THE PACIFIC EARTHQUAKE

REPORT IN NEW HAMPSHIRE. The following is a graphic description of a terrible hurricane experienced in New Hampshire on the 13th Aug. 1868, the Pacific Earthquake day when the world was shaken from pole to pole.

rible velocity, creating a hissing, seething sound, and commingling with the terrible crashing of timbers, they presented a spectacle truly appalling. Coming through the Tabor notch—so called—cutting through the dense forest a breadth three-fourths of a mile, the tornado reaches the Tabor sugar orchard of three hundred trees and leaves not one standing.

As soon as the storm neared, Fred, Aldrich and Charles Roby, with horse and carriage, were seeking shelter near the above named house. On a sudden they perceived themselves raised entirely from the ground, and Roby, whirling like a top high in the air, feet downward, together with his team, was carried over a high board fence, while Aldrich (large timbers, brick, stones and debris of every description lying in all directions) was taken six or eight rods in an opposite course.
