THE UNITED STATES PRESIDENCY.

On February, the 13th, the joint committee, composed of one Senator and two Representatives of Congress, waited on General Grant to inform him officially of his election as President of the United States.

After the President's commission had been handed to General Grant, he made the following response, speaking very deliberately, and with evident embarrassment.

REPLY OF GENERAL GRANT.

I can promise the Committee that it will be my endeavor to call around me as assistants, such men only as I think will carry out the principles which you have said the country desire to see successful—economy, retrenchment, faithful collection of the revenue and payment of the public debt.

BUENOS AYRES GREAT SOUTHERN RAILWAY

An extraordinary meeting of this Company was held yesterday at the office, 4, Gt. Winchester-street-buildings, for the purpose of confirming the resolutions passed at the meeting on 5th instant.

The Secretary (Mr. C. O. Barker) having read the notice convening the meeting, proceeded to read the resolutions to be confirmed, as follows:—

That the Directors be, and they are hereby authorised to enter into negotiations, and to conclude and execute an agreement on behalf of the Company with the Government of Buenos Ayres, for varying the terms of the concession by the said Government of the Company's railway, dated the 11th and 12th June, 1862, and the decree of the 12th August, 1863, so far as relates to the Guarantee of Interest at the rate of 7 per cent. upon the cost said railway, either by modifying the terms of said Guarantee in such manner and for such consideration as the Directors think fit, or by commuting the said Guarantee for such benefit or advantage to the Company, whether in the form of payment of money or otherwise as the Directors shall think equivalent thereto.

That the Directors be, and they are hereby authorised on behalf of the Company to enter into negotiations and conclude an agreement with the Government of Buenos Ayres, on such terms as the Directors think fit for constructing an extension of the Company's Railway to some point in a South-westerly direction beyond the Salado. Provided that no such agreement shall impose the making of the said extension as a burden upon the present Capital of the Company.

That the Capital and Revenue account of any extension shall be kept strictly separate from that of the parent line, and that the option shall be given to the shareholders of subscribing to the new line or not.

The Chairman, in moving their adoption, said that it was a most gratifying and happy state of things, and which augured well for the future prosperity of the Company, which indeed never was in doubt. He had been informed by his friend Mr. Spencer Herapath that there were some gentlemen in the room, members of the Stock Exchange, who were desirous of returning to business.

Me. Spencer Herapath, seconded the resolution, which was carried.

The Chairman, before making any observations, would first apologise for not attending on the last occasion.

His friend Mr. Drabble, had, however conducted the business of that meeting in a manner that must have been gratifying to himself and to those present. That gentleman had at that meeting read an extract from a letter from him, but he had omitted to read the first part of it, in which he [the chairman] had said that there was no man more qualified to fill that position than Mr. Drabble, from his knowledge of the affairs of Buenos Ayres.

He possessed 500 shares in the Company, which he had from the beginning, and which he meant to leave to his children; and, moreover, he meant to take his full allotment of the new shares, which would be allotted 25 to the 400. It was much better to make it optional on the shareholders to take these shares than to make it compulsory, as he had no idea of swelling the capital account, but at the same time he advised them to take the shares. He wished them most distinctly to understand that the Shareholders of the old company were not bound to take a single share in the new Company. They were offered their allotment, but there was no obligation. No one could say what the railway would eventually pay, but in his opinion it would pay 10 per cent. at least, and he was extremely glad the Buenos Ayres Government had been good enough to waive their power to buy the railway at 20 per cent. premium.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Copernicus arrived yesterday morning, but her passengers and papers did not get ashore until about 11 a.m. This steamer has made a splendid run out, and takes the mails home on the 9th. Owing to press of copy we hold over our extracts from the English papers until to-morrow.

The new Commander-in-chief Count D'Eu is expected in Montevideo to-day. His commission is exclusively military, and he will be accompanied by the renowned Polidoro. The Duke de Caxias is in very infirm health, and about to proceed to Europe, his doctors having advised a sea voyage.

In the southern camps there is great speculation as to the route of the Southern Railway extension. It is very generally believed that the new line will pass through the town of Ranchos, but as yet nothing positive is known in this regard.

In the district of the Fortin de Areco, at a place called the Posta Acuña, adjoining the immense camps of the Molinos, a small estancia, belonging to Mr. Healey, is now offered for sale. The land is considered the very best in the province; it has a fine estancia house, and several puecos. The estancia will be sold cheap, and is a very favorable opportunity for parties looking for land.

Parties who have arrived from Rosario state that so great is the flood up there that the brick wall of the new gas works, it is feared, will give way, as the arches are said to be giving in.

An English broker, who has just returned from a trip on the Central Argentine Railway, reports the camps up there to be in splendid condition, and the wet weather to have done no damage to the estancias in Santa Fé.

A party of Gauchos have been making a raid at a place called Cilanarcitos, in the Province of San Luis. They were pursued and overtaken by a party of troops under Sergeant-Major Antonio Loyola, four of the marauders remaining dead on the field, and one taken prisoner. This incursion can in no way be attributed to the Indians, as there was not a single one amongst the party.

We learn with regret from a foreign estanciero of San Antonio de Areco, that within the last fortnight the sheepfarmers have lost heavily in that partido; owing to the heavy rains and the young thistles; on some estancias as many as 400 sheep have died from the effects.

Professor Lewis has returned to the city from the far south. Mr. Lewis has been sojourning on the magnificent Alzaga estancia; he reports the camps down there and the stock in very excellent condition.

The Arno left Montevideo crowded with passengers; she also took heavy mails. We salute Captain Burton on his return from the west coast. The Captain, in the short space of four months, has done the Provinces, done the Andes, done Chile, done Peru, the Straits of Magellan, and now goes up in the Provedor to do Anaco. He gives a most melancholy description of the San Luis Road. Captain Burton met Mr. Coppinger in Chile, and helped him to sell some of his rams.

The next advices from Paraguay are looked forward to with much anxiety, as it is supposed that the Brazilian forces which marched along the railway must ere this have come upon the Paraguayans, and a fight ensued.

At a meeting of Cuban ladies held in New York lately, for the purpose of raising funds to assist the army of liberation, we observe that Mrs. Macias, wife of our esteemed friend Colonel Macias, now in Buenos Ayres, was elected vice-president of the junta there formed for carrying out the objects of the meeting.

The news from the province of San Juan yesterday was of a gloomy character. The montonero Guayama, eluding the vigilance of the National troops, had invaded the Llanos on the

confines between the provinces of San Luis and San Juan, and committed serious depredations, especially on inoffensive travellers that came in his way. A troop belonging to D. Camilo Rojo had been plundered, the mules carried off, and several persons killed.

An extra train will henceforward leave the Retiro station for Belgrano at 6.10 p.m., on week days, returning to the Retiro (only) at 6.55 p.m.

His Excellency the President of the Republic, visited yesterday the Lopez furniture now on view at Mr. Billinghurst's, and expressed himself highly pleased at its beauty and taste. H. E. ordered a photograph of the crown to be taken for him.

We hear that Mr. Peter Beares, the well known engineer, has been up at Parana surveying the ground and drawing out plans for the construction of a tramway through that city from the Plaza Alvear to the river's bank. Sr. Suarez is the contractor for the works. A general wish is expressed up there that the National Government should order the publication of all Custom House returns throughout the Republic, as they are to a certain extent a gauge by which the prosperity of any particular locality can be estimated.

The people of Entre Rios are described as very anxious to enter on a career of industry and progress, and they certainly cannot be denied a foremost place amongst the different states of the Argentine Confederation. There is to be a grand ball given next month in the upper rooms of the Parana College. The event derives additional importance from the fact that it is to be given by a number of "Beneficiaries" to a circle of their unwedded companions. It is a curious coincidence that in those very rooms (then the Government House) Sr. Paranhos in 1858 was working night and main to bring about the Paraguayan war.

The river is still rising; never have such downpours of rain been seen in the province, and the damage to property up to the present has been most serious.

Considerable excitement reigned throughout the city on Monday, and as the day wore on, and the telegraphic despatches from the country made it certain that in the rural districts Sr. Castro had a large majority, it increased rather than diminished. A meeting was held in the Plaza Victoria at half past 6 o'clock. Some notabilities were present, and a good deal of strong language was used.

After about an hour's declamation, shouting, firing of crackers by boys, and rockets by the troops, a vast amount of general noise, the few hundred young men comprising the meeting marched off at the heels of a brass band shouting for Señor Castro, who after all proves to be the popular candidate. The defeated party say that matters are not yet settled, but it is to be hoped that passions will cool down, and that we may consider this election nuisance as settled.

Montevideo is still swallowing up a considerable quantity of specie. Last week the steamers America, Rio Uruguay, Rio de la Plata, and Comercio brought to that city between them upwards of \$23,400. The Saturno, the first of a new line of steamers, built at Glasgow for River Plate, arrived at Montevideo on yesterday morning; she can accommodate 200 passengers. Very few transactions on Bolsa: price of gold slightly higher—7 prem.

To-night 'El Trovatore' will be performed at the Colon Theatre, and between the acts Mlle. Correa de Tagle will sing an aria from Lucia de Lamermoor, a cavatina from Sonnambula, and a mazurka written expressly for her by Señorita Perez; this lady comes preceded by a great reputation, and a full house may be expected.

A really lamentable accident occurred the other day in Calle Peru, between Estados Unidos and Europa. A little boy of 13 years of age, while amusing himself, together with a companion of his own age, in firing pistols, by some mischance shot his little friend dead on the spot. It is inconceivable how parents can allow children of such tender years to handle firearms.

A sergeant in the corps of Invalidos found a few days ago in the street a pocket-book containing \$580, belonging to one of his fellow pensioners. The brave and honest veteran immediately placed it in the hands of the police for restoral to its lawful owner.

We take the following extract from the "Medical Times" on the subject of colored stockings, which we believe in winter are extensively patronised by the fair portion of the community. In their interest we raise a warning voice, which of course they will listen to with their usual docility:—"Poisoned by colored socks.—It is understood that a committee which has been formed to investigate the ill effects said to arise from colored socks finds that there is more material for its labors than was at first suspected. The number of persons who have suffered from the colored socks is very large, and their complaints of protracted pain, lameness, and utter inability to attend to business, are only equalled by their invectives against our unhappy fraternity for not having sooner detected the cause of the mischief. One gentleman, who was unable to attend to his business, and was absent from home and under medical care for

more than six months, is said to have forwarded to the committee a list of eight physicians of eminence whom he consulted, and of whom three pronounced the cause of his illness to be 'poverty of blood,' three called it 'en thetic' disease, one called it indigestion, and one said it was a 'skin affection,' which last diagnosis was indelible. One most important hint we may give for the public, that, until further advised, they had better abstain from the use of all articles whatever which are dyed with the poisonous coal tar colors. We hear not only of ladies whose skins have suffered from tinted flannel waistcoats, but senmen whose backs and arms are excoriated by wearing 'singles,' i.e. tight woolen 'tuties' similarly dyed; we hear of beautiful pink soaps which irritate the skin, of pink sweetmeats which produce aphthae and diarrhoea in children, pink jellies which unaccountably disagree with young ladies, and even of infectious wines and cordials better suited for the eyes than the stomach. There may be exaggerations, but the now well-proved fact of poisonous socks was similarly scouted as an exaggeration at first. We would say, in conclusion, that in cases of obstinate irritation of unusual character, these dyes should be suspected and inquired for; and until the facts are fully investigated and settled one way or the other, 'nimium ne crede color.'

Judging from the published returns the income, to whoever it belongs, derived from fines levied by the police, must in the course of the solar year, amount to a very respectable sum. It appears that between the 9th and 16th of this month the amount paid in fines for various offences to the police reached a total of \$9,400 mpc. At this rate the annual income from this source would be nearly £4,000, and it would be satisfactory to know how it is disposed of; during the same period the Municipality only managed to levy \$2,700 mpc.

A strange race lately took place in England between three parties mounted on velocipedes, the course being from London to Brighton, a distance of about 55 miles. The winner was Mr. Mayall, it being at the finish a case of "the rest nowhere," though for 30 miles it was an even thing; the highest speed attained was a little over 8 miles an hour, except when descending Clayton Hill, Mr. Mayall then doing the mile in 4 minutes.

The deputation sent by Colonel Rodriguez to the Indians with instructions to treat for the surrender or exchange of some women and girls that had fallen into their hands, last week unexpectedly returned, bringing with them three women and a girl who rejoined their families. Thirty days was the time taken to reach and return from the Indian village, where the king or cacique of the tribe resided. Attention of all kinds were lavished on the white men by the cacique and his officers. On our side two Indian prisoners were given up, as also a quantity of trifles of all kinds which appeared to tickle the fancy of the cacique and his squaws.

A rumour is current that an influential petition is about to be presented to Government, begging that in view of the present electoral excitement an extraordinary meeting of the Legislative Assembly may be summoned.

LATEST FROM COLONIA.

Colonia del Sacramento, 15th March, 1869.

Having noticed the paucity of news contained in the "Standard" respecting this place, I have ventured to trouble you with the present communication, and should you deem it worthy of insertion in your columns, I will endeavor to forward you, from time to time; such scraps of news as I may be enabled to pick up in the course of my wanderings.

We have been much annoyed by the stoppage of communication between this port and Buenos Ayres, as most of us receive our letters from home through your post-office. As the necessity of quarantine is, however, a moot point among medical men, we must not grumble at a measure which may be prudent and necessary, though extremely inconvenient for the time being.

We have been greatly horrified by a barbarous murder committed lately in this district. The victim was Mr. John Morris, an old resident in Buenos Ayres, and well known there. He lived entirely alone, and was treacherously murdered for the sake of robbery while dispensing hospitality to his assassins: it is supposed there must have been three of them, as four cups of coffee were found on the table when the murder was discovered. The murderers are still at large. Several robberies have also been committed lately in the country districts; in one instance, two Englishmen were stopped by five men in broad daylight, and robbed of about eighty sovereigns; two of the robbers were afterwards taken by the police and sent to Montevideo, where they will, no doubt, be let loose on society with the least possible delay. It is of no use to blame the camp police for not apprehending criminals; the root of the evil lies in Montevideo. Were proper justice dispensed there and due punishment awarded to malefactors, very few of them would escape, for every honest man would then help the police in the

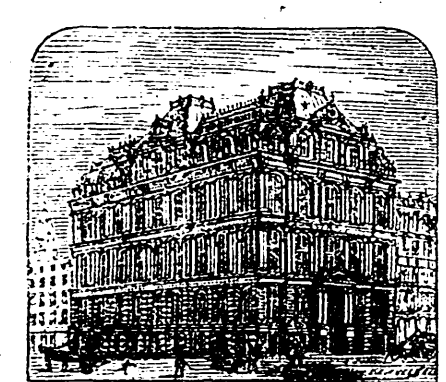
