GORTSCHAKOFF.

The traveller who happened to pass by rail between St. Petersburg and Moscow ten or twelve years ago, heard often enough of those three great Princes, Peter, Michael and Alexander Gortschakoff, whose vast estates lay along the line of the road. They were three brothers, born in 1790-'95, and 1800; the only representatives of one of the oldest and noblest Muscovite families, each was getting old—stood at the height of fame—and was enjoying the increased renown that valuable services rendered in the cabinet and field during the Crimean war had given him. Prince Peter Gortschakoff, then 70, after having been retired as full General, offered himself for active service at the age of 65, and commanded the left wing of the Russian forces at the battle of Alma; Prince Michael, who succeeded Menschikoff as commander-in-Chief of the whole Crimean army, and superintending the protracted defence of Sebastopol, secured with consummate skill the retreat of the Russian forces from the blazing ruins of its fortress, his age then reaching three score; and Prince Alexander, the world renowned diplomatist, who, attached for nearly four decades to the Russian Embassies at Florence and Vienna, Berlin and London, Paris and Constantinople, has just now, as Minister of Foreign Affairs at St. Petersburg, at the age of 71, astonished Europe by his audacity; these three were at that time, perhaps the most distinguished men in the Empire of the Czar. Unlike the Menschikoffs and Orloffs, their blood was all blue. In all Russia there was no nobler, wealthier or more gifted family than the Gortschakoffs. For eight generations save one, a member of the family has been identified as statesman, soldier, poet or public writer, with the peculiar policy that has made the Empire great. It was a Gortschakoff who prompted Alexander I. to say, on his first meeting with the great Napoleon, 'I hate the English as much as you do,' who instigated the firing of Moscow and the Kremlin; who forced onward the subjection of Poland without justice and without mercy; who made Nicholas Czar in spite of the rights of Constantine; who opposed toleration of the Jews, urged persecution of the Roman Catholic Christians, and said of Louis Philippe, when the Bourbons were driven from Paris, 'Is it then true that this beastliness must take place,' and who, nine years ago, opposed to the last the decree that emancipated the serfs. Not the same man of course, but members of the same family, true to tradition, irresistible as a power in the government, wedded to the old policy which has conducted Russia out of barbarism. There has always, from the days of Peter the Great been one of them who has stood foremost in the councils of State.

Of the three brothers named, two are dead. Peter outlived the conclusion of the Crimean war only four years. The greater military commander, Michael, died at the age of 74 three years ago. Prince Alexander, now at the head of Russian Foreign Affairs, is the only Gortschakoff survivor of that generation. The Prince possesses a constitution of iron. He is a man of great industry as well as extraordinary ability. Muscovite in features and shape of head, with eyes that are deep set under slazy gray eyebrows, but which exhibit no signs of dimness; hair thin, long, and perfectly white; a figure rather spare and tall in younger days, but now slightly bent, and a manner peculiar and impressive.

Prince Gortschakoff is hardly likely to be forgotten when once seen. As a diplomatist, he stands in the very first rank; as a statesman he is identified with the old policy of the Czar Peter. That policy was included under several heads.

To keep the Baltic open; to confine the Swedes, then a powerful people, to their peninsula; to weaken and destroy Poland by fomenting intestine divisions; to profit by the decadence of the Ottoman Empire; to enlarge the eastern borders with new territory, and to be reckoned for something in the family of Christian nations, were the six points never to be forgotten.

Amid almost inextinguishable embarrassments in which his passion for reforms had entangled him, this program was put in execution by Peter the Great, and so powerful was the machinery he organized, that his successors for more than 150 years, sometimes in spite of themselves, have been forced along by the mighty impulse. The mastery power of waiting never in all history achieved so great results.

The Baltic has become a Russian sea. Prisoners on their barren soil, the Swedes live only on the military glory of Charles XII. Poland belongs to the past.

in the councils of the Christian nations of the West the voice of Russia is more potent than that of any nation except Prussia.

Five of the six maxims reduced to practical realities within 150 years—This sixth is as certain to be made a fact, perhaps immediately, perhaps in time a little more remote, as that the world goes on.

If Peter the Great organized the future of his vast dominions, it was Catherine II. who crowned the work. To her was due the partition of Poland, that first revolution in the European system; to her is due the design for a second—the humiliation of Turkey, and its extinction as a power. From Catherine to Alexander, and from him to the present Czar, nothing has been done in Europe without consulting Russia. She arbitrated between the young France and the old monarchies in 1793. She played the first part in the Congress of Kings at Vienna after the fall of Napoleon I. She gained preponderance by the Treaty of Adrianople in '29. She came out of the Crimean war stronger than she went in. And she has to-day a preponderance, established on a solid basis, in the affairs of Europe greater than ever before. That this is neither factitious nor transient is evident from her people's territory, comprising more than half of Europe and more than a third of Asia. To speak more exactly, the surface of Russia in Europe exceeds 2,000,000 square miles; that of Russia in Asia is about 6,500,000—a total of 8,500,000 square miles, or more than double that of Europe (the whole surface of which does not comprise four million square miles), and quite a sixth of the habitable globe.—N. Y. Tribune

THE GERMAN CONTROVERSY.

(To the Editors of the Daily Post.)

At the request of a German subscriber we publish the following which merits a perusal.

"Sir,—Three redoubtable pens have been set to work in your paper to-day against my humble efforts to vindicate the truth. A 'civilian' calls me a frantic Tanton, guilty of falsehood, because I did not proclaim the present French army to be poor peasants only, and mere non-combatants. General Trochu may thank him for the compliment; but the Wurtembergers and the Bavarians who met them the other day will scarcely assent to the proposition, and the first Napoleon learnt at Bantzen and Katzbach what such non-combatants, if properly inspired, may accomplish. A 'Civilian' is justly indignant that war is war, engendering passions and enacting scenes at which humanity shudders; but if he has studied the reports of our own correspondents he will acquit the German soldier of anything like the barbarities committed in former wars.

In yesterday's Daily News. "Our Correspondent" at Amiens writes—"If you refuse to credit the canards of Tontonic cruelties, you are considered a Prussian. I have seen both sides. No invading army, whether French or English, would have marched into the bowels of any land with less marks of disorder." Will a 'Civilian' oblige me by referring to the history of the Crimean war, A. D. 1855, and see what barbarities were committed by French and English soldiers at Kerch? Is he aware of the deeds of our French conquerors from 1807 to 1813, when, inter alia, they shot Paulin, the publisher, at Nuremberg, because he sold a book containing disrespectful language to the French—aye, and executed by drum-head the officer of General Schill's corps? But, pardon me, I must not call to mind the tales of war resounding in the ear of every German whose father shared the calamities of those times, or I shall fall into the same mistake which your two Englishmen have made, in warming up for present use the tales of political misdemeanors and crimes committed by the statesmen of former generations. Gracious me! What an indictment of atrocities could be drawn up against every State in Europe if we would look back a hundred years; but this much every student of history will admit, that in applying such a test, the Germans will appear as angels of light compared to their Gallic neighbours. However, let us adhere to the present, agreeably to the suggestion of your Englishman, with the classical turn of mind who coins a barbarous Latin adjective, to which he points with pride, instead of writing "Borussiae fides" like a scholar that he is. Treating them of the present, I should wish to see, instead of vague reference and bold assertions, some proof advanced that popular pretensions have increased and are receding in their equity." I suppose these words imply that Germany, as conditions of peace, now claims more than at the commencement of the war. I deny this flatly, and defy an Englishman to prove that Germany, ever since the opening of the campaign, demanded less. The revindication of Alsace and Lorraine and a peace dictated in Paris formed the programme from the very outset. Of course I mean the popular programme, as statesmen cannot name their terms of peace before the last gun has spoken. Whether the popular programme will prove feasible and wise is quite another question, to be decided by Germany and the God of battles; but people who now maintain that peace ought to have been made at Sedan seem to forget that the Republican Government declined to treat whilst there was a German in France. I wonder what the Duke of Wellington would have thought of a piece of advice such as that volun-

teered by 'an Englishman,' that the Prussians should have gone home 'in the wake of the Basaine army'—what a period of the war that means. Your peaceful-correspondent has evidently profited by Mr. Harrison's wealth of reproachful terms, which it is impossible to treat as grand serious. I will therefore confine myself to ask him one sober question—what can the Germans do to obtain peace on such terms as every impartial politician will consider fairly their due? It seems there is not the slightest disposition on the part of the Republican Government to propose reasonable terms. In fact they fear that the re-establishment of peace would be the signal of their downfall, and therefore selfishly urge on the continuance of a ruinous warfare. Can, under such circumstances, the Germans do anything else than reduce the refractory enemy to reason by hard blows?

I give you the following extract from the letter of a Prussian M.P., dated Berlin, 6th December— "We labour under no illusions; our desire for peace cannot be realised for some considerable time yet; the continued sacrifices disgust us, but there is no help for it until decent terms be accorded. We are about to despatch a hundred thousand fresh troops to France from the Baltic provinces." Thus you hear the prayer for peace everywhere; but it would be too absurd to expect that the victor should conclude it on conditions ignominious to himself. What, therefore, ought he to do at this present juncture?

About the King's so-called perjury it is useless to waste another remark. The leading London papers have so long ago and so thoroughly disposed of this curious accusation that our getting hot over it now would have a terrible smack of provincialism. I remain, &c., A GERMAN.

DEATH OF M. DUMAS.

How much of the public attention is engrossed by the war is illustrated by the fact that the death of the celebrated Alexandre Dumas, which occurred at the small village of Puy, near Dieppe, seven days ago, was only made known this afternoon in London. The well-known novelist had been very ill for several months before his decease, and his friends had, at all events, the melancholy satisfaction of knowing that he passed away without pain, his latter days having degenerated into those of second childhood. At another time, and under more favourable national circumstances, his death would have been quite an event in France, but in the present terrible crisis the announcement of his demise has only called forth a brief announcement in the provincial newspapers. Notwithstanding the general decay of his powers, which, as I have said, some months ago resulted in dotage, his family hoped against hope up till the end; and only a month ago, when there seemed to be some signs of an improvement in his condition, it was confidently stated that he would soon be back again to his old work. Few purely literary men perhaps have gone through such a strange career, and fewer still have equalled him in the multiplicity of his labors. He turned out novels by the dozen, and, in fact, employed apprentices to do rough work of his craft much in the same way as Tolbin has the groundwork of his scenes painted by his assistants. Paris and her boulevards will miss him much, especially one noted 'café' in the Italiens, where it was the custom of the grizzily-headed old man to discourse on an afternoon with his friends. He enjoyed the reputation of being one of the best 'connaisseurs' in the French capital, and few among modern men of letters were more popular in Parisian society than the author of "Monte Christo."

Alexander-Davy Dumas was born at Villers-Cotterets, in the department of the Aisne, on the 24th July, 1803. His father, of the same name, distinguished himself during the revolutionary wars, and was the illegitimate son of a negress in St. Domingo. After his father's death Damas repaired to Paris, where he procured a clerkship in the office of the Duke of Orleans, afterwards King. He devoted all his leisure time to supplying the defects of his education, and soon acquired a taste for literature, to which he was stimulated through the representation of "Hamlet" by an English company. He resolved to be a dramatist, and produced shortly afterwards "Henri III. et sa Cour," which was well received, and spread the name of the author far and wide. His success in the drama induced him to write a great number of other pieces, which followed in rapid succession, and many of which were acted with much acceptance. But M. Dumas is better known as a novelist than as a dramatist, more especially by his novels "Monte Christo" and "Les Trois Mousquetaires," both of which have been translated into most European languages. He visited England during the general election of 1857, and in 1860 he was with Garibaldi, whose memoir he wrote. For a short time he held the office of Conservator of the Naples Museum. In 1852 he began to publish his "Memoirs," of which several volumes have appeared. It is said that the full extent of his writings comprise more than 1,200 volumes! How many of them will live?

ON CHANGE. Jan. 23, 1871. Consols, 100 400 Sovereigns, 122 1/2 National Bonds, 66 1/2 The Bond market looked fat to-day; the bears tried to push prices down, but there were no buyers. For cash 3,300 sold at 66 1/2; for Jan. 31 20,000 at 66 1/2. Some parties offered to sell for the end of March, but nothing was concluded. Exchange was done to-day at 60, and on Antwerp at 6 3/2 and 5 1/4; not much passed. Some new credits, it appears, have come out, and new bills are now offering in the market, but we heard of none as yet passed.

The auction at the Lomas proved a great success; some of the property sold at the rate of 210,000 mps per square, and the lowest at the rate of 75,000 mps per square; the lots are situated about one square from the church and three from the station. Mr. Naylor, one of the managers of the River Plate Bank, was welcomed on Change to-day on his return from Cordoba and Rosario. Money ruled in good demand to-day, and best city paper was done at from 8 to 9 per cent. Some advances on bonds are spoken of at a higher rate. One of the most important matters to-day was the closing of the new street running through the Arroyo quita at the top of Calle Cerrito by order of the Legislature. This will probably entitle the owner of the property to heavy damages against the Municipality—and many parties who have built houses facing on the new street now find themselves shut in; and without any means of outlet to the public streets. The matter is a very serious one, and calculated to give rise to much litigation.

The sale of 4,000 American hides in Montevideo was announced to-day at 6 1/2; and 5,000 ar. wool at 25 gold. Dates from Rio are to 18th inst. Exchange rules the same—80vs. 109230. The Palestine took the following cargo—500 bales, 2,000 dry hides, 122 boxes of extractum carnis, 250 pipes tallow, 300 pipes oil; and about 400 bales waiting in Montevideo. The reported seizure of Goys by the rebels, although known on Change on Saturday, seems to have had no great effect on the market—in fact the Entre Rios war has become so chronic that very little attention whatever is paid to the matter now. Those connected with the up river trade complain severely of the loss and ruin entailed by the war, but on the other hand the continuation of hostilities always tends to improve certain branches of trade, and the War-office is at present spending very large sums in fitting out steamers, &c.


