THE COLISEUM.

This new temple of the Muses will be inaugurated with great pomp on to-morrow evening, under the presiding patronage of the Vice-president Paz and Governor Saavedra, and in presence of a select company limited only to shareholders, who are among the leading English and German residents. The preparations are on a scale of becoming brilliancy, and it will be a full-dress 'soirée': the stewards will be 16 in number, under the direction of Mr. Constant Santamaria, and the performances will comprise classical music in which the chief-artistic talent of our city will be employed.

The building has been finished but a few days, and is now an ornament to B. Ayres. It stands in Calle Parque, between Esmeralda and Suipacha, and cost, we believe, about £9,000 sterling. Being simply a Concert-hall, it is small but beautifully arranged, with seats for 500 persons, and cloak-rooms, ladies' apartments, breakfast-hall, &c. suitable for balls, public dinners or such like purpose. The vestibule has three entrance-doors: the grand hall is lofty and well designed, with seven frescoes on the left and four on the right, the other three niches on the right being occupied by doors opening into a corridor. These frescoes, from the palette of the talented French painter, M. Palliere, comprise the following classical allegories: we begin on the left.

- 1st 'Chant de guerre': an infant on a dismounted cannon, blows a trumpet: in the distance a city in flames. Below, the figure of Victory, a woman crowned with palm.
- 2nd. Bacchanals: a child playing cymbals, surrounded with grape and vases. Below, a female 'Bacchante.'
- 3rd. Love song: a child imitating on a flute two pigeons cooing. Below, a girl playing a serenade on a guitar.
- 4th. Lyric poetry; sunset, an infant blowing a sea-shell. Below a priestess playing on the lyre.
- 5th. Rustic poetry: a child playing bagpipes on a sheaf of corn, two larks uprising. Below a woman dancing and playing on the triangle.
- 6th. Comedy: a child playing a tambourine, beside an antique mask of tragedy. Below, Folly with her cap and bells.
- 7th. The Idylls: a child blowing a hunting horn and holding in a hound. Below, a woman playing on the ancient double-flute.

On the right side, we have—
1st. "Chant de Joie": a woman playing castanets.
2nd. "Chant de Deuil": female figure with urn and cypress-wreath.
3rd. "Sacred song": woman playing an organ.
4th "Concert music": woman playing a violin.

At the end of the hall, behind the orchestra, are three doors communicating with the salle-a-manger and ladies' apartments. The corridor on the right of the hall leads into a small court-yard with glass-roof, and other out-offices. The cloak-rooms are on either side of the vestibule at the entrance to the hall. In fine, the arrangements are tasteful and commodious, reflecting every credit on the committee, architect and artists.

INDIAN INVASIONS IN MENDOZA.
The 'Eco de Cordoba' states that M. Charpentier's new Diligence 'Union Americana' has brought the following alarming intelligence:

A body of Pampa Indians, about 300 in number, swept that part of the Province of Mendoza from Villa de la Paz to the Posta de Cabra, carrying off some 2,000 head of cattle. Having fallen in with a convoy of 150 mules laden with cargo, they broke open the cases and rummaged their contents but took very little, except the clothes of the mule-drivers and peons whom they left perfectly naked. At the same time another body of 500 savages made a descent between Achiras and Lagunilla, carrying off everything, even sheep, and escaping with great booty. Three of these Indians straggling behind were attacked by Capt. Concha and his orderly, but the Captain got badly wounded.

It is said the savages intend another 'malon' in the direction of Tambito, which has caused some alarm in Rio Cuarto and the frontier of Cordoba, where the Nat. Guards were at once called out and placed under arms to be ready at a moment's notice. Luckily the 7th reg. of the Line was on march towards San Luis, via Rio Cuarto, and will be able to prevent the advance of the Indians and restore security.

INDIANS IN CORDOVA.

INVASIONS at TUNAS, CARLOTA, RIO CUARTO, &c. The Governor of Cordova has written to the Minister of War, 9th inst., that the Indians have flagrantly violated the treaties with Gen. Emilio Mitre. On the 21st ult. they invaded Las Tunas and Loreto, on the 25th they swept off all the cattle at Carlota, on the 28th they came within 19 leagues of the Rio Cuarto and took 150 horses; on the 2nd inst. 500 of them swept the country from Esquina to Chajan, taking 8,000 head of cattle and 14 families, and sacking three troops of carts: on the 2nd they again invaded Tunas and killed a soldier; on the 3rd, 400 more made a descent on Carlota. Col. Baignoria succeeded in killing three of the savages.

THE FENIANS OF RIOJA.

Colonel Pizarro in his report to the Governor of Cordoba, respecting his campaign against the Rioja Fenians, dated Villa Dolores, Nov. 4th, says—"I am concerting plans with Col. Iseas, and have learned by letter from Major Zelaya that the rebels Salazar, Agnero and Navarro, have united their forces to the number of 200 men and set out in direction of the San Juan mines intending to invade Caucete and provide themselves with horses. Of the 200 men ordered from here to march to Rio Cuarto none of them have assembled, although that old fool, Col. Cornejo, who is a foreigner, has managed to consume over 100 fat cattle: I will, however, do my best to get these 200 together. Col. Zelaya is not so bad: he has placed himself at my orders, and the townfolk are quite easy since my arrival, some of those who had fled returning to their houses. Being rather badly mounted I am getting fresh horses and hope to be ready to meet the rebels on their return from San Juan. Col. Leal has got no men together, and you might as well stop sending him money for military expenses. If you do not want the 200 recruits immediately to send to Paraguay, leave them here for the present to guard the frontier. I have caged some birds of ill-omen and will send them to you. The bearer of this will give word to the authorities at Cruz del Eje to be on the alert with the rebels. Please send any spare muskets to Major Zelaya."

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The inauguration of the Coliseum is the only topic of the day. Vice-President, Dn. Marcos Paz, and Governor Saavedra are to be the sponsors on the occasion; as we do not belong to the committee we cannot say what part these distinguished gentlemen are to take, but we think that the sponsors of a Concert-hall should be prepared to sing a song on the occasion, 'Rob in Adajir,' 'Spots 'Wha has,' or the 'Harp that once through Tara's Halls' would do, if Beuken could only reduce any of these soul-stirring airs to

Spanish. From what we hear about the preparations, the inauguration promises to be the grandest thing of the kind in Buenos Ayres. Young ladies will go in full ball-dress and matrons in what is termed Tertulia attire. We have been requested to notify subscribers that the performance will commence precisely at 8 o'clock, and the moment the music begins, the doors will be closed not to be opened until the first pause occurs. Some of our leading, and we may add, most-fashionable brokers are but mere users. Mr. Santa Maria, one of the Directors of the Southern Railway, is the master of ceremonies. As the tickets of admission are limited to the shareholders of the building there was great pushing and driving to get a ticket yesterday. The Secretary informs us that all the shares save one are subscribed for.

The Government has demanded of the Camara three names, to select a Criminal Judge for the District of San Nicolas. It appears that the prison is overflowing, and, as there is no Judge, there is no safety-valve. Next week the prisoners will have to be lodged in the private houses in the town, there is no other place for them.

The manager of the Western Railway seems to have been determined to raise the fares high enough—nothing in railway literature affords a precedent for Mr. Haedo's conduct—first class fares to be doubled, and second fifty per cent. increase.

The Tucuman, alias 6th, regiment of the line is now ready to march, but no one knows where to; some think Corrientes, others hint Bahia Blanca. Two French ships just arrived in port brought out over fifty French soldiers; they were all drafted into this regiment.

Mr. Rosende, the Collector General of the Province of Buenos Ayres, will sell by auction on the 27th inst., the Municipal tax or duty on Saladeros for killing mares. The tax, which is, we hold, a most unfair impost on trade, is one paper dollar per head. Last year it realized \$72,000, this year: it is not thought it will reach one half of this price, owing to the declining state of our saladeros—half these establishments are shut up or sold off by auction for a mere song. The saladero business may be strictly said to be going to the dogs. The Government, instead of protecting this trade, still perseveres in wringing the last farthing from the unfortunate saladeristas. The business will soon cease altogether, for, from the moment the novillos are parted out on the rodeo until the salted hides are on board, it is but one continued system of taxation—of course the trade is all but annihilated.

Messrs. Balbin & Plowes are, after all, the heroes of the hour: what Lopez, with all Paraguay, could not effect, these intrepid auctioneers are about to realize. In a few days these gentlemen will make a clean sweep of the Argentine navy. On the 27th inst. three Argentine warsteamers will be knocked down to any one who will condescend a nod or a wink. If we recollect aright, the boat with the pretentious name, Caaguazu, was once bought by the Government of Buenos Ayres in five thousand ounces; we question, although this renowned war-vessel was never in a fight, if she will, under the ivory hammer of Messrs. Balbin and Plowes, fetch over five thousand dollars.

The Germans have established another new club; we forget the new name, but we believe it is something equivalent in English to 'Home, sweet Home.' On Thursday night there were some German amateur theatricals in calle Belgrano: we hear they passed off with the greatest success: indeed, everything the Germans do we must say they do well.

A gentleman called at our office on Friday to know what about the Tacuarembó gold. We profess to know nothing at all on the subject, but hope if some of our Oriental subscribers read this they will send us some advices.

Mr. Mendez, the mayordomo on the Cazon estancia, notifies the public that in the new law of fines, the penalty for galloping in the street includes going one's horse at an English trot. The cause of this express notification to the public arises from some difficulty which the vigilantes encountered in

distinguishing between a regular gallop and a stiff trot. The case was tried in the Police Court last week—a man ordered to be fined for galloping, he refused to pay on the ground that the horse couldn't gallop, but merely trot; he left it to the Chief himself, who fearlessly mounted the recreant Bucephalus—off went the Chief at a trot that would almost cut the Chinese giant in two, but notwithstanding all the whipping the brute would not gallop. Foster tells us this is the reason why the notice in question is published.

On Friday evening Mr. Wheelwright, accompanied by the Vice President and some of the Ministers, went down to the Boca by special train, to inspect the locality for the terminus or station there. We hope that now all the questions or difficulties which have opposed Mr. Wheelwright's conclusion of the work will be removed, as the Vice President will have seen not only the importance of the line, but also the miserable shifts and tricks of the diligence people to paralyse this road. Down in Barracas the thing has become a regular nuisance: the works are stopped by order of the Government to meet the wishes of a set of irresponsible diligence drivers, the streets are blocked up, some of the roads are impassable, and our friends the barraqueros are so hemmed in that the carts with high timbers get into the barraca. It is high time that Governor Saavedra should show his good sense by ordering Mr. Wheelwright to proceed with the completion of his line, which is a most decided convenience, instead of harassing him at every step, and stopping a railway to oblige the diligence drivers! The thing is really so monstrous that it is not to be tolerated, and we feel certain, from what we know of Governor Saavedra and his Ministers, that the moment the business is properly explained to them the works of the railway will be allowed to proceed at once.

We learn on good authority that the Crudo party is now so completely in the minority, notwithstanding all their programmes, etc., that it has not the remotest chance of succeeding in the coming election. The only people who are really in favor of the few Crudos who are making such a noise, are our friends in Rosario, who are to a man Crudos, and want, by hook or by crook, to get the capital up there.

General Flores is much wanted in Montevideo owing to the scandalous post-office neglect about the delivery of newspapers. The carrier frequently takes the papers home to his own house, because the day is, too hot, or the weather rainy. What an outrageous abuse! and yet there are four newspapers in the Mount, and not one of the editors dares to say a word about it. The unfortunate Orientals want such a man as Posadas there.

Miss Casalla, one of the best sopranos in Montevideo, is shortly expected to arrive in Buenos Ayres. All the lovers of music in Montevideo regret much this young lady's departure.

Watson's Hotel at Belgrano is the great rendezvous for all our fashionable young men to-day. Genuine and mock turtle soup, we suppose, as usual, and that delicious drink which mine host humorously calls 'up and down stairs.'

We publish to-day the programme of Professor Reinken's grand concert, which comes off on Wednesday at the Coliseum. Tickets to be found at the inevitable Mackern's.

Mr. Forrest, the renowned cotton-planter of the Paraná, has written down to Mr. Helper, the American Consul, for fifty American families for his plantations. Let President Mitre, who always reads the 'Standard,' take note of this!

Mr. Billinghurst's auction at Ca-ballito is postponed.

GREAT NEWS FROM MONTEVIDEO.

TRAMWAY CONCESSIONS.

GREAT ARRIVALS OF WOOL.

AN ENGLISH GARDENER MURDERED.

MR. LETTSOM'S "SUMARIO."

Montevideo, Nov. 17, 1865.

With the present fine weather, the arrival of produce from the 'campaña,' the killing season which is now upon us, added to the assurance of a favorable termination to the campaign

against Paraguay, and the rumors, faint as they are, of a prompt settlement of the question with Loper's Government, give Montevideo an aspect of greater activity and contentment.

Various undertakings are in the course of being carried out. The surveys and levels for four new roads are now being taken, one to the Figurita, one to the Molino pass, another to La Union, and the fourth to the Duranas pass or bridge. These when made, as they will undoubtedly be before very long, will be incalculable advantage to this city and its suburbs, and will greatly facilitate the arrival of produce from the interior.

Our countryman Mr. John McColl has obtained the concession from Government for the construction of a tramway to La Union, to El Paso del Molino, and a branch line to the Matadero, on the coast. This is an undertaking of which the great advantages are too manifest to require my noticing them here, and the fact of the concession having been obtained by one of our most influential English residents, gives good promise of the project being carried out. That the enterprise will be a highly lucrative one, there cannot be the slightest doubt, as the large and constantly increasing traffic on both these roads insure a large return on the outlay of capital. The Government guarantees 7 p. c. on the capital necessary for the construction of the lines. The present would be an opportunity for one of your contractors in your city to take charge of the execution of the work, thus avoiding the necessity of sending to England or elsewhere, for what we require for carrying out the project.

Prices for wool can hardly be quoted as yet. The barbarians, as a friend of mine facetiously calls certain produce buyers whose bargaining disposition might give them the honour of being counted among the tribes of Israel, have not as yet gone higher than 32 rls. per arrobe, or say 3 1/2 pats, which at 26 1/2 paper currency, would only give 86 1/2 per arrobe. Such a price is so out of all proportion to the real value of our fine wools, and so far below the prices you state as having been obtained for the 25,000 arrobes of Mr. Prange and Mohr's wool which realized a mean price of 4 39 s.c. or say \$114 80 paper currency, that the owners of wools refuse to let them go at such prices. I know of Estancieros who expect to obtain 40 rls. for wool of equal quality to Mr. Prange's. It is probable however, that the ruling price at which the largest part of our mestiza wool will be sold will be a shade lower than the figure I have named.

The wool of the Uruguay Pastoral Company, near Fray Bentos, corresponding to the clip of 80,000 sheep, will, I understand, be shipped direct for England; and indeed the largest part of the wools from the estancias bordering on the Uruguay, will not come into our market, but will be sent direct to Europe. Mr. Harris, the enterprising manager of the Uruguay Company, shipped for England last year, I am informed, some 100 bales of wool, for which he obtained the price of 10d. per lb. We have now among us an American gentleman, who, I understand, has arrived amongst us with the express commission for the buying up wools for some foreign markets.

Altogether what with the firmness of prices in produce generally, according to last advices from Europe, the advance in the value of ox and cow-hides, and the manifest readiness of wool buyers on one side to make purchases, the rural interest is just at present in a very good humor. We shall be hearing of sales of wool in our city before long. As yet people are holding back not only for better prices, but until they can foretell with more or less precision the final result of this year's shearing, which before the middle of December will probably have been brought to a close.

Amongst the larger parcels of wool now arrived, I notice Mr. J. McColl's: a fine, well-conditioned lot of about 2,000 arrobes. Another parcel of fine wool of about 6,000 arrobes, is shortly expected to arrive from the Department of Cerro Largo, from the flocks of the 'Sociedad Merinos de Tacuari.' These wools fetch generally prices on

a par with those of the best of Banda Oriental wool.

The jury called together to take cognizance of the charge brought by the Fiscal against the 'Correo' newspaper, for certain ludicrous verses, accused on the score of their attacking the alliance with Brazil, has, as was to have been surmised, thrown out by the juridical decision, that 'no hay lugar a la formacion de causa.' This is as it should be. Those who have not had a word to say against the loathsome obscenity of such compositions, find themselves very justly bereft of public support, when they attempt to fetter illegally the action of journalists, on grounds so low and so utterly untenable as those on which the Fiscal has endeavored to sustain his point on the present occasion.

Sr. Tomas Fortunato de Britos, the new Brazilian Resident Minister, presented his credentials yesterday, and was duly received in his official capacity.

Yesterday morning a sad occurrence took place. Mr. Jobson, an old English resident here, occupied as a market gardener, I believe, and latterly residing in town, in the service of the late Mr. Buggeln, was found shockingly mangled and quite dead, near the English Church early yesterday morning. The body was taken up by one of the dust carts. A severe wound across the forehead had been the cause of death, and there are fearful suspicions of his having come by his unhappy end through foul means. The doctor at the police-office tells us that the death of Mr. Jobson, was caused by a fall, that the wounds have not been inflicted by any kind of weapon; but other competent parties, also members of the faculty, affirm that the wound on the forehead has been caused by a knife or sabre. The Policia try as hard as they can to hush up these little disagreeable matters; and the indifference to human life, as we well know, is not alone confined to the 'campaña.'

Our Minister, Mr. Lettsom, has taken a very lively interest in the matter, and what they call here a 'sumario,' is being drawn up. It is true that this formula too often resembles the cloak of charity, inasmuch as it seems many a time to cover a multitude of social enormities and iniquitous crimes.

HEAD-QUARTERS AT MERCEDES.

AWFUL SICKNESS AND MORTALITY.

(Army correspondence by Col. Falleja.)

A few days ago we published Falleja's diary from Oct. 28th to Nov. 2nd: the previous letter (23rd to 27th ult.) had miscarried but has now turned up, and we publish it, along with the latest letter [5th and 6th inst.].

October 23rd. Gen. Flores has been looking for dry ground, to shift us out of these marshes, but cannot find any. The men are drying their clothes: most of our ammunition has been destroyed by the wet. Gen. Osorio paid us a visit to-day: he says he has lost five thousand men between sick and died since the opening of the campaign. It is just as I thought, disease has proved a more terrible enemy than the Paraguayans: in our little Oriental army we have from 12 to 20 deaths daily. To-day 11 died in our hospital at Mercedes, and as many more here in camp, while the number of sick is on the increase. We have been 9 days enveloped in mud. The cattle are completely beaten up: they die by dozens every night, and the camp is covered with their carcasses. Those that survive cannot drag us through the 3 leagues of mucky ground before us, and we are hunting up oxen at 14\$ and horses at 10\$ a head. We have got some flint and percussion muskets from Salto, and have offered our old firelocks to Gov. Lagragna in exchange for horses. Order to march at 6 a. m. to-morrow.

Oct. 24th. A delightful day. Left our position at Arroyo-Burro which has been so fatal in sickness and desertion: the Florida and Abril batts. lost 23 by desertion, and several wounded in drunken quarrels at Mercedes. Crossing the Cuchilla Cuenca, where the Brazilians are encamped, we approached Villanueva and pitched our tents on the Molina estancia, having marched 2 leagues. The camp is pretty good: the baggage waggons stuck in

the middle of the journey, the cattle being exhausted. Gen. Flores has been obliged to issue an order against stealing the neighbor's cattle.

Oct. 25th. Bad weather and rain again all day. Gelly's army has come up and camped beside us.

Oct. 26th. Bad weather continues, mortality increases: the deaths in the allied army to-day exceed sixty, including 21 of Paunero's men.

Oct. 27th. Weather improving. Flores sent Major Cardoso to Tranquero de Loreto to procure oxen and horses from Castro to enable us to continue our march towards the Paraná.

November 5th. To-day being Sunday we had military Mass by Padre Irastusta, with musical accompaniment.

November 6th. The heat is insupportable. Four deaths to-day in our 2 batts. At 11 a. m. got order to march at 4 o'clock.

THE NEW AMERICAN LINE OF STEAMERS. It is understood that the contract for carrying a monthly mail between New York and Rio Janeiro, Brazil, calling at St. Thomas, Pernambuco and Bahia, which was let to the New York and Brazilian Steamship Company, will go into operation on the 20th of the present month.

The contract was a compromise between the Spanish house of Asencio & Co. and that of C. K. Garrison, of this city, each house owning one-half.

Congress at its last session granted a 'conditional subsidy' of \$150,000 to be paid annually for ten years for carrying a monthly mail to Brazil, provided that government would pay a like sum.

This the Emperor agreed to do, and the Postmaster General, in pursuance of the law of Congress, advertised for proposals for building ships of not less than two thousand tons burthen to make monthly trips between the ports above mentioned.

These two lines—one to Brazil, the other to China and Japan and the Sandwich Islands—are, perhaps, the most important, on some accounts, ever established by the United States government.

Both of these lines are coming into contact with two of the most powerful steam lines in the world—lines that have been in successful operation twenty-five years each—the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company and the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company.

The other line which controls the trade of the whole Eastern world is the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company. Starting from Southampton, these ships communicate with all the principal ports in the Eastern world.

In July, 1863, the company owned one hundred and twenty-eight steamers, making weekly and semi-monthly trips; distance run, 11,402 miles; subsidy, \$1,350,000, being \$2 46 per mile, postage receipts, \$534,525—total miles run, 547,296.

Specie is firm at 26 1/2, and nothing can move it from this figure, although some sanguine 'bears' say that paper money is in such great demand, that next week, patacons will touch 26.

In National Bonds there were no sales; buyers at 43 1/2 and 43 3/4; but there is nothing doing in these securities, owing to the growing stringency of money.

There was a good deal said on 'Change to-day about the new port at Ensenada. The full account of the trip of the Iron King in this morning's 'Standard' drew attention to this subject, which is regarded with peculiar favor on the Bolas; merchants all agree that something must be done about remedying the present port abuses; the expense of landing and shipping goods, the constant pilfering going on, on board the lighters, and the excessive delays attending loading and discharging vessels, have now reached, as it were, a crisis—something must be done.

The shipping of packed and preserved beef from this port and Montevideo is at last becoming important; the French brigantine Louise Holder has been cleared from Montevideo for Havre with no less than 600 bales on board, and most of the English houses have received orders, but they find it impossible to fill them. Dr. Fleury is expected out next month, and will bring with him an efficient corps to work on the very largest scale.

The sale of the steamer Paraná was talked of on the Bolas, but we could obtain no particulars. Freight for all the up-river ports have risen some forty to fifty per cent. At the Boca every vessel is engaged. The arrivals continue very heavy, and many articles, such as posts, firwood, and lime, are already declining owing to the heavy stocks. Wools, also, from the river ports are now arriving daily—we recommend to our up-river subscribers the new barraca on the Riachuelo, alongside the Atalaya, known as the Barraca del Privilegio, Messrs. Fadicker & Brown proprietors; they have an extensive connection with all the leading houses and wool-buyers of Buenos Ayres, and spacious depots for all wool consigned to them.

A private letter received in Montevideo from Valparaiso states that on the 30th October the American war steamer Mohongo arrived in that port. There is nothing new about the political state of affairs. The blockade still continues very rigorous.

We heard with much satisfaction that all the difficulties in the way of the Government receiving the Great Southern Railway have been removed, and the Government will inspect the road immediately. Messrs. Peto and Betts the contractors were about to stop the trains running to Jeppener, but now of course they will run as usual.

The English barque, Alice Annie, was chartered to-day to load at San Salvador. Messrs. Prange's wool for the States, 7 patacons for bales and 1 ct. for dry hides, 5 per cent.

Mr. Boyd's wool, which we quoted by mistake to-day as sold, has only just arrived, and the carts not yet opened. It is a prime lot.

Don Roque Carranza's wool was sold to-day at 90. This is one of the best lots in the market, and the owner refused a few days ago 92, holding out for 105. A report that the wool was full of carretilla got spread on the Plaza, which greatly damaged the value of the lot; the wool has very little carretilla and was sold cheap.
