THE AUNIS' MAILS. LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The leaders of the Spanish Revolution are determined not to stand still in the career of progress they have commenced, but day by day fresh changes of the most radical and startling nature are announced.

The convents established before 1837 are to be reduced in number by one-half, and those left are forbidden henceforward to receive novices. That many of these changes are in themselves good and desirable may be very true, but the policy of such rapid innovation is always doubtful.

The difficulty as to the choice of a successor to the throne still remains unabated. It is understood that Serano and his friends of the Union Liberal are suspected of harbouring the Duc de Montpensier as their King in petto; but the Duke would not be generally acceptable to Spaniards.

On October 22, Mr. Reverdy Johnson was entertained at dinner by the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, Lord Stanley and Mr. Gladstone being among the guests and speakers on the occasion.

Prim knows better. I have described the general as an ambitious man; I meant no blame by it, for the limits which part ambition as the greatest of virtues can be traced by no human hand. Prim is ambitious. He knows his own worth; he feels himself born to rule; he has the welfare of his country at heart as well as in hand, and he feels confident that no man is more able or willing to promote it than himself.

Our English journals are now occupied almost exclusively with the approaching elections, and a feature of the morning papers for the last fortnight has been the broadsides reporting the voluminous speeches which Mr. Gladstone has been making in his constituents in Lancashire. It is unnecessary to say that the question of the Irish Church, and his policy towards it, has been the leading topic of the Night Honorable gentleman's addresses.

So far as we have yet learnt, the Revolution has caused no disturbances in the Spanish Colonies, but appears to have been quietly received. From Cuba we learn that a deputation of some of the principal inhabitants is coming to Europe for the purpose of conferring with the Provisional Government as to the course to be pursued under existing circumstances.

The exiled Queen still remains at Pau, though it is said that representations have been made by the Provisional Government to the Emperor Napoleon as to the inconvenience which might possibly arise from her being located so close to the frontier, and that, in consequence, the Emperor has offered her the use of any other of the Royal palaces which Her Majesty might desire to inhabit.

The elections in the United States have so far gone largely in favour of the Republican party in Pennsylvania. Out of twenty-four members voted for, the Democrats have only been able to elect six; out of the nineteen Congressional districts of Ohio, the Republicans are said to have carried thirteen, and in Indiana eight out of eleven.

By the arrival of the Cape mail, we have news of a great rain-fall at Natal, which lasted three days, and caused damage to roads, bridges, and buildings, which has been estimated at \$150,000.

San Francisco, Oct. 21, Evening. The city of San Francisco was visited this day with a very severe shock of earthquake, which was felt throughout the whole of California and several of the neighboring States. The town in many parts is a complete heap of ruins; houses, stores, churches, and other buildings being razed.

At this particular moment Colonel Martinez and a Captain Montes rode up to the door, hailed the fellows on the 'azotea,' and asked for a 'parley,' which was granted, and they walked in. This appeared to have been the critical moment, for Colonel Martinez denied to the ringleader, a certain Balbuena, his ever having offered them his protection in the mutiny, as it appears he had done, and at this denial Balbuena, who had half the force at his command, gave them the two orders, 'preparan apunten!' The next was death.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION. MUTINY OF TROOPS IN SALTO. TERRIBLE AFFAIR.

Salto, Banda Oriental, Nov. 28, 1868.

Being on a short visit up here, I have had the opportunity of witnessing "a negocio" I had never before seen, although heard of many times, and this was a rather serious mutiny of the Compania Urbana of this town, a body of regular troops.

At about 4 p.m., on the evening of the 23rd, and as we were about finishing dinner, a person, known to the hotelkeeper, came running in shouting that a "revolution" had taken place at the Comandancia.

This caused a general stir and a general rush to the corner of the Plaza. I managed to get into a good position, and began closely to observe the movements of the sentinel (only person to be seen) at the partly closed doors of the said Comandancia.

At this state of affairs, and carried away by curiosity, several persons—mostly foreigners—imprudently approached the door to have a "peep in"—they were immediately accosted by the sentinel, who, to all appearance, was a cool fellow, and who told them—

"Entren, Señores, quo nos vamos a arreglar, entren vdes."

At this information you can better imagine the hubbub and the general scrambling off for life, and the rush for open doors that were slammed in their faces by those few shopkeepers, who like Biscachas, had had courage enough to keep peeping from a half closed door.

distance, and where he thought he was protected from any shot, but still, in case of a sally, kept a sharp look out for a low stone wall he had close at hand.

From this position C... kept up the observation, but everything being quiet and nobody to be seen, the crowd began to come back again and form at the corner. After this some time elapsed before anything was heard from or seen about the Comandancia. It could be plainly seen, however, that the troops were in a strong position, and, what was worse, had all the ammunition in their power, and a large force would be required to dislodge them.

About the time these preparations were being made some stray shots were heard, which caused some to think that having freed the prisoners, a general 'afusilamiento' was begun with the chief [Col. Reyes], officers, and citizens, but as luck would have it, although they [the mutineers] were all intoxicated, they did not carry out this, their original idea, as they found things easier without taking life.

They carried away nearly all the clothing in the establishment, and all liquor as well, but nothing else. After looking around for more information, I walked into the room where the body of poor the baker was laid out. He had been fired upon from behind, and struck in the back of the neck, the ball going through, and coming out a little below the throat; it was an awful hole; the neck was completely torn to pieces.

The mutineers carried all away their arms except the field piece, which they left loaded and spiked on the wharf; many of the muskets were also returned, and others thrown by them into the river. These men had the town completely in their power, and they were not over 100 men; by this you can imagine what they could have done if they had wanted to sack the place.

P. S.—I have found out that the poor fellow killed was a puestero of one of Cabal's estancias, who had just then come in for some medicines for his wife, who was sick.

Colonel Martinez has been imprisoned, and "allowed no communication whatever." It is thought it will be a serious case with him, as it is now well known that he was an accomplice in the revolution, but was unsuccessful through a body of troops he had outside burning over to the Government; the movement was of Conservatives against Floristas, and the chief object the Gefa Politico office.

LATEST FROM PERGAMINO. MELANCHOLY STATE OF THINGS.

The present state of the frontier of this Province is such that if immediate steps are not taken to garrison the places called for, we may expect the savages shortly in the Plaza Victoria. We received yesterday from an affrighted Irish farmer the following dispatch which our friend had to send by a chasque some eight leagues in order to catch the mail to town: Pergamino, Nov. 26.

I wish to Heavens, President Sarmento and his Ministers were here this evening! You would pity the poor people, to see them running like wild geese on account of another Indian invasion. The report here at this moment is that about 150 Indians are now near the Fortin Melincuo and coming in at full speed for certain.

Shortly after receiving the money, they began to march out from the comandancia, [it was then night] and I believe, some idea was entertained of attacking them, but the force required was not at that moment up to time; however, they, the mutineers, were well prepared, fully armed, and had a field piece, which, besides, was well loaded with canister. They took the road to the wharf, and when there, a general row began after boats, as none were to be found, except those of the schooners in port, as all the others had been ordered away beforehand by the authorities.

At this state of affairs old C... took up a good oblique position in a door that besides the wall had a "columna" that projected out a good

struck 9 p.m., we thought they were in for it, and ourselves as well, as we heard some 'vivas' at the Plaza, and, as a matter of course, thought the troops were marching to the attack, and we would be between two fires; we soon moved out of there, and travelled to the Plaza, where really there was troops formed, and had given some 'vivas,' and were eager for a brush with the others before they got away: there was about one hundred men altogether.

C... then went to the Comandancia, and saw there a scene of the greatest excitement as well as confusion; natives and foreigners, just as they stood, had laid on to muskets, &c., and were all apparently disposed to fight. That being the case, no time was to be lost, and your friend C... carried away by the general excitement, proposed to the Colonel an attack on the rascals. This was accepted, and many made preparations and others none; but, however, this was soon put down, by some officers coming forward and saying, that they had given their word of honor not to disturb them, that they had spared many, and consequently, there ought not to be any retaliation. However, this palovar did not go so much against the movement as did the fact of finding the field piece, [a 6-pounder] left behind so spiked as to be completely useless, and as this was the only arm to have been used with advantage on them, as they got into the current with over-loaded boats, the movement was completely given up.

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The whole affair did not occupy more than four hours, and C... and many others thought at first it was some combined affair with Blancos, invading from above, as it has been rumored for some time that they were preparing for another blow; and what at first confirmed this idea was the 'bola' that circulated, saying that a woman had been taken disguised as an officer.

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town are systems more alarmed than the sheepfarmers. There is nothing for us but all to clear out—every man, woman, and child must leave this place, for the Government will do nothing.

Just look at the shocking state of the country with these Indian savages burning our ranchos over our heads—and the Government sending all the troops to fight the Paraguayans. The hand of God points to the retribution. The few soldiers out here are like starved rats. They say they get no pay—I believe them. There was a letter published in the Tribuna from here, giving a description of the state of Pergamino: print it in English—every word of it is the truth.

Gelly y Obes has all the troops up in Paraguay, when he should be out here defending the country against the savages. The people in the camp are beginning to form their own opinion about what is going on in Buenos Ayres, all the Generals, Colonels, and officers, ought to be put into a sack and shook up, all the camp is covered this evening with people galloping to and fro, no one knows where they are going to, but the Indians—the Indians, is the cry on all sides, even the sheep seem to know that we are all done up, for I can't keep the flocks quiet the whole day. I tell you gentlemen, that Pergamino is going to the dogs, and could I sell, out you would not long find me in these parts. 'Tis a shame—'Tis a disgrace to the country, the Government and the people that a band of cowardly savages can sweep every thing before them, and carry the women and children to their wigwams.

The foregoings is the plain unvarnished tale of a suffering sheepfarmer. We published yesterday an equally afflicting correspondence from Nueve de Julio, something must be done. And done at once. Meanwhile Frontier men, write by each mail and don't be afraid to speak out.

W. L. The Aunis arrived early yesterday morning, but the mails were not delivered until late in the afternoon. She has brought the American mail, and we salute General Grant as the new President of the United States: the polling of the different States leaves no question as to the final result.

The mails from the Uruguay yesterday brought down the startling news of an attempted revolution in Salto, Banda Oriental. We publish a very graphic description of the row from the pen of an Englishman sojourning in that town.

The Panama has brought fresh news of another earthquake shock at Ecuador. As yet the full details are not at hand, but it appears that it was unattended with loss of life.

A farmer from Pergamino has sent us a special despatch respecting another Indian invasion in that quarter, which we call our reader's attention to. The letter is well worthy of perusal.

Many anticipate a rumour at the elections to-day. It is desirable therefore for all strangers to avoid the booths at the church doors owing to the intense heat of the weather. It is probable however that everything will pass off quietly, and none of the churches unroofed as in former years.

At Colón on Wednesday night not more than 150 people assisted at the performance of "Traviata," and on Friday only 87 entradas were sold to hear the "Barbieri di Siviglia!" Never has our great lyric theatre been in so degraded a condition, and all on account of the utter incapacity of those entrusted with the management of it. We have borne enough, and it is high time they should be sent about their business and make room for more competent persons. Our neighbours in Montevideo are far better off because they have in Mr Pestalardo not only an intelligent and active impresario but one whose tact and conciliatory manner place him in the most favourable contrast to the present managers of Colón. The consequence is that Montevideo has now an operative company such as has never been heard there, and which has lately been supplemented by the arrival of a star of the very first magnitude, Mme. Zucchi. The event has created quite a furore in the sister capital, and no wonder, since the River Plate has never had the fortune of being visited by an artist of her eminent abilities, Lagrange, La Grua, and even Tambrick not excluded. We take pleasure in sending a distant salute to this highly gifted lady, and since the owners of the Colón Theatre are so deaf to their own interests, as to shut its doors to the most successful and intelligent impresario in the Plate, our friend Sr. Pestalardo, we hope he will come to some arrangement with the Victoria Theatre, or even the

Francisco-Argentine, to enable the Buenos Ayreans to contribute their meed of admiration to so distinguished an artist.

On taking up the pavement for the water pipes in Calle Bolivar, nearly in front of Mr Cornu's music shop, a deep bricked well was discovered yesterday, the existence of which is a bottomless mystery. An iron box is said to be hidden there, but no ropes long enough were at hand to ascertain it.

The Revd. Mr. Carter of Rosario sends us the following notice to correct an erroneous statement about his magazine:—"South American Monthly."—This magazine contains 32 pages besides the cover. It was stated to be 24 in a previous notice, which is a mistake.

It would be difficult to find in any civilized country under the sun, any thing worse than the condition of the Barracas river. In any other country with the enormous traffic carried on at those points, constituting so essential a portion of the wealth of the country, the Government would go out of its way to facilitate that traffic. But here, not only the most culpable apathy and negligence is displayed, but, when any thing is done, it is sure to be performed without the slightest prevision or even thought. The bridge at Barracas will not allow barges to pass under it except at exceptionally low tides, and in consequence, a large quantity of pipes of tallor, despatched from the upper saladeros, destined to be shipped on board the Flamsteed, and for which the shipper has already drawn on England, are tide bound on the other side of the Barracas bridge, and for all we know, may still be there when the bills of exchange reach England. And this, because the engineer who contracted the bridge, altered the level of the bridge, and made it one inch and a half lower than what was originally put down in his plans. Saladeristas are justly mad at this state of things.

The elections of the Municipal electors take place in the various parishes of this city to-day. We trust that those who are anxious to regenerate the worn out and useless Municipal Board will persevere in their laudable efforts, and secure a triumphant success. With men of such well-tried honesty, energy and intelligence as our friend Hector F. Varela, there might be reason to look forward to some good being done, and, although unfortunately we have no direct voice in this matter, our best wishes are with him.

We are happy to hear that Mr. Pestalardo intends gratifying the curiosity of the Buenos Ayres public by bringing over his troupe here and giving some performances.

By a telegram via Lisbon we are pleased to hear that the Hipparchus, which left Montevideo on the 26th September, reached Liverpool on the 26th October.

Sr. Rossi de Ruggero, who, as first baritone at the Colón, has become so marked a favorite with our public takes his benefit on Wednesday, in Verdi's beautiful opera 'Luisa Miller.' The artistic merits of no common order he has displayed in the execution of the important parts entrusted to him, entitle him to the support of a discerning public, and we doubt not his many admirers will not fail to patronize him on this occasion.

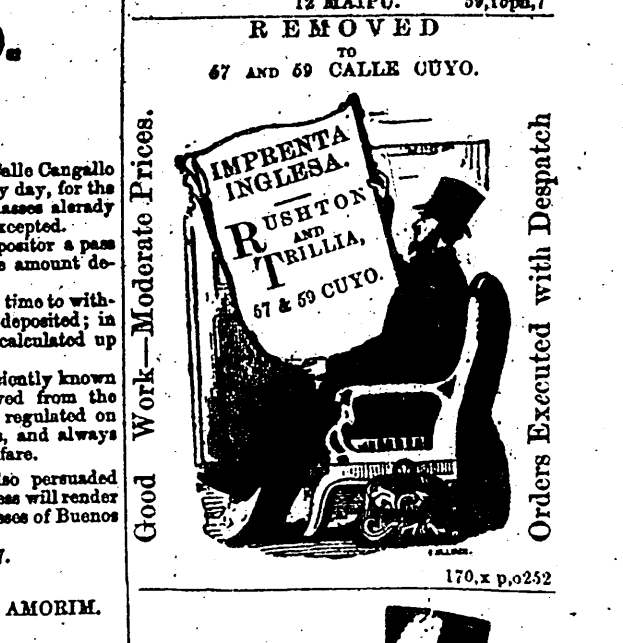
