NEWS FROM HEADQUARTERS.

INTERESTING LETTER OF BUSTAMANTE. DIARY OF MARCHES, SCENERY, REFLECTIONS &c.

Camp at Pay-Ubre, Nov. 9th.

Ever since leaving Mercedes, some days ago, we have been terrified with awful stories about the marches adjacent to the River Corrientes, and the impossibility of crossing with our army. Many expected we should need a repetition of the miracle of Moses and the Red Sea. Our guide, however, was right in saying that the hot sun of these few days would dry up all the 'bañados,' and we have happily crossed the swamps and arrived to-day at 4.45 p. m. on the 'Arroyo Pay-Ubre' dry footed: these 'bañados' instead of 3 leagues hardly exceed one league in width, and 2 miles more will bring us to 'Paso Lucero' on the River Corrientes. To-morrow, at daybreak we continue our march, and by sunset will have crossed the river, which is distant 180 leagues from our homes in Monte Video. And still the word is 'onward,' to give liberty to Paraguay! From Villanueva our march hither has been through delightful woods and thickets, where the majestic Naudubay and Algarrobo held divided sovereignty among the leafy glades, and gave evidence of a vigorous and colossal vegetation. The scenery is wild in the extreme, and it was only by the aid of two companies of Argentine pioneers that we were able to trace a rough and tortuous way through its woody recesses. The undulations of hill and dale, with many a new and charming perspective, reminded me of the picturesque beauties of Wicklow in Ireland or the Derbyshire lakes in England. The thousand enamel hues of wild-flowers unknown to botanists form at intervals a carpet of verdure and beauty such as poets paint the Garden of Eden. The pansy, narcissus, forest-flower &c. also abound.

But lo! the enemy's vanguard is upon us, a hundred to one, and thirsting for our blood. Shrink not, gentle reader; it is only the mosquitoes I allude to, which have come to dispute our approach to the river. As for the Paraguayans I believe they are somewhere on the other side of Paso la Patria. The sickness among our troops has declined, but desertion has again set in, the Correntinos aiding our men to escape by night. These Correntino politicians not only lent no assistance to drive the enemy from their soil, but swaddled us in all dealings with them, stole our horses and oxen at night and sold them to us again next morning, and now carry off our men to work on their estancias, which are actually protected by our bayonets. General Mitre was 2 days crossing the river and is now near the Batel: I asked a Correntino how far it is to the Batel and he replied "something between one and eight leagues." The same fellow stole a horse from me next morning. When the Argentine army was crossing, some pedlars got drowned, which put a stop to their speculations. But it is time to confer with Morpheus, who may be able to tell me how far it is to the Batel.

Corrientes, Nov. 10th.

At half past ten this morning the whole Oriental Division arrived on the river bank, and the Brazilian Brigade has just come up (4 p. m.) encamping 7 1/2 leagues from the ford. Before sunrise the baggage will also have arrived. Three men, unaccountably got drowned to-day, but such a serious accident was never known before: one of the rafts was so much damaged by their arms that they were obliged to jump from the raft, and the men were

promptly rescued and hauled up on dry ground. With 4 rafts and a boat we crossed over, 4,000 men, in 7 hours. The rafts were constructed by Brazilian engineers, of thin boards planed over a tight tub of gutta serena. The life-boat, of the same materials held 30 men: it was a present from Queen Victoria to the Emperor of Brazil. When it came to my turn, I got on the raft, with Solzona, Macchia, a ram-peter and some others, and felt a mis-giving, which was heightened when I saw the priest of the Division in the prow. The rope broke loose but we were not capsized, and the only misfortune which occurred was that a sick Paraguayan sitting next me died on the passage. When crossing the river, as well as on many other interesting occasions, I much regretted the want of a photographer to commit to paper the most striking scenes, which would find great demand in Montevideo and Buenos Ayres.

Nov. 11th.

On leaving the banks of the river Corrientes, the appearance of the country changes. From here to the river Batel, 4 leagues, there is, I am told, neither wood nor water, and even to the banks of the Paraná it is a flat expanse hardly broken by a cluster of trees. The only thing we can find in the way of firewood is a shrub called 'Capon,' and we have to dig for water, but then it is as good as the best in M. Video. Ducks and other wild fowl abound. Gen. Suarez has issued an order of the day ordering to be struck off the army-roll all officers on service or furlough in Banda Oriental, except Col. Regules who is to be returned as 'wounded'. As there will be no march to-morrow, the men are ordered to keep watch over the horses and horned cattle all night.

Nov. 12th.

General Flores went last night to visit General Mitre at the Batel, and returned this morning. I have just received a trust-worthy letter with the following news of Urquiza's army—"Some 1,500 men, mostly deserters from Urquiza, have crossed over into the Banda Oriental. The Entre-Riano army is at Toledo, but evinces a bad disposition, shouting 'Muera' to Mitre, Flores and the Macacos. They refused to put on Mitre's uniforms, and go in shirt-sleeves. They desert every night, in fifties and hundreds, and will all break up in a few days, just as at Basualdo. Perhaps it is so much the better for the allies." General Castro writes that the army of Barrios (18,000 men) is now all gone back to Paraguay. The Brazilian army is crossing the river and I have just had a visit from Majors Paranhos and Guimaraens: the first is brother to the diplomatist, the second was formerly editor of the 'Correio Mercantil,' Rio Janeiro. The weather continues fine, and as to-day is Sunday I will take a siesta. The mail leaves at 3 p. m. Adieu.

INSULT TO THE IRISH NUNS.

The attention of the police has been called several times within the last few days to a series of annoyances and insults which we regret to say have been committed against the Irish Sisters of Mercy by some thoughtless and ill-reared young men, said to belong to respectable native families. It appears the devotions of the Month of Mary are held each evening at the convent-chapel, and these youths forgot themselves so far that at length on Thursday evening the Commissary had to send policemen to remove them. The clergyman who officiated was insulted on his return from the Convent, and language of a disgraceful character used towards him, his persecutors following him as far as Plaza Parque. There are circumstances which make this outrage the more grievous, seeing that our inoffensive and high-minded countrywomen who have settled in Buenos Ayres to fulfil their mission of Charity, render valuable service to the city and neighborhood: they instruct 200 native children gratis, not even receiving any subsidy from the Government; they also educate the daughters of our Irish sheep-farmers and bring up several poor orphans. Their labors are neither known nor appreciated by the general public, "for the Sister of Charity blanches at fame," but we feel convinced that our Argentine friends will be generous enough to agree with

us that these pious and philanthropic ladies deserve the respect of all classes, and that every care should be taken to prevent a repetition of the misconduct we allude to, which we believe proceeded less from malice than ill-breeding. As we are upon this topic we may allude to extravagant stories sometimes published in the native papers, of Italian priests taken up for intoxication and other offences. We know for a fact that the Bishop sent his Secretary to enquire at the Policia, and the Chief stated these stories were "mere inventions."

IMPORTANT COLONIZATION PROJECT

Montevideo seems to have got the start of us in an effort to induce some of the fugitive families from the Confederate States to come and settle in the River Plate. The 'Siglo' states that a project is before the Government of Uruguay, for a contract to introduce 4,000 North American families, to be settled on a territory of 20 square leagues, with 40,000 head of horned cattle and sheep. The projectors, comprising some of the leading estancieros in Banda Oriental, have already commenced negotiations with the special emigration agent, General Wood, who is now making the tour of Rio Grande, and it appears only some preliminaries remain to be settled, for at once carrying it out, as soon as the contract is given, the approval of Government. It may be that the great clemency now shown by the Cabinet of Washington towards its former foes will act powerfully to conciliate the feelings of many Southern who at first resolved on leaving their country for ever, after the triumph of the Abolitionists, but General Wood counts upon a gigantic exodus, of which even the tenth-part would be a valuable accession to the Argentine Republic. This country has many and great advantages over Brazil, and if Montevideo succeed in getting some of General Wood's countrymen to prefer the shores of La Plata, there is no reason why Buenos Ayres should not make a similar effort.

Hands and industrial experience are the great wants of this country, and without intending to seek occasion for a mere compliment, we may truly say that few kinds of immigrants could prove more advantageous than those from North America. It is useless to suppose the Government will take the initiative in a matter of this kind, and we advise the native and foreign 'estancieros' to do exactly as our friends in Montevideo.

LATEST FROM THE PARANA.

ARRIVAL OF THE BRITISH GUNBOAT SPIDER.

SQUALLY STATE OF ENTRE RIOS.

Yesterday we received our exchanges from up the rivers. Our Paraná correspondent writes as follows: "News here none—everything flat, stale, and unprofitable. Five Brazilian steamers arrived, all laden with soldiers. The Romulo arrived here on Tuesday morning and sailed in the evening; at the same time passed up the old Villa del Salto towing a vessel—it was raining so hard when she passed that we could hardly see Marshall's last job. To-day the English brig Lizzie and Kate leaves for Liverpool with bone ash—this is the great occupation here, all the little boys and girls are roaming about the country, picking up bones for Boyd, Green, and Benn's vessels; a little higher up the river there is no scarcity of this valuable article of export.

THE ROSARIO BEEF PACKING CO.

We are glad to inform that the new Beef Packing Co. of Rosario is progressing in the most satisfactory manner, and will be ready to commence operations at an early date. We learn that the manager of this new industry sent to North America for experienced workmen who had been in his employ there, and these men have arrived here and leave this day for Rosario to put this establishment in working order for the coming season. We have seen the prospectus, and hope it will be a perfect success. The manager with his large practical experience in packing grass-fed beef in a warm climate, has after thoroughly investigating the whole subject fixed upon what he considers the most favorable locality, and with plenty of capital, and all the necessary appliances, such as the right kind of cattle, the right kind of salt and barrels; we are assured that good plain Mess and Prime Beef will be produced, to stand the test of any Market. This is a step in the right direction: we do not want any more secret or new processes, nor experiments by men who have not been educated to the business, and who use materials that if used in N. America or Europe would produce the same unsatisfactory results as here. Owing to the cattle plague that seems to be spreading all over the world, except South America, there never was a more favourable time for starting this business, and we are glad to see that our capitalists are fully alive to the importance of this great enterprise, and are taking up the stock rapidly which promises to be the best paying investment in this country.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday the Rio de la Plata, from Montevideo, and the Tala, from the Paraná, brought us news from all quarters. Things in the Banda Oriental are beginning to wear a mighty squalid aspect. Bustamante states that half Urquiza's army has invaded the Banda Oriental. A farmer from the Rincon Noario, near the Magdalena, states that the people down there never had such a splendid year before; every house in the partido has several pipes of wine; in fact, the farmers out there are so accustomed to see pipes of wine washed ashore that it no longer creates surprise. Some peons erected a tent on the beach hard by a pipe of 'vino carbon' and gave themselves up to the most unrestrained spree. The rent of puestos along the coast has gone up fifty per cent, as all agree that the Rincon Noario is the jolliest place in Buenos Ayres for sheepfarmers. We hear that the steamer Uruguay will not come out from Liverpool this time, and that in her place the Una is expected, commanded by the popular Captain Smith. The Herschel is expected out also about the 1st Dec. Although the mail at the Consul's office closed last evening at 5 o'clock, thanks to the attention of our friend Captain Curlew, a bag for the reception of letters will be open until one o'clock to-day at the agency office of the steamer, in Calle Mayo. The Arno leaves to-day at 4 o'clock; she will take a number of passengers, and we have accepted the Captain's invitation to take a run down in her to Montevideo, so as to be able to give our readers an idea of what the new steamer is like. Two Englishmen, we hear, were drowned the other day in the harbor of Montevideo; they were in a small pilot boat, which capsized. Their names were C. W. Godfrey and P. Bandon. We hear that no less than six thousand Brazilian recruits are hourly expected in Montevideo; they will not remain in that city we believe, but at once proceed to the Brazilian headquarters, Higuieritas; we have a correspondent in that little town now, and can promise our readers news from Higuieritas once a week. One of the most extraordinary accidents on record occurred recently: an Englishman who had taken his passage at Magdalena, in the diligence, for town, died at the founda in that town. The same night the 'mayoral' got a coffin made and put the dead Englishman on the top of the coach: at a rut in the road the coach gave a jolt and the coffin was thrown from the roof the corpse falling out; the passengers were seized with terror, as they knew nothing of the matter. The 'mayoral' got frightfully cut by the accident. Some Irishmen got a cart and rescued the corpse of the poor Englishman from further insult, and took it to Ensenada, where it was decently buried. We notice the arrival of all the em- the stock of a negretti sheep farm.

Mr. Charles Kahn has just arrived from Hamburg in the brig Rosalinda, with the first remittance of 150 ewes and rams of the well-known and renowned farm of Ghina, near Eastman, in Saxony. These arrivals will be offered for sale hereafter by Mariano Billinghurst, Potosi, No. 70, where the said animals can be seen and inspected by our sheepfarmers after Monday next, 27th inst. The drought in the camp is still greatly complained of. Several farmers in the South are at present drawing water for their sheep. The 'lagunas' and 'arroyos' are all drying up. It will surprise our readers to hear that a sheepfarmer residing some 25 leagues from town had his wool in the Plaza Once de Setiembre, the same day that he finished his shearing; in fact, part of the wool which he sold, say to-day, was this morning growing on the sheep's back, and some 25 leagues from town. Of course, the wool was sent to the market by rail. Mr. James Lloyd, who has been named by the Government Argentine emigration agent in Liverpool, is a member of the firm of Wright and Kelso, the agents of one of the Liverpool lines of steamers plying to this port. The salary attached to the post is £240 sterling per annum. The steamer Menay will be re-launched on Monday and Tuesday, the engineers who have been down to visit her report her as better than new. There will be a Government trial trip in a few days. The Tala is the only steamer now plying with the small river ports in the Parana. The renowned Estrella del Norte is taken off the Parana, and will be run in the Uruguay; the sheepfarmers complain greatly about this. Watson's at Belgrano will of course be crowded to-day: it is the Gresham of the River Plate, all the fashionables resort to this well-managed house; the dinners are better than at any other hotel in town or country, there are private marquees for select dinner parties. That interesting but secret society called the Aztecs is about to liquidate; there has been a sort of successful revolution got up, fogies who tried to rule the club have been deposed. In consequence of the continued illness of Mr. Schramm, Dr. Leslie will not allow him to perform at the Concert on Tuesday, Mr. Bushmeyer will play in his stead. We hear that a café and confectionery will be opened for the convenience and accommodation of the ladies; it will be in the patio of the Coliseum, this is a decided improvement, as it is very wrong to keep ladies the whole night confined to the Hall without even the possibility of getting a glass of water. On the 3rd of next month the townspeople of Chivilcoy will be honored by Messrs. Werner, Bushmeyer, Nessler, and others. These gentlemen will give a concert in that thriving little town, and all the tickets are already bought up. Capt. Bruce has sold his steamer at a snug profit of several thousand pounds, and is off in the packet for England. We wish our riverine friend a pleasant voyage, and hope to see him back soon with another new steamer, which, we suppose will be for the Buenos Ayres and Asuncion route. Several estancieros in the Uruguay have applied to us for hands. If any of our countrymen want 'puestos,' with interest in a flock of sheep, they should at once apply at our office. The heat yesterday was the greatest experienced for a long time in Buenos Ayres: our thermometer standing in a current of air marked 91 in the shade. Passengers arrived yesterday from Rosario complain that some of their luggage was left behind at the Retiro for want of waggons on the tramway. Several handsome gigs are now seen on Sundays at the Tigre and Conchas, and boating is becoming very fashionable. The funeral of the late Mr. Payne, last Monday, at Rosario was attended by every foreigner resident in the Department, deceased being much respected. An English sheepfarmer has just arrived from New Zealand with intention to settle in this country: he made the voyage from New Zealand to Valparaiso in 20 days.

Today is the Bishop's birthday, and several of his friends pay him the customary congratulations at his palace.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

November 24.

Since my last I have nothing of any importance to notice. This morning's 'Tribuna' publishes certain documents relating to the new amalgamated Maua Bank. The new company is now officially recognised, and enjoys the sanction of the competent authority in the country. In consequence, no doubt, of the new arrangement, and with the view to carry it out, I suppose, within the term marked by the contract of partnership, which is two years, Messrs Maua are reducing the amount of their large outstanding balances, which, according to their last return for October, amounted to 6,700,000 dollars advanced on securities, and 7,150,000 dollars in accounts current. This action on the part of the bank, favorable to a contraction of their business operations, for the present at least, is no doubt taken on very good grounds. Some parties however do not refrain from expressing their surprise at such a course, and profess to feel uneasy at the effect it may have in Montevideo on trade generally. The question is of a somewhat intricate nature, and we must confide in the experience and wisdom of those gentlemen connected with the direction of the Maua Bank, that the measures they may take will not be otherwise than in accordance with the generally liberal way of doing business in the River Plate, whilst we may certainly trust with confidence to the sound business community of our city to meet the exigencies of any moment of monetary pressure, should it be our lot to go through such a trial. I notice, in Sr. Bustamante's correspondence from Corrientes, published in this morning's 'Tribuna,' that he notices the small difficulties (?) in Entre Rios. Some parties are disposed to attribute great importance to the state of things in that very rebellious province, and the false or feeble attitude of her once too-worshipped Caudillo. Urquiza's star is evidently on the wane, though no one does anything but laugh at the idea of such a man as Lopez Jordan taking his place, and leading his fellow Entre Rianos by the nose. The news which Sr. Bustamante repeats of the 1500 men from Entre Rios having crossed over to the Banda Oriental, is, to say the least of it, not very assuring. The unhappy discord now reigning in the allied camp between the Brazilians and their allies, is a natural sequence of an unnatural league—the union of Comus's body to the wild beast's head. The impudence too of the 'politicians of our village,' is painfully displayed in their incautious exclamations against Brazil, and these find a too fatal echo in the field, where the pistol and dagger are for the Oriental soldier the 'argumentum ad hominem,' which he is nothing loath to use on all occasions. The impunity with which certain misdeeds have been committed against Brazilian soldiers, and the countenance which such, at times, have received from certain subaltern officers, ought to warn us that the chord may snap when least expected, from overstraining; and then. It would be well if Generals Mitre and Flores could make an example of certain miscreants calling themselves soldiers, to whom, if the alliance is preserved, no thanks will be due, for they are doing everything that could be done to destroy it. Let the allied Generals take counsel in time, for 'forewarned is forearmed.' The 'Siglo' and the 'Tribuna' are at peace. They have embraced one another, and they each promise the public to behave like good boys in future.

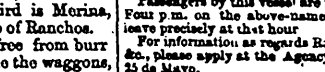

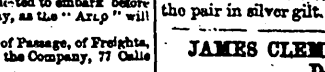
