ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

To-day is the great national festival of 12 millions of our race, who claim their descent from that Green Isle which the poets call

"First flower of the earth And first gem of the sea."

The beams of this morning's sun are saluted with enthusiastic rejoicing in every country where the name of Ireland or Irishman is known.

Irishmen have done much towards the advancement of the human race in liberty, literature, and civilization.

The present age is, indeed, one of practical utility, when people are disposed to award a higher gradation to Brunel and Stevenson than to the author of Lalla Rookh or the hero of Waterloo.

It cannot but be a source of satisfaction that the condition of Ireland is every day improving.

The Ireland of to-day cannot, perhaps, point to many men who will leave their mark on History's page; still we find Irishmen of great merit in every walk of life, not merely in the United Kingdom, but in various foreign countries; men who do their duty to the land of their adoption, and make up for a mediocrity of talent by honesty of purpose and persevering labors.

On a day like the present it is not suitable to introduce political questions; suffice it to congratulate the Irish people on the achievement of a degree of Liberty, combined with law and domestic peace, that is not surpassed by any country in Christendom.

Circular to the Foreign Diplomatic Corps. Department of Foreign Offices, La Paz, 30th January 1871.

The undersigned Secretary General of the Government of Bolivia has the honor to inform Your Excellency that in consequence of the splendid victory obtained on the 15th inst., by the Bolivian people over the tyrant D. Mariano Melgarejo, who has abandoned the territory of the Republic to expiate his crime in foreign regions, the new National Government has been organized and constituted under the Provisional Presidency of H. E. Colonel Augustin Morales, who has been elected by all the Bolivians and proclaimed the saviour of the liberties and institutions of this nation.

Your Excellency cannot have ignored the illegitimacy of Don Mariano Melgarejo's rule in Bolivia, and the most eloquent proof of it may be found in the numerous protests of the people that have arisen en masse to overthrow this monster. Y. E. has witnessed the course of events in the revolution, and will be able to do justice to the generosity, legitimate and popular origin of the new Government.

In communicating this to Y. E. the undersigned has the satisfaction to manifest the sentiments of fraternity that we entertained by H. E. Colonel Morales, whose most sacred wish is to cultivate and bind closer the good understanding and amicable relations that happily exist between the Government of Bolivia and the Republic of so worthy representatives by Y. E.

Be pleased, Sir, to acquaint your Government with an occurrence so notorious in the history of Bolivia, and accept the profound consideration of regard and esteem which the undersigned has the honor to express to Y. E. remaining Your Excellency's Most obedient servant, CASIMIRO CORRAL, To His Excellency the Minister of War near the Government of Bolivia.
