Montevideo, April 25, 6 p.m.

The Copernicus arrived in port this afternoon with European papers to March 30th.

Political—nothing fresh. 125 oxen per the Ariadne sold for £5 sterling, each, and 290 sheep fetched ten shillings and sixpence each, and six horses £11 10s. each.

THE RACES.

AUTUMN MEETING.

Nothing has a greater effect upon the spirits than sunshine and genial air, a fine day does more for a race meeting than anything else; who can enter into the spirit of the course if roasted alive under a broiling sun, or choked to death with dust, but Sunday was an especial day; it was not only charmingly fine, it was pictorial; never have we seen Belgrano so such advantage as on Sunday.

Sweet Auburn, loveliest village of the plain. Verily Belgrano on a fine day is a lovely place, the houses look neat and comfortable, the streets lined with paradise trees form graceful avenues, and the gardens rich with exotics indicate the wealth and taste of the villagers.

This was a foregone conclusion, and the only speculation was confined to the respective merits of Carguero and Kingston. The latter who had been freely backed by the friends of the stable, was nowhere. Othello took the lead, and won in a canter, although carrying 13 lbs. overweight; that is giving 13 lbs. to Carguero. Time 2-25.

Provincial Prize.—Hurdle Race. Entry \$500, with \$7,000 to the first, and \$3,000 to the second horse. One round and a-half, with eight flights of hurdles. 150 lbs. Winners of a hurdle race to carry 5 lbs. extra. Gentlemen riders.

Mr. Burmeister's ns Adios, pan-garé. 1 Mr. Glover's ns Ituzaingo, Colorado 2 Mr. Casares' ns Cimarron, malacará. 3

The two favorites were Adios and Cimarron, and the betting between these two horses was kept up very briskly. Ituzaingo was the first to take the fences, and with one or two exceptions knocked them down, giving his competitors easy work. The stewards had arranged that the last hurdle in front of the Grand Stand should be left standing, so as to give the people in the Grand Stand an opportunity of seeing the horses jump.

The road from town to the course was thronged during the day, coaches, omnibuses, and bread carts were all called into requisition; possibly the most attractive vehicle on the course was an Irish jaunting car which fairly took the shine out of all. In mute astonishment many gazed upon the car as some Mendicant attempt at improvement on the velocipede. Ireland for ever with the sky over it, the "low backed car," shot along the road with a velocity that bewildered the Jehus, the outside car was the novelty of the day, and yet it is far more ancient than the Argentine Republic.

At half past one o'clock the races began, the Stand house was then sparsely occupied, but between two and three o'clock crowds arrived by train, carriage after carriage rolled up, and at three o'clock every seat on the Stand house was occupied; there were few ladies; those who did attend spread sunshine on the course, many of the ladies preferred their coaches to the Stand house which is a mistake, the receipts at the gate reached over \$20,000. Watson held his own beneath the Stand house, his lunch was the theme of universal approbation, charges most moderate and every delicacy of the season on the groaning table.

The following was the order of running:—

Belgrano Prize.—Sweepstakes for horses that have never run in a public meeting of the Jockey Club. Entry \$700, with \$7,000 to the first, and \$3,000 to the second horse. Twice round: 125 lbs.—half-breeds 3 lbs. extra. Third horse to save his stake.

Mr. Crawford's ns Porteno, lobano, 1 Mr. Casares' Pegasus, alazan. 2 Mr. T. Livingston's ns Misterioso, picasso. 3 Mr. H. Varela's Pantano, overo. 4 Mr. A. Alsina's ns Yataý, sebruno. 5 Pegasus, a splendidly made half-bred, both from his appearance and the fame of the stable from which he came, was a decided favorite with the public.

Under the auspices of peace and cordiality towards the Entre-Riño people I landed on this part of Argentine territory in presence of the yet warm corpse of General Urquiza, who was brutally assassinated by one that presumed in this manner to seize the chair of Governor and take the place of the hero of Caseros. The mission of my army is one of peace and morality, to prevent the violation of Argentine neutrality by bands of filibusters crossing over to Banda Oriental, and to avenge the barbarous crime of San José, for which Lopez Jordan audaciously declared himself responsible.

As a pledge of the sincerity of the National Government my first word to the people of Entre Ríos was to desire the militia of the various departments to return to their homes until called out. I was determined to observe the utmost prudence not to hurt in any way the sentiments or susceptibilities of the people of the Province; and now General Lopez Jordan throws down the gauntlet not only to the National Government but to the whole Republic, to the entire Argentine people, who have protested against a Government based on assassination and upheld by audacity.

In return for such an outrage and such a crime I reply by taking up the challenge of this assassin-Governor who hopes to escape the arm of Justice.

The people of Gualeguaychu were the first to ignore a Government based on crime, and called on Lopez Jordan to resign. His reply is a declaration of war the consequences of which must fall on this fine Province, but he will soon have to answer for the bloodshed caused by his insane ambition.

Entre-Riños! Be not deceived. The war provoked by Lopez Jordan, the murderer of the hero of Caseros, is not against a party or circle, but against the whole Republic, and against the National Government which had inaugurated for all of us an epoch of peace, progress and industry.

Whoever ranges himself under the blood-stained banner of Lopez Jordan becomes an accomplice in the rebellion against the Federal authority and in the horrid deed of blood that is lamented by the whole Republic. Whoever, on the other hand, takes the post of duty and patriotism, by standing up for the law and public morality, will be rewarded by the Argentine nation according to the deserts of a brave soldier and good citizen.

To arms, then, soldiers of Entre Ríos! Take your stand beside the Federal army. The National Government, by virtue of the Constitution, calls upon all the National Guards of Entre Ríos to hasten to my side, so that we may speedily put down the assassin who declares war to the people and Government of the Argentine Republic.

I shall be glad to share with you the glory of the struggle and call myself your friend and general.

José María Mosquera, one of Urquiza's murderers, the same whom Lola Urquiza wounded in the face, has already expiated his crime. He was going towards Gualeguay with

I am, lance in hand, to defend the right. If you wish to be slaves remain at home; if you would be free, then follow me. I have already around me two thousand valiant patriots who prefer death to dishonor. We take up arms merely to uphold the rights of Entre Ríos against the invaders who think to trample on us as they have done in the other Provinces. The proof is, that up to the present we respected the Federal authorities and custom-houses, according to my programme.

Entre-Riños! Your representatives have elected me to defend the Constitution, and the invaders come to trample on your Government, your Legislature and the Constitution. To arms, then! The honor and liberty of Entre Ríos are at stake. I should be a wretch only worthy of your contempt did I hesitate to take up a lance and make the enemy bite the dust.

Soldiers and men of Entre Ríos! It is war since they will not let us have peace. A short and glorious struggle will give us days of happiness, liberty and progress. He who will not stand up for Entre Ríos is a traitor. He who takes up arms will receive a patriot's laurel. Death rather than Slavery! These are the wishes of your Constitutional Governor and friend.

Ricardo Lopez Jordan April 23rd 1870. At the same time (Saturday) of issuing the proclamation Lopez Jordan started from Concepcion with all his forces, 800 men, to seize the artillery at Calá, which it is hoped has been already removed by Colonel Taborada, who has declared for the National Government.

General Emilio Mitre, on receiving the above proclamation replied at once with a similar manifesto, viz: The Commander-in-Chief of the Federal forces to the People of Entre Ríos.

From Concordia there is nothing new. The Chief of Police, Mr. Mouricio Quereñoco, keeps that town very quiet. They are awaiting the results of the National intervention. Every-body is under arms. I suppose you know it was in Concordia that the revolution commenced.

I hear Major Vica is getting together all the men he can in this department to help the Concordians in their revolutionary notions. The National Government will have enough to do to subject the fellows in and about Concordia, as they have got together a good many men to uphold Lopez Jordan.

We have not heard a single word from the invaders of this department for some days past. The National Guard is under arms at night only, and there is the Battalion 24th of April, lately arrived from Paraguay, nearly 200 strong, and 2 Bue pieces of artillery in barracks here at present. Business dull. River rising fast.

Our very active Chief of Police, Goyo Castro, has chartered the steamer Concordia, and made her a man-of-war to guard the coast between this and Paysandu.

The townspeople of Paraná, under date Thursday 21st, have made a vigorous protest against the murder of Urquiza and the accession of Lopez Jordan, and declared themselves for Federal intervention.

Advices from Corrientes mention that the 5th batt. under Col. Levalle landed at that city. The 1st batt. received orders to join the 5th and will by this time be also in Corrientes.

A telegram from Minister Iriondo at Santa Fé dated 1. 20 yesterday (Monday) morning brings the following news— "At 4 p.m. I left General Conesa at Paraná, when despatches just came in from La Paz, Hornandarias and Villaguay, announcing that Denis Marsden, Mendez and Gonzalez had marched to join Colonel Navarro, their united columns making up 2,500 men. They will incorporate with Navarro, to-morrow, and the latter with a small escort is to proceed to a certain place to confer with Gen. Conesa previous to commencing operations. The Gefe at Villaguay is Velasquez who receives orders from Navarro.

"I am now embarking troops here, and at Rosario there are 500 infantry and 200 carabineers ready. I have telegraphed to Governor Cabal about hipping them at once. We are organizing a reserve force, here as arranged with General Conesa. The authorities at Paraná lend the General every assistance and the neighbours offer him all their horses: the Nat. Guards bring their own horses. The General is very active."

THE GRASERIA OF ALMIRANO. Saturday. The funeral of M. Rouault de Colligny, commander of the French gunboat Bruix, took place yesterday; the cortege comprised marine detachments from the war-vessels of all flags in port, under their respective officers. The coffin was covered with the tricolor, and borne by French blue-jackets. The French Admiral was chief mourner and pronounced a short speech over the grave, at the English cemetery, after which a farewell salute was fired and the sad ceremonial concluded.

Count D'Eu arrived to-day and was received with a salute of 21 guns from San José fort. A grand Te Deum was sung at the Matriz for the conclusion of the Paraguayan war. Two battalions of Oriental infantry and a detachment of artillery lined the streets, and the 1st reg. of National Guards accompanied President Battle as a guard of honor to visit the Prince.

IMPORTANT FROM PARAGUAY. We have files from Asuncion to the 21st. General Caballero has at length submitted and surrendered. He himself, and his 45 officers and men as prisoners of war, to the Brazilians. Count D'Eu had given strict orders that no Brazilian should kill him; as Caballero was remarkable for his kindness to prisoners and good faith throughout the campaign. He and his men are now at Asuncion.

General Vedia has received full powers, as Argentine representative, and the first session of the Allied Commissioners was held on the 21st. The elections for President and Vice-President of Paraguay, will probably result in an arrangement between the opposing parties, making Rivarola President, and Candido Barreiro Vice-President.

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station and has a fall to an adjacent lagoon, leaving the factory free from bad smell or other inconvenience. The machinery comprises—1st, a cylinder for a fifty-horse engine, 2nd two revolving vats, 3rd the wheels for moving them, 4th the deposits for the grease, 5th a four-horse engine which can pump up 100 pipes of water daily from two wells into a large tank on the top of the factory; from this tank the water is turned into the vats or any other part of the establishment, especially to the place where the tripe is washed, and this work is done with great care. In fact the tallow of this graseria always sells at a premium.

There is an apparatus also connected with the engine to lift up the carcasses of the sheep, two at a time, to the mouth of the vats, a height of twenty-five feet; the vats hold 280 fat sheep or 400 lean ones. When the vat is three-quarters full, steam is begun to be applied, and when filled it is closed; four hours' steaming concludes the operation, after which it takes one and a-half to two hours to let off the steam. After opening the vat a valve is turned midway up, from which the grease and water are poured into different compartments of a deposit, and the water is subsequently let off by a cock, while the grease is also turned off into coolers, and when sufficiently cool is put into pipes.

It is only the work of two or three minutes to turn the vats upside down so as to remove any matter at the bottom, and this is done by four men, the vats working on an axis. The vats are again ready to be filled; one of them is called the Magdalena, the other Dolores, after the partidos from which the first sheep arrived for melting down. The steaming operation requires forty-five to fifty-two pounds pressure, which is difficult with such poor fuel as the flesh of animals after the grease has been extracted. It is remarkable that when the bones are finally taken out of the vats they are as bare and whitened as if they had been centuries under the soil.

We observed to the proprietor, Don Pedro Guerin, that, instead of having a man to open and shut the vats, there should be a regulator to do the work, but he informed us that it was the fault of the founder. This is the only improvement that could be suggested. Mr. Guerin is very polite to visitors, and his factory is a great advantage to the southern districts of Buenos Ayres.

The Altamirano Grasería is one of those rising industries which indicate the real progress of this country. The machinery, which is on a new and comprehensive system, was all made at the workshops of Messrs. Stevens & Kay in Pasco Julio. The whole establishment is in every sense Argentine, and due to the brains and capital of an enterprising Frenchman. Such men as Guerin merit success, and we are happy to say that since the establishment has commenced working the business has given excellent results. Parties engaged in the graseria trade who have seen Guerin's vats and machinery and their excellent and economical working have been so pleased that they are now adopting the Guerin system. The want of a regulator necessitates the employment of extra hands. This defect we pointed out to Mr. Guerin, who informed us that Mr. Stevens, previous to his leaving for Europe, promised to supply the defect. We call the attention of Messrs. Stevens & Kay to this matter; the machinery reflects the highest credit on the firm and only requires the regulator to be every way perfect.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The die is cast, and another civil war is about to be added to the catalogue of similar disasters that the annals of South American record. The "chiripa" is collecting its forces and girding up its loins for a last struggle with civilization, a contest that will end in its annihilation and a final establishing of the cause of law and order throughout the Confederation. The madness often inspired by a losing and condemned cause has induced General Lopez Jordan to refuse all advice and declare war against the nation. Nothing remains for the National Government but to follow with all its powers and resources the course it has entered on with the approbation of all, and by rapid and decisive blows put an end for ever to the pretensions or future possibility of rebellion based on the worst of crimes, assassination. In another column we publish the exciting news received yesterday morning from Entre Ríos. Jordan says the National authorities must be made to bite the dust, and indulges in much similar bombast. Mosquera, the cowardly assassin of General Urquiza, whose face was slashed open by the heroic Lola in the endeavor to defend her father, has been himself set upon and killed by the partisans of the late Governor, and it is clear that the flourishing province of Entre Ríos is
