EDITOR'S TABLE.

The French packet arrived yesterday morning, also the Rio de la Plata: we expect our brother-editor in the Portefolia to-day.

We have great pleasure in saluting Sr. Sorello, the new Spanish Minister: this gentleman is half an Englishman, having been educated at the R. Catholic college of Ushaw. Sr. Blanco del Valle succeeds him as Spanish Ministers at Rio Janeiro, and Sr. Creus resumes the Montevidean Legation. The latter has gained universal respect during his residence in B. Ayres. The Spanish Diplomatic service unlike the British, has no difference of grade, with respect to countries, so that these changes import neither promotion nor otherwise to the Ministers named.

The Carmel intended leaving Monte Video on Monday evening, but was unable to discharge her cargo in time, which delayed her till next day.

The Hon. Mr. Edwards, new British Minister, is expected by next English mail-steamers.

Mr. Riestra has not yet launched the Argentine Loan in London, and the French packet has brought no gold this time.

The astronomical steam-ship Herschel left Liverpool on Oct. 24th, and is due to-morrow.

The English transport Lillie Belle arrived in Monte Video with troops from Rio Janeiro, and announces that reinforcements of 10,000 men are getting ready for the River Plate.

Admiral Elliot is expected to arrive next week in H. M. S. Narcissus, from Rio Janeiro. The Triton arrived in Monte Video on Tuesday evening from the former port with special despatches from Mr. Thornton.

We find that we have been grossly misinformed relative to that interesting and secret society, the Astecs. So far from being about to liquidate, it appears that the society will shortly hold a pow-wow at the magnificent residence westerly which has recently come into possession of its mercurial secretary. We regret to say that notwithstanding our most unceasing efforts as yet we are unable to give our camp readers any definite idea of the object of this society, but Prescott's 'Conquest of Mexico,' selling at Loedel's, may possibly throw some light on the subject. We hear that one of the members of the Argentine Astecs attended the coronation of Maximilian in the historic Halls of Montezuma.

It is our pleasing duty to inform our readers that two of our city brokers drew prizes in the lottery last week—one gentleman seventy thousand paper dollars, and the other no less than a quarter of a million. As they are both subscribers we feel almost as well pleased as if we had drawn the prizes ourselves.

There was a grand masque ball in Montevideo, at which all the British clerks attended. As a matter of course it was a noisy affair, but everything passed off well.

The French packet, when entering Montevideo, had the Spanish flag at the main, which caused great attention. We believe the reason was she had the new Spanish Minister on board.

The arrivals received per French packet respecting wool are very favorable, particularly as regards the finer classes. Wool has gone up in Antwerp, but heavy wools of last year are still unobtainable in Havre, and are greatly neglected, owing to the injury which the harr causes to the machinery.

The 'Euzon' correspondent from Bahia Vista, Nov. 24th states that Pres. More is occupied at Paso Espindola,

on the Santa Lucia, about 5 leagues from the former town.

We are glad to announce that the preserved beef sent by Messrs. Morris and Brown of Rosario arrived in splendid condition at Liverpool, as well as the Morgan beef from Paysandú: both were inspected by Dr. Fleury on arrival.

The Brazilian (new) Bonds have fallen, in London, to 68; Buenos Ayres quoted at 86 to 88. River Plate Bank shares continue firm at 14 to 16 1/2 p.c.

Baron Leibig, Baron Mauá, M. Bouchier and Messrs. Gunther constitute the board of the new S. American Beef Co. formed in London, connected with the system of Doctors Morgan and Fleury of Dublin and Paysandú.

Mr. Billinghurst will sell by auction to-day a beautiful estancia with fine houses thereon, known as Estancia Bejarano, and formerly occupied by Mr. Dillon, in the partido of Guardia Monte. See advertisement.

An accident, luckily unattended with loss of life or other serious injury, occurred at Mr. Urie's soda-water factory, calle Defensa, on Monday evening, from the bursting of the apparatus or boiler.

Mr. Marshall informs us that he has received a flattering account of the first trip of the Villa Salto, since rebuilt: she made the voyage upwards from Las Piedras with great speed.

To-day is the festival of St. Andrew apostle, patron of Scotland.

The police-fine we mentioned yesterday for "English trot" incorrectly appeared 700\$: it should be 100\$. This line of business continues brisk.

The Montevidean papers report the case of a cartman who accidentally ran over two children, and then in desperation stabbed himself fatally.

The Northern Railway Co. has commenced putting down electric telegraph posts between the Retiro and Plaza Mayo.

The tramway from Plaza Constitucion to the Monserrat is all but finished.

It is rumored at Corrientes that Lopez has 100 canoes manned by 40 men each, and 11 steamers, at Humayta.

We have received only half-a-dozen English papers by the mail, but will give the European news more at length to-morrow from the "Correspondence Havana-Ballier."

We understand that next week the Boca railway will commence running trains every hour, up and down; the Boca branch opens on Monday.

A London correspondent informs us that the Government is in a serious predicament consequent on the death of Lord Palmerston.

STOCKS AND LOANS.

POLITICS, GAMING, &c.

To the Editors of the 'Standard,'
London, Oct. 23.

Gentlemen,

Fog, rain, and mud are the order of the day, and every one is returning to town to enjoy these and other pleasures inherent on the approach of winter. The topic is the death of the Premier; the funeral is to be strictly private, though of course in a country like this, it is next to impossible. On Thursday, the 26th, there is to be a Cabinet Council, and undoubtedly Earl Russell will be the successor. The Queen also returns on the 1st to Windsor, and it is thought will in the future not be so retired as has been the case.

The financial world is quiet, nothing having transpired of importance after the subscription of the Brazilian Loan; and a stop has been put for the moment to speculation and speculators by the so-to-say uncalled for 'sampilha-restacion' made by the Bank in her discount from 4 to 7 per cent., followed by her colleagues on the Continent.

The Argentine Loan is still it is said in embryo, and I think the moment is not a good one: it should have preceded Brazil. Matters are very quiet about the Stock Exchange, but I should not be surprised if in my next I should be able to give you some important disclosures about some of our city banks and bankers interesting to the River Plate.

The health of the King of the Belgians is rumored not to be good.

Another rumor, but doubtful, is, that McOlellan is to be appointed com-

mander of the Pontifical troops: Franco has ordered a bill of expense to be made out of the cost of the French troops at Rome. Is this little pill to be served on his Holiness by his *Vile Ains?*

At Paris great preparations are going on for the last 'World's Fair' that is to be, and everything is to be ready by the 1st January, 1867. There are 95 committees already named for the 10 classes in which it will be divided. I hope Buenos Ayres will be represented.

Expositions being the order of the day, there is to be a grand horse one in November. All Europe will contribute. Then comes poultry in December, to be followed by chess: this latter a great treat for epicures.

Talking of horses, which I know is interesting to River Plate people, at the Chantilly, on last Sunday, 15th, the observed of all observers was a certain Baroness of the 'demonde,' but who mysteriously disappeared after a few days, owing to a midnight visit having been paid her by the P.P. Prefecture de Police in her palace, and an established bank found there with all its necessary articles; of course, a *tapis verde*. All the articles and rouleaux were seized, with the Baroness, by the police. It has caused quite a sensation among the fancy at Paris.

Talking of banks and stocks. The Bank of Wiesbaden has declared for the summer season, now over, a dividend of 41 per cent., 39 paid out, and 2 kept for improving gardens, &c. Baden-Baden has lost. A Russian Prince sprang the bank, and one of our neighbors, a young Brazilian, who had never seen a gaming table of this sort before, won over half a million of francs, and was smart enough to walk off with them.

Vienna, Oct. 23.

The President of the Committee for the Control of the Public Debt will be received in audience by the Emperor to-morrow, in order to present an address containing the objections of the Committee to continuing their functions.

Florence, Oct. 23.

The election of Deputies to the Italian Parliament has commenced. Most of the colleges are balloting for the different candidates. A large number of electors are taking part in the elections, but order has nowhere been disturbed.

General Della Marmora, President of the Ministry, and Signor Jacini, Minister of Public Works, have been elected to the Chamber of Deputies by considerable majorities.

Milan, Oct. 23.

Yesterday the Prince and Princess Napoleon arrived here 'incognito,' and were present at the theatre last evening.

Turin, Oct. 23.

A despatch received to-day announces that the King and Queen of Portugal will arrive here on the 26th inst.

Berne, Oct. 23.

The National Council assembled to-day, and commenced its deliberations upon the revision of the Federal Constitution.

The Council of States has entered upon the discussion of the Budget for 1866.

Madrid, Oct. 23.

It is believed that Admiral Pinzon will be named Minister of Marine.

LORD PALMERSTON'S FUNERAL.

(From the Times, Oct. 24th.)

It is now decided that the funeral of the deceased veteran statesman shall be a public one, and his remains will be laid on Friday next beside those of Canning and Pitt in Westminster Abbey. This alteration in the arrangement to have a private funeral at Rome, in accordance with the wish of hi-

late Lordship, has been made at the eleventh hour by the express desire of Her Majesty, who will be represented on the occasion.

The body was yesterday removed from Brackett-hall to Cambridge-house in Piccadilly. In the removal there was no ostentatious display—a four horse hearse and one mourning coach forming the sole procession. Unpretending, however, as was the display, the country people who met the cortege evidently knew its meaning, for, as it passed, there was a general reverent uncovering, and at the little towns and villages, as Hatfield, Potter's Bar, Barnet, Whetstone, and Finchly, through which the body passed, the bells of the churches tolled, and the inhabitants showed the utmost respect.

The mournful train started shortly before 10 o'clock in the morning, and arrived in London at the fall of the day, thus escaping all notice, and when the body arrived at Cambridge-house at nearly 6 o'clock,—so privately had the matter been managed that there were not half a dozen persons gathered about the doors. The body was received there by the only nephew and by the private secretary of his late Lordship, the Rev. Henry Sullivan, and the Hon. Evelyn Ashley. It was carried into the dining-room, where, covered with a pall and with a plume of feathers at the head, it will remain until next Friday.

It is arranged that the procession shall leave Cambridge-house at 12 o'clock on Friday, and arrive at the Abbey in an hour. The chief mourners, among whom will be Viscount Bury, representing Her Majesty, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, Earl Russell, and the members of the Cabinet, will follow from Cambridge-house, and the great body of the members of both Houses of Parliament will assemble in the Abbey.

It is understood that the Right Hon. William Cowper, the late Premier's executor, is making all the arrangements for this mournful ceremony, which will be carried out by the Messrs. Banting, of St. James.

HURRAH FOR THE G. SOUTHERN RAILWAY!

The subjoined satisfactory communication, dated the 13th September, has been received from the Local Committee at Buenos Ayres of the Great Southern Railway Company:—

"The most gratifying intelligence I have to communicate is the result of the first month's preliminary working of the line, which is contained in the accompanying statements from Mr. Banfield, showing on an incomplete line, during an idle season and other disadvantageous circumstances, a net return at the rate of nearly 2 per cent on the whole capital; and, judging from the receipts per train mile, the result looks still more favourable. The directors, therefore, have every reason to indulge in the most sanguine expectations as to the ultimate success of the railway. The line will be completed in about five weeks' time, and ready for opening, as previously announced to you, by the 1st of November; and the committee are only waiting to hear from Mr. Crawford the date when it would be ready for inspection, in order to apply to the Government to officially examine and accept the works previous to the opening of the line."

UNITED STATES AND MEXICO.

In New-York on the 7th Oct. rumours were current that the Erin and City of Boston carried to Europe 1,000,000 dollars in Fenian bonds, and also a printed Fenian proclamation. A meeting of the Grand Central Council of the Fenian Brotherhood had been held at Astor House, at which delegates from all the Centres were present. The events transpiring in Ireland were canvassed, and the meeting decided to call a special general congress of the entire order to assemble at Philadelphia on the 16th inst. [Monday last], when business of the utmost importance would be brought before it. Mr. Davis has been removed from the casemates to other quarters in Fort Monroe. The public debt on the 30th ult. amounted to 2,745,000 dols. Since August it has been reduced nearly 12,000,000 dols., the interest half a million, and the legal tender notes

afloat six millions. The coin in the Treasury has decreased twelve millions, and the currency has increased thirteen millions. The Louisiana Democratic Convention have nominated J. M. Wells as Governor. The Convention urged to request Congress to grant compensation for the losses caused by emancipation.

The American Government has made a demand upon the English Government for compensation for losses sustained by American citizens through the depredations of the Alabama and other Confederate cruisers fitted out in British ports. Earl Russell denies the justice of the demand, but offers to refer to a commission "All claims which the English and American Governments should agree to refer to it." A semi-official announcement has since been made explaining that claims for losses by the Alabama and other vessels of the same character would be excluded from the jurisdiction of such a commission.

From Mexico we learn that Romero has repudiated the authenticity of the statement lately published in the New York papers concerning emigration to Mexico. He says that he has no authority to accept the services of officers and men for Mexico. They must apply to the Mexican Government in its present residence. Advices from Matamoros, to the 16th Sept. state that the Republican Governor of Sonora had written to the French Commander, stating that he would leave as soon as the French arrived at Hermosillo, deeming the Juarez cause hopeless. The Imperialists had totally defeated Mendez near Tampico, and occupied Tlilba, Ciudad, and Victoria.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

OUR ESQUINA CORRESPONDENT.

Esquina, Nov. 25th.

Gentlemen,

Major Manuel Ojeda, better known as Major Manú Cambá at the head of an armed force made a formal effort on the 19th to take possession of La Paz. Fortunately for the townspeople they were forewarned of the hostile intention, when a competent force was sent from the town in quest of the aggressors, whom they fell in with at some distance from the place. It is said the assailants came boldly to the charge and stood their ground until a well directed volley from the townsfolk dispersed them at all points, flying with precipitancy in every direction to the woods and deep ravines. Four of the force from the town were killed, and five of the assailants were left dead. In our recital of this affair we are thus succinct, supposing your La Paz correspondent (who is not a man to remain long inactive in a like case,) would have been upon the spot and may have communicated what occurred. Suffice to add Major Manú Cambá is one of the heroes of Basualdo, a Correntino by birth, and he formerly held the rank of Sargento Mayor under Caceres, by whom he was degraded and dismissed for horse-stealing. As his Guarani alias implies he is a wily negro scoundrel. A prominent feature about this episode of the times is, the onset was made by a ringleader who is a staunch friend of "the man of destiny." All here think the raider's intentions were to have pillaged the place, to have avenged some ancient yet well-remembered grudges, and then to have decamped to the adjacent woods or to the Gran Chaco. Very stringent orders emanating from the local authorities have been promulgated, directing to act summarily with those found marauding upon this side of the frontier. Luckily, causes over which no human being has control will prevent any inroads from being made at present by the runaway 'gauchos' of Entre Rios. The river Guayquiraró, an insignificant stream that separates the two Provinces, is now a deep river a half of a league broad. Still what is passing beyond our limits has not failed to cause disquiet, as the army at Toledo is 'breaking up,' the men as usual leaving with their arms. It is anomalous that those who have manifested a strong repugnance to act in concert with the allies, should make no difficulty in using the weapons supplied from Buenos Ayres against those of their own Province. What judgment may be formed of the fealty, or what

dependence? may be placed upon the patriotism of those who as confederates had cheerfully espoused the common cause, and afterwards declined to observe the pact, for the reason they did not like the Portefolios.

The sentiments of the prisoners who were taken at Yatay, and Uruguayana were not asked as they were being placed in the files of the allies, if they had any hesitation in marching by the side of Brazilians, Orientalists or Portefolios. There was no such antipathy when the interests of Rosas and his party were to be subserved; then there was no disinclination to coalesce and go hand in hand with the partisans of the most abominable man the revolutions of the country ever brought to light, teaching the Correntinos "to bow to the supremacy of his power in the undissembled homage of deferential honor."

We know nothing hereabouts of what progress the allies may have made in the march northward. Our latest news from the north is that which the downward-bound steamer brought us eight days ago. In fact all communication by land with the other departments is suspended for the present. When the roads are dry one might in eight hours have gone from this, and reached the place where there was a division of the allies: now it would take as many days for a well-mounted traveller to arrive there.

During the last forty eight hours we have had rain, not in showers: it came in one continued sheet with thunder and lightning "that made the stoutest heart quail." The water lying upon the surface of the ground combined with the unprecedented hot weather will preclude military operations in the meantime. Loaded vessels continue to arrive or pass upwards, going to an over-stocked market: we have now a superabundance of all that is wanted of every kind of goods. Much of the merchandise that is being introduced is of a perishable nature that will not keep sound three months in this climate. One of our discomforts are the myriads of mosquitoes; as soon as the sun goes down, it becomes necessary to shut all doors and windows and every cranny to get what rest may be had in a closed room where the Thermometer ranges from 88 to 90°: yet it is better to bear the heat than the sting of the tormenting insects. Here every low spot is now a lagoon teeming with frogs which make a deafening din throughout the night, otherwise they are harmless.

NEWS FROM GUAYQUIRARO.

To the Editors of the 'Standard,'
Costa de Guayquiraro, Frontier of
Corrientes, Nov. 26.

Gentlemen,

The only place to find news is in the 'Standard.' I think it almost useless to say the allied army is near Goya, and that report says Urquiza's men have nearly all deserted him. To look into the future is difficult; better wait until General Mitre utters the much wished for words, 'Veni, vidi, vici,' for thus he will complete all heretofore promised.

The only news which engrosses all attention here at present is the La Paz revolution. The party I informed you of in my last, dated 17th inst., collected by the Commandante Ojeda, known as Manú Camba (Guarani), 'Black Manuel,' it is said by order of Colonel Beron, had a sharp encounter with the La Paz people, commanded by Colonel Ramirez. The rebels amounted to about 200, well armed, being taken by surprise at 'siesta,' the La Paz people, about the same number, fell upon them killing some eight or ten, and wounding others, but as their horses were at hand and fresh, the rest escaped into the forest. Manú Camba had a sharp run for his life, in his shirt, sword-in-hand, on a race-horse. Report says he has gone to the Federal to muster some Indians, and also that Beron intends passing to this side a large body of Indians from the Chaco. Thus La Paz has been, and is, in a state of siege, as parties going inside are not permitted to go out; and it is only through women as messengers that we can post or receive our correspondence from that town.

The troops of horses and oxen, which were embargoed some time since,

of which I made mention to you in my last, are still at the Estancia de los Ingleses, the owner being kept in La Paz. The present state of this rich and fertile department is to be sadly lamented: the incapacity of the authorities in command, the little inclination which appears to exist for all and everything that may be a public benefit, their lukewarmness and apparent fear of taking steps to protect life and property, keeps and will keep the department in a state of prostration and misery. The country and woods are full of deserts, and parties who fly to escape being forced into the service, of which little notice is taken, so much to the prejudice not alone of the estancia, but to the danger of the travellers being assassinated, or to the peaceful inhabitants whose necessities or circumstances oblige them to reside in this locality. These circumstances, which many, if not all, are ignorant of in your province, it is well to bring to light, that the impurity of so much crime may be manifest, and that the authorities who wink at its many horrors may know that the 'Standard,' although distant and a stranger, watches jealously the interests of every spot on Argentine soil inhabited by a Christian.

Dr. Fermín Soto, owner of the Rincon de Soto, who had been residing here for some months, has gone back to Goya.

We have had plenty of rain lately: the rivers are flooded, the camps beautiful, but the 'flechilla,' which has grown in great quantities, I am afraid, will leave few sheep alive this year.

Mánú Camba, of Beron's Estancia, with force. Colonel Panyagua, at La Paz, with 100 men from the frontier. Commandante Parera, with a detachment from the Chaco. Col. Quiros preparing to attack Mánú Camba with a force commanded by Col. Ramirez. Colonel Garcia, one of Urquiza's staff, just arrived at La Paz, reports to settle all. While writing these last few lines Colonel Garcia called on his way to Concordia. He says General Urquiza has received orders from President Mitre to give his cavalry leave till further orders, and to canton his infantry and artillery in comfortable quarters until the recommencement of the campaign.

CONCERT AT THE COLISEUM.

This beautiful edifice was again thrown open on Tuesday night to a large and fashionable audience assembled to assist at the 1st of the series of concerts announced by Messrs. Werner and Schramm. The hall was well filled, and any vacant seats there may have been were caused by the intense heat, which deterred many from going, as 94 deg. in the shade is quite sufficient to melt the finest musical feelings into 'a myth.' Apropos of heat, we would remark that it seems to us to be a mistake that the upper windows are permanently fastened down, as too much ventilation cannot be afforded in such weather. However, this is a point we leave to the architects.

The performance commenced with a trio by Messrs. Werner, Frigola, and Poppe, after which Mrs. Krutisch came forward and was highly applauded. Her rendering of the 'cancion' 'Frühlingstraube,' was really artistic, and displayed a taste and feeling not often found with amateurs. The 'Nocturno' by the four violoncellos, Messrs. Werner, Gras, Hiriart, and Koilsch, was, we should say, a little out of time, yet the beautiful and melodious notes of Werner could be heard with fine effect.

Part II. commenced with 'La Mancinella,' by Werner, which was his best piece, the piano notes he extracted in this were exquisite. M. Bushmeyer's playing in 'L'Air de Grace,' was good and firm. The concert closed by Mrs. Krutisch singing the 'Bolero,' which was received with marked applause. We can certainly compliment this lady on her exquisite singing, which was the theme of the evening. On the whole the affair passed off well, and every one seemed pleased.

While always happy to offer any suggestions that may occur to us, we generally avoid interfering with the programme issued on those occasions,

but we not only comply with the wish of many lovers of music, but likewise offer our own opinion, by suggesting the addition of a few operatic airs at each concert. German music is, we have no doubt, very fine, yet we fancy Werner's playing some of those delightful airs from 'Lucia,' 'Norma,' or 'Trovatore,' would be received with rapture. We trust that such a treat may be afforded at the next two concerts, as a large portion of the audience complain that the programme seems to be arranged without consulting the varied tastes of those present.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT NEWS

MORGAN'S BEEF SALE.

The first parcel of meat consigned to the Morgan Meat Preserving Company was received here last week per steamer from the River Plate, and sold by auction by Messrs. E. B. Frupp and Co., 42 the Temple Dale street. The meat (beef and mutton) was excellent both in appearance and condition. The sale was numerously attended, and the meat realised good prices, viz., 3d to 6d for beef, 3d to 5d for mutton, and 7d to 8d per lb. for tongues. The problem appears at last solved that this country, where provisions are scarce and dear, can be supplied with beef and mutton from the South American provinces, where it has hitherto been almost valueless from the difficulty of preserving it; and the quality of the meat just received differs but little from that of our own slaughter.—Liverpool Mercury.

THE CATTLE DISEASE IN IRELAND.

The following communication from Mr. Barron, veterinary surgeon, in reference to the new disease which has broken out in cattle in Wicklow, Dublin and other places has been published:—"The disease is still raging in Wicklow. People are anxious to keep any cases they may have private. The disease in the county Dublin, although similar to that in Wicklow, assumes in most cases a most virulent form. What is to be done to stop the butchers from selling meat cut from the carcasses of diseased animals which, when killed, were in a state nearer to death than life—may, which were often dead when purchased? The extent to which trade in diseased meat is carried on, and that has come under my own immediate observation, is fearful to contemplate. The milk from animals affected by the disease is unwholesome."

ON 'CHANGE.

From the wool-markets we have the following: In the Once Setiembre, the rest of Mr. Norris's wool (5,000 arrobes) has arrived in 7 carts, but is not yet sold: the first part, comprising 12 carts was sold on Friday at 80s. There was little animation, the buyers not having yet received their letters: the market and vicinity are crowded with wool-carts.

In the South Plaza some German and English buyers showed themselves: Messrs. Cribbis and Smith of Magdalena sold 6 carts at 99s. Mr. Richard Simons, from same party, sold his second lot lower than the first.

The chief reason for the dullness of wool is the super-abundance in the barracas, which are full of loose wool.

Our advices from Montevideo per Carmel are of an interesting nature. Exchange for the packet closed at 51 1/2; the total amount drawn, say one hundred pounds sterling; a great many bills were passed at 51 1/2, and even at 51 something was done, but the closing price is 51 1/2. One or two houses have drawn for wool purchases, which they are about to make. The comestible trade is at present very active, and shipments up the river are on a most extensive scale. Money rules easy owing to the number of banks, and the free occupation which is accorded all the bank bills in circulation. The Trouba suspension has greatly staggered the bill-discounters, as his bills were thought the best in Montevideo; his liabilities are about two hundred thousand National dollars, but his assets are more than sufficient to meet

everything, if properly administered. As yet there has been very little done in wool; some splendid lots are in the barracas; Jackson's wool is all washed this year; it is being baled and shipped for owner's account—the clip on the Jackson estate this year will amount to about fifty thousand arrobes, the first lot beyond all question in South America. Diogenes Urquiza's wool, about 4,600 arrobes, was offered for, yesterday 36 rs., and declined. Mr. J. McColl's wool, one of the best parcels that come to Montevideo, has not yet been sold—37 rs. offered and declined. Don Ricardo Hughes' wool is at Jackson's barraca; it is really very prime, and not yet sold; in the early part of the season some 35 rs. offered and declined. The total clip in the Banda Oriental is estimated at one million of arrobes, of which say two hundred thousand arrobes have already arrived. There is not a single wool buyer as yet in Montevideo—two English houses, it is said, have received orders to purchase, but no American buyer has as yet presented himself—the barracas are crowded to overflowing with wools, the presses are idle, and when the difference in the condition of the wool, the export duty, expenses of shipping, etc., are taken into account, the Banda Oriental wools are selling five per cent. less than the wools in Buenos Ayres.

Mr. Warden, who, we hear, takes the place of Mr. Gregory, the 2nd Manager of the London & River Plate Bank in Buenos Ayres, arrived in the French packet. Mr. Gregory, we understand, sent in his resignation some months back, which the Home Board thought proper to accept. The River Plate Bank in Montevideo, under the able management of Mr. Jones, is doing a very good business; it has drawn heavily for this packet at 6 1/2; its new notes will be put in circulation about the beginning of the year.
