FROM CHIVILCOY TO MENDOZA

NEW COLONY OF CONCORDIA.

From Chivilcoy to Mendoza, as the bird flies, the distance is about 600 miles.

These wild Western camps are almost unexplored, being Indian territory as soon as we pass the Bragado frontier.

They resemble in great manner the Western States of North America, and are, doubtless, destined to become as fine a field for emigration.

Being unencumbered with timber the land is ready for the plough; the soil is probably the richest in the world, and will give continuous crops of wheat for 20 years or more, without the necessity of manure or irrigation.

In its present condition it is covered with grass, in some places higher than 6 feet. Lagoons are met with only at long intervals, but water is easily found by digging wells. Hitherto the danger of Indians has deterred settlers from venturing far beyond Bragado, but as soon as agricultural colonists in sufficient number begin to open up this fine country the red men of the desert will retire before them as they did from the colonies of Santa Fé.

We have now the pleasure to announce that the first step towards the Andes has been given, by the establishment of an agricultural colony about 100 miles beyond Chivilcoy, between the Lagoons known as Aljorrobas and Ballanca.

The Concordia colony is to be the first of four that the present company intend to establish. Each family receives a free grant of a farm lot of 210 acres (1,125,000 sq. varas), a garden of eight acres, and a building site among the town-lots of two acres each.

The total area of the colony is 2 1/2 square leagues, say 15,000 acres, which will be sufficient for 70 families, mustering say 500 souls.

The gentlemen in England whose names appear on the Directory, and some of whom (if the charges be true) we trust will indignantly throw up their connection with a business which is attaining such unenviable notoriety.

We translate from our Montevideoan colleague as follows—

"Before Senen Rodriguez concluded his contract with Messrs. Waring Brothers he learned that Messrs. Simmons made a proposal to construct the Central Uruguay Railway at much less cost. He then offered to Messrs. Simmons a sum of money to withdraw their proposal, but the latter at once wrote out to their agent in Montevideo, expressing their surprise at the way in which Rodriguez was acting."

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SYMPATHY FOR BUENOS AYRES.

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Don Santiago Estrada made an eloquent speech, thanking the Chileans for their generosity. Dr. Amadeo de Amadeo embarked for the River Plate to lend his professional services; he has had much experience of plagues, at Bengazi in Africa, at Venice (1849) and Constantinople (1853).

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REPUBLIC OF PARAGUAY V. LYNCH AND ANOTHER.

This case came before the City Court (before Vice-Chancellor Sir R. Malins) on April 20, on a motion to commit Messrs. Chappell's (the plaintiffs) solicitor for contempt of court, in causing to be published in the Daily News an advertisement stating that an order had been made which in fact was not made. The bill was filed on March 21st last for a receiver, pending proceedings in the Probate Court, in reference to the will of the late General Lopez, and it alleged that Lopez, availing himself of his position as President, obtained from the Republic large sums, which he transmitted to this country, and of which Madame Lynch, who lived with him as his wife, was taking steps to obtain possession. On the day on which the bill was filed the plaintiffs obtained an interim order, extending over March 23, restraining Madame Lynch and General McMahon (formerly United States Minister at Paraguay) from dealing with the money in question, and on the 23rd, the defendants not appearing, the order was extended to April 20. It turned out that the affidavit of service was not sufficient, and the order therefore taken *ex parte*. The next day application was made on behalf of the defendants to discharge that order, and in the absence of anyone representing the plaintiffs, an undertaking not to deal with the money was substituted for it. 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he should drag her to the bed in the last act. THE NORTHERN RAILWAY. Gentlemen, As it seems all the rage at present for the public of Buenos Ayres to rush into print against the various railway companies, the Northern in particular, perhaps a few lines in your next issue would not be amiss from a servant of the Northern, who, perhaps, knows a little more about the affairs of the Northern than some of the individuals who have been writing against the company of late in the various papers.

Now that the fever is over there is a great quantity of people who moment they arrive in town they commence to talk about the fever, &c., whereas they know nothing at all about it, as far as they were concerned they might as well have been in London or New York, all they know about it is from the papers.

I think it very unfair on their part to condemn those who were at their work during the whole time of the plague. If the railway officials, from the manager downwards, had joined in the general scold for the camp, I am afraid a few of the public would have been left behind. I consider that a railway servant has just as much right to run as any one else (he is only a man). In that article by the minister of the English Church, he mentions the number of deaths on the different railways. If any one would take the trouble to find out the number of men employed on each, and the number dead, they will find out that the Northern has suffered the most. I have no doubt but the Southern men are thankful they got off so easy.

As an instance I might mention that only one engine driver ran all the time, amongst the conductors only two, all the rest either dead or sick; not to mention station masters, clerks, &c. You mentioned the other day that the Western Company intended giving to their men a bonus for their extra work; perhaps the general public are not aware that Mr. Crabtree gave in addition to their month's pay to engine drivers, a present of \$1,000 mg each, two months ago.

In conclusion, I must add that the regular passengers by the trains assist the servants to their utmost, and often put themselves to a deal of trouble. The people who gave us the most trouble were those who had a ticket for a month, a thing they never had before, or never will again, until the next epidemic breaks out.

It is very seldom you hear a regular passenger complain against the company's servants, as far as my experience goes I have always been treated by the respectable part of the passengers with the utmost civility.

I remain, Yours respectfully, A COMPANY SERVANT. CITY OF BUENOS AYRES TRAMWAY COMPANY. An extraordinary general meeting of this Company was held on April 12, Mr. B. Isaacs in the chair. The Chairman said he had to propose the adoption of the report and accounts as now presented to the shareholders. They would find that the receipts to the last meeting were very nearly correct, but that the expenditure was rather more than it was supposed to be. Mr. Spencer Herapath wished to add that the local committee's report complained of the trumpeters, and he hoped they would succeed in soon obtaining from the municipal government the abolition of this absurd and costly nuisance. The earnings for January were £1,500 in round numbers, and this was equal to £18,000 a year—a sufficiently remunerative return to pay them a very handsome dividend indeed. He cordially seconded the motion. In reply to questions, the Chairman said he did not think they could get the accounts made up sufficiently prompt to allow of their paying a quarterly dividend, but it should have the consideration of the Board. There remained four and a half miles still to be made, which would cost more money, from their having to be paved by the Company; but they had no concession to purchase in this case, which originally cost them £1000 per mile. He hoped at the next meeting to have to lay before them a balance-sheet which would allow the declaration of a very handsome dividend. The report was then adopted, and the special resolution passed at the general meeting held on 23rd March confirmed.

There was an awkward change made in the Bolso-day, the blackboard was put against the liquidation room and large scaffolding on either side of the hall. Brokers and merchants complain much of the inconvenience and it is to be hoped that the improvements of the Bolso will be concluded as quickly as possible.

Some shares of the Lobos Branch Railway were offered for sale to-day. These shares belong to estancieros who have subscribed for the road and live along the line. They are not offered by the Government, but it is thought that the Government ought to buy up all these shares and remain sole owner of the Lobos branch.

There were no telegrams from Montevideo to-day; the wires are out by the belligerents, who refuse to allow them to be repaired. Loans on National Bonds at 12 per cent. and on Municipal Bonds at the same rate at a valuation of 70 good city bills which difficulty does not under 1 1/2 per cent per month, which is the rate the Government is paying on renewals.

Respecting the Brazilian concession for the cable telegraph to the Plata, we are informed that Mr. Julio Jurdole is a concessionaire. The Copernicus, Captain Verrill, will sail for Liverpool on Friday. As there will be no paper issued on that day, Thursday being a holiday, we shall publish a special supplement on Friday morning for the Copernicus.

The Copernicus has brought news from Brazil. The Minister of Finance has furnished a most luminous report on the financial state of the Empire, which shows the gigantic growth of the trade of Brazil. The report in question we shall publish to-morrow. Much attention is paid in it to some samples of Indian-rubber which have been sent from Mato Grosso, and which article promises to be a new staple in that distant province. Two of the Thompson road steamers are now plying on the public roads in the province of Parana and with great success. A company of Americans arrived the other day in a schooner from Boston at Mañanos, bound for Bolivia to start an agricultural colony. Owing to some dispute the party separated at Mañanos, and gave up the Bolivian scheme. Some remained at Mañanos, others went to Purus, and the remainder joined the American colony at Santarem. Another new steamer for the Amazon Navigation Company has arrived from England at Plata, she is called the 'Carmy'. The merchants of Maranhao report a severe shock of earthquake on the 5th April, which shook the houses and frightened everyone.

The steamer Calderon, which brought the last news from Europe, is one of the new steamers of the Rio Grande line built in England and belonging to Messrs Stephen Husk & Co. of Rio. The Camoes of the same line is another new steamer which has just arrived at Plata for the same owners. Respecting the Rio Exchange markets we have the following.

The Banks opened at 2 1/2, and desirous to find the Government to advance their rates, on the following days drew at 2 1/2, but soon declined to 2 1/4, and eventually withdrew from the market.

The Government offered to draw £200,000 at 2 1/2, 14 days, or at 2 1/4, at 90 days. This amount has been taken, and negotiations have been pending for a large amount of Treasury drafts, with one of the banks.

Commercial bills, during the fortnight have ruled at 2 1/2, 2 1/4 and 2 1/2, at which latter rate there are but few drawers.

The table which we gave to-day of home and foreign exports represent the average value exported during the year in question, as estimated by Mr. C. F. Woodgate, one of the best authorities in matters in the River Plate.

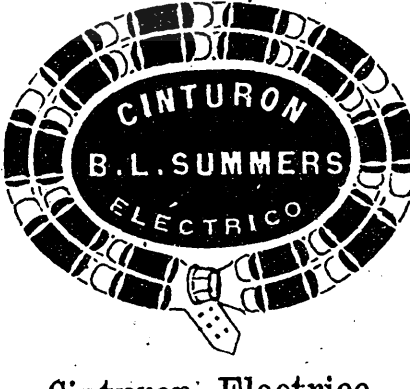
