. The heart of the nation beats bravely on the land, but an overwhelming force occupies their waters.

Two steam frigates are blockading Caldera, the 'Blanca' and 'Berenguela'; another the 'Marques de la Victoria' is at Coquimbo, while the 'Resolucion' and 'Villa de Madrid, each 42 guns, with a transport, occupy the outer roadstead of this port.
