Wednesday, April 20. Earl Russell was to have been the guest of the British Minister at Paris last evening, but the Emperor requested the honor of his company, and the noble Lord went to the Tuilleries.

Calcutta objects very strongly to the Income Tax, and is dissatisfied with the present condition of Indian finance. A memorial was agreed to at a public meeting on Monday, requesting the Secretary of State to disallow the one, and to appoint a Royal commission to inquire into the other.

A concession has been granted for the laying of a telegraph cable between Constantinople and Odessa. The United States Commissioner of Inland Revenue has consented to the abolition of a custom which, it may be presumed is exceedingly offensive to Income Tax payers.

He has instructed the assessors not to publish the income list, not only because in many respects it is objectionable and offensive, but because such publication is not for the best interests of the Government. As a matter of fact, however, there will only be a mitigation of the evils arising from this practice, inasmuch as the list will still be open to inspection by the public.

If the Rome correspondent of the Morning Post is to be trusted, Monsignor Haynald has hit upon rather an ingenious plan for settling the question of Papal infallibility. He proposes that he, with nine other Hungarian or Slavonic bishops should engage in discussion ten other prelates, in the presence of the whole assembly.

We learn from a Philadelphia letter that the reopening of the Legal Tender case by the Supreme Court of the United States has created a profound sensation, and great anxiety exists to have the matter settled. A belief is expressed that the Court, reinforced by two new justices, will reverse its former judgment and decide in favor of greenbacks.

The income of the United States was sufficiently in excess of the expenditure to enable the Treasury to reduce the public debt by \$5,766,249 last month, and a similar reduction is looked for at the end of April.

The King of Sweden has ratified the acts of the Legislative Body, extending political rights to Christian dissenters and Jews. A bill was passed by the Diet, the object of which was to permit the establishment of printing offices in rural districts as well as towns; but this measure, it appears, did not obtain the Royal sanction.

There seems to be some mystery attaching to the intended visit of the Emperor of Russia to Ems. The story is that he goes there by the advice of his physicians. On the other hand, it is affirmed that his disease is not of a kind to be benefited by the resources of this refuge of invalids. A better explanation was felt to be necessary; so the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Independence Belge tells us that he has himself been told, and declares that the journey to Ems is but the pretext for an interview between the Czar and King William of Prussia. The writer's faith in this version is strengthened by the fact that the party advocating an intimate connection between the Cabinets of St. Petersburg and Berlin have been lately "in great movement" at the Russian Court, and the adversaries of that policy have been correspondingly discouraged.

A correspondent at Shanghai gives some interesting particulars of an expedition up the Yangtze, undertaken by the French Chargé d'affaires at Peking, for the purpose of settling various missionary troubles of long standing. The result of this personal and persistent negotiation has been the settlement of questions that had been accumulating for months, and probably would never have been decided at the capital. It is said that in every instance the riots were traceable to the investigation of the literati, and generally grew through the non intervention of the local officials; and that if the hostility of these people could be effectually subdued, foreigners would have little to fear.

The Gazette announces that the Queen has been graciously pleased to give orders for the appointment of his Royal Highness Prince Arthur, K.G., K.T., K.P., to be an ordinary member of the first class of Knights Grand Cross of the most distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George.

The Treasury accounts published show that the total receipts into the Exchequer from the 1st to the 16th

of April amounted to £2,338,459, against £2,785,066 in the corresponding period last year. The Customs show a decrease of £252,000. The expenditure was £6,382,039, against £6,226,157.

By the wreck of the Jane and Sophie, of Aalborg, at the entrance to the Tay, five or six lives have been lost.

The unusually large number of 1,800 emigrants have left the Mersey for the United States and Canada, and they will shortly be followed by an almost equal number.

Newspaper correspondents in Ireland report that a very unsatisfactory state of affairs continues to prevail in certain quarters. Agrarian outrages are as frequent as ever, and many landowners dare not move abroad without impeding their lives. The emissaries of "Rory of the Hills" are held in extreme awe, and it is no unusual thing to see "warmed" men going to church under the escort of a couple of policemen.

Easter Monday was the first holiday on which Westminster Abbey has been opened to the public free of charge, and the opportunity of visiting the interesting edifice was taken advantage of by a large number of persons. The London papers speak highly of the behaviour of the people, and state that the visitors generally manifested great interest in the building and the monuments contained in it.

The golden rose, which the Pope is accustomed to sometimes send at Lent to a female sovereign who has most distinguished herself by religious zeal, is said to be destined this year for the Empress of Austria.

Two more tragedies are reported from France. The scene of the first of these was one of the principal streets of Paris, and the time Monday night. A banker named Espir was leaving one of the houses in that street, when he was suddenly attacked by a man who was a stranger to him, and who struck him a heavy blow on the head with a loaded cane. The banker, being armed with a sword stick, ran the blade of his weapon through the body of his assailant. The wound each of them received is thought to be mortal.

The scene of the other tragedy was the Ohateau of Durhand, the country residence of Count de Douet, who at the time was staying with his countess at Paris. The footman, a German, having quarrelled with the cook, a Frenchman, attempted to shoot him with a revolver, and failing in that chased him about the house with the intention of stabbing him. After having received two stabs, one in the back and the other in the abdomen, the cook closed with his assailant, and wrestling from him his pistol struck him senseless with it, and then fled from the house. When the police went to the chateau the next morning they found the footman lying dead in his room. He had committed suicide by cutting his throat. The cook's wounds are not considered dangerous.

The Tagus was swept by a fierce hurricane on Sunday night. The full extent of the damage done his not yet known. It is reported that a large number of lighters with valuable cargoes was sunk, and it is supposed that several lives have been lost. It is certain, however, that much damage was done to the shipping in the river, but the British squadron safely rode out the fury of the storm.

The following is the finding of the court martial that sat on the Duke of Montpensier for his duel with Prince Henry:—

"The court having taken all the facts into consideration, as well as the precise declarations of the Duke himself, sentenced him to a month's exile from Madrid, and to pay the family of the deceased a sum of \$6,000 (£1,200), but declined to pass any censure on his conduct."

THE ENTRE RIANO WAR. Although there is nothing really very fresh from Entre Rios, still it may interest our readers to know how things are going on up there.

The rain has ceased and the floods subsided; all Gualeguaychu was alarmed on Monday night by the news that Jordan was coming. The foreigners assembled in an instant in the Plaza, armed themselves, and went in the direction where the enemy was expected; but the night passed on, no enemy appeared, and at daylight every one returned home satisfied that they were all so far safe. Gen. Almadán, with 1,000 men, is said to be in advance. The San Martín Regiment made a small scout the other day pushing out some two leagues and a half; they fell in with the Jordanites, who at once decamped.

The town of Gualeguaychu is guarded by the foreigners, who have patrols out night and day. Some carts with provisions for Almadán's men were seized the other night and brought back.

Almadán's men are charged with all sorts of enormities—killing, sacking, and even carrying off girls from their homes; truly a shocking chapter. Almadán appears to have no control over them; he is at present sick and has retired from the encampment to San Juan to get cured; this news was brought into Gualeguaychu by two English sheepfarmers, who came in to look for peons and bisonts.

It is said that Jordan has ordered his men to fall back as Mitre advances and not on any account to engage in a fight.

Two battalions have arrived at Guayra from Corrientes, about 800 men in all, well uniformed and armed. Gov. Go-and-come-again (Babiéne) has ordered the National Government three more regiments, in all five regiments.

Gen. Gelly y Obes, as usual, is the soul of the National forces; he is in and out everywhere; and by his unceasing activity inspires the troops with spirit. Gelly is the first up every morning, and before Aurora peeps over the river banks Gelly may be seen going about to see how things look after the night.

We regret sincerely to hear that some of the Jordanites have attacked Mr. McDougall's estancia. At the estancia of Don Luis Acosta, the soldiers carried off everything and lanced a whole flock of sheep in the corral; they also attacked an establishment of the banker, Benites, and swept off over 200 fine horses.

Col. Placido Lopez, with a strong Correntino force, is now on the Entre Rios frontier; strange to say, he is encamped at the once celebrated spot, Basualdo, where, during the Paraguayan war, Gen. Urquiza first witnessed the defection of his Entre Rianos.

Col. Reguera, with a strong cavalry regiment, is also advancing; and, in fact, as far as we can learn, the National Government is receiving far more assistance from Corrientes than first expected.

There was a slight brush the other night at the altura del Cura, just outside of Gualeguay, and a few of the Jordanites placed hors de combat, but the Jordanites are in great spirits. Almadán has promised them the free sack of Gualeguaychu for four hours, with liberty to carry off all they can; this is no small temptation to a band of poor, half starving gauchos, and there can be no doubt that there will be a bloody fight at that town.

Respecting the occupation of the town of Concepcion del Uruguay it appears to amount to nothing, the town has been retaken by the Jordanites, and the National officer who landed to take the place has returned.

The state of the estancias in Entre Rios on the Uruguay side is truly deplorable, the sheep are cared by women and children, the men having been all carried off to the war. The large rodeos of cattle roam at large from their "querencias," the Montes are all getting filled with deserters and "matrosos," such a melancholy state of things is so orderly a province as Entre Rios was never anticipated. All the large estancias belonging to officers and others who have joined the National cause are completely deserted, and if the war goes on as it is going for a few months longer, Entre Rios once the garden of the Republic will be a howling wilderness.

ENGLISH EMIGRATION TO THE RIVER PLATE. We have been favored by the Government with the original of the following important document. Mr. Pfall, whose signature is attached to this document, was of late years emigration agent in Montevideo, previous to which he acted as correspondent of the STANDARD. He is well and favorably known in the River Plate. The length of this document forbids our making any remarks upon it to-day:—

London, April 2, 1870. To his Excellency the President of the Argentine Republic, Dr. Don Domingo Sarmiento.

Monsieur le President, The board of directors of the Emigrant and Colonist's Aid Corporation, Limited, having resolved at their last meeting, held in this city, to communicate to Your Excellency the views and objects of this Association in the hope of thereby securing Your Excellency's valuable co-operation; and at the same time to submit to Your Excellency's Government a proposal for founding colonies in the Republic, the undersigned Chairman and Directors of the above Association beg to place in Your Excellency's hands, for the better appreciation and understanding of the matter, their accompanying prospectus.

The proposed operations of this Corporation, as Your Excellency will at once perceive, are not limited to any particular part of the world, and whilst it has been the object of its founders to give as comprehensive and beneficial a character as possible to the undertaking, they have also kept in view the necessity of placing it on a sound commercial footing, in order to insure greater success and widen the scope of its usefulness in those countries where its services may be required.

It can hardly be matter of question that the increase of an industrious population, and the consequent accession of power to the National Executive through the increase of revenue and the efficiency and prestige of administrative authority growing out of it throughout the country, must essentially contribute to the development of the resources of the nation, and materially aid in placing on a more secure basis its national institutions.

It is under a profound conviction of this truth that the Directors do not hesitate to claim Your Excellency's best attention to this important subject, as one of no ordinary interest to the Government and people of the Republic; and which they doubt not Your Excellency will deem well deserving, the most serious consideration.

Referring to the accompanying prospectus, the Directors desire to place before Your Excellency's Government the outline of a plan for carrying out a system of colonisation in the Republic, which they consider all the more feasible as it would enable this Corporation to deal with the question, as concerns that country in an efficient manner, and carry out its operations for colonisation within the territory of the Republic on a scale commensurate with the necessities of the case, and in a manner calculated in nowise to impair the national credit nor to burden the Exchequer with any actual outlay of money.

Leaving to a future occasion the arrangement of details, the Directors desire to submit to the distinguished consideration of Your Excellency the following, as forming the more salient features of the plan they propose:—

1. That Your Excellency's Government, having decided upon the sites most suitable for the formation of colonies, shall hand over such areas of land to this Corporation, in trust, for the sole and exclusive object of forming one or more colonies as proposed.

2. That Your Excellency's Government with the proper consent of the Legislature, shall issue Bonds to an amount sufficient to cover the sum required to pay all the necessary charges incurred by this Corporation in the formation of such colony or colonies, including passage money, cost of transport to and from ports of destination, maintenance of colonists during the first year, cottages for colonists, edifices, such as churches, schools, manager's establishment, granaries and other outhouses, cost of fencing in land of colony, carts, oxen, cows, with ploughs and other implements, and five years' seed for the use of the settlers, and such other expenses as may be found necessary for the welfare and better success of the colonies.

3. The above Bonds to be issued at the price of 75 per cent, to bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

4. This Corporation offers to undertake the sole charge of founding and administering, under proper regulations, and subject to the Governmental supervision, which may hereafter be mutually agreed upon, such colony or colonies, and further engages to negotiate in London the above mentioned Bonds of Your Excellency's Government.

5. In case the public lands should not be immediately available for the purpose, the cost of any arrangement that Your Excellency's Government might have to enter into in order to provide the necessary lands may be included in the general cost of the colony, to cover which the above mentioned Bonds are proposed to be issued, provided always that the cost of providing such lands does not exceed £3,000 the square league.

6. The Corporation would propose that the area of land to be allotted to the family of each colonist not exceeding four adults, shall be not less than 40 acres and not more than 60 acres, and that the maximum price to be charged to the colonist for the land shall not exceed one pound sterling an acre.

7. This Corporation would suggest to Your Excellency that the number of families to be sent out and placed on the lands to be destined for colonisation in the Republic be not less than one thousand, or about five thousand souls in all, which the Directors think could be done within the space of twelve months, allowing a previous interval of a few months for the necessary preliminary arrangements, in order to insure the selection of a better class of colonists and to make suitable provision for them on their arrival at their destination.

Judging of the question in the light of past experience the Directors allow themselves to suggest to Your Excellency that in order to insure the more complete and immediate success of the undertaking it is expedient that any sites to be selected by Your Excellency's Government for the purpose be limited to lands on the banks of the Parana, not further up than Santa Fé, or otherwise, within an easy distance of the capital.

The total sum required for carrying out the undertaking on the above scale would be in the opinion of the Directors about £175,000 apportioned as follows:—

Six square leagues of land at £22,500; Cost of maintenance of one thousand families during the first year at £10 each family of five persons £65,000; Passage money at £20 each £20,000; Advance of money for account of outfit &c. to emigrants at £10 a family £10,000; Construction of huts, surveying land, out-houses, barns, &c., Manager's house and offices, churches and school houses, £40,000; 1,000 yoke of oxen £50,000; 1,000 ploughs, £5,000; and other implements £4,000; Fencing, land &c. £5,000; Total £210,000.

Or if the cost of six leagues be included, £190,000.

8. The Directors would also suggest to Your Excellency that the interest to be charged on the advances to colonists should in no case exceed a maximum of 10 per cent, per annum.

9. That in consideration of the services above mentioned, comprising not only the negotiation and annual

service of the loan proposed to be issued but also the founding and efficient administration of the colony or colonies the Directors would propose that this Corporation receive free of all expenses 5 per cent, per annum on the total amount of capital absolutely required for the colony or colonies, to be paid out of the yearly repayments the colonists may make for account of the advances made them; and also the ordinary per centage of 5 per cent, to be charged to the first year only, for the negotiation of the Bonds proposed to be issued besides the customary annual commission for the service in London of the above mentioned loan.

10. It should be further stipulated, that after paying the above charges, and all other expenses of the colony or colonies the moneys yet remaining in the hands of the Administrators out of the repayments made by colonists on account of advances and interest, shall under the direct supervision of Your Excellency's Government be remitted periodically to this Corporation towards the sum which the Government of the Republic under the above conditions would engage to provide for the service of the proposed loan.

11. In case any amount should remain over after the payment of such amount interest and expenses, the amount would be at once applied towards cancelling a corresponding amount of Bonds.

12. The administration of the colonies by this Corporation may cease at the will of Your Excellency's Government as soon as the Bonds have been fully cancelled and the interest and charges thereon fully paid.

The Directors believe that the advantages of the plan proposed are such as cannot fail to secure the benevolent attention of Your Excellency and its acceptance by the Government of the Republic whose interest it must, always be to secure what the Directors are firmly convinced they can offer in the present instance, the greatest amount of benefit for the country at large with the least possible sacrifice for the nation.

The momentous nature of the present question, its direct bearing on the moral and political status of the Republic of the River Plate, where the more or less speedy social improvement of their labouring classes, and future material prosperity must so much depend not only on the increase in population, but on the class of emigrants attracted to the country, are considerations of such weight as cannot fail to recommend the subject matter of the present communication to the attention of those statesmen who, like Your Excellency, are called to guide the destinies of those Republics.

Should Your Excellency's Government be disposed to accept this proposal, one or more of the Directors or a duly accredited Agent of the Corporation will at once proceed to the River Plate with full powers to treat on the spot with Your Excellency's Government and conclude such an arrangement as may be agreed upon.

The Directors have the honor to salute Your Excellency with the greatest respect and consideration.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The Tycho Brahe, Captain Sir Richard Peel, K. O. R. which arrived at Montevideo on Thursday morning, brings the expected news of a smart rise in Brazilian and Argentine Government securities when the conclusion of the Paraguayan war became known. The former rose 2 per cent, the latter about half as much, although the London press is divided in opinion as to the advantage the termination of the struggle may eventually prove. The Times takes an unfavourable view of the state of things, but the majority of the other daily papers view the situation of our affairs with satisfaction. The English Parliament was prorogued till the 25th April, and the French Corps Legislatif had also adjourned till after the taking of the plebiscite on the 8th May. The interests of English commerce in the Pacific, China and Australia have induced that Government to renege, some say protest, against the construction of the Darien Canal, unless Great Britain be allowed a share in the enterprise. Serious differences with the States might arise on this point, but it is thought diplomacy will be equal to settling them. The general news from the old continent is unimportant, and the commercial advices are slightly less favourable than by last packet.

A subscriber from San Nicolas informs us that things are mending rapidly in that district. Estancieros are doing well, new graserias going to work and doing a large business, and houses property which a year ago was a drug, is now becoming in daily

increased demand. The effects of the late bad times are rapidly passing away in this "partido."

Yellow-fever has disappeared from the Brazilian capital, but has unfortunately broken out at Santos where several cases are reported.

An important improvement has been effected in the steamer service between the Buenos Aires and San Fernando channels have been marked out with buoys in a complete manner that must conduce greatly to the safety of vessels that have to pass through these dangerous entrances. In the first named seven buoys have been laid down with a "baliza de percha" at the mouth. Full particulars for the guidance of ship captains will be officially published in a few days.

Mr. and Mrs. Heine gave another concert on Thursday night at the Coliseum with their usual brilliant success. But for the intense cold the audience would have been more numerous, but it amply made up in enthusiasm its shortcomings in point of numbers. Professor Rossi made a most favourable impression and performed some really extraordinary tricks. The magnificence of this gentleman's apparatus is in itself a great attraction, and he has a decided advantage over ordinary competitors in the "navvies in molo" that distinguishes him, and which puts him at once on friendly terms with his audience. Neill's communication to us by the Tycho Brahe, which we intend publishing to-morrow. From a single district in Australia six thousand sheep have been sent to London, preserved, within an incredibly short space of time, and the demand for the food at home is progressing at a wonderful rate. Here, what have we done? echo answers, nothing, except to despatch to England a cargo of miserable broken down "novillos," the appearance of which on arrival served to provoke the facetiousness of our English contemporaries as to our new and expensive method of exporting horus and hides. Australia has, as usual, left the River Plate "nowhere" in the race. We have all the advantages on our side, but seem hopelessly unable to avail ourselves of them.

A very curious "lot" was put up for sale the other day at the Hotel Dronot, Paris—the bedroom furniture of the ex-Queen of Spain, which, according to the Gaulois, was of most deplorable taste.

Sr. Don Luis Msones, Peruvian Minister near the government of this Republic, presented his credentials yesterday with the usual formalities to President Sarmiento.

The most important news from the States by Tycho Brahe is that Congress has sanctioned the imposition of an additional tax on sheepskins; this leaves the duty on this article the same as that on wool, and the intelligence is the reverse of satisfactory for our estancieros and exporters.

The intelligence of the death of Lopez and the Great Storm of the 11th March created a great sensation in England. The accounts given by the STANDARD of these important events were copied by all the leading metropolitan and provincial papers.
