THE GREAT SOUTHERN RAILROAD.

The realization of this important enterprise is now a mere question of a few days: the works are everywhere approaching completion with the most rapid strides—whatever men and money can accomplish is being done to bring matters to a speedy conclusion. The station buildings are all ready, or so nearly as to require but a few finishing touches, to release them from the hands of the workmen employed upon them; the bridges and other works of art are in a similarly advanced state; large numbers of engines, carriages, and goods-waggons are standing on the rails, ready to do their duty, and now crowd together at all the stations awaiting the flat which shall send them circulating along the line; the rails are now laid as far as the station ground of the terminus at Chascomus, and the intention was to have had the line ready to open for public traffic throughout upon the 1st of November, but it is feared that some little delay must now occur before this most desirable event takes place.

It appears that the cause of the delay arises from the fact that the Company, in compliance with the wishes of the Government of the Province, made arrangements some time since to extend the Railway for three quarters of a mile beyond the point originally selected for the terminus at Chascomus, so as to bring the station into a more central part of the town, but the vessel with the rails for this extension on board, although now over-due has not yet reached our harbor. When these materials do arrive, some days must necessarily elapse before they can be got ashore and transported to their destination.

In the meantime every exertion is being made to overcome the difficulty, and so far with success, as appears from the fact that the rails now extend to the terminus.

The company has acted liberally and wisely in thus meeting the wishes of the inhabitants of Chascomus, who will, no doubt, reciprocate this gracious act of the company, by inducing all their friends from the far south to avail themselves, to the fullest extent, of the advantages afforded by the railway.

It is extremely gratifying to hear the very important results already derived by the running of one train a-day each way, over a portion of this railway, as indicating what a brilliant future is in store for the undertaking when fully developed. It is not simply the shareholders of the company who are interested in the matter, but the public generally, as it would be idle to dispute that upon the results obtained by the Great Southern Railway, depends in a great measure the question whether or not foreign capital will flow into this country for investment in public works and similar enterprises.

A GLANCE AT OUR EXPORTS.

WOOL AND SHEEPSKINS.

Mr. Guejin has favored us with a statistical table of our exports for the past year, that is to say, from October 1st, 1864 to October 1st, 1865, which we doubt not will prove highly interesting to our readers, as it gives a better idea of the trade of the country than even the Custom House returns which are invariably one year behindhand. As the present is the wool season, we limit our remarks to Mr. Guejin's returns concerning this staple. The total export of wool for the past year from the Argentine Republic amounts to one hundred and twenty-nine thousand and thirty-two bales, and four hundred and fifty 'chiguas,' which is considerably in excess

of what was supposed. It will be seen by the following list that Belgium takes almost fifty per cent. of the whole staple:

These returns, compared with the previous year, show the real state of the trade: for some countries it shows a decided falling off, whilst for others a great increase. The export of wool to Antwerp is 25,062 bales over last year; for Havre, 8,837; for Bordeaux, 1777; for Marseilles, 580; for England, 4,964 bales, and for Genoa 618 bales.

The total export of sheepskins during the year is 19,421 bales, viz.:

The export increase of sheepskins over the previous year is 6,932 bales, which is a very flattering figure.

As will be seen by the following table, we have within the last five years doubled our wool exports, which, when it is remembered what bad seasons and epidemics we experienced during that period, speaks volumes for the progressive industry of this country.

It will be seen that in sheepskins the increase has been even greater than in wool.

Will our readers credit it that only ten years ago the total wool exports from Buenos Ayres—which was then, as it is now, the chief and only outlet for this Republic—amounted to only twenty-seven thousand six hundred and seventy-seven bales? What a gigantic increase! We challenge all the trade returns of the United States or of the most prosperous British colonies to show any equal to this. The history of the wool trade of this country does indeed disclose the most startling facts, and if we are to be permitted to judge the future by the past, we have reason to suppose that the exports of wool from the Argentine Republic in 1875 will fall little short of ONE MILLION of bales.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The steamer Uruguay from Montevideo arrived yesterday bringing us later dates from Europe. The commercial news could hardly be more favorable, hides, tallow and wool going up both in the States and in Europe, money easy, the Brazilian loan effected and the Argentine loan about to be launched.

The weather, although good for the camp, is bad for shearing; a subscriber from the north informs us that for years the camps have not been seen in such condition as at present, shearing has been commenced everywhere, but as yet, owing to the broken weather, very few have finished. On the Lujan road there are about a hundred carts coming into town with wool.

Mr. Hall's new steamer La Elena is now plying to and from the outroads. Yesterday she took one hundred and odd bales out; she is a decided improvement on the old lighters, and we are glad to see that she is very well supported. It is a great advantage for shippers to have a steam lighter at command, and we believe the Elena only charges the same as the other lighters.

To-morrow night the ball at the Club del Plata is advertised to come off; it promises to be a very gay affair and well attended.

It was rumoured yesterday that Sr.

Lastarria, the Chilean Minister, is about to leave for Montevideo where he purposes making his headquarters. There is great talk of privateering going on, and letters of marque being issued, but we believe that it will result in nothing, as the Argentine Government, we learn, will not allow any armed privateer to leave this port, and even supposing that a privateer was fitted up outside there is no port into which prizes can be taken; so it is every way improbable that the Spanish shipping interests will be molested in the River Plate.

Our French colleague published yesterday a letter from M. Goddefrois, Montevideo, (a translation of which we give to-day) acknowledging his error in charging the River Plate Bank with having taken a false bill of lading with bills of exchange attached. This matter has caused much conversation in commercial circles in consequence of a circular which we declined, not knowing the merits of the case, beyond a simple statement from Mr. Green, that his bank never took the bills in question which is now confirmed by the letter which we publish this day.

The English steamer Santiago arrived at Valparaiso on the 1st October, and was allowed to enter that port by the blockading squadron.

Mr. Jehu Hitchins jr company with Mr. Chacon has started for the gold mines of Tacuarembó. We hope these gentlemen will favor us with a few samples of this much talked-of gold. In Montevideo the affair is causing great attention; Mr. Lettsom, the British Consul, we believe has expressed himself most favorably concerning the matter, and a sort of Tacuarembó gold fever is springing up.

Two Mediterranean vessels have been placed in quarantine in Montevideo. Every possible precaution is being taken by the Captain of the Port against cholera importation.

Advices have been received that a British war steamer, the Devastation, has gone in search of the Shenandoah, a pirate under the Secession flag, which has done, and is doing, great damage in the North Pacific.

We call attention to the statistics about wool and sheepskins, which we publish in another column. It is compiled by a leading 'barraquero' of this city, and the figures may be fully relied on.

It is currently reported through town that our talented Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Elizalde, is about to move down to the Calle Larga, in Barracas, now the most fashionable quarter about town. The Minister's 'rue in urbe' is alongside Standard Hall, and beautifully situated on this South American Broadway.

COMMERCIAL NEWS FROM EUROPE.

ARGENTINE AND BRAZILIAN LOANS.

The 'Telegrafo' of Montevideo furnishes very interesting commercial news from England to Sept. 23rd and New York 9th, brought to Rio Janeiro by the French mail, which arrived in the latter port on the 18th inst.: from Rio the steamer Hercules conveyed same to Montevideo.

London, Sept. 22nd 1865.

The demand for money has been very active during the past fortnight, without altering the rate of discount, which remains at 4 per cent. The Brazilian Loan, for 5 million £ sterling has been introduced with good success, the demand for stock being much greater than the sum required: it was quoted yesterday at 2½ to 2¾ per cent premium. It is expected the Argentine Loan will soon be put on the market, and the friends of Buenos Ayres are sanguine in the result. London and Brazilian bank shares 4 to 6 prem. London and River Plate Bank 14 to 17 prem.

Ox and cow hides are firm: potro do, in slight demand at former prices. Bones have improved something at 5 to £6 per ton bone-ash at 95 to 105s. per ton. Heavy salted ox-hides 59 to 66 lb. 5½ to 5¾d.: cow do. 45 to 49 lb. 4 to 4¾d.

Antwerp, 23rd Sept.

Stock of wool on 7th inst. 13,500 bales. Fine wools of good quality looked for, and improved 5 to 10 centimes, but these kinds are very scarce: large stock of inferior and ordinary wools, in very little demand. Of River Plate wool 213 bales sold, at 1.65 to 1.90.

Hides continue in good demand. Sales since our last, 44,800: arrivals 21,072 hides. Good salted are drawing attention: cow-hides scarce and in demand at improved rates. Dry hides less looked for, but some buyers from the United States, and a good feeling generally. Tallow in good demand, for good saladero: horns no change, sales 24,000.

Havre, 22nd Sept.

The demand for hides during the fortnight has been active: no arrivals from the River Plate. Dry horse-hides wanted: no stock: 3,000 salted sold at 5¾ to 4 f. Stock of Monte Video and Buenos Ayres hides 51,499 dry and 60,510 salted. No arrivals of horse-hair from the River Plate: good Rio Grande, sells well. Tallow continues in good demand at 57 to 57½ f. Mares' grease sells at 81½ f. Arrivals of wool, 483 bales, and sheepskins 50 bales: sales 2,832 bales wool, and 39 do. sheepskins. The auction-sales of the 14th were well attended, and drew good prices.

Liverpool, 23rd Sept.

The wool-sales are nearly over and have been well attended, both home and foreign buyers continuing to transact freely: prices are extremely firm. Tallow in east quoted at 46½ d. Salted hides at 4½ to 5¾ d. The animation in the Cotton-market has been maintained with vigor this week, sales unusually great and prices rising: news from America is firm, and yesterday some large transactions of American were done at ½ to ¾ d. advance: Brazilian has gone up ¾ d. and Egyptian 1 d. to 1½. Large sales of Indian at 1 d. advance.

Barcelona, 20th Sept.

No business is thought of, and the Cholera occupies all attention: for six weeks our market has been dead, and although the epidemic is not increasing, our port is declared infected, which prevents all business: importers have bonded all their goods, and this state of things is likely to continue for some time.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

THE FRENCH MAILS.

The health of Her Gracious Majesty is not satisfactory, and the newspapers seem to hint at mental suffering, which is in some manner hereditary. The most important subject occupying attention is the Fenian agitation in Ireland, in connection with clubs in the U. States, for the purpose of total separation from Great Britain and the establishment of an Irish Republic. The Secretary of State, Mr. Seward, has notified the British Government of active preparations by the Fenians, and declared that the American Government views the same with complete disapprobation.

The Emperor of the French was received with coolness by the inhabitants of San Sebastian. He is said to meditate important political concessions, fuller liberty to the press, and to popular associations; M. Ollivier, of the Opposition, becoming a member of the Cabinet. Cholera is raging at Marseilles and Toulon, but has abated in Italy and the East.

The new Italian Chambers will have to decide on the present policy; the Ministerial crisis continues and predicts a fall. The Papal Government has failed to recruit its army in Austria, Spain, or Belgium.

There was talk of Ministerial changes at Madrid, Sr. Bermudez de Castro wishing to resign, but O'Donnell restored order and continues in the Queen's favor. Prince Amadeo's projected marriage with the Infanta is broken off.

The Portuguese Government has named a new Minister to Brazil, in view of some outrages committed on Portuguese residents at Para.

The rebels in Mexico are nearly finished; the imperial troops have taken Hermerilla, and 3000 of Juarez's followers have submitted. The French have driven Juarez to the northern frontier of Mexico, where he will take refuge in American territory.

LATEST FROM THE U. STATES.

President Johnson has disapproved of Gen. Howard's circular which continued the sale of properties belonging to rebels already pardoned, declaring that the pardon restored them to all their rights. The Mississippi convention voted the approval of the Slavery

abolition bill. In Richmond there was a great meeting to protest against the suspension of some newspapers: at the same time it was declared the South accepted the result of the war and the abolition of Slavery.

Passports are now freely given to Southern emigrating, many of whom proceed to Mexico. Jeff. Davis is to be tried by the civil tribunals, but it is thought President Johnson has resolved to banish him for life. The negro conflicts unhappily continue. The Mexican question was debated in a Cabinet-Council, and most of the Ministers were for recognizing Maximilian, but the President has postponed the matter, and the friends of Juarez intend to make a noise in Congress.

LATEST FROM THE PROVINCES.

THE RIOJA REBELS.

The 'Eco de Cordoba' states the Rioja rebels to be within 12 leagues, at a place called San Antonio Grande. Col. Pizarro had gone the wrong way, towards Cruz del Eje, to meet them, Col. Irrazabal was at Chañar, pursuing them. Pizarro left on the 14th with two companies of the Cordoba Libre battalion. The rebels commit great depredations. In Cordoba another citizen has been murdered by the soldiery, behind Peñalozas quinta.

The Governor of Salta has resigned, and Gen. Taboada intends to assemble a contingent of 2,000 men. An Italian named Bruza committed suicide at Tucuman.

IMPORTANT FROM BOLIVIA.

FUGITIVES IN SALTA.

Gen. Melgarejo was at Oruro with 2,000 men, when he heard of a revolt in Potosi: marching at once on that place he cut up the malcontents, many of whom escaping across the Argentine frontier have taken refuge in Salta, where at his request they have been disarmed. The party of Mr. President Gorriti remains entrenched at La Paz, some 1,500 strong.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

(From our Correspondent.)

Montevideo, Oct. 25th, 1865.

In my last I was led into an unintentional error through false information. The capture of the individual who, as clerk at Señor Alcorte's, left this with moneys obtained on forged 'conformes,' now turns out to be an unfounded report, and I hasten to correct the mistake into which your readers will undoubtedly have been led by your correspondent. I am told, however, by the Manager of the Montevideo Bank, that there is every probability of the party, who, by the way, is a Spaniard—Catalan—being secured, and the loss consequently being but a small one.

To-day we have had a copious fall of rain, which has cleared the atmosphere, and we are now likely to have fine weather for the shearing in the camp. From what I can learn from different quarters the clip this season promises to be a good one, and I have just been favored with the perusal of a letter from one of our principal foreign estancieros, who remarks that the general state of the camps is remarkably good. The shearing is now going on in different parts, and already there has arrived in town a small parcel of wool, I believe from Mr. Fair's estancia. Prices at present are nominal, but very shortly sales of wool of this clip will begin to be made. I have heard it remarked in more than one quarter that there is in many estancias a noticeable improvement in the quality of the wool this year.

There is a report current in town to-day that Señor Aguiar, the Chief of Police, resigns his post for the alleged reason of ill health. It is even whispered that General Caraballo has tendered, or is about to tender, his resignation of the post he occupies as Military Commandant of the forces of the Capital. I cannot vouch in any way for the truth of these rumors, which may, it is very probable, be nothing more than 'on dits,' that are had recourse to, to fill up the political conversations of the day in moments of an utter want of more important matter.

We are now entering on the lugubrious week of the 'Noventa de Animas,' and amid the mourning crowns and fu-

neral garlands that stock the shop windows, destined to find their way to the Cemetery on the 'Dia de Defuntos,' to deck the humble grave or broken pillar that marks the place where the departed are resting from the chiding ills of life, we are called, as in duty bound, to refrain from worldly amusements; thus the theatres of the city are to be closed, as is the custom at this season of the year, and Señora Mollo has given her parting 'funcion,' 'Un Ballo en Maschera,' to resume the 'temporada' after the 2nd of next month. And here I may say incidentally that the new Opera Company, under the guiding genius of Señora Mollo and Pozzolini on the boards; and Pretti in the orchestra, have had no occasion to repent of their having come to this city. The two last performances were each night 'Un Ballo en Maschera,' and Señora Mollo sang to an appreciative and contented audience of more than 1,500 each time. Marietta Mollo is growing quite popular amongst us, and her singing is really good, and I have heard more than one intelligent amateur give it as his opinion that her voice or her mode of singing has greatly improved since she last appeared on the Montevideo boards.

MORE FROM MONTEVIDEO.

October 25th 1865,
 Hotel Oriental.

Dear 'Standard.'
 Your correspondent invariably winds up, or begins, his interesting letters by stating that this place is dull, and nothing doing; I request you will correct this, as I am in a position to prove Montevideo is twice as gay as your city; and as for news, politics, &c., if I only had time I could fill your columns up with Oriental topics. Having a few spare moments I send you the following items.

The 'Carnel' is undergoing repairs; that last flash of lightning having done much more damage than was at first supposed, but boiler-makers are very scarce here and the captain had to send to Buenos Ayres for some. They say at the Rooms that she will be all right and ready to sail by the 12th, but the opinion here is she ought to be sent home and another steamer sent to replace her.

The 'Teyere,' that 'boat of grief,' since the day she refused to take up the 'Standard' supplement, I think last February, never had a day of luck and is I may say hopelessly laid up: no one knows what is the matter with her some say her keel is broken; others that the cylinders have collapsed, the agents have sent up to Buenos Ayres for new ones. But she won't be able to run for the next three months.

Minelli the ex-Judge of Mar Chiquita has been made a Vice Consul by King Victor for the village of Minas; the nomination has given great satisfaction, as people feared here he was going to start another paper.

Affairs in Corrientes look so sunny at present, that the Government has disbanded all the National Guards in the camp. This is regarded as a good measure, as shearing being on, and hands scarce, the men were wanted badly on the estancias.

There is some terrible work going on in the Captain of the Port's. Three vessels were fined yesterday. The most stringent regulations to prevent the importation of cholera have been adopted.

The 'saladeristas' are preparing to commence operations, but hands are very scarce, and the 'barraqueros' also complain of this. A petition has been sent into Government, signed by most of the 'saladeristas' and 'barraqueros,' praying of the Minister to distribute the Paraguayan prisoners amongst these establishments, where they can earn from fifteen to twenty reales per day. It is supposed that the petition will be attended to.

Exchange for the packet not very active. About £500,000 on England has been passed at 51½; on Franco about 120,000 francs at 82.
