Montevideo, May 15. 5.15 p. m.

The Douro arrived here this morning.

OPENING OF CONGRESS.

As announced, Congress was formally opened on Sunday by Pres. Sarmiento. Although the day was cloudy and the streets ankle deep in mud, there was a good muster of idlers outside the Congress building, and inside, the galleries destined for the public were crowded in every corner. The muster of Senators and Deputies was very large; of the Corps Diplomatique only the Italian and Spanish Ministers, 'en grande tenue,' were present, while there was a good sprinkling of general and field officers in full uniform.

civil and military authorities. A deputa-

tion of Congressmen received the President on his stepping out of the carriage, and accompanied him to the interior of the building. Shortly afterwards the President and his suite entered the Sessions Hall, and the former took a seat to the right of Dr. Alsina, the President of the Senate.

After rising to salute the Chambers, he sat down again and read his message in a clear, emphatic manner, occupying about three quarters of an hour. It was listened to with great attention by all, and only towards the conclusion, where he gave his motives for not expatiating upon the Entre Rios revolt, which he styled a criminal accident, a general applause from the body of the house and galleries testified the general approbation. There was a so much cheering when the message came to an end.

We give below a full translation of this remarkable message, in our opinion the best ever delivered by any President of the republic.

Fellow-Citizens of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies!

The conclusion of the war imposed upon us by the tyrant of Paraguay is the most important historical event of this continent during the past year. The world looked on with wonder at the duration of this struggle, and even now good sense militates against a full belief in the many barbarous acts and in the inveterate obstinacy of a sanguinary enemy, which has mainly contributed to this prolongation.

Paraguay, open to-day to the influence of civilization, and in free contact with all nations, is beginning to assume republican institutions, and will soon repair the ravages of the war and of the hereditary tyranny that has weighed upon the country.

Peace has been restored by the triumph of the allied arms; ere long all the episodes of this truly extraordinary war will belong to the domain of history, leaving us with the desire to see our country reach the independence, prosperity and liberty of so unfortunate a people.

The administrative year of which I have to give you an account would have been the most prosperous and tranquil that the Republic has ever enjoyed, if an odious crime and the rebellion of its chief perpetrator had not a few days ago cast a sinister shadow over the bright picture I am about to lay before you. This shadow will, however, pass away; and since dissipated, whether by the good feeling of the citizens, or by the arms of the Nation, we shall be able to consider as positive facts or as real promises for the future, the improvements and details of which will find in the several reports of the Ministers.

FOREIGN OFFICE.

The quotations of Argentine Bonds in the London money market are a test of the credit of the Republic in Europe, as far as concerns its capacity and desire of fulfilling financial liabilities; but there is a moral credit of nations which cannot be quoted in the money markets, which the Republic can boast of to a high degree, having enlisted in its favor the good opinion of the civilized world, which watches with benevolent eye our rapid progress, and believes us already exempt from the state of disorder to which we seemed to be doomed.

The cordiality of our relations with the governments of other nations is based upon this good opinion, and shows an anxiety not only to avoid obtruding any obstacle, but, on the contrary, to help the Argentine Government in the noble task of developing the valuable resources of the country.

Several treaties have been made with some nations and others are being negotiated, while almost all those which Y.H. sanctioned during the late legislative period have been ratified.

The most perfect harmony has existed between the allied powers during the war against the Paraguayan tyrant, and continues unalterable after victory.

The plenipotentiaries of the three nations allied are occupied in arranging by common accord the terms of peace with the present Paraguayan Government, until a competent authority is created, which may ratify the definitive treaties alluded to in that of 1st May, 1865.

HOME OFFICE.

Providence has showered its favors with a profuse hand upon our country this year, vouchsafing victory to our arms, fertilizing our fields with copious rains, filling our ports with vessels loaded with the product of human industry, and inspiring the peoples and their governments with the desire of continuing to deserve this visible protection by practical justice in respect for the law, and perseverance in labor which develops and turns to account nature's gifts.

The public tranquillity which had reigned throughout the country during the past year has lately been disturbed; but the position attained by the Republic induces the hope that it will not in future be altered, after our having crushed the criminal rebellion of one who murdered the Governor of Entre Rios to take his place.

RAILWAYS.

The Argentine Republic was for a long time far behind other American sections in its means of rapid communication. The late and present administration have done much to remedy this shortcoming.

With the railways in the province of Buenos Ayres, which initiated the move, with the Central to Cordoba now concluded, with the Uruguay and Rio Cuarto railways constructed for, and that to Tucuman under survey, we can now boast of a fair system of communication.

It is a remarkable fact that the railways established in the Argentine Republic are more productive than those of other nations, which, while showing the wealth of the country, will, when once fully ascertained, induce capital to be invested in our undertakings.

Four hundred and fifty-eight miles of railway open to public traffic, sixty in construction, two hundred and ten contracted for, and four hundred in course of being surveyed, form the total of our railway network.

The whistle of the locomotive has already been heard at the gates of Cordoba, announcing to that rich province that the moment has arrived for it to follow the movement that impels to-day the civilized world. The Minister of the Interior will represent the Government in the act of its solemn inauguration.

This railway is a real monument of

honor for the Republic. Began in

days of great uncertainty, it was continued at the cost of sacrifices, to show that we have the capacity and the means to carry out a great enterprise, as long as we display sufficient perseverance to raise ourselves above the difficulties of the moment. All have deserved well in this work. The Government that decreed it, the contractor that brought it to a termination, and the country that knew how to bear without a murmur the large outlay necessary for its completion.

TELEGRAPH APHS.

There are already working in the territory of the Republic eight hundred and thirty-six miles of telegraph, and upwards of a thousand in construction.

The cable across the Paraná river will be laid down in a few days. A project has been started for uniting the extremity of one of our lines with those of Brazil, and thus place them in contact with the submarine telegraph already contracted for in Europe, which will bind together both worlds.

BRIDGES.

A bridge is being constructed over the Desaguadero, and others have been contracted for of iron and of wood, to be finished within a year, one on the Rio Primero, near Gualliano, and one on the Caracarán in Santa Fé, and one on the Saladillo, in Santiago; some others are also being surveyed. Three iron moles are being moreover built in the province of Entre Rios to facilitate the access to different ports.

ROADS.

This forms one of the principal objects of public administration, and the Government by devoting a particular attention to the subject, has endeavored to remedy one of the greatest wants of the country.

The Argentine Minister in Chile, and the Government of San Juan, lost no time in reporting the bold enterprise carried to a successful issue by Don Indalecio Castro, of crossing the Andes with a train of thirty carts, which was followed shortly afterwards by one of eight coaches.

It is the duty of the Government to congratulate this gentleman on this discovery, and it would recommend Congress to grant him a reward as a proof that the Nation has not viewed with indifference an acquisition of this nature.

A carriage communication between Chile and the Argén in the Republic is thus expectedly established, and as being San Juan, had already been made another in the Rioja, which will serve as a complement to the above international road, which has been provided in anticipation with houses of refuge in the centre of the Cordillera.

The first section of the Cordoba and San Juan road across the mountains has been opened to traffic, and the work is being continued. There are also in construction a road from Tucuman to Salta, from Salta to the Quebrada del Toro, from Rioja to Famañana, and another from Rioja to San Juan, authority having been given to the Governments of those Provinces to finish and open others.

The river communication is well served by the line of steamers running between our different ports, and the Government has only had to subsidize two which go to points not much frequented.

Our foreign communications are numerous owing to the many lines of steamers established from various ports of Europe, and it is only to be regretted that the subvention granted towards the prolongation of the line between the United States and Rio, should have hitherto remained ineffective.

REVENUE.

A greater development of our industry, and the consequent increase of exportation, have been followed, as was natural, by a greater amount of imports, and a greater development of our foreign commerce.

The revenue in 1869 amounted to 12,076,680 silver dollars 6 cents, being an increase of 180,553 dollars 80 cents over that of 1868.

This surplus would have been much greater, and kept proportion with the increasing ratio of the revenue since 1863, but for the reduction of the tariff and the duties upon articles of great consumption.

In the first quarter of this year the revenue has produced 4,012,545 hard dollars 80 cents, an increase over the same period last year of 1,135,426 hard dollars 90 cents. And although so satisfactory a result may partly be attributed to the change in the Customs-house duties, it is to be hoped nevertheless that a proportionate improvement will be found in the succeeding quarters, because our produce is in demand, and our country augments and multiplies its production.

This remarkable increase is due also in great measure to greater regularity in the payment of the rights of citizenship, and to the suppression of smuggling, and of the careful revision of old standing accounts, in which it is not uncommon to find large sums due but not paid to the exchequer.

PUBLIC CREDIT.

With so cheering a perspective you may be certain that our credit will not only keep pace with that of the free nations, but that it will continue to rise as it has done hitherto in an increasing ratio.

Fortunately at that very time the

account was received in Europe, of the visit which with your consent I paid to the Provinces where colonies have been successfully founded, and the testimony the Colonists themselves gave of their own prosperity, served to give a most eloquent refutation to so unfounded a charge.

I hasten to inform you that I have reason to believe that the English Government has since withdrawn that notice.

All the colonies in Entre Rios, Santa Fé, Cordoba and Buenos Ayres are prospering and promise to turn the pampa into fields studded with settlements, industrious and happy, if the laws accelerate and facilitate this change.

The Government frequently receives proposals tending to encourage agricultural immigration, and its agents in Europe are giving publicity to important statistical data tending to show the advantages offered by our soil, for the benefit of the thousands who are eager to ameliorate their condition.

THE CENSUS.

The first census of the Argentine Republic has been taken, giving as the total number of inhabitants 1,736,701.

I am happy to state that this operation so long deferred has been carried out with perfection and accuracy which has seldom been surpassed by other states in a first trial. The employed engaged in the work, the Provincial Governments and the people in general, have so far contributed to this happy issue that the figures, with very few exceptions may be fully relied on. The general results have been already published by the Director of the Census, who has accomplished the task entrusted to him promptly and efficiently.

THE CORDOBA EXHIBITION.

As a tangible inventory of our industry and products, as well as a show of the instruments, machinery, and products, other nations can furnish us, the Cordoba Exhibition is bound to exercise a great influence over the development of our national wealth.

The works are progressing rapidly; and the materials ordered in Europe and the United States for the construction of the Palace are on their way out. The peoples are at the same time beginning to take a lively interest in the success of the Exhibition, and the idea has met with special favor both in Europe and the American States. I trust, therefore it will prove a measure fruitful of good results.

It is my pleasing duty to recommend to you to constitute the active services of the Managing Committee established in Buenos Ayres, and those of its worthy president, Don Eduardo Olivera.

FINANCES.

The civil war of the United States led to a serious disturbance in the consumption of textile matters in the world. The consequent scarcity of cotton called for an increased production of wool to replace it, and the Argentine Republic filled up the gap by augmenting rapidly the production of this article. On the cessation of the war, however, cotton became again plentiful, and wool fluctuated in price up to last year, when a demand for Argentine wool, in consequence of its fineness and cheapness (after the defect caused by the presence of carotilla had been remedied by a chemical process) was permanently secured, placing us at the head of the list of wool producers as the United States are in regard to cotton.

The exportation of this important article in 1869, through the B. Ayres Customs-house has been 140,000,000 lbs., exceeding by 6,000,000 that of 1868. To this is to be added 1,000,000 lbs. of grease and tallow, and 45,000,000 lbs. of sheepskins, in order to be able fully to appreciate all its extension.

May 13. A cattle driver arrived yesterday from San José, states that he was detained by troops belonging to Aparicio which, after putting several questions, allowed him to proceed on his journey.

Don Adolfo B. Rodriguez, lately appointed by the Paraguayan Provisional Government its Consul in Montevideo, will open his office next week.

The official reply of the Executive to the note passed by the Legislative assembly, requesting the recall of the political exiles, has been published.

The setting up of the steam press of the *Siglo* is nearly completed. A drawing of it is placed on exhibition at the Lasteria library.

On 'Change the price of gold may be said to remain without alteration; today, 25,000 were sold in small amounts, to be delivered to-morrow and Monday, at from 5 1/2 to 5 1/2 per cent.

General Borges, a staunch Colorado, is said to have arrived on a mission to Government from several influential chiefs of the blancos both in Entre Rios and in several parts of the republic, offering to abstain in future from taking any active part in the present political events if the Government will give them a guarantee that they shall be left in the enjoyment of their

respective ranks, and allowed to live quietly in their several homes.

The *Tribuna* of today announces that Col. Perez arrived on the 11th inst. at Mercedes at the head of his division 400 strong.

A great deal of correspondence and important papers were seized in the baggage of Montaña, who has been sent in irons here on a charge of complicity in the murder of the sons of Gen. Urquiza.

A correspondence to the *Tribuna* says, "The blancos are gathering together in Cala. Col. Medina and Barrarria are the most prominent among them but it the Government will recall them and give them guarantees, they will leave, and even agree to induce Aparicio to lay down his arms.

The news from Europe per Poitou is in a political sense the reverse of encouraging. A special correspondent, writing from Gibraltar on 19th April, says that Spain is in the worst possible state of social disorganization, Ireland still agitated, and Penian outrages frequent.

FULTON MENDEZ. Montevideo, May 14th 1870. To the Editors of the STANDARD, Gentlemen,

There can be no doubt that Mr. Fulton Mendez has found a mare's nest. He is probably not aware that the power necessary to drive a given vessel through the water varies as to the cube velocity; thus, if it takes one dollar's worth of fuel to drive a vessel ten miles an hour, it will take 4x4x4=64 dollars' worth to drive it forty miles an hour.

The whole question is thoroughly understood by engineers, and it is surprising at the present day to hear any one arguing on such a point.

The slip of a screw, viz., the difference between the advance of a screw if working in a solid, and the speed of a ship, is the only possible loss. The form of least resistance has been ascertained years ago; this slip may, in some cases, amount to ten per cent.

Let me entreat the gentlemen inquired to risk their money on such a phantasm, to consider the question most carefully before they take the plunge which must end fatally.

ON 'CHANGE. May 14, 1870. Sovereigns 400, Gold 122 1/2, Patentes 25, Nat. Bonds 6 1/2.

The President's message to Congress had not the favorable effect expected on the bond market, as instead of rising they remain flat, yet the amount of stock is so limited that no permanent fall can be looked for.

Almost the sole topic of conversation to-day was the impending lawsuit between Don Manuel Ocampos, whose name had been forged to a cheque, and the London Bank who had paid the cheque, the latter insisting on the supposed signer being responsible for the loss occasioned.

The law in this case is not so clear as it should be, for though a deposit made in account current against which cheques were drawn is legally a loan to be repaid on demand, yet the fact that the cheque was numbered and stamped with the usual forms, leads to the opinion that negligence has facilitated or invited the forgery, in which case, as the bank could not have taken preventive means, the verdict would be in their favor.

Such negligence is sometimes a crime as proved in Young v. Grote, where a merchant gave to his

who signed cheques to be filled up as necessary required, a cheque was filled in for £52, written a small '4', and in middle of the line the clerk fixed the words 'three hundred'. The bank paid the whole amount, and it was held that the improper mode of filling up the cheque had invited the forgery; therefore the loss fell on the customer.

Had the deposit drawn against been a special deposit, such as a certain parcel of sovereigns, which same sovereigns were to be returned, the customer would in a case of fraud be undoubtedly the loser, unless the bank had neglected its trust.

It had often been decided that even in a robbery by a bank cashier of jewels, deeds, bonds, or other special deposit, the loss must be borne by the depositor.

The whole affair turns on the negligence of one or the other party, if the numbered cheques are not actually noted in the bank against each recipient's name, as they ought to be. The means taken by the bank as a preventive are defective, incurring responsibility, and if the cheque book was kept in Ocampos' safe, and abstracted therefrom by the forger, the plea of negligence against Ocampos falls through.

The plea of collusion, though not to be thought of in this case, may, generally speaking, be considered, yet, as a banker has liability to accept or reject business, so must he incur the penalty of trading with dishonest men, if he over-reached.

Such was the confusion that many refuse to receive cheques, and it may be worth knowing, that a cheque is not regarded as cash, provided it be presented within one day of its issue; any one keeping a cheque beyond that time incurs its liability.

The Tycho Brahe is expected on Wednesday with Chibirin's troupe. The failure mentioned in our last issue has caused an unpleasant impression, among wool brokers especially; they complain that the loss of custom of conducting the trade has entangled several of their number in this disagreeable affair.

Not much business done in discounts; money continues very scarce. On Saturday 1 1/2 per cent. was paid; no expectation of an easy market can be hoped for.
