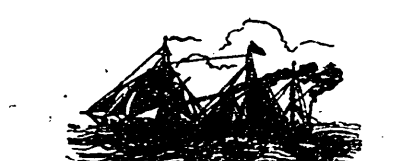

LONDON LETTER. London, December 12, 1870.

By far the most important news is a very circumstantial assertion in the Handelsblad Cologne Gazette, and Independence Belge that the Duchy of Luxemburg is to be annexed to the new nearly established German Empire.

M. Bismarck, 'a la Prusse,' has simply notified to the Ducal Government that Prussia no longer considers herself bound by the treaty of 1867.

The treaty so carefully and complacently conducted by the present Earl of Derby three short years ago.

The resolution of the Prussian Government is founded on the complaints that, firstly, the inhabitants of Luxemburg have sympathized with the French, and that the expression of that sympathy was tolerated by the Government.

secondly, that convoys of provisions intended for Germany were sent to the French garrison at Thionville from Luxemburg territory; thirdly, that French prisoners of war confined in Luxemburg were permitted to escape; fourthly, that a complete organization existed to favor their escape.

The complaints are paltry in the extreme, compared with the magnitude of the decision which sets at naught a solemn and recently contracted treaty.

If the eyes of John Bull or of Mr. Gladstone and his flippant secretary of foreign affairs are not now well open, we must be content to have our throats cut whilst we are asleep.

I have no doubt that similar complaints are in store for Belgium, and then our turn will come. As we are the biggest and choicest morsel, we are reserved for the 'bonne bouche.'

There is something ludicrous in the notion of seeing a crowd of spectacled Germans invading Barclay & Perkins, and teaching us personally how to make Lucifer matches, and sing at the right side of our mouths; but I am beginning to think it is quite within the political cards; for John Bull, rich and fat as he is, and ready as he is for a fair stand-up fight with any two of them, will certainly lose flesh in fighting the combination preparing against him, namely, Germany, France, Russia, the United States and Ireland.

But let us close the book of the future, with the leaf of Great Britain turned down for future reference, and turn to poor France, who is now undergoing her agony.

Having no further faith in ordinary human wisdom, I am rather inclined to turn superstitious and believe in the Nun of Blois, who gave her opinion of existing events sixty years ago, and she has positively been nearer the truth than any one I know of.

Up to the moment I pen these words, Blois, according to her prophecy, has not been desecrated by the Goths. The courier with the bad news certainly must have arrived long since, and the nun of Blois again, according to prophecy, must have packed up, ready for a bolt. But we are

waiting with intense anxiety for the courier 'fire and water' which early in the morn is to take the good news. Beaueigny, where the Germans were at last advised, is only thirty miles from Blois.

After the defeat of the centre of the French army of the Loire near Orleans on the 4th inst. General Chazuy, in command of the left wing, followed the right bank of the river to defend Blois.

On the 7th inst. he took up a position between Meung on his left and St. Laurent des Bois on his right. He was then attacked on the saump day by the Duke of Mecklenburg, and after a fight of eight hours he withdrew his right to Beaueigny.

The German attack was repeated with more success on the 8th, the French losing 6 cannon and 1,000 prisoners. The result of that and other less serious engagements, was that the German troops occupied Beaueigny as well as an important railway position, Vierzon.

In the meantime General Pallieres, in command of the beaten French centre, had fallen back South of Orleans; and Generals Bourbaki and Crouzet, who commanded the corps on the right, retreated towards Nevers and Bourges, where they are closely followed by the Germans; and sundry encounters have taken place with the French rear-guard.

On the 10th inst., according to the Duke of Mecklenburg's own dispatch, he was violently attacked by General Chazuy's division, which he repulsed. The battle was continued at intervals during the day, and was principally carried on with artillery.

The Duke in his dispatch says the losses of the Germans were inconsiderable, and that "God was with them." Who was with the French we have no idea, for our accounts since the event of the 7th inst., when Chazuy claimed a success, are exclusively German.

All we know is that the Germans push on; that the Government at Tours meditates transferring itself to Bordeaux, and that nevertheless, the first German accounts of the utter defeat of the army of the Loire were essentially wrong, and that the end is not yet, however near it may be approaching.

The forces of the Duke of Mecklenburg, Prince Frederick Charles, and Von der Tann operating on the Loire, amount to over 100,000 men. The several French corps opposed to them number 150 to 180,000.

General Chazuy has been named Commander-in-Chief in place of D'Aurelles de Paladine. The latter celebrated, over-cautious General was evidently bewildered at Orleans. The nomination of Chazuy is universally approved.

Little by little as letters drop in from German correspondents on the Loire, we learn the truth that the French army which M. Gambetta has so actively created in the West, is composed of materials naturally heterogeneous, and in great part inexperienced, but sufficient to cause serious alarm to the German authorities at Versailles who are not altogether satisfied with the late sorties from Paris.

Though the sorties were repulsed and the French failed to break the line of investment, the 'circle of iron' to the north of Paris was greatly extended. Dierrot's troops still occupy Champigny and his forces recrossed the Marne without molestation.

The threat of bombardment is again renewed and positively announced for the 19th inst. This may be to pacify the German people, some of whom in Berlin have risen in open insurrection on account of further demands on the Landwehr.

Meantime up to this hour everything in and around Paris has been solemnly quiet since the beginning of the month. Krupp is sending new siege guns which it is said will easily reach Notre Dame.

Amongst his novelties are balloon shooters. The projectiles consist of small grenades which will penetrate a balloon and cause it to explode at the height of 2000 metres.

The French on their side are working up artillery and threaten fresh sorties. Count Moltke despatched an aide-camp to General Trochu asking him to send out an officer to receive the report of the defeat at Orleans.

The French General returned the dignified answer that he did not require to verify the particulars of the event by such means.

Another and probably final phase in this criminal war is now approaching. It commences a new struggle or it may soon end one with an advantage to the Germans, equally important to them in either case. They have lately learned to respect their enemies.

In the north of France the Germans under Manteuffel are spreading themselves unopposed over Normandy. They have occupied and again evacuated Dieppe. It is expected that they will meet with serious resistance at Havre.

This French army of the North at Lille recently placed under the command of General Faidherbe has given no signs of activity, but it is said to be formed of good materials.

ARMING OF THE SQUADRON. People live in Buenos Ayres and know little of what is going on, there is hardly a city in the world that boasts of more newspapers, and yet they are at best but poor reflectors of passing events.

There is at the moment a stir in military and naval affairs, which reminds one of the days of Pavo; old muskets are overhauled, cannon dragged out, gunpowder looked up, and whole piles of swords, scabbards and saberdashes revised and set in order.

If Lopez Jordan could only see the stir there is at the Parque, he would realize the fact that we are in earnest in fighting him, and that if he hopes to hold his own he must prepare for the struggle by sending to Europe for arms.

On Monday a special committee of navy men overhauled the Parque Arsenal, and one of the members of that committee, an Argentine officer of American extraction, informs us that he was agreeably surprised at the very splendid and numerous collection of guns of which Buenos Ayres can boast.

A battery of six rifled Blakely guns with complete mount particularly attracted notice; the cannon are steel and covered for protection against the weather. Our informant states that a finer or better battery could hardly be found in the arsenals of England.

The great Paraguayan brass cannon, called the 'Orlolo,' cast in Paraguay by the English workmen at the Arsenal of Asuncion, from the bells of Paraguay, is still the wonder of all who visit the Parque. It is, perhaps, the largest in South America, being a 150-pounder, and weighs without the carriage ten tons.

The gun is so large that it is, comparatively speaking, useless, as there is no steamer of the Argentine fleet prepared to mount it; and if placed at the Once de Setiembre battery, near the Gas-house, at the first discharge all the windows of Remate Hall and Sor. Estrada's mansion would be shattered.

Thus the gun is for the present useless. There are six splendid Paraguayan 68-pounders at the Parque which also attract attention—good, serviceable guns, but too heavy for the steamers which the Government is now fitting up for the Entre Riano war.

In the patio of the Parque there are over 100 good, serviceable cannon, mostly all of small calibre, but just suitable for the new Argentine steam squadron. In the galpones of the Parque there is almost a like number of cannons reported in good condition; and, upon the whole, the stock of arms at the Parque is most respectable, and amply sufficient for the war in which the country is at present involved.

MUNICIPAL RETURNS FOR DECEMBER. The usual long-winded report of the Corporation may be summed up in a few words—

"During the month we have sold 211 graves and 6 niches in the Recoleta, and 127 graves in the South cemetery, yielding 45,090\$. Our expenditure in public schools has been 177,551\$, including a donation of 150 copies of 'Recuerdos del año 20' to the schools are attended by 4160 children.

We have made some repairs in the prison, ordered alterations in 4 of the Tramways, and commenced a bridge in Calle Independencia, besides whitewashing some wards in the Men's Hospital and Lunatic Asylum.

"Only 73 children were vaccinated in the month. In the South cemetery there were 218 burials, including 102 of infants and 3 over 70 years. For the Recoleta no returns. The market-inspector reports everything very dear this season, especially fruit. The number of gas-lamps is 2,150, the average lighting being 5 hours 40 min. each night: the Cabildo clock takes 7,200 cubic feet.

"The Serenos during the past year arrested 3,646 men, 110 women, and 81 children, besides 18 lunatics; they also found 200 stray horses, and 11 corpses in the street. The Serenos are 160 foot and 60 mounted.

"At the South Corrales the slaughter in December was 115,252 including 83,285 for saladeros and 9,181 for the markets.

"We have made 6 carts for watering the city."

The Inspector of Tramways reports as follows—

There were 4 accidents this month: on the 13th the Barracas car ran down the hill, upsetting the trumpeter, and cutting off his foot.

On the 19th the same car ran over a little boy who was jumping off and on, leg cut off. The same day one of the conductors, getting down in front was run over, both legs broken.

On the 27th at the Cathedral a little boy begging tickets was run over and killed. In no case did blame result to the Company's servants.

The Hospital reports show as follows—

The Municipal Lazaretto received 44 patients during the month, viz Small-pox 31, Measles 11, various 2; only 6 died.

There are 200 patients in the Lunatic Asylum, viz 91 natives, 40 Italians, 26 Spaniards, 21 French, 9 S. Americans, 4 Swiss, 1 English, 8 various.

The Men's Hospital on Dec. 21st had 353 patients viz 87 natives, 84 Italians, 48 Spaniards, 29 French, 26 S. Americans, 16 Portuguese, 15 English, 13 Germans, 9 Swiss, 6 N. Americans, 20 various.

THE LATE MR. LUIS VERNET. It is with deep regret we have to announce the demise of Mr. Luis Vernet, one of the oldest and most respected foreigners in this country.

Mr. Luis Vernet was born in Hamburg in the year 1701, and came out to Buenos Ayres about the year 1817. When he commenced business in this

city, devoting himself at first to mercantile affairs, and subsequently to colonization, his first attempt at the latter was south of the Salado, then outside the frontier, where he lost his brother and brother-in-law defending his estancia against the Indians.

About the year 1824 he visited Patagonia and the Falkland Islands, and finding the latter highly advantageous for colonization he returned to Buenos Ayres and organized a company for colonizing the Islands, and was then civil and military commander of the Falkland Islands by the then Argentine Government. He remained at the Falklands until 1831, when in the faithful discharge of his duty as Governor he incurred the animosity of an American naval officer, who, with the vessel under his command, captured the colonists and destroyed the Colonel, Mr. Vernet being at the time absent in B. Ayres.

Mr. Vernet finding his colony broken up, and no prospects whatever of its reorganization, settled again in this city, and after many years study discovered a specific for curing hides, which specific is in use to this day. Mr. Vernet some years afterwards left for Europe, where he remained six years engaged in a scheme for the colonization of Bolivia, and returned to the Plata after the death of his wife, about the year 1858, where he has since resided, occupied to the last hour of his existence in various schemes of colonization, &c.

The demise of this venerable gentleman will long be deeply deplored by a wide and sorrowing circle of friends, and few foreigners who have come to this country have played a more useful or conspicuous part than the object of this memoir. Respected and esteemed by all, he has passed to the grave, leaving six children and ten grandchildren surviving him.

He died in the full possession of his faculties, surrounded by his family, in his charming quinta at San Isidro.

ANOTHER CAMP FIRE. At about two o'clock on the 12th inst. a fire broke out in the partido S. Antonio de Areco, in the extensive camps of Messrs. Casten, and fanned by a strong wind, rapidly grew to a great extent. People from the adjoining estancias and village soon arrived, and after much exertion, got master of the conflagration.

At about eleven o'clock at night, when tired and weary, they thought the fire extinguished, all left for their respective homes. Unhappily, at about three o'clock in the morning a strong wind sprang up, and, perhaps, through burning cinders, the fire broke out in a blaze in a moment on several sides. To describe the mode how people worked to stay the fire would be impossible, sufficient is that the fire was at last put out yesterday afternoon. The loss caused by this fire is fearful; several houses, sheep, horses and cattle burnt, and about eight leagues of camp laid bare. The fire began in the partido San Antonio and spread more in the partido Baradero. Great blame is attached to the sheepfarmers living about there, who did not join the natives in extinguishing the fire; in fact, if it had not been for the former they would have lost houses filled with wool, &c, as instance; Mr. Pat. Murray's house, which would have been a prey to the flames, with about 300 arrobes of wool. Those who worked most day, and night, were Messrs. Casten, Chorarin, mayordomo of the Minister of War's estancia, Nieves, from the Lynch estancia, Mendiotta, Galvan, and others, to whom every praise is due for doing their utmost in staying the progress of the fire. A true statement cannot yet be made of the loss caused by the fire, but it is thought it will be about three hundred thousand dollars at the Casten estancia alone.

SHEEPFARMER. MONTEVIDEO. BATTLE OF CARDOSO. Monday.

Don Luis Revuelta, formerly editor of a paper in Salto and now Paymaster General to the army of Goyo Suarez has brought detailed despatches of the battle of Cardoso, in which General Borjes's vanguard under Major Castro defeated the Blanco forces of General Benitez, the latter only escaping with 6 men. The despatch of Borjes is as follows—

Arroyo Cardoso, January 11th. "Yesterday at 2 p.m. the Salto division under Major Castro completely defeated the rebel forces of Benitez, whom Aparicio had recently named Commander-in-chief North of Rio Negro. The battle took place at Arroyo Cardoso on the boundary line of Salto and Tacuarembó: during the fight Castro sent me word he was keeping up a running fight for a league and a half. I at once despatched Colonel Coronado, who pushed forward in haste and on reaching the battle-field dismounted his troopers, giving the word 'charge on foot,' which they did so well that all the rebel infantry surrendered, and we took them prisoners, besides a quantity of baggage and horses, 5 carriages, a dog-cart &c. The enemy had 80 killed between officers and men, including Colonel Sogovia and an Englishman named Bond who used to cast cannon for the Blancos at Union. Out of 400 men that the enemy had brought into the field only 8 escaped with Benitez. The prisoners

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consist of 4 Colonels, 1 Major, 3 Captains, 7 Lieutenants, 10 Sub-lieutenants, 7 Sergeants, 3 corporals, and 18 soldiers. Our loss consisted of 2 killed and 5 wounded."

After the rout of Benitez General Borjes sent Major Irigoyen to Paysandu to look up Enrique Olivera who was somewhere about Rincon de Gallinas. Escobar has taken the Tacuarembó division to pursue the Salvaflores, Coronado is gone to Salto and Borjes to Paysandu. Colonel Vidal arrived safely with his men at Canelones. Aparicio was by last accounts at Cerro Largo, and Goyo Suarez in pursuit. Letters from Durazzo say that Major Barbosa with 40 Blancos has submitted to the Government. A fight took place last week near Pau de Azucar in which a Colorado officer named Falero is said to have beaten some Blancos under Triay.

Montevideo is still infested with burglars. They broke into the shop of Mr. Behrens, agent for the STANDARD, and took away a number of blank receipts; subscribers will, therefore, please to be on their guard.

The Customs returns for 1870 show a considerable falling-off.

The gross trade returns show a diminution of 12 per cent, and the shipping 8 per cent. This is due to the civil war, and when we compare these returns with those of 1867 and 68 we find a falling-off equal to 28 per cent.

EDITOR'S TABLE. We received most distressing news from Montevideo yesterday morning. House breaking on Sunday is becoming so fashionable in the sister city as Sabbath breaking in the way of land auctions is said to be here. We regret to announce that the victim on this occasion was our indefatigable and esteemed agent Behrens who, we may remark, has lately come across some old family papers proving beyond doubt that he is of English descent, the family name, Baines, being an old one in the county of Kent. The melancholy particulars of the sack of the STANDARD agency in Montevideo are as follow:—On Sunday afternoon between 4 and 5 o'clock (in broad daylight) a band of several thieves walked coolly up to Mr. Baines's store, smashed in the door, and commenced the work of plunder. The main attack was on the cupboards, probably with the view of lurching before the immediate object of their visit was put into execution. Nothing eatable or potable was however found, and the intruders wreaked vengeance on a lot of cambic frosted shirts and paper collars of all shapes and sizes, which were scattered about the store in lamentable confusion. The burglars then turned their attention to the till, but times have been so bad lately that the ready money in that receptacle only amounted to one copper real, which they carried off; also some very choice Hamburg cigars, the wholesale price of which is something under ten paper dollars a thousand. The most valuable booty the robbers secured was a lot of blank STANDARD receipts for monthly subscriptions. Up to the present moment we believe not a word further has been heard of the perpetrators of this audacious outrage.

The papers to hand from the provinces yesterday morning contain very little news of general importance. Election riots are frequent, and there was a most serious one at Cordoba on the 11th inst. The Chamber of Deputies was broken into, and 26 of the members withdrew from the House, afterwards publishing a protest in the Eco against the violence to which they had been subjected. In addition to these troubles a filibuster named Olgario Vidal is endeavoring to raise men for a marauding expedition at Dolores, up to the present without success. The Exhibition works are almost completely finished, and will be ready long before the day named for the inauguration.

The Ebor Paddock Club, lately started with the object of improving the breed of horses in this country, is, we are happy to hear, progressing very favorably, several members having lately joined. We understand that this club will hold its first race meeting towards the end of March, at Monte Grande.

We publish to-day particulars of a disastrous camp fire at Baradero. It is one of the worst things of the kind we have had yet, and the amount of property destroyed is large.

Several gentlemen went off yesterday in company with Captain Oribe to visit the magnificent steamer Paletina of the Glasgow line. They had not returned when we were going to

press, so our readers must wait till tomorrow's issue for a description of this fine vessel.

We publish to-day our London Letter received by John Elder. It contains some very important items about the situation in Europe.

We are informed that the amateur concert given on the 5th inst. at Chascomus in aid of the Endowment Fund which the English residents there lately resolved to raise, passed off in the most successful manner. The concert room was crowded to the doors, and the receipts were so large that with all expenses paid the Committee calculate on having a balance of ten thousand paper dollars in aid of the Fund.

This is a very satisfactory and creditable result, considering the limited number of Britislers in Chascomus.

General Ochoa and Governor Cabral returned to Rosario on Sunday from Santa Fe. Two steamers from Asuncion, it is supposed with Yellow fever on board, passed that port on the same day, but did not stop.

What's one man's meat is another's poison is very true in the main, but a dislike to innovation in general often deprives people of what might be very good for them if they could be persuaded to try it. In Dublin, the second city in the United Kingdom, with 300,000 inhabitants, the opposition to the introduction of tramways is as vigorous as if the immense benefits arising from this kind of communication had not been proved by experience in many parts of the world. A deputation lately waited on the Lord Mayor to oppose the establishment of tramways. The reasons adduced by the deputation were that tramways would interfere with the cab tax to the amount of £5,000 per annum, throw 5,000 cab-drivers and their families into penury, and destroy at a blow the £100,000 capital invested in the hackney vehicles of the city. These arguments have about as much foundation as those put forward in England when railways were first mooted. The 'iron horse' was then mainly objected to on the ground that the old article of flesh and blood would be perfectly useless, and of no marketable value if it had such a competitor.

General Rivas has returned to this city from Montevideo. It is not known if his efforts to bring about peace in the Banda Oriental have yet met with any success. Some say the General has returned on 'urgent private affairs.'

We have to thank Dr. Jose F. Lopez for sending us yesterday a copy of his pamphlet on the Franco-Prussian war, the greater part of which has already appeared in the Tribuna. We have also to acknowledge the receipt of Dr. Carlos Ramirez' 'Guerra Civil y los Partidos,' and thank the distinguished author for sending it to us.

In this latter 'brochure' we find an amusing anecdote told by the present Minister of the Interior, as a proof of the high purity feeling everywhere apparent in the Banda Oriental. H.E. while on a trip to the sister city was constantly visited by his nephew Dr. Sierra y Cafranza. While once and nephew were one day engaged in pleasant chat Dr. Jose Candido Bustamante was announced, and away bolted the nephew to a neighbouring room to avoid meeting Dr. Candido, who took up the conversation with Dr. Sarsfield, but himself skeddaddled in a moment or two, caudally admitting that he had no wish to meet Dr. Candido Juanico, who was announced by candid No. 1 had time to take a seat. Dr. Sarsfield says Candido No. 2 was evidently prepared to vanish also in case another Oriental came in, but none appeared.

From Rosario we learn that the Municipality of that town has received further proposals for laying down tramways from several capitalists, and is disposed to accept some of them. The storm on Friday night did some damage in the port. Several vessels dragged their anchors, amongst them the brig Villa Nova, which came into sharp collision with a large vessel, and was somewhat damaged.

The season when local news is generally scarce, through the 'haut ton' being in the country and the 'basso volée' anywhere, is approaching. Under such unpleasant circumstances, editors of newspapers in England generally fall back on 'monster gooseberries,' 'wonderful turnips,' pigs with two heads, and calves with none, all which wonders crop up just when they are wanted. Here there is a perpetual stock of very old niggers and negroes available for a news's 'saca.' In yesterday morning's papers we find half a dozen cases of awful longevity. A white gentleman, named Ledesma, at Chascomus, aged 130; a coloured lady named Maria Ballesteros, in Buenos Ayres, aged ditto; and four other ladies and gentlemen, white and black, whose united ages get very near 500.

There is some question as to the correctness of the European telegram announcing the route on the 23rd, in which the French are said to have captured a large quantity of cattle. The French believe this; the Germans don't. The Diario Popular says that in one of the great sorties 3,500 Prussian cavalry were buried at the Mobbles, but a dozen mitrallenses mowed them all down but 300, the dead horses being immediately carried into Paris. It is probably this incident which gave rise to the report of cattle being captured, which latter, however, is quite possible.

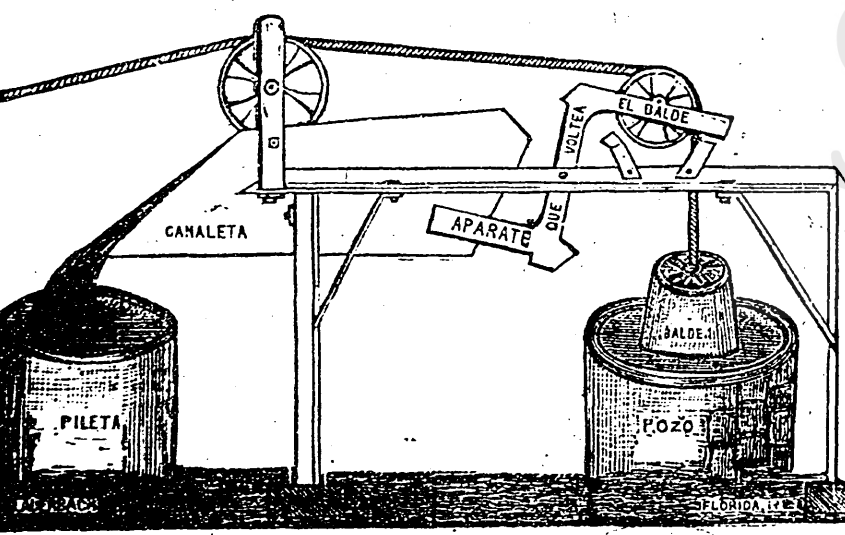
