





EDITOR'S TABLE.

The announcement of the death of the Very Rev. Canon Fahy caused the most profound sensation of sorrow in the city yesterday morning, more especially amongst the English community, by every member of which he was known and esteemed.

The German's mails were delivered on Sunday at an early hour. The Post-office authorities report them unusually light.

The Copernicus arrived at M. Vileo on Sunday morning. She brings the mails of the 20th January, the Others only sailing on the 30th January. The Copernicus will be despatched by Messrs. J. P. Boyd and Co. for Antwerp on the 27th inst. calling at Santos and Rio. She entered this port yesterday afternoon.

Carnival opened on Sunday, though on Saturday evening the streets presented a gay and crowded appearance, and scent throwing was vigorously carried on. On Sunday the amusements of all kinds began in regular form. Some of the comparas exhibit really beautiful uniforms and possess good bands.

The Carnival ball at the Progreso Club on Sunday night passed off with great éclat and success. The gorgeous saloons were crowded with a fashionable crowd, which closed "the glowing hours with flying feet" till daylight yesterday morning.

We are happy to announce that there was a sensible diminution in the number of cases of yellow-fever yesterday and the day before. The fall in the temperature, which is very sensible, particularly at night, has brought about this happy change, which it is to be hoped will continue.

A passenger who came down yesterday from the Uruguay gave us an important piece of news. Lopez Jordan has fled from Entre Rios to the Banda Oriental, and joined the Blanco rebels. The rebellion in this republic may, therefore, be regarded as terminated.

UNITED STATES PUBLIC LANDS.

The following important statement respecting the public lands in the United States is taken from Pres Grant's address:—

During the last fiscal year 809,511,300 acres of public lands were disposed of. Of this large quantity 369,391,005 acres were taken up under the Homestead law, and 215,951,781 acres more gold for cash. The remainder was located with Military Warrant, College or Indian Scrip, or applied in satisfaction of grants of railroads, or for other public uses.

The quantity of land in the market will amply satisfy the present demand. The claim of the settler under the Homestead or Pre-emption laws is not however, limited to lands subject to sale at private entry. Any unappropriated surveyed public land may, to a certain extent, be acquired under the former laws, if the party entitled to enter under them will comply with the requirements they prescribe in regard to residence and cultivation.

The opinion that the public lands should be regarded chiefly as a source of revenue is no longer maintained. The rapid settlement and successful cultivation of them are now justly considered of more importance to our well-being than is the fund which the sale of them would produce. The remarkable growth and prosperity of our new States and Territories attest the wisdom of the legislation which invites the tiller of the soil to secure a permanent home on terms within the reach of all.

The time-honored and beneficent policy of setting apart certain sections of public land for educational purposes

in the new States should be continued. When ample provision shall have been made for these objects, I submit as a question worthy of serious consideration whether the residue of our national domain should not be wholly disposed of under the provisions of the Homestead and Pre-emption laws. In addition to the swamp and overflowed lands granted to States in which they are situated, the lands taken under the Agricultural College acts for internal improvement purposes under the act of September, 1841, and the acts supplementary thereto, there had been conveyed to the close of the last fiscal year, by patent or other equivalent evidence of title to States and corporations 2,783,625,763 and 1-100 acres for railroads, canals, and wagon roads. It is estimated that there is an additional quantity of 174,735,523 acres still under grants for like uses.

The policy of thus aiding the States in building works of internal improvement was inaugurated more than 40 years since in the grants to Indiana and Illinois, to aid those States in opening canals to connect the waters of the Wabash with those of Lake Erie, and the waters of the Illinois with those of Lake Michigan. It was followed, with some modification in the grant to Illinois of alternate sections of public land within certain limits to the Illinois Central Railway. Fourteen States and sundry corporations have received similar subsidies, in connection with railroads completed or in process of construction. As the several sections are rated at the double minimum, the sale of them at the enhanced price has thus, in many instances, indemnified the Treasury for the granted land.

The construction of some of these thoroughfares has undoubtedly given a vigorous impetus to the development of our resources and the settlement of the more distant portions of the country. It may, however, be well insisted that much of our legislation in this regard has been characterized by indiscriminate and profuse liberality. The United States should not loan their credit in aid of any enterprise undertaken by States or corporations, nor grant lands in any instance unless the projected work is of acknowledged material importance. I am strongly inclined to the opinion that it is inexpedient and unnecessary to bestow subsidies of either description; but, should Congress determine otherwise, I earnestly recommend that the right of settlers and of the public be more effectually secured and perfected by appropriate legislation.

MUNICIPAL REFORMS. To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen,

Being a stranger in your city I necessarily looked forward (for all the glowing accounts I have read in print) to see something really worth looking at, and I must say in this I have been most disappointed, and I was most struck with seeing an elaborate report from a gentleman (known in England as a sanitary engineer) upon the different subjects connected with a proposed dock for the port of Buenos Ayres, or, I may say, a sea-wall extending from land to land, with a proposal to dredge or deepen the interior. With all due regard to the said gentleman's opinion I think, and firmly believe this to be a great mistake, because the sand, mud, &c. being excavated, forming a lower level, and also the channel he proposes will naturally cause a fresh lot of sand, mud, &c. to form, and this will form faster than it can be dredged and cleared away, I fully expected seeing something new in his report, but am not aware of any new feature being introduced, except where he speaks of the port proposed for Ensenada. He condemns this port because the wind does not happen to blow favorably for vessels going in and out. This I am afraid will never see, as it is an impossibility for it to be favorable to both. I need not quote his words, as the report stands it should be read by those interested, but I would earnestly call your attention to a matter of far more importance than spending an immense amount upon an experimental structure, and to appropriate some of the money to a saving of life. I would call your attention to the state of the streets, sewerage, ventilation, &c. No wonder yellow-fever has set in; my only wonder is that you are ever free from it, and other contagious diseases. Take your streets, those that are recently paved, the unequal surface, simply because the stones are too large. Why not get a Blake or Maraden stone-breaking machine? This would break them to one size, from ten to twelve tons per hour, or would crush them smaller, when they could be incorporated with sand and lime, and laid and rolled, and make a first-rate road, instead of the present petrified rams the wrong way up.

I would remind you that wood has been tried years ago, and found not to answer. With the materials I see in Buenos Ayres I could make a good, hard road, properly drained and channeled.

Secondly, look at the drainage in and out of the city. In the present age of civilization and improvement it is simply wretched. No drains; all the filth that is generated thrown on the surface, the fluids completely saturating the loose earth strata. What drains are formed are surface drains, and generally brought through to the front, passing each entrance door into the street. Surely this is not drainage.

Then again, look at the river called the Boca. Would it be possible to find a greater source of pollution?—In fact a river of blood, the stench from which is abominable; a complete hotbed for yellow fever, cholera morbus, etc. etc. Thirdly, look at the ventilation in nine out of ten shops, cafes, etc. There is only one doorway, which answers for door and window, and this generally covered over with a large curtain. And this is the only means of ventilation for places in some extending 40 feet back, with from 20 to 50 persons inside—say 8,000 cubic feet of air, with a doorway of 28 feet; from the average, say 35, the air expelled from their lungs, equal to 10 feet per minute, would vitiate the whole room in less than half an hour. No ventilating shaft, no fire-place, in fact nothing but bare walls. Look at the water-closet system used by the inhabitants generally. This and the drainage seem to me to be the last things thought of in house building etc.; whereas they should be the first things done. These two items alone are the primary cause of cholera, fevers, etc. Coupled with these is the water supply. Generally the public use rain water, which is left standing many months. A wingglass-full taken out and examined by the microscope would convince anyone as to what he was drinking. I have not as yet been able to examine, but if taken from the river I hope it is filtered.

Having had practical experience in these matters for the last thirty years I would offer a few remarks. 1st. Your city is most favorably situated for carrying out a good, sound system of drainage. 2nd. Your water supply might be improved. 3rd. With a proper system of drainage, your water-closet system would necessarily follow. 4th. British Naturalisation Acts (1870.)

NOTICE TO BRITISH SUBJECTS. The attention of British subjects, who have become naturalized in the Republics of the River Plate, is called to the passing of the Act to Amend the Law, relating to the legal condition of aliens and British subjects' (33 Vict., cap. 14, May 12th, 1870.), and which are as follows:—

HOW BRITISH-BORN SUBJECT MAY CEASE TO BE SUCH. Any person who by reason of his having been born within the dominions of Her Majesty is a natural-born subject, but who also at the time of his birth became the subject of any foreign state, subject of such state, and is still such subject, may, if of full age and not under any disability, make a declaration of allegiance in manner allowed by the Act, after the making of such declaration of allegiance such person shall cease to be a British subject.

EXPATRIATION. Any British subject, who has at any time before or after the passing of this Act, when in any foreign state, and not under any disability, voluntarily become naturalized in such state, shall from and after the time of such naturalization, be deemed to have ceased to be a British subject, and to be regarded as an alien, provided— 1. That where any British subject has before the passing of this Act voluntarily become naturalized in a foreign state, and yet is desirous of remaining a British subject, he may, at any time within two years after the passing of this Act, make a declaration that he is desirous of remaining a British subject, and upon such declaration, he shall be deemed to have ceased to be a British subject, and to be regarded as an alien, provided— 2. A declaration of allegiance taken may be made, and the oath of allegiance taken as follows: that he is to say:—If the declarant be in the United Kingdom, in the presence of a Justice of the Peace; if elsewhere in Her Majesty's dominions, in the presence of any judge of any court of civil or criminal jurisdiction, of any justice of the peace, or of any other officer being authorized by law in the place in which the declarant is to administer an oath for any judicial or other legal purpose. If out of Her Majesty's dominions, in the presence of any diplomatic officer in the diplomatic or consular service of Her Majesty.
