GENERAL NEWS. The Archbishop of Canterbury is seriously ill. A telegram received from London on Friday night states that his grace has not spoken since Thursday morning.

The contest for the representation of Glasgow and Aberdeen Universities terminated on Friday, Mr. Gordon, the Conservative candidate, being returned. The late occupant of the seat, the Right Hon. J. Moncreiff, is a Liberal, so that the Tories have won a seat.

The polling for Waterford city takes place to-day. At the nomination, on Thursday, the show of hands was in favour of M. Bernal Osborne.

As Mr. Justice Hayes was leaving the Court of Queen's Bench on Friday, he was smitten by paralysis.

Letters have been received from Dr. Livingstone, dated July, 1869, announcing the discovery of what he considers the sources of the Nile. They were read before the Royal Geographical Society on the 8th of November. He directed his letters, &c., to be sent to Ujiji "till further notice."

Advices per Cape mail state that it was the general opinion in the colony that Dr. Livingstone is dead.

A Yokohama telegram of October 10th says the Duke of Edinburgh has proceeded to Peking, accompanied by Admiral Keppel.

The Berlin Borsen Zeitung states that a new loan for £800,000 is being negotiated with German bankers for Buenos Ayres, and that it will be brought out and placed exclusively in Germany, as existing agreements with Messrs. Baring Brothers & Co. preclude its being issued in England.

The Daily Telegraph, with an air of authority, says the public should understand that the speculations as to the Irish land measure occasionally put forth have been guesses only, and it is quite within the mark to state that each one of the circumstantial statements announced within the last few months as embodying the substance of the scheme contemplated by the Cabinet, contains hypotheses which err either by defect or by excess. All which can now be asserted with any confidence is that the ministerial proposals will embrace something more than a full recognition of the right to compensation for unexhausted improvements, and that they will apply to Ireland alone.

The project of a convention to establish a uniform system of coinage has now received, a Berne telegram states, the adhesion of the Spanish, French, Italian, Belgian, and Swiss Governments.

The annual conscription for the Russian army is ordered by an imperial decree to take place in January next, the number of conscripts to be four in every thousand of the population of the empire.

The insurrection in Dalmatia is not yet suppressed, but the Austrian troops have defeated the insurgents wherever they have come up with them.

Garibaldi is very ill of rheumatism at Caprera. His son Ricciotti has gone to Egypt to be present at the opening of the Suez Canal.

According to the latest intelligence from New Zealand the forces of the rebels are decreasing.

The Government of New South Wales proposes to borrow £1,600,000 to extend the railway system in that colony. The public revenue of the colony is increasing, and the Executive is persisting in its policy of retrenchment. In Victoria a change of Ministry has just taken place, but there is to be no change of policy. The revenue in this colony has increased £300,000 within the past twelve months. In South Australia the financial position is not so prosperous, as the budget which has just been presented by the Government shows a deficiency of £93,000.

Walter Brown, the champion sculler of America, who lately came to England for the purpose of "trying conclusions" with some of our crack oarsmen; made his debut on Friday in a contest on the Tyne with Win. Sadler, of London. The latter was defeated; but it must not be inferred from this that Brown has any pretensions to row such men as Reuforth or Kelley. Sadler is a good oarsman, but he does not stand in the front rank; so that our transatlantic friends will blunder if they regard Brown's victory on Friday as a proof of his superiority to our best rowers.

AMERICA.

The American papers state that Mr. Thornton, the British Minister at Washington, has been advised that the English Government is prepared to reduce the single rate of postage for prepaid letters between the United States and the United Kingdom to threepence, in accordance with the United States Post-master General. Philadelphia, Nov. 15.

A collision took place on the Western Pacific Railway near San Francisco, yesterday morning. From 10 to 15 persons were killed, and from 30 to 50 injured. The trains which came in contact were completely smashed. Great excitement has been caused in San Francisco by the accident.

The Alabama and the Tennessee Legislatures have given their decision upon the proposed amendment of the federal constitution by extending the suffrage to negroes, the former having ratified and the latter rejected the proposition.

The abundant character of the late harvest in the United States continues to be indicated by the receipts of grain from the interior. The arrivals of wheat at New York during the first ten months of the present year have been 17,868,000 bushels, against 9,173,000 in the same period of 1868, and 6,098,000 in 1867; while of flour the total has been 2,645,000 barrels, against 2,240,000 in 1868, and 1,900,000 in 1867. The exports of wheat during the period have reached the extraordinary total of 15,736,000 bushels, against 4,628,000 in 1868, and 2,706,000 in 1867. Ottawa, Nov. 17.

The French residents in the Red River country have armed and banded themselves together to resist the cession of their territory to Canada. They forcibly compelled the governor, Mr. McDougall, to cross the boundary into Dacotah territory, where he now awaits assistance or instructions

from the Canadian Government. The insurgents demand separate territorial government and an elective legislature.

It appears that in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1869, 760,000,000 letters passed through the mails of the United States, being an increase of 40,000,000 over any previous year. This is about 20 letters per head for every man, woman, and child in the United States.

OPENING OF THE SUEZ CANAL.

Port Said, Nov. 16, Evening. The fêtes in inauguration of the Suez Canal have commenced by religious ceremonies in the open air, which were performed both by the Ulema and the Catholic priests. The latter were concluded by a speech and benediction from Monsignore Bauer, the almoner of the Empress Eugenie. Great enthusiasm prevailed. The Viceroy and his Ministers, the Empress Eugenie, the Austrian Emperor, the Princes of Prussia, Holland, and Hesse, the diplomatic representatives of all nations, as well as an immense concourse of distinguished visitors, were present. Ismailia, Nov. 17, Evening.

The Imperial yacht Aigle, with the Empress Eugenie on board; the Austrian, Prussian, and Dutch royal yachts, with their respective princes; the Psyche, with the English ambassadors and admiral on board, followed by the Newport and Rapid, in all a fleet of 40 vessels, arrived here this afternoon from Port Said, and are now at their moorings. The journey through this half of the canal has been performed in eight hours. Four good sized steamers have likewise arrived here from Suez to-day. The maritime canal has thus been traversed by sea-going vessels throughout. Great rejoicing and festivities are taking place. Ismailia is splendidly illuminated. The Khedive and his royal guest are expected to land here to-night.

Ismailia, Nov. 18. The entry of the flotilla of vessels into the Lake of Ismailia has been achieved most successfully, there being every where a good depth of water, from 30 to 40 fathoms actually moored in the lake. To-morrow morning the flotilla will proceed to Suez.

A banquet was given here yesterday by M. de Lesseps to the members of the commercial congress, the chambers of commerce, and the directors of the Suez Canal Company. M. de Lesseps delivered a speech, in which he said—"The work of the canal is completed. It is now necessary that the present administration of justice in Egypt, which paralyses the resources of the company and obstructs commerce, should be reformed. The Egyptian Government is willing to effect the necessary reforms in union with the Great Powers, but I regret to state that the French Government is the one which opposes the greatest resistance to the projects put forward for that purpose, and which are so indispensable to the company, to the foreign residents, and to the natives." M. de Lesseps concluded by stating that the board of directors of the Suez Canal Company have drawn up a petition to the French Government demanding the reforms referred to, and he expressed hopes that all interested would give their support to this petition. M. de Lesseps' speech was well received, and the president of the Lloyd's Company promised to support the petition. Upwards of 40 sea-going ships are now in the harbour, the largest being a Russian frigate drawing 17 feet 2 inches of water.

The festivities were continued to-day. The royal yacht Deerhound, with Sir Stafford Northcote and Sir George Starkey on board, has arrived here. Ismailia, Thursday Noon.

Thirty-four steamers have already reached Ismailia, and others are arriving. Between this point and Port Said, the shallowest part of the canal is 19 feet, but the soundings for the most part register from 25 to 30 feet. The general arrangements of the inauguration are excellent. The Khedive's special guests number 3,000 Europeans and 25,000 Orientals. No expense is spared to enhance the magnificence of the fêtes. Ismailia, Nov. 18, Evening.

The Empress Eugenie has been out on a camel to witness the shooting and riding feats of the Arabs. The tents are five times as numerous as on an average meeting of the volunteers at Wimbledon. All the entertainments are open to Europeans, and refreshment is gratuitously provided. Lake Timseh is magnificently illuminated. There will be a grand ball to-night. The Empress will proceed up the canal at noon to-morrow.

Altogether the number of vessels which have reached Ismailia is 47, and the average size is 1,000 tons. Ismailia, Nov. 19, Morning.

A grand ball was given here last night, which was a most brilliant entertainment. The Imperial and Royal guests and 3,000 persons are said to have been present.

The native fétes were also magnificent, and 20,000 Arabs arrived here. The shipping in the harbour now numbers upwards of 50 vessels. The Empress Eugenie rode out yesterday on horseback, and was greeted with much cheering. The fleet of vessels which assisted at the inauguration of the canal will sail this afternoon, the Aigle leading, and will cast anchor this evening near

the lighthouse south of the Bitter Lakes, proceeding to-morrow to the Red Sea.

The Daily News enters into some calculations to show that the prospects of the shareholders in the Suez Canal are not very favourable. There must be 3,000,000 tons of shipping passed through to pay 5 per cent., while the total tonnage passing between the East and the various countries of Europe and America does not exceed altogether 4,000,000 tons, Australia being excluded, as the canal will be of little advantage to that colony. Moreover, the sailing ships by the Cape, which possess about seven-eighths of the trade, will not without an effort be beaten out of the field by the steamers on the canal.

A telegram has been received by Messrs. Handyside and Henderson, of Glasgow, to the effect that their screw steamer Dido arrived at Ismailia on the morning of Thursday, en route for Suez. The Dido is the first British merchant vessel to pass through the canal.

LATEST TELEGRAMS. Paris, Nov. 19. A rumor is current that an interview will take place at Nice next month between the Emperor Napoleon and the Czar.

The rumors respecting the Ministerial changes asserted by the journals of this morning are contradicted.

The Gaulois and Figaro mention reports of ministerial modifications, but state that nothing certain is known. The koppel says M. Barbes and Felix Pyat, the nonjuring candidates, intend to proceed with their canvass.

Paris, Nov. 19, Evening. A letter of yesterday's date, addressed by M. Emile Olivier to an elector of the third circonscription, and recommending the candidature of M. Poyner Quartier, has been published this evening. "I urge my friends," says M. Emile Olivier, "to prefer Mr. Poyner Quartier to all those sporting tribunes who, from London or elsewhere, fatigue us with their poor declamations. The only means of defeating the party which desires revolution is, even if it cost us our liberty, to rally round those who desire liberty without revolution. Our adversaries are more vanquished than ourselves, and have not the consolation of being left up-standing. They are hooted, as I myself have been hooted. Their unpopularity will increase, and they have become as powerless to serve the cause of liberty as that of revolution." The letter concludes as follows:—"Struggle you must. Never bend your head before demagogues. It were better to succumb entirely." Madrid, Nov. 19, Evening.

Martial law will continue in force a few days longer. In the Cortes to-day the bill ordering elections for the seats at present vacant was again discussed. During the debate, signs were disclosed of a possible rupture of the understanding at present subsisting between the Unionists and the Progressives. The Imparcial states that Señor Figuerola, the Minister of Finance, is certain of being in a position to meet the payment of the next coupons of the external and internal debt. Turin, Nov. 19.

The university has been closed on account of turbulent demonstrations made by the students. Florence, Nov. 19. In to-day's sitting of the Chamber of Deputies, Signor Lanza, candidate of the Left party, was elected President of the house by 169 votes, against 129 given to Signor Mari, the Ministerial candidate. Signor Pisanelli, candidate of the Left, has been elected Vice-President of the chamber.

The Duke d'Aosta has gone to Brindisi to visit those who were injured at the accident on board the Castelldarado, and the duchess has gone to Turin.

Vienna, Nov. 18. The New Free Press learns—that what authority is not satisfied that in consequence of the unsatisfactory nature of the answer of the Khedive, the Sultan has directed Aali Pasha to send a commissioner to Alexandria after the conclusion of the Suez Canal opening ceremonies with an ultimatum. In this document the Khedive will be summoned unreservedly to accept the conditions laid down by the Porte.

Berlin, Nov. 19. The Upper House of the Diet discussed to-day the motion of Herr von Balow relative to the introduction of the tobacco monopoly throughout the territory of the Customs Union, and the proposal of the committee recommending this monopoly to the Government was ultimately adopted. At the commencement of the debate the Minister of commerce read a declaration stating that the Government must decline to take part in any detailed discussion of the present motion, and adding that in deference to the allied Governments, and taking into consideration the present condition of affairs, it was the duty of the Prussian Government to forbear entering upon a debate which might give rise to a feeling of uncertainty among the trading and commercial interests affected by this question.

Plymouth, Nov. 19. The Hamburg and American Company's steamer Cimbria, from New York, has arrived here with 153 passengers, 48 cases of mails, and \$10,841 in specie. She landed eight passengers, and proceeded for Cherbourg and Hamburg. The mails were forwarded by the 2.15 a.m. train.

Queenstown, Friday. The Cunard royal mail steamer Cuba, from New York on the 10th instant, arrived at midnight. Having landed the mails, except those for Liverpool and Scotland, passengers, &c,

she proceeded immediately for Liverpool. All well.

New York, Nov. 19. Advices from Cuba state that the insurgents are destroying the plantations in the neighbourhood of Trinidad and Cienfuegos.

Plymouth, Nov. 19. The Union Company's mail steamer Saxon, with the Cape mail, has arrived here.

A reef has been found at the entrance of Table Bay harbour which will delay the opening of the docks for some time.

Mr. Molteni's proposed increased customs bill has been thrown out in the Legislative Council by a majority of one.

It is proposed to present the freedom of the city of London to the King of the Belgians before he leaves this country.

The Marquis de Butte has signified his intention of subscribing £1,000 towards the building fund of the new Glasgow University.

Newuid, Nov. 16. The marriage of Prince Charles of Roumania and the Princess Elizabeth of Neuid was celebrated yesterday in the presence of the Queen of Prussia, the Grand Duchess of Baden, the Count and Countess of Flanders, all the members of the Hohenzollern family, as well as the representatives of the principal Sovereigns of Europe.

Gold won't go up; notwithstanding all the brokers say, large sales have been made at 124,450, and even at 124,400. Gold keeps coming up fast from the River Plate. There are some parties in Buenos Ayres who well know this market;—they know how to pull the cords, and nothing escapes them.

Exchange is at 19½ and 19¾.

All that was said about heavy army drafts amounts to nothing. There may be heavy balances due, but we can all now see the end of the bill and know how much it amounts to. There are few probabilities of much gold being shipped from this to the Plate. The Minister prefers taking drafts, which can be had at a very fair rate. Merchants say that instead of gold being shipped to the Plate, we may expect large specie remittances from Buenos Ayres and Montevideo during the next three months.

Several distinguished Brazilians and foreign residents purpose spending a month or so this summer in the Plate. I could send you a list, but perhaps it is better not to publish it.

Gomez Pereira is in his quinta. There is a lawsuit going on, but most people think Pereira will win.

Caxias will shortly leave for Europe. Señor Paranhos, it is said, will also make a trip to Europe shortly after his return from Paraguay.

The new tramway is doing well, and will shortly run out to TIJUCA.

MONTEVIDEO. GOYO SUAREZ AGAIN IN THE FIELD. Saturday.

Last night an officer named Lopez arrived from Tacuarembó with despatches for the Government; it seems General Goyo Suarez is inclined again to give trouble. The day of the elections at Tacuarembó he marched upon that town at the head of a body of 150 gauchos whom he had gathered together from all parts of the country, besides two divisions of camp police that he had annexed to his forces. The Gefe of Tacuarembó was alarmed at such a display, and sent orders to Suarez not to allow any of his followers to cross the arroyo that forms the outskirts of the town. At the same time Major Mendicti and nine commissaries were ordered to take measures for the defence of the place. Goyo Suarez replied to the intimation of the Gefe, demanding an explanation of the prohibition, which he said was contrary to the laws and liberties of the Republic. The Gefe replied that the strangers were not voters on the district electoral list, and had, therefore, no business in Tacuarembó. At length General Suarez quietly broke up his forces, as if convinced of the error of his ways. The Government, meantime, does not seem satisfied with the occurrence, and the Tribuna says, it is rumored that a detachment of 100 men, belonging to the Second Chasseurs, is to march at once for Tacuarembó, under the orders of Colonel Balleiras.

The Hipparchus has made a fine run this time of twenty-eight days, and brings out some old Buenos Ayrean residents, who have been for a time sojourning in Europe.

Minister Bustamante has written a reply to Maximó Perez, relative to the petition signed by 4,000 citizens, requesting the Government to press forward the judicial enquiry with the view of discovering the parties concerned in the assassination of Flores. The Government has not lost sight of the matter, and the investigation will be duly proceeded with.

There is talk of the foreign residents getting up a race-meeting for New Year's day. A great match is to be run between Tacuarembó and Azulejo, the latter a new horse, two rounds of the course.

The Telegrapho complains that the new railway breaker at the Aguada is doing much prejudice to our port, and will cause it gradually to fill up. A dredging-machine is spoken of as absolutely indispensable.

The city mortality of yesterday was very low: one foreigner, one native, and four children.

Mme. Carozzi had a great ovation on Thursday night in the opera of Norma, and was well supported by the Chilean cantatrice, Mme. Escalante, in the part of Adalgisa.

The accounts of the wheat crop from all quarters are most flattering, and it is thought that the Banda Oriental will be a large exporter of grain next year.

The English brig lost last week off Solis Chico was the Forest Queen from Swansea with coal for this port: the two survivors have arrived.

The steamer Golden Horn from Naples arrived at Bahia with 600 emigrants for Buenos Ayres: she is a vessel of about 1,800 tons.

Last night there was an attempt to plunder the English ship Silistria, the pirates trying to bribe the crew. The captain noticed a boat come alongside with two men, whereupon he shot one and captured the other. The former is supposed to be drowned; the prisoner proves an Englishman.

The Port Captain is constructing an iron mole on the W. side of the new custom-house: it is intended for men-of-war's boats.

A Portuguese corvette, called Duques de Forceyra, has arrived from Rio.

The news brought by the Hipparchus is of general interest, though politically there is nothing of primary importance. In France the agitation caused by the attitude of the Republic party is inducing the moneyed classes to send their surplus capital to England for investment in Consols till things settle down; the most reassuring feature in the situation is that the army remains indifferent, and in fact hostile to the outrageous pretensions of the extreme party. The condition of Ireland is deplorable, murders are increasing in a most alarming manner. Our telegraphic despatch on Saturday contained the chief items of commercial intelligence which is in general favourable.

We find by our exchanges that the Directors of the Buenos Ayres Southern Railway declared at the late meeting a dividend at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum, for the past half year. Argentine Government securities have risen one quarter to one half on the London stock Exchange.

Madamé Gasc appeared on Sunday night at the Italian Opera House as Lucia in Donizetti's magnificent composition of that name. We have no hesitation in saying, that she has exceeded all her previous impersonations in her rendering of this difficult role. Her conception of the character leaves nothing to be desired, and she brought all the resources of her fine voice to aid her in presenting us with a Lucy such as none of her predecessors on these boards have surpassed or perhaps equalled. In the mad scene, on which the success of the character may be said to depend, both her singing and acting were perfect and endured for her at its conclusion a perfect storm of applause and a double recall on the falling of the curtain. Lelmi surpassed himself, and we have never seen an audience so electrified as it was, as that of Sunday night seemed to be by his unusually correct and energetic acting in the wedding scene; the famous quintette was admirably given and all the leading performers were recalled at the end of the act. Lelmi sang the famous 'fra poco' in the last act magnificently, its effect was somewhat marred, however, by the bad taste exhibited by a portion of the audience who noisily commenced withdrawing before the curtain fell. We have to congratulate the managers of the Colon theatre on the decided success achieved by their company on Sunday night.

We find the following respecting the new steamer Isabella in the columns of a London colleague. "The new screw steamer, recently built and fitted up by Messrs. J. Wigham Richardson & Co., on the Tyne, made a satisfactory trial on November 8. She is commanded by Captain G. S. Barris, is the property of Messrs. A. Cerranti tu Antonio & Co., of Genoa, and is intended to trade to Rio de la Plata.

Goyo Suarez is causing the Montevidean Government renewed uneasiness. His movements lately in the vicinity of Tacuarembó have been such as to induce the authorities to despatch a small force thither in order to be prepared for eventualities.

The Favon arrived yesterday from Asuncion with the 6th Regiment of the Line on board. It is supposed they will remain on shipboard till the National Guards arrive, and enter the city with the latter corps on the day of their public reception, for which such extensive preparations are being made.

The number of vessels entered inwards on Sunday was unusually large, being about forty sailing ships and steamers from all quarters of the globe.

The wreck returns at Lloyd's since the month of August last show the value of steamers, with their cargoes, lost up to this date to be over a million sterling. The number of these vessels lost within the above time was twenty-five.

By our advices per this mail, we see that the Royal mail steamer City of Limerick, Captain Corbett, which left here with mails on 17th October, arrived in England on 18th November, thus making the extraordinary run home of 28 days and a few hours. On the homeward voyage such speed has seldom before been attained.

The latest advices from Annelón represent the situation of that city as daily becoming worse, and "Argos," the talented correspondent of the Tribuna, can liken it to nothing but a veritable hell upon earth. The people are still dying from hunger and misery, and it is expected that on the departure of the allied armies matters will become worse than at present. The Provisional Government can do nothing; and the taxes are insufficient to make both ends meet. "Argos" does not believe in the final defeat of Lopez, and thinks that the moment the Allies turn their backs on Paraguay he will not be long in finding his way back to Asuncion and to power.

The Gualeguay branch of the Entre Riano Bank is about to secede from the parent institution. It is said it will amalgamate with the Banco Commercial. The National Guards were to embark on Sunday last at Asuncion; we may therefore expect them here towards the end of the week.
