LATEST FROM EUROPE. THE ABOVE MAIL PACKET REACHED MONTEVIDEO ON SATURDAY MORNING ON HER FIRST TRIP TO THE RIVER PLATE.

The English Parliament was in recess, but the attention of the Executive, and indeed the whole country, was turned to Ireland where the increase of agrarian crime and growing influence of the Fenians are establishing a chronic 'reign of terror.'

The Land Bill which was expected to go far towards establishing a better feeling among the peasantry, has fallen far, if not altogether, short of that object; and the increase of violence and agitation leaves the Government no resource but the old one of vigorous repression.

Troops are being still poured into Ireland, and conflicts with the people have already occurred, and some lives have been sacrificed. The Government has obtained information of another intended rising on a large scale instigated by the Fenians, and the most rigorous measures of precaution have been adopted.

The French Senate has passed without a dissenting voice, the 'Senatus Consultum' for the reform of the Constitution of the Empire. The plebiscite was to be taken on the 8th of May, and only to last a single day.

A special Cabinet Council at which there was a very animated discussion, was held by the Emperor to consider whether the voting should last for one or two days. Mons. Rouher and his party strongly advocated two days, but Mons. Ollivier's counsels were finally adopted in favour of a single day's voting.

It was said by the Figaro that the Emperor intended to address a circular on the plebiscite by post to each of the ten million electors in France. The idea is believed to have been at one time seriously entertained by His Majesty.

Public meetings have been held both in Paris and the departments, without any disturbances having occurred. Gigantic exertions are being made by all parties, but it is believed that the Government majority will be a sweeping one.

Another frightful crime of the Troppan class, has been committed at Boux, Haute Garonne. A tailor who had disappeared from that town some months ago was believed to have been murdered in an 'auberge' of the place.

The police employed blood-hounds in the search, and the corpse was found under the hearthstone of the fire-place in a low tavern. The body had been cut to pieces and preserved in salt, and it was stated that parts of it were from time to time served up to the customers of the house.

The rumours that were lately circulated as to the Emperor's ill health are unfounded.

The Algeria tribes have again revolted against the French. General Wimpffen, had marched from Oran with a strong corps to put down the movement.

The High Court of Justice that lately tried Prince Pierre Bonaparte at four is not to be dissolved. The parties involved in the late intended conspiracy will, it is said, be tried by it.

The ex-King of Spain has taken bachelor apartments in a fashionable quarter of Paris. His ex-Majesty is very extravagant, and it is thought the £8,000 a year allowed to him by the deed of separation from the Queen, will not suffice for his wants.

Advices from North Germany announce an improvement in Count Bismarck's health. At the opening of the Parliament on the 21st ult., the Vice Chancellor announced that a general rise in the taxation would be necessary, amongst other items coffee has to bear an increased impost.

The Grand Duke of Hesse was expected in Berlin shortly after Easter. Up to the present this Prince was the only one that systematically avoided intercourse with the Court of Berlin, since the formation of the North German Confederation, his visit is therefore supposed to have some political object. Prince Gustavus of Hohenzollern will shortly be married to the eldest daughter of the Duke of Alba.

Universal suffrage is about to be adopted in Wurtemberg. This is considered of great importance, as the introduction of this system of voting in Bavaria and Wurtemberg will be a death blow to the hopes of Prussia, who desires to establish her electoral code in the South German States.

Austria still continues in a state of political agitation, but administrative reforms are steadily progressing. The Government has issued a declaration embodying the wish and hope of the new Ministry to put an end to all foreign difficulties in order to avoid a conflict. The new Cabinet will take no steps that are not fully authorized, by the Constitution.

Political confusion still reigns in Italy. The King had just returned from a hunting sojourn at his favorite 'chateau' of San Rossore, and had a long conference with General Cialdini as to the formation of a new Cabinet in case, as is expected in all quarters, the Lanza Sella Ministry should fall.

The Finance question is still the uppermost one of the day, Sr. Sella insists on getting from the Bank 120,000,000 francs, 50 in gold and 70 in paper. The Ministry cannot pull through. A contemporary compares the Italian Parliament at present to a gambling house where the players look into each others hands in order to take advantage of their opponents.

Prince Pierre Bonaparte was on his way to Florence to take up his residence there at the country palace of his brother in the valley of the Arno.

On the Pontifical frontier revolutionary disturbances have occurred. These manifestations are got up in the Abruzzi, and strong detachments of papal troops are in pursuit of the brigands or insurgents, for their object is quite as much pillage as political change.

Two notable characters have just died in July. Monsignor Chiaras, Archbishop of Genoa, and Signor Leonardo Fea, librarian in the Chamber of Deputies. The latter was one of the most learned men of the day and a profound politician.

Several shocks of earthquake were lately felt at Verona; they were preceded by loud subterranean rumblings and reports like the discharge of ship's guns.

The chance of the Duke of Montpensier's ascending the Spanish throne seems to have improved since his trial, although petitions have been sent in to the Cortes from the provinces of Catalonia praying that Espartero might be declared King. The Regent Serrano lately proposed to General Prim that he (the War Minister) should put an end to existing troubles by accepting the crown, naming at the same time the Duke of Montpensier and Marshal Espartero as candidates. General Prim replied that "he neither could or would make his head uneasy by assuming the crown." It is now thought that the Duke of Montpensier will be King, as the Duke of Modena has given the 'coup de grace' to the pretensions of the Carlists by definitely refusing any further supplies of the sinews of war. Some say that Prim will at the last moment appear as candidate for the Presidency of the Republic, and will in due time give the Spanish people a revised and corrected edition of the 2nd December 1852. Conflicts between the soldiery and some 'volunteers of liberty' have occurred in the streets of Madrid. The Republican party is working night and day to prevent, or at least postpone, the settlement of the question as to who is to be King.

On his return to Seville the Duke of Montpensier was visited at his castle San Telmo by all the leading personages of the city; the people also gave him a warm reception and serenaded him at night.

The Cuban revolution is at last nearly stamped out. There are only wandering bands of guerrillas now in arms and a general and combined movement of the Spanish troops has been ordered by the Captain-General, in order to clear the island of them and restore order.

From North America we learn that the right to vote having been now conceded to the freed slaves by three-fourths of the States of the Union the right has now become a fundamental part of the Constitution of the Republic. President Grant has issued a Special Message to Congress in which he dwells on the importance of the privilege now granted to a race so long proscribed.

THE JORDAN WAR.

DEFEAT OF THE JORDANITES. BATTLE OF THE WILLOWS. FALL OF CONCEPCION.

The military commander of Concepcion sent the following hurried despatch to the National Government. By next steamer we expect full particulars tomorrow. The description of successes like these does not, we suppose, come under the prohibitory decree of the War Minister.

At four p.m. on the 20th inst., the National forces under Commander Francisco de Elia, occupied the city of Concepcion, in conjunction with a body of volunteers under Mabragaña, who had some days before marched on the town, and held it bravely enough until a squad of the enemy appeared when they evacuated it. They recovered all their bravery on the arrival of the regulars. With a view to avoid bloodshed, Commander Elia had an interview with the Gefé Politico, who advocated a peace policy as the garrison was much more numerous than the attacking party. Therefore the troops were landed some distance from the town. The only opposition was a few mounted horsemen who after firing two or three random shots retired behind the trenches. The Plaza was said to be held by 200 men, equally composed of infantry and cavalry, when the National troops arrived, however, there was no one to be seen, except the National Guard under Governor Sagastume, Minister Mantero and the Gefé Politico John George. Several stray horsemen have joined the garrison, and Commander Elia says he can hold this important point against any odds.

Elia in his order of the day promises to respect private property, and in return the residents both native and foreign have sworn to stand by him. Just as the steamer was leaving Majors Ferreira and Espino had passed over with fifty troopers. Several more are expected to follow the good example.

The following is the official despatch of General Conesa, respecting the battle on the 20th. Full details with the lists of killed and wounded may be expected to-day or to-morrow:—

OFFICIAL BULLETIN.

Field of Battle, Puntas del Sauce, May 20. General Conesa to the Minister of War.

This morning at half-past eleven, having reinforced my vanguard, I ordered an attack upon that of the enemy, and drove it beyond the Arroyo del Sauce, and then halted for a while in order to give time to all my forces and baggage to cross said arroyo.

Having accomplished this, I sent some light infantry to skirmish in the front, while my artillery opened its fire from the centre. The fire of both the artillery and infantry was vigorously replied to by the enemy, who made a brilliant cavalry charge on my right wing with about 1,500 men.

The Twelfth of the Line, which had been kept in reserve together with the San Lorenzo regiment, having advanced to protect this wing, the enemy's cavalry was completely repulsed, but without losing its formation. On the contrary, a second charge was made upon the left wing, which made it waver, until having been reinforced by the Third of the Line, it recovered its formation and repulsed the attack. Just at this moment a column of about 2,000 made an attack upon my rear, but took to flight on the approach of the Second Regiment of Cavalry and the San Lorenzo, and finally, Monsieur le Ministre, after a desperate fight of three hours' duration, in which the centre was principally composed of the Fifth of the Line, the Rosario Regiment and four pieces of artillery, which kept up a continuous fire; the enemy beat a retreat, leaving us masters of the field, where we found some arms, ammunition, a great number of dead and wounded, and some prisoners.

The enemy, however, retreated in good order, and could not be pursued on account of the bad state of our horses. Y. E. knows that all the cavalry has gone through the campaign without any remount.

The enemy's force to-day must be over five thousand men, and the battle was doubtful for more than two hours, our cavalry being at times victorious, at others being repulsed. All the army under my orders, without a single exception, has done its duty. The artillery has fired 300 shots. For the present I cannot give any details as to the losses we have suffered.

I will send later on further details of this first encounter, which amounts to a first victory for the national arms.

The Argentine Minister of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Varela, has replied to Captain MacDonell's last note. We publish the reply in to-morrow's issue.

EXTRAORDINARY REVELATIONS.

GEN. RESQUIN'S DECLARATION. We have through the kindness of a friend, received from Rio a copy of the declaration made by General Resquin, who was taken prisoner when Lopez fell at Aquidaban. This extraordinary document bears the stamp of truth, and puts the Paraguayan drama in completely a new light. Robles, it appears, was no traitor, and after the fall of Ascurra, a Paraguayan woman followed Lopez through the mountains with a knife concealed under her chemise to kill him. As the paper is some what long, we purpose dividing it into chapters.

Declaration of General Francisco Isidoro Resquin, Chief of the 'Etat Major' of the Paraguayan army, taken at headquarters of the Brazilian army at Humaita on the 20th March, 1870. On the 10th of March General F. I. Resquin appeared before Colonel F. P. Guimaraes, and declared to be 40 years of age, unmarried, but living with a woman and five children. He declares that he was made prisoner at Cerro Corá by the Brazilian forces, and that at the beginning of this war he was Colonel, and commanded a column of 12,500 men, almost all cavalry, which invaded by land the province of Matto Grosso, the deponent going under the orders of General Barrios, who followed to that province by water, taking with him over 4,000 men.

Those forces effected a junction at the village of Miranda, after Barrios had taken with great loss the fort of Coimbra.

In Miranda the Paraguayan cavalry arrived on foot, and not finding a road remained stationed there. Some time afterwards it retired under his orders towards Nioac, but before arriving at that point the deponent received orders from President Lopez to send a force of 300 men to Coxim, having sent from Bella Vista the necessary horses. The road to Coxim was impassable; they had to pass a swamp of 22 leagues across.

The expedition found nobody at Coxim, lost 50 men, and returned with a large number of sick.

The deponent delivered the command of the column to Major Urbina in Nioac, and proceeded in a canoe for Asuncion, and thence on the same day for Humaita, to present himself to President Lopez. Lopez made him some slight accusations, but afterwards calmed down; and, on the following day (24th June, 1865), made him Brigadier-General, saying that he was going to send him to Corrientes as second to Robles, with whom he was not satisfied, nourishing suspicions regarding his conduct, because he showed himself haughty. Lopez did not yet wish to break all at once with Robles, but he wished to watch his behaviour by means of the deponent, who should in the meantime organize the cavalry.

The deponent left for Empedrado in Corrientes, and eight days afterwards Robles was made prisoner by the Minister of War, General Barrios.

The deponent, notwithstanding, saw nothing in the conduct of Robles to cause suspicions, and to this moment he believes he never intended to betray him.

It was Colonel Alent who secretly denounced Robles to Lopez, saying that he despised a decoration which Lopez sent, and that he corresponded with the Correntino chiefs.

Alent was chief of the 'Etat Major' of Robles; he had disagreed with him, and formed a party against his general.

*A Paraguayan frontier guard on the Rio Apa. †This Alent had accompanied Lopez to Europe as a junior secretary, and had since then been his Private Secretary, until sent under Robles to Corrientes.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Everything is now ready for the departure of our President, who takes the field determined to put down Aparicio. The Government has a pretty strong force, but much scattered; all over the country there are Government troops. To concentrate these forces and fall like an avalanche on the rebels is the programme of President Batlle. Will he do it, that is the question? A ruler with such a military name as Batlle, ought to be able to crush such a pigmy as Aparicio whose chief strength consists in his weakness; the only man of real metal or resolve is Bustamante who allows no grass to grow under his feet. In truth there is no hope for this place save in the strong arm of some good and patriotic man who knows how to rule and has the will, the courage and decision of character to maintain his authority; we want such a man. Batlle was born for peace, he goes now; but when will he return? There is a story here that out in the camp there is great confusion as to the rebels and the Government troops all wearing the same uniform; it appears that Aparicio seized some cart loads of uniforms sent out by Government to Maximino Perez; these he gave to his soldiers; and now, as few of the estancieros can read the heart, they are perplexed to know which are rebels and which are loyal troops. I never at any period knew the Banda Oriental to be in a worse state than at present. It is going down, down; present stalks over the land; all the die fellows who came out here seven or eight years ago with capital have been long since done up and gone back, lanky for them that they did, to escape the misery of the hour.

From some cause or other there is a great drain of gold in the market, every steamer takes up specie to Buenos Ayres. The Government, anxious to find out the extent of this, has ordered that henceforward all parties exporting gold must take out a permit in the usual way. The fact is we have now no more produce to ship, so we must ship gold. Poor as the country is, the extravagance of the people almost beats Buenos Ayres; most of the shopkeepers have started carriages, and now, when coaches are least required owing to the traumas, now all the world drive in carriages; somebody must pay the piper. Last week we had fresh sail put on in our money market in the shape of new notes—Pshaw, the measure is a hateful one, a make shift, and there is too much going on for the size of the place, and far too little going on for the character of the Republic. If I were Bustamante I would throw up the sponge and let the place find its own level.

Some of our best people are talking of migrating to Buenos Ayres, and I could send you the names of half-a-dozen who cry loud enough! and are looking out for houses in your city.

The news of the hour is Marcoratu's new telegraph line from Pará to Montevideo; of course it is a move in the right direction, but no shares will be taken here, mark my words; the burnt child dreads the fire, and we have all been burnt by the d—d Fomentos, Gold mines, Junta Economica, Banks, &c.; not a brass farthing can be raised here, so Mr. Marcoratu had better arrange everything abroad.

Buxareo have dissolved, that is to say the old firm of Buxareo Hermanos is now changed to Salvador, Buxareo, Hermanos. Preserved tongues and house rent are both going up, and it is really extraordinary the high rents paid for houses, fully 10 per cent. over that of Buenos Ayres.

Mr. Octavio Ramirez has taken charge of the editorial part of the 'Siglo,' rather a crochety business at present, owing to the Minister's resolve to keep political leaders out of the papers. Bustamante says that editors ought to confine their attention to the weather.

Mr. Labrousse, a member of the Legislature, has proposed a general amnesty for all political offenders. If this measure becomes law then we may expect to see Aparicio next week in the Oriental hotel, or possibly routing Buscheval's now untenanted house at the park near Paso Molino.

M. Legout has started his new French paper 'Le Moniteur Oriental,' it is well edited, but poorly printed. As the French population here is numerous I suppose the organ will meet with good support. Legout is well able for his post and a capital writer.

The Lavadero Americano is declared in bankruptcy; as yet there is nothing said of the assets or liabilities. Business as a rule is very dull, and every one complaining. The wool men this year have done well and some of your friends in that line are on their legs again. Sheep have improved in the Colonia and Pray Bentez district, 12 reals have been paid for fleeces that last year could be bought at 4 reals, but the mortality last year in the fleeces has been fearful, fully fifty per cent. of all the sheep in the country perished no wonder therefore that what is left is worth a trifle more than last year. Publish in your paper that the best business to-day in the Plata is to buy sheep at present in the Banda Oriental, the camps are good, rent low and capital prospects for wool.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

On Saturday night news arrived in town of the defeat of Lopez Jordan by Conesa, in the neighbourhood of Nogoya. At once we had rockets going up on all sides, and bulletin boys making night hideous by their yells. Sunday morning everyone looked for further details, but a new sort of intelligence arrived in the shape of an official despatch from Elia of the capture of Concepcion del Uruguay, and this we believe without any special order from the Government. People anxiously waited all day on Sunday for further details of the battle of Nogoya, but our colleague the 'Prensa' was the only paper that published a 'boletin,' and with news by no means favorable to the National cause. Thus affairs stood until yesterday, when again we had a violent discharge of rockets. The news of the battle of the Willows and the march of Mitro on Cala we give in another column.

Sunday the Plaza Victoria was crowded, thousands witnessing the preparations going on for the May festivals—pyramid whitewashed, railing and fountains all newly painted, and platforms being erected for the acrobats. It appears that one of the acrobats purposes walking on a tight rope from the Recoaba Viejo into the City Hall clock. The Plaza looks to great advantage, flags every where, and immense fireworks preparations. The Colon Theatre also looks very well, having been newly painted outside.

At the National Government House there is also a good deal going on; the gardeners were at work all day long making new flower beds. The Government palace is after all beginning to look like a palace, but the new portico is out of all proportion.

On Saturday Mr. Edward Lamb, Mr. Buscheval and others returned from Cordova highly delighted with their trip. Mr. Lamb speaks in glowing

terms of the beauties of Cordova; in fact every one who has been up there has brought back the most favorable impressions.

The Honorable Mr. Kirk, American Minister, is expected back from Cordoba about the 30th inst.

The French mails were on shore on Sunday but not delivered until late. The Times has a long leader on the death of Lopez by no means complimentary to the Allies. Argentine National Bonds had still further improved, and were firm at 92 1/2 and 93. Brazilian Stock has also improved and selling at 89 1/2. The news of the death of Lopez has had a decidedly beneficial influence on the Stock Exchange.

Mr. P. D. Lynch has placed in our hands the prospectus of a new colony out in the Negro de Julio camps, of a very important character. The colonists for the first year receive \$400 per month, and in the second year flocks of sheep on balraes, besides small land grants in perpetuity. Up to the present we have seen nothing so favorable for English speaking colonists as this offer. The prospectus and full particulars we hope to publish in a few days.

On Sunday the convention for the reform of the Judiciary and Constitution, held an important session. The question as to the swearing of the members occupies attention, some members refusing to be sworn on the Holy Evangelists. It is supposed that members will be allowed to take the oath in whatever manner they think proper.

Tickets and programs of the Athletic Sports are now on sale at Mackern's and Hiebert and Co's, Bond Street. The meeting promises to be very good, though the forecast holds up, although the frogs in the morning indicate rain.

Several Englishmen have just come up from Tandil, after an exploring trip through the south country; they report camps good, but sheep thin, and very few flocks offering for sale; prices even in the far south are much higher than last year. The heavy frosts last week were much felt in the camp.

This morning a fashionable English wedding comes off, one of our city merchants leads to the hymeneal altar the lovely and accomplished daughter of one of our wealthiest Scotch residents. On Saturday night there was a fashionable wedding in our native circles; the son of one of our native merchant princes was the happy man.

This week M. At the portals of our office we place a 'last rose of summer,' which we hope will escape the grasp of boy-coming with advertisements.

We will publish to-morrow some further letters from our brother editor, who we expect home in a few days.

We received yesterday from Rio de Janeiro a translated copy of General Resquin's declaration—a document of great length and importance, and which will much interest our readers. Resquin was taken prisoner at Aquidaban when Lopez fell, and his revelations throw a new light upon part of the Paraguayan story.

We find the following in an English paper in reference to the party of English noblemen and gentlemen who lately fell into the hands of brigands at Marathon. We are happy to see that Capt. Watson is not amongst them as was at first supposed:—

'The Marathon' brigands have released Lord Manchester, but hold to ransom other captives—Mr. Frederick Vyner, Mr. Lloyd (a barrister), and Mr. Herbert (Secretary of Legation).

In addition to the sum to be paid as ransom, the brigands demand that they shall receive a full pardon for their offences. It might be a question for casuists whether a promise of pardon made under such circumstances should be kept.

On being ushered into the presence of the 'chase' the jeweller was astounded at the altered appearance of his master's quondam customer, who had shaved off his flowing whiskers and moustache, donned a pair of green goggles and a suit of unimpeachable black, and looked like an itinerant preacher of no particular persuasion. A few minutes conversation resulted in the surrender of sundry rings, pins, etc. to the representative of their rightful owner; and as the property was delivered up whole and intact, further proceedings were deemed useless, and Mr. Richard L. Harpers alias Hart, was allowed to depart in the Douro for 'fresh fields and pastures new.'
