LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

(BY ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.) January 30, 1867.

Gerente arrived with Port Alegre, who resumes command of the Second Division at Curuzú. Passengers from Rio Grande say Osorio has set out with only 300 men.

ARRIVALS.

The Ada, from Liverpool, 51 passengers. Edwin Everett, from New York, Dec. 21; is sister ship of Portefa. Steamer Caroline, from Rio Janeiro, for Zimmermann Fair, with general cargo.

THE SITUATION.

The state of affairs has improved in nothing during the week, and it requires more than ordinary caution on the part of the journalist to define the situation.

We are unwilling, however, to admit that the suppression of two or three opposition journals amounts to a confiscation of the liberty of the press. The Executive, in view of the lamentable state of affairs in the Provinces and the strong reactionary feeling even in this city, has been forced, for its own safety, to silence the organs of opposition.

In a country, however, so peculiarly adapted for rebellion as the Argentine Republic—where the elements of civil strife are so abundant and distance defeats law and supports riot; it is highly important that the well-wishers of law and order, and the pronounced enemies of sedition, revolution, and disturbance, should know the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

The Standard makes no concealment of its policy: true to its motto it still flings its whole weight and influence into the scale to uphold the Government and combat revolution, and this is no new policy adopted for the occasion and of the hour, since from its infancy to this day it has followed the same principles—combating revolution, no matter under what pretext. Now, as a disregarded 'Caudilla,' we point to our unheeded predictions and neglected counsels.

The insurrection in the Interior continues: General Paunero has not been heard of for some days; bands of 'montoneras' seem to have cut off his communications, and, though we still cling to the hope that he may defeat the rebels and cut through the 'montoneras,' we cannot close our eyes to the perils which surround him, and the possibility of our worst fears being realized.

of much service stationed on the confines of a Province two-thirds of which, if we are to believe report, is in open rebellion against the National Government. That so small a force, even though commanded by so experienced an officer as Arredondo, can march to the Interior to support Paunero we very much doubt, and indeed the risk is so great that it would probably be better not to try it. General Rivas, who is in this city, and who, as an authority on such matters, is second to none, gives it as his opinion that the remission of troops in small bodies, such as that at present going on, can only result in disaster. It is to be hoped, therefore, that Arredondo will concentrate his forces at Frayle Muerto, and allow no inducement to tempt him from moving from that point until at least 2,000 or 3,000 more men are sent him from the regular army at Tuyuti. The defeat of Campos was solely owing to his incautions zeal to fight the rebels: he wanted, apparently, to eclipse Paunero, and his conduct can under no circumstances be otherwise explained.

The rebellion in the Interior, however, no matter if every Province north of Frayle Muerto joined it, cannot be regarded as aught but a passing trouble so long as it is unconnected with Entre Rios and Corrientes. These Provinces seem to us to hold the key to the position. There are unpleasant rumors respecting the doings of some well-known Entre Riano officers, but Urquiza rules those countries, and we regard it as the very worst policy to court the possibility of a rupture with this highly influential man, by abusive articles in the columns of some of our colleagues. It is alike the interest as it is the ambition of General Urquiza to rest in peace and keep aloof from the present disorders, and we note that the journal which has been most virulent in its attacks has received a sort of caution from the Government.

The condition of the State prisoners on board the Ponton calls for observation. The ship is destitute of all accommodations—no awnings—and the concentrated rays of a tropical sun must literally roast alive the unfortunate occupants of that floating penal colony. We do not pretend to be in possession of State secrets, but we believe that the National Executive would earn a well-timed popularity by extending clemency to those prisoners. We believe that the Government can afford to be magnanimous. We have other appeals to listen to besides those of unrelenting justice; there is an instinct in the human heart paramount to reason; there is a wisdom in generosity which is often superior to that of expedience; and possibly the Government could not better inaugurate the new Argentine campaign than by a deed of clemency and generosity, which will speak to the hearts of even its most bitter opponents.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The little schooner of the Welsh colony has arrived in port, and a delegation of some 12 of the colonists has come up with the intention of 'prospecting' the riverine banks of the Gran Chaco. It is anything but pleasant to consider that after so much waste of time, and an expenditure of over eleven thousand pounds sterling, the colony has to begin anew. Yesterday some of the colonists had an interview with our excellent Prime Minister, Dr. Rawson, whose untiring labors on behalf of this colony have rendered him doubly popular with all Britishers in the River Plate.

The Gerente arrived late on Tuesday evening in Montevideo. Mr. Proudfoot has arrived, after a good passage, at Rio Grande, where the greatest anxiety reigns to hear how things are going on in the River Plate. Our French colleague states that there is a very current rumor that a complete change of Cabinet and politics is imminent in Rio, which possibly will lead to Brazil withdrawing from the Triple Alliance.

The Itapiru Custom-house regulations is causing great noise in Montevideo. The merchants are furious, and complain bitterly. A leading English merchant of that city has favored us with the following remarks on the home cotton trade:—"During the last fortnight a complete change has taken place in the position of the cotton trade; a heavy business has been transacted both here and in Manchester, at an advance of 1d. per lb. A general expectation now prevails of a serious scarcity of raw material next year, and many persons are looking for a very important rise in prices, say from 2d. to 3d. per lb. or more. It is therefore more and more evident that the consumption of cotton, and the production of cotton, must be largely reduced next year, and it is simply a question, what rise in the raw material will do this?"

By request of the Committee of the Sociedad Musical de Socorros Mutuos, we call the attention of the members, as well as the ladies and gentlemen invited to take part in the concert at Colon Theatre, that the second rehearsal will be held to-day (Thursday) at eight o'clock precisely, in the Saloon of the Colon Theatre. Yesterday evening we received several valuable additions to our Museum: a block of 'brilliantina' from

the quarters of Curumba, which is really a great curiosity; also some petrified remains, picked up 100 leagues north of Curumba. Such is the interest taken in our Museum that an English gentleman has sent us from London a Times of 1798, which unfortunately has got lost in the Post-office here. We hope if any of our subscribers have received it that they will kindly send it to us.

Sr. Torrobas, one of the well-known merchants of Mercedes, and agent of the Standard, is at present sojourning in Montevideo. He purposes soon leaving for his native hills in Spain. We are pleased to note that during his business career in Mercedes he and his brother amassed a respectable fortune.

The pedestal of the statue of Liberty, which is being erected in the Plaza Cagancha, Montevideo, is of the best Carara marble, and attracts numerous visitors.

Yesterday we had no news from the Interior, and our Montevidean mails brought nothing new. The United States war steamer Shamokin and lighters had rendered effective aid to the shipwrecked barque at the Baco. The Provocador with advices from Paraguay and Rosario was looked for yesterday.

The steamer Oriental has been placed on the Montevidean route by Alvarez and Rizzo, and will leave Buenos Ayres every Monday and Thursday, and Montevideo each Sunday and Wednesday. The steamer is well fitted up, and has private state rooms for families.

A native estanciero of Canelas, whose estancia is overstocked with some of the best mestiza sheep in the country, is anxious to sell ten thousand by the cut, at a very low figure. To a good buyer he will sell them on credit. This is a splendid chance for parties who have money and think of investing. As money becomes easy, sheep will undoubtedly go up, and we believe these sheep can be had a bargain.

In the town of Rojas one of the principal shopkeepers has failed and cleared out. His liabilities are large. In the town of Rancho we also hear of a failure. We believe the cause of these collapses is speculation in wools. To-night the Rogers Company gives a performance in the French Theatre. Prices as usual. The playbill looks well, and we believe the company will meet with a successful 'debut.'

On Sunday the great trial of the fire extinguisher took place in the Plaza Victoria. It seems that M. Cazon would not allow it to take place in the Plaza 25 de Mayo, before the Government-house. The exhibition came off with signal 'ecclat.' Three tar-barrels were fired, and in an instant the machine put out the blaze. The public seemed highly satisfied with the exhibition.

On Tuesday afternoon a Commission called at the Pueblo printing-office, and in the mildest manner possible asked for the names and addresses of the editors, as also of the owner of the printing-office. Our colleague in consequence has published a notice, stating that if they do not henceforward meddle in politics people may well know the reason. The times are very critical, and editors of native papers are in rather tight places.

Cataldi's cheese breakfast in Moron passed off remarkably well. The moment the breakfast terminated, he set about showing his friends how he made his cheese, making a very appropriate speech on the occasion. All seemed well pleased, and speak in the highest terms of the 'fete,' which has astonished all Moron. The chief of the rotters on board the Chacabuco is a man named José Torres, who has no less than twenty-seven wounds. He is recovering fast, and will be sent up to the army.

Captain Montenegro has been released by order of the National Government, and restored to his former command. It seems the charges against this officer were mere slanders, and amount to nothing. So many versions are current about the resignation of Minister Octaviano, that probably it is just as well we

should give the real cause of the row with Caxias.—It appears that a doctor in Argollo's army, being rather indisposed, applied to Minister Octaviano for liberty to return to Rio. M. Octaviano told him to report himself to another doctor and obtain a certificate, which he did, and then received the permit. Meanwhile Caxias was furious at the interference of the Minister, wrote a most intemperate letter to him, and threatened that if it was repeated to publish an order of the day at head-quarters stating that M. Octaviano had no authority whatever in military matters. M. Octaviano sent back a dignified but galling reply, with the Marshal's own letter, and told Caxias in plain language that he recognised no authority save his own Government. The Marshal replied in the most undiplomatic language, which M. Octaviano did not deign to answer. He then sent his peremptory resignation to Rio, which the Emperor accepted. Caxias belongs to the Conservative party, which is fast sinking in Brazil, and Octaviano to the Liberal party, at the head of which is the Emperor; but Caxias is a man of very great influence in Brazil, and when leaving Rio for Paraguay received the high title of Grand Marshal, hitherto only given to royal blood. Minister Octaviano is one of the most rising men in Brazil. His unceasing labors in the River-Plate have laid his country under great obligations to him; and, as a proof of how very highly the Emperor values his services, he has been named Senator of Rio Janeiro. He leaves in the French packet. We wish him a pleasant voyage, and hope soon to see his country at peace, and her sons applying their talents to the development of its almost inexhaustible wealth.

Molina for causing the row comes off on Thursday. This is worse than even the Court of Chancery.

On Sunday the great trial of the fire extinguisher took place in the Plaza Victoria. It seems that M. Cazon would not allow it to take place in the Plaza 25 de Mayo, before the Government-house. The exhibition came off with signal 'ecclat.' Three tar-barrels were fired, and in an instant the machine put out the blaze. The public seemed highly satisfied with the exhibition.

On Tuesday afternoon a Commission called at the Pueblo printing-office, and in the mildest manner possible asked for the names and addresses of the editors, as also of the owner of the printing-office. Our colleague in consequence has published a notice, stating that if they do not henceforward meddle in politics people may well know the reason. The times are very critical, and editors of native papers are in rather tight places.

Cataldi's cheese breakfast in Moron passed off remarkably well. The moment the breakfast terminated, he set about showing his friends how he made his cheese, making a very appropriate speech on the occasion. All seemed well pleased, and speak in the highest terms of the 'fete,' which has astonished all Moron. The chief of the rotters on board the Chacabuco is a man named José Torres, who has no less than twenty-seven wounds. He is recovering fast, and will be sent up to the army.

Above this was also written.—"H. M. B. Nassau, 20th Oct. 1860, Lat. 20 deg. 0 min. 13 S. Long. 32 deg. 53 min. 26 W." Wind fresh E.S.E., making 8 knots, course S.S.W. Richard C. Macque, Capt. R.N." This paper together with the desired information was handed over to the British Consul in Bahia.

Commercial news are still very limited. Yesterday morning the rate opened at 23d. for Bankers drafts and 23½d. for private bills, but later on it became firmer and large transactions took place at 23½d. for Bankers drafts and 23½d. for private paper. On Paris some extensive business was done at 40frs., 40frs., and 410 fr. per franc. Some 6 p. Brazilian Stock was sold at 89 p. Rio Gas Company Shares at 210s., and Banco Rural Hypothecario at 140s. Some large transactions in coffee took place, and account for the hardening of the rate of Exchange on London.

The following statistical information may prove interesting to some of your subscribers. The average consumption of Carne Seca in Rio de Janeiro during the last five years ('62 to '66) has been 1,004,052 arr. (600,936 quintals) per ann. or an average of about 160,000 arr. (51,200 quintals) per month from all ports of supply. From Buenos Ayres the average consumption per month in 1866 was 39,756 arr., which is below the average of the five preceding years, viz.—12,433 arr. From Montevideo and Entre Rios the average consumption per month in 1866 was 112,556 arr. which is somewhat below the average of the five preceding years, viz.: 138,019 arr. But from Rio Grande there has been during 1866 an increase of 137,447 arr. over the average of the five preceding years. In January this year to date the arrivals of Carne Seca from the River Plate have been very large—156,559 arr. (50,098 qq.) against 69,089 arr. in the whole month of January 1866. Two cargoes have this month been sent on to the North ports of the Empire.

Exports since 1st inst. have been for the River Plate—Tobacco 25 bales and 937 rolls for Buenos Ayres and 2,060 rolls for Montevideo. Sugar 118 cask and 1915 bags for Buenos Ayres and 16 cases, 529 casks and 748 bags for Montevideo. Rum, 235 pipes for Montevideo. Beans, 293 bags for Montevideo. Toucinho, 20 barrels and 30 baskets for Montevideo. Coffee, 548 bags for Buenos Ayres and 403 casks and 1173 bags for Montevideo. Farinha do Mandioca, 1,998 bags for Montevideo.

The Dutch frigate Kaysomar arrived here yesterday en route for Tokohama, Japan, where she will be delivered over to the Japanese Government for which she was built. This vessel is of 1,200 nominal horse power and mounts 26 guns, of which 18 are rifled.

I shall send you a few lines by the Arino to-morrow in addition to those I have already written and sent to the post for that mail.

P.S.—Up to yesterday some 10,000 sovereigns had changed hand at 103/30 to 104/00, but I cannot ascertain what has been done to-day owing to the bustle for the mail, but I will endeavor to find out in time to advise you by the Arino to-morrow. Bank of Brazil Shares have fallen to 170s. Later advices from Para, contradict the reports of an invasion by the Peruvians; it appears that the cause of these rumors was the concentration of the Peruvian frontier guard in the districts where the limits have just been determined by the Mixed Commission.

There has been an Indian invasion in the interior of the Province of Maranhão; it appears that there has been a large sacrifice both of the lives and property of white or civilized inhabitants.

NEWS FROM THE INTERIOR.

We extract the following interesting items from the Tribuna correspondence of the 29th.—

Matters are growing momentarily worse, and the last news is the rising of the Puntanos, under Felipe Sa, and the partial rising of some districts of Cordoba. Fears are also entertained for the tranquility of the province of Santa Fe. The communication between Paunero and Rosario is cut off. It seems undecided whether to advance or retreat; but in the opinion of military men, his only safety is in an immediate march upon either Mendoza or Cordoba, and the latter place will most likely be his point to gain.

Rio Cuarto, Villanueva, and other districts are already in the hands of the rebels, and several Government officers have been made prisoners—amongst them Segovia, Carril, and Viejo Bueno, the latter being afterwards sent at liberty. Meanwhile 1,200 Government troops have arrived at Rosario from Paraguay, under Arredondo—the best man possible in the present crisis, for he is active, brave, young, and has a thorough knowledge of the country and people he has to deal with. The troops under his command are the San Juanino and Mendocino battalions, and the 5th and 6th of the Line, with 4 guns and a company of artillery.

Com. Martinez de Hoz opines that more Government troops should be sent, as a general rising of the whole Interior is feared. The movement is gaining ground rapidly, but there can be little doubt but that it will be of very short duration, as the rebels are badly paid and worst armed.

We hear that Lopez Jordan has just left Entre Rios for Corrientes, with letters from Urquiza. The Tribuna exclaims, "What does this journey mean?"

In Rioja things are taking a more favorable turn. Varela has been defeated for a certainty, together with another of the banditti called Ramon Flores. In the latter affair, Vera, the Government commander, took the rebel chief Andrada prisoner: important letters were found on the prisoner's person, it is said, in reference to things in Cordoba and Entre Rios. Bringes is the man who defeated Varela: 10 men were killed in the fight, and 40 taken prisoners.

Suspicious are entertained of the fidelity of Governor Luque, of Cordoba; but he may turn out to be a good man after all.

The Taboadas have called out the national guards of their province, to prevent the movement from spreading northward.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

LATEST FROM TUYUTI. (From the Pueblo Correspondent.)

Tuyuti, Jan. 24th. At midnight on the 20th the enemy commenced throwing hand-rockets from the adjoining woods; the night was so dark that we could not see to dislodge them, and the short range made the missiles more than usually effective. One burst in Aguilera's rancho, which was of course burnt down; the flames spread to the adjoining huts of Gutierrez and Arias, both of which were as quickly reduced to ashes. Happily none of the gentlemen were at home, all three having left a few minutes before to visit the outposts. Several other parts of the camp similarly suffered, and in some of the officers' quarters valuables were destroyed by the flames. Happily no lives were lost. Just then a violent storm burst over us—the wind arose, and sweeping furiously, carried away our tents and the roofs of our huts, adding fresh fuel to the flames. The danger past, and the enemy quiet, the following day was spent in repairing the damage and taking precautionary measures for the future—tents were secured, huts re-titled, and the straw that substituted by a less inflammable material.

Zeballos arrived here yesterday from your city, having made a short stay at Rosario.

Private Merlo, of the 6th of the Line, and formerly orderly to Commander Campos, had his right arm so frightfully mutilated by a rocket, that on the 21st, Dr. McDonald, of the Central Hospital, assisted by Surgeons Biedma, Sutton, and Castillo, amputated the member: the poor fellow suffered awfully, for besides losing his arm, a piece of the rocket had lodged in his right breast. Castillo managed to extract this, very skillfully during the night, and the next day the man appeared greatly relieved, but gangrene has set in, and the doctors entertain little hope of his recovery: he is reported as the only victim of that unlucky night.

The 5th and 6th of the Line, with the Mendoza, San Luis, and San Juan battalions, under Colonel Arredondo, have just received orders to march to-morrow at daybreak, taking with them two small field-pieces. These comrades of ours proceed to the disturbed provinces, and may good fortune attend their arms. I only wish I were one of the party.

On the 19th inst., although unprovoked by the enemy, Caxias opened a favorite plan of attack, by a heavy fire on the enemy's extreme right. About 8 a.m. the random gun was discharged, and for two hours the batteries poured forth their deadly fire. The affair was attended with success, inasmuch as, one frowning rampart was dismantled, the Brazilians then pushed forward their lines, and carried an advanced outpost of the enemy, taking prisoners the officer in command, who was severely wounded, and some of his men, all more or less disabled; the only trophies taken were a valuable set of sapping tools. Our entire loss was only 4 killed and 10 wounded, including 2 killed and 2 wounded in the Piris battery by the bursting of one of the iron pieces. Guerrilla fighting was kept up all day and night, and now and then the boom of a heavy gun awoke us from our sleep.

The enemy remaining quiet within their lines on the 20th, the Brazilians spent that day in dancing and carousing, in celebration of their victory. This novel mode of warfare seems to have attracted the contempt of the enemy and the heavens. A cloudless day was followed by a pitch dark night—the wind arose gradually, increasing in violence till midnight, when a frightful storm broke over the camp. The enemy availing themselves of the obscurity, approached through the woods to within 5 squares of our lines, from whence they hurled

such hand-rockets at our huts with such fearful precision that in a very short time many of them were in a blaze, and fearful might have been the consequences had not the rain, which came down in torrents, extinguished the flames.

But this is not the first time that we have been nearly burnt out, neither will it be the last; such must always be the case as often as the enemy will take the trouble to pay us a nocturnal visit. It is really most culpable and disgraceful that, with the means at our disposal, nothing has been done to prevent such disasters, or chastise the enemy. A single brigade of two battalions carefully posted in the woods, with scouts and sentinels regularly relieved, and in perfect communication with the main army, would prevent a surprise, to check its advance, to cut off stragglers, and give immediate notice within the lines of the enemy's movements.

A contingent of 100 and odd men from Tucuman arrived here on the 22nd inst. On account of their mutiny at Rosario, they were at once drafted into the Line, with some others who had been entrapped on the road.

The other day a deserter crossed over to our lines, having just escaped from Humaita, after two years confinement. He says that stronghold now only counts 52 guns, of which only 10 command the river; if this be so, it proves the trust Lopez has in the torpedoes to prevent the advance of the Imperial fleet.

The sanitary condition of the army is greatly improved by the present mild weather.

LONDON AND RIVER PLATE BANK.

HANOVER UNDER THE PRUSSIAN RULE.

In Hanover stringent measures continue. The Hanover stock appropriated by the late sovereign of the country when leaving has been declared invalid, and its *littera* and number being known, the manufacture of new shares in its stead has begun. The horses of the King are being sold by auction, to cover, to some extent, the amount of cash also removed by King George. Though among the finest animals to be found in Germany, they fetch marvellously little, from the hurry with which the sale is conducted. A fine stallion, for instance, the property of the Crown Prince, was bought by an agent of M. Rothschild for the trifling of 400 thalers; another, equally valuable, was knocked down to the Emperor Napoleon for the like sum. At the same time the conscription has begun in right earnest throughout the country. Upon the whole, the recruits do not object to enter the ranks, or to leave their native district for a Prussian province, the number of recusants hitherto amounting to no more than 20, who

required to intimate the fact to the Consul within whose district the deceased resided. In case, however, of the latter having prior knowledge, he is bound to make a similar notification to the local authorities. The second section sets forth that the Consul shall have no power to interfere where the deceased leaves only Brazilian inheritors, or where, with major French inheritors, present and capable, there are also Brazilian minor inheritors. When, however, the inheritors include one or more French minors, the Consul shall have the exclusive administration of the estate, unless there be a Brazilian widow, an inheriting *chef de famille*, a testamentary executor, or one or more Brazilian minors. In either of the latter contingencies, the Consul can only act conjointly with the persons interested, or their legal representatives.

In connection with these provisions, it is defined that minor inheritors born in Brazil of French parents shall be regarded until their majority as of the same nationality as the father, in conformity with the law of 10th Sept., 1860, and Brazilian consuls possess the same power and faculties in relation to the succession of Brazilians dying in France. Legatees are also considered inheritors. In the event of the Consul having the exclusive administration, he is required to observe certain formalities, in some of which the local authority is invited to participate; for instance, in the affixing of seals to the goods of the deceased and the taking of an inventory of his papers and possessions of a moveable character. Should the local authority decline to avail of the invitation, which must be in writing, the Consul can act independently and without delay. The Consul in his proceedings as an administrator is bound to act in conformity with the laws; and when the deceased occurs in a place where there is no Consul, the local authorities are called upon to intimate the same to the Government, but may enter upon the administration of the succession, and carry the same to completion unless relieved by the arrival of consul or of an agent appointed by him for the purpose.

INFLUENCE OF MARRIAGE ON DEATH-RATE.

Dr. Stark read an interesting paper before the Royal Society of Edinburgh, on the 17th, on the influence of marriage on the death-rate of men and women in Scotland. He based his calculations on the statistics issued by the Registrar-General, and brought out results which in a great measure, he believed, were now presented for the first time. He first showed the results in the case of men. He found that between twenty and twenty-five years of age the death-rate of bachelors was exactly double that of the married men. As the age increased, the bachelors decreased, but at every stage of life the advantage was in favour of married men. From twenty years of age to the close of life the mean age attained by married men was fifty-nine and a half years, while that of bachelors was only forty years. In other words, married men had the chance of living nineteen and a half years longer than those who were unmarried. From twenty-five years of age to the close of life the mean age of married men was sixty and two-tenths, while that of unmarried men was only forty-seven and seven-tenths. Very nearly one-half of all the bachelors who died had not attained thirty years of age. In the case of married men, by far the largest number died between 60 and 80 years of age. The results, Dr. Stark thought, clearly proved that the married state was the condition of life best fitted for mankind, and that the prolongation of life by that state was a special provision of nature. It was based on fixed laws of life. Married men were generally more regular in their habits, better housed, better cared for, and more under the conditions of health and long life. In the case of women, also, the results were in favour of the married as compared with the unmarried, though the difference was not so marked as in the case of the men. Married women died at a higher proportion during the three quinquennial periods (from 15 to 20, from 20 to 25, and 25 to 30), but at a lower rate from 30 to 40. The death-rate in the case of married women was higher again between 40 and 45 years of age, but the rate was in their favour again from the latter period to old age.

A ROMANCE OF THE PEEVAGE.

The London correspondent of the Birmingham Post writes—"The Countess Fortescue, whose untimely death has plunged her family in the deepest sorrow, will obtain a place in some future edition of the 'Romance of the Peevage.' About 20 years ago the beautiful and accomplished Miss Dawson was sought in marriage by two suitors—the one an exiled prince, heir to the fortunes and traditions of the French empire; and the other the son and heir to an English earldom. She gave her hand to the latter, and at the time, every one said, that in a worldly point of view the young lady had made the better match, leaving out the moral consideration that the prince was esteemed in society so somewhat of a *mauvais sujet*, while the young viscount was one of the most amiable, rising, and philanthropic among our youthful nobility. The prince was very much in love, and deeply chagrined at the lady's preference for his rival. A year after the lady became Viscountess Ebrington the unsuccessful suitor became President of the French Republic, and in five years afterwards he was proclaimed Emperor of the French. The Viscountess Ebrington must have been more or less than a woman if she had not sometimes thought of the brilliant destiny of her former suitor, and of the imperial diadem which might have graced her fair brow. About this time her husband, in the zealous and courageous discharge of his official duties, visited a public building, the inmates of which were suffering from one of the forms of zymotic disease. He caught the contagion, was prostrated by fever, and for many weeks his life was despaired of. He was nursed with all womanly devotion by the countess, but only emerged from his sick room with the loss of his eyesight. For months his eyes, 'bereft of light their seeing had forgot,' and although time and the skill of his physicians have brought some alleviation of his cala-

my, a faint glimmer of light alone remains, and, known by a green shade over his eyes, Earl Fortescue is scarcely able without assistance to find his way to his seat in the House of Peers.

Fixed price of Oncoes, \$100 Do. Sovereigns, 122 1/2 Patrons 25 The National Bonds recovered somewhat today, although the absence of news from the Interior gave room for many unpleasant rumors. Still Bonds to day are above the control of politics. A very large amount has to be either borrowed or bought for the end of the month; and it is the opinion of many experienced brokers, that if the Bonds are bought in the market they will run up considerably in value. The sales to day were very limited—

The market looks firmer, and prices with an upward tendency. In the South Plaza about 20,000 ar. sold, from 55 to 80, and in the North Plaza somewhat more at the same rates.
