Montevideo, July 29. Pampiro since last night. The J. T. Brady gone to pieces.

IMPORTANT FROM PARAGUAY. ARRIVAL OF THE GUARANI. Yesterday at an early hour the steamer Guarani arrived in port.

Asuncion, July 24, 1869. Since you left things have undergone many changes. The chief topic here is the new Paraguayan Government.

should be formed. He also showed by the conduct of the allies since the flight of Lopez to the mountains their anxiety to help and assist the Paraguayan people.

Dr. Roque Perez, Argentine Minister, next addressed the meeting in his usual eloquent and impressive manner touching on the same points as the Brazilian Minister.

At noon on the 22nd inst. the public meeting came off in the theatre; the place was crowded, and both the Brazilian and Argentine Ministers attended simply as spectators.

The chairman rose to explain to those present the exact object of the meeting; the necessity of forming a government to counteract the evils arising from the present state of things.

The following is the list voted, from which the members of the new government can be chosen. It will be observed that both Eguzquiza and Bedoya have been omitted in the list.

From the foregoing list live are to be selected, who will arrange with the allied Commissioners as to the public inauguration of the Government.

On the 18th General Castro and the other Orientals commemorated their country's independence. General Saustiano was unable to attend.

The Prince strikes his tents on the 29th July, and, it is believed, marches for Paraguay.

One thousand Brazilian troops of the garrison at Asuncion have been marched to the army at Tacuaral.

Deserters and women drop in from Lopez's lines daily; they all attest the misery which the families are suffering, and many affirm that Lopez is falling back on the mountains of Caaguazú.

Colonel Gaizca has arrived in Paraguay, and had an interview with Dr. Perez. He then passed out to Pirayú Cajón, to General Mitre's encampment.

The Cracker and Decidee are both lying off Asuncion.

Sr. Paranhos has left Asuncion for Pirayú, where he is busy conferring with the Prince and General Osorio on the state of affairs.

Dr. Roque Perez is still residing at the Hotel de la Paz, and is indefatigable in his exertions to bring about an arrangement, but it is feared the hostility which exists amongst the Paraguayans will defeat everything, and the only solution of the difficulty will be a strictly military Government.

re-established, I am anxious that you shall follow me in a toast to the welfare of the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay, under shelter of its Constitution, fraternity and union.

Dr. Perez proposed a toast to the Allied Armies.

Dr. Correa said—Three illustrious men have raised their voices, each one of them, in the name of their respective nations, and also in the name of that whom all are defending.

Colonel Iturburu rose again and said that precisely on this day, the 18th of July, three years ago, a distinguished Oriental general died on the field of battle.

Colonel Agüero drank to the health of His Highness the Commander-in-Chief of the Brazilian forces.

Dr. Perez said, that in his former toast he might have appeared to have committed a discourtesy in drinking to the allied nations and not for that of Paraguay, but he had done it intentionally, in order to make the latter the object of a special toast.

A rumor is current that Baron Manfredi is in another note to the Government couched in very strong terms, and it is generally understood that the Government is firm in its attitude.

The Patagonia arrived yesterday morning from the West Coast, and left in the afternoon.

The French packet arrived yesterday with latest news from Europe, and leaves for Buenos Ayres this afternoon.

The troubles in France are all over, but Italy seems on the verge of another outbreak. The American papers state that President Grant has disapproved of General Webb's conduct at Rio.

The Arno takes a good many passengers this time for Europe. Among them are Mr. Sorela Maury, the late Spanish Minister, also our old friend Captain David Bruce, Mr. Giebert of Fray Bentos, Mr. Black Junr., and some Englishmen from Frayle Muerto.

On Friday night there will be a great gathering of foreign residents at the Chiarini circus for the benefit of the British-Hospital. All the boxes are already sold, and even 'banetas' are at a premium.

Respecting the death of young Le Bas it is not correct as copied by the 'Standard' from the 'Siglo' that he was out a-fowling on Sunday; the accident occurred on Monday, and some of the details are incorrect.

A decree has been published this morning relieving Minister Bastamante of the extra portfolio of War and Marine, which he held 'pro tem' since the resignation of Goyo Suarez.

The Minister now appointed is Col. Juan Pablo Rebollo. The post of Gefe at Soriano has undergone a change, Col. Ordoñez being removed, but his successor is not yet named.

From Fray Bentos there is news of a visitation of small-pox. The Giebert factory is now working rather slack, and Mr. G. will return from Germany by November in time for the busy season.

Mr. Pealer reports the first reservoir of the new water-works finished, and has invited me to visit the works next week.

The Rev. Mr. Davis likes Montevideo very much, and has established his congregation at the Caridad chapel, where there is Mass and sermon every Sunday.

Not a dog is even to be seen now at Nembucu, once the commercial capital of Paraguay; the houses, unwilling to survive such a tempest of sorrow, are tumbling down of their own accord.

We now come upon the mouth of one of Paraguay's greatest rivers, the Ybicuará. Yonder bank was once fortified with cannon and defended by a noble Britisher, whose name will ever throw a lustre over the dismal history of this ruined land.

Long rows of bullock carts were here the prison cells of the first families of Asuncion, and the mockery of trial was gone through day and night.

The weather yesterday morning was intensely cold. The thermometer fell during Wednesday night to freezing point, and a southerly wind carried clouds of dust through our lane-like streets.

Owing to the present floodtide in the Paraguay, the Ybicuará is at present navigable above Villa Rica, but seven leagues from its mouth is the ancient town of Villa Franca, which when first founded was called Remolinos; on the hill tops we can see from the quarter deck the straw capilla of San Fernando and the remains of that memorable camp.

The news from Paraguay leads to the belief that many difficulties still lie in the way of establishing the Provisional Government.

Large consignments of horses arrive daily at Asuncion, and the army believes that more active service is soon in store for it. Sr. Paranhos was at headquarters conferring with the Commander-in-Chief, with a view of bringing civil arrangements to some satisfactory point.

We had a visit yesterday from a subscriber in the neighborhood of Flores. He informs us that the low-lying sheep runs in that neighborhood are nearly bare, in consequence of the long drought and constant frosts.

We had yesterday a visit from our New York correspondent 'Coro,' stating that not only has Gen. Webb's conduct in reference to the difference with the Brazilian Government on the Canada claims been disapproved of, and even condemned by General Grant, but he has also been severely censured for his want of diplomatic courtesy on this and several other occasions.

The sight of such consecutive ruin is tedious to the heart, and we willingly join Mr. Lisboa and Mr. Edward Perez in the humbling meal called "lunch!"

Palmas is the next point of importance. Here is the well-known encampment of Palmas. We see around the relics of the Argentine tents—miserable hovels made of shrubs and sticks.

Villa Oliva is a miserable deserted hamlet; not a soul to be seen about; yet, withal, the place has a sweet, pretty aspect from the river.

The French mail packet Anis arrived in port yesterday morning from Montevideo. The principal items of the news she brings we have already published.

We received our files of newspapers per Anis so late yesterday evening that we were obliged to defer extracting from them till to-morrow.

The French Imperial gunboat Decidee may be expected in this port in a few days, bringing from Asuncion the Foreign Consular Body 'en masse,' who, it appears, have determined to have nothing to do with the new Provisional Government.

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To those who purpose emigrating to the countries lying on the River Plate this book will be found of great value. It is the work of a citizen of Buenos Ayres, and appears to be quite accurate and trustworthy.

The Argentine Republic of Uruguay and Paraguay are described, their chief cities, agricultural and other resources, and the chances for immigration fairly told.

The book throughout contains much information of importance. In spite of domestic and foreign wars it is pleasant to learn that the number of immigrants into the Argentine Confederation increased from 4,658 in 1858 to 23,500 in 1868.

The material wealth of the country is also increasing with rapidity. It is, probably, in Paraguay, where the war is raging. Altogether the book gives us a better idea of the River Plate Republics than any other recent publication does.

Mr. Adolfo Jaeggli, the well known watchmaker at the corner of Potosí and Rivadavia, has just delivered the Government the new town clock for the go-ahead province of Santiago de Estero.

The enormous resources of the United States are shown by the Treasury report for the past financial year, which exhibits an excess of income over expenditure of no less than 30,000,000 of dollars.

In another column will be found the advertisement of the change in the time table of the Central Argentine Railway. The opening of the line to Chacabuco will now enable passengers to reach Cordoba by a single day's journey.

We remind our readers that to-morrow, the 31st, is the last day allowed for payment of the Contribution Directa Tax. Those who have not paid on that day will be rigorously fined.

We observe amongst the newest publications in Paris an interesting novel entitled 'Mota.' The author of this new work, which has been most favourably received by the literary world, is our friend Dr. Luis Ernest, and he has dedicated it to the well known pianist, Mr. Gottschalk, who is at present creating such a 'furore' in the capital of Brazil.

From Rosario we hear that the river has again commenced to rise. Between Monday evening and Tuesday morning last it had risen seven inches.

The Córdoba Legislature has passed a bill authorising the establishing of three new towns on the banks of the Rio Cinco.

A rumour was current yesterday that a hostile meeting, which has long been threatening between two well known editors, had come off in the morning in the Bois de Palermo. The arrival of one of the parties from Montevideo on Wednesday gave some color to the report, which we trust will prove unfounded.

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1st. There is not one word in his contract about the removal of obstructions. 2nd. The locality of his works would be close to the Catalinas current, covering a space of land and water not more than 500 or 600 acres, or somewhat less than a square mile, where to the best of my knowledge, there is not a single obstruction; but yet the port is at least two leagues square and studded with wrecks of all kinds.

In the third place, supposing that the removal of the wrecks were included in his contract, which is not the case, and further supposing that the Government should grant to Señor Madero what he claims, he would not be in duty bound to commence the works for one year after the contract was made with him, which added to the four years he would have to complete the work makes five years in all; and allowing for the present that his work will suffice for everything, which I think anybody can see at a glance it would not leave it to you to judge of the probable amount of property likely to be lost in this time—perhaps five times the amount of the price asked by me to clear the port of all wrecks, chains, anchors, &c., not speaking of the number of lives (very considerable as experience ought to have proved to Government long, very long ago) that might be sacrificed from the same cause.

The clearing of the port would also be of material advantage to Argentine commerce by relieving the community engaged in it of the policies now being paid to insurance companies, and converting this 'hell,' as sailors unambiguously term it, into a clear and unobstructed port.

In conclusion, gentlemen, and hoping you will excuse the lengthened form of the reply which your evidently unintentional statement of last Saturday has called forth from me,

Mr. Heberich in the Liverpool mail circular gives the following:— We have 22 in report a fall and a satisfactory state of affairs. Indeed the situation of the trade has been a very gratifying one up to the sales of October 25, prices at which have again ruled higher than for some time.
