





In addition to these leading partic- lars, we may add a few others: all the bricks and most of the lime used in building the houses now erected on the colony have been made in the colony itself; the farmer's houses are generally neat and substantial, of from 6 to 7 apartments each, and the situation of each house is well chosen; commanding a fine and 200 uninterrupted prospect over the surrounding pampa; and it would perhaps, be difficult to find any part of the country so well adapted for the colony as the very estates on which it is happily settled.

The industry and activity which prevail all over the colony are truly praiseworthy, and it cannot be too gratifying to see at this distance from home the members of a little community like this preserving all the sober and moral habits acquired in their own country. It emigration, organized as this of the Scotch colony has been, were extended in this sphere, who can say to what degree the beneficial effect of such a widened example would have on the agricultural class of this country?

One produce of the industry of our Monte Grande friends is well known in town, in the shape of butter and cheese; in fact, the colony almost exclusively supplies the market with articles of our daily use, and in consequence of the great crops of Indian corn raised there, that article has remained stationary and low in price while nearly everything else has risen to three or four fold what they used to cost.

Among the great improvements introduced by the farmers of Monte Grande, that of the 'tala hedge' is, perhaps the greatest; nothing beyond a simple ditch was ever even thought of before in farming operations, and it would be difficult to say whether its expense or insecurity were the greatest. The 'tala' is a thorny tree which no animal destroys, and which in three years makes a permanent enclosure, thus uniting permanency, cheapness, utility, and beauty in its favour as a fence.

For clearing the land of thistles, an ingenious machine has been invented by Mr. Tweedie, the head gardener of Santa Catalina; and so persecuted has the emblem of Scotland been at Monte Grande that there is every prospect of its soon being known there in its typical character. The mill erected in the incipient village promises immense advantages to the colony, since it produces in abundance, from the Indian corn, a flour which many of our town readers could not distinguish from flour made from wheat.

We have already alluded to the moral excellence of the colonists, and we shall only add that they have lived here in uninterrupted harmony among themselves, and on the best terms generally with their surrounding neighbours, natives of the country. The proprietors of the colony have invariably found all the members of it reasonable, cheerful, and contented, and the heads of the establishment, or farmers, express their increasing confidence of their ultimate and entire success.

On the whole, we cannot but feel the greatest satisfaction in contemplating the actual results produced from the trial which Messrs. Robertson made in colonizing here; we think it proved beyond contradiction that with good management and support from our own country to this might be carried on, with manifold advantages to both, to a great extent; and in this feeling we give our best wishes for the successful realization of the company projected by the proprietors of Monte Grande.

### DREADFUL NEWS FROM RIO.

#### DESTRUCTION OF THE ARSENAL.

The *Telegrafo Maritimo* of the 21st has the following:— On Tuesday, the 13th instant, the Imperial Arsenal at Rio Janeiro was burned to the ground. The fire began at midnight in the graving dock, and rapidly spread to the whole establishment. The Chief of the Fire Brigade was advised of it at 10 minutes past 1 a.m., and at once hastened to the spot where he was quickly joined by his staff, with 3 fire-engines. The flames had already destroyed the building yard, machinery department, steamboat depot, turning offices, and second section. All efforts were, therefore, directed towards saving the warehouses of the first department, and preventing the flames from spreading to the adjoining edifices, viz.—The manager's offices, boys' barracks, museum, and new ware-houses, in which latter were a quantity of materials, ammunition, tailoring stores, artillery depot, and the naval hospital.

At 5.30 a.m. the fire was so far kept within bounds, but not quite got under; it was, however, thought, that by working the pumps incessantly for 24 or 30 hours the flames would be completely extinguished. Besides all the above edifices destroyed, the flames consumed the paint stores, mathematical instruments, &c., but the armory was saved, except some 30,000 stand of arms. The origin of the fire is as yet unknown.

So great was the heat caused by the flames that the sick people in the neighbouring hospital of Misericordia had to be removed, and some of them died in the streets while being so removed to another hospital.

Among those who were at the scene of disaster were E. B. H. Count D'Eu,

Viscount Rio Branco, the other Ministers of State, the Chief of Police, the commanders and delegates of the Municipal sections, several officers of the army, with detachments of troops, &c. Numbers of civilians also lent valuable assistance. H.M.S. Egunote, the U.S. flag-ship Lancaster, and the Brazilian vessels Brazil and Galgo, rendered prompt aid with their fire-engines, and all the other vessels in port sent boats' crews to help in extinguishing the flames. There were in all 18 fire engines on the ground, including the steam engine of the Arsenal.

The loss is estimated at £300,000 or upwards.

### MONTEVIDEO.

Thursday. The peace negotiations do not seem to have entirely fallen through, as the *Tribuna* says that Gen. Osorio started yesterday for Aparicio's headquarters to lay before the Blanco chief the terms to which President Balle is disposed to accede, and to request the Blanco commissioners to come in to Las Piedras to confer with those of the Government.

A great fraud has been committed by a man named Berry, who forged a bill purporting to be signed by Admiral Lobo, commander of the Spanish station, negotiating same through the agency of a broker named Antonio Pino. The amount was 18,000 hard dollars, and Berry gave out that he had committed suicide; but it is now ascertained that he escaped to Chile yesterday in the steamer Hector, which sailed for Valparaiso. Pino has been arrested; but produced a 'changador,' who admitted that he was sent by Berry to Pino and received from the latter a bag full of gold, which he delivered to Berry at the Hotel de Paris. When the police went to the hotel they found a ballet dancer in Berry's room, who confessed that he (Berry) had been there with a bag of gold, but that he had gone away with the money. It seems Berry had been previously employed by Admiral Lobo.

Yesterday were interred the remains of Benito Nunez, the oldest printer in these countries; he worked as a pressman 40 years ago, before Hoe or steam presses were thought of. It is rumored here that General Vedia, brother-in-law to General Mitre, will be named Minister to Rio, to succeed Pantero.

Mr. John Robertson, Uruguayan Consul at St. Johns New Brunswick, has been to-day nominated Consul General for this Republic in Canada.

### THE FALKLAND ISLANDS.

Our readers will learn with great pleasure that the handful of Englishmen in the Falkland Islands have spontaneously raised a very handsome subscription for the relief of those of our country people who have suffered by the recent plague. When we consider that the total population of the Falkland Islands is only 230 souls, and that the contribution acknowledged at foot is over £20 sterling, it must be admitted that the gift is truly magnificent.

The Rev. Dr. Smith, English chaplain, begs to acknowledge the receipt of the following sums, forwarded by the Rev. C. Bull to the Rev. S. Adams, to be applied "for the relief of Her Majesty's subjects suffering from the visitation of yellow fever at Buenos Ayres."

### EDITOR'S TABLE.

"Old Times" at the STANDARD office yesterday—Patagonia in, going good hard all the morning, and bulletins out fully an hour before any other paper in town. Subscribers rushing in for news. All the brokers in town coming to know about the gold per Neva and Flamsted. Bull-baiting shouting out going, going, gone, to some sweet magnolias or delightful camellias. Governor Castro and half the magnates of Buenos Ayres in our 'patio' buying plants, reading bulletins and, cheek-by-jowl with sturdy camp subscribers who came to pay up back subscriptions, purchase English newspapers, see the museum, and hear the prospects of the wool market. "Old times," we hail ye! Is there no Eliza Cook in Buenos Ayres? To write us a sonnet now that returning prosperity has dispelled the gloom, in which editors, auctioneers, governors, brokers, and even camp subscribers, were so long enveloped.

The steamer Patagonia, of the Pacific and West Coast line, arrived at Montevideo early yesterday morning. She brings the pleasing intelligence that 'l'ordre regne a Paris,' and that business has been partially resumed. The Assembly, which had at once resumed its sittings in the capital, declared the reconstruction of all the public buildings and monuments destroyed by the Commune. The Spaniards seem dissatisfied with their Italian King, and have made an unsuccessful attempt to assassinate him.

The French mail brought particulars of a terrible catastrophe at Rio. The arsenal, one of the glories of the Brazilian capital, was almost totally destroyed by fire on the 13th inst. Full particulars will be found in another column.

The munificent subscriptions collected in London for the relief of the yellow fever sufferers here have naturally attracted great attention in all circles of this city, as proving the genuine sympathy Englishmen entertain for this country. In another column we give a detailed account of the meeting which preceded the opening of the subscription list.

Spring weather prevailed yesterday, and although the streets were in a condition that the filthiest coral in the camp could not vie with, the number of fair customers to be observed in the various 'tiendas' was greater than we have seen since the plague disappeared. Dry goods of all kinds seem in considerable demand, though the weather is decidedly inclined to dampness.

A highroad is about to be constructed between the provinces of Cordoba and Santiago by Mr. Charles de Mont, who has secured the necessary authorization from the Nat. Government. The road will run from Mar Chiquita to Abipones.

The 'preserved meat' problem is again on its trial in Chile. Sr. Vazquez, a Santiago chemist, has taken up the cry of 'Eureka,' which has already been shouted in vain by so many chemists in all parts of the globe. As yet no details of the new process have reached us.

The Sociedad Rural has called a meeting of its members and all interested who choose to assist for Friday next, to take into consideration the effect the closing of the saladeros has had on the cattle and sheep breeding interests. We recommend our country friends to attend this meeting if possible, as the subject is one of vital interest to them.

Several passengers from England by the Flamsted came up yesterday morning in the America. The Flamsted is expected in port to-day or to-morrow, and will no doubt, like the French mail steamer, be subjected to a short quarantine, as she has a foul bill of health from Bahia. The Gironda's passengers will obtain 'pratique' on Monday.

We intend publishing some particulars of the escape of Dr. Livingstone, the great African traveller, in an early issue; to-day we cannot find space for the purpose. The Dr. was last heard from in April of the present year; he was then with some friendly Arabs at Ujiji, with eight followers, but without means of moving. Dr. Kirk sent aid to him in November, but that had not reached him at the latest date from Ujiji.

The port authorities at the Tigre lately ordered that no more vessels should be repaired in the 'Canal' at that place, as it obstructed the river, and that all ship-building establishments should be removed to the Lujan. This edict is complained of in some quarters, as it has given rise to much inconvenience.

The Provincial Government is about to erect a large general hospital in Calle Rio Bamba, between Calles Temple and Paraguay. Two 'manzanas' of ground have been purchased as a site for the new building, which will cost 6,000,000 paper dollars.

The Caldera, of the Pacific line, is announced to sail from Montevideo for Liverpool on the 27th, Tuesday next; the mail for this vessel left here last night.

The Indians on the Santiago, Cordoba, and Santa Fe frontiers are said to be preparing for a grand raid at the next full moon. It is said the savages have seized some firearms from the Italian colony at Goya, and which they intend to make use of in the coming fight; the National Government is said to have full information of all the intended movements of the Indians.

Five thousand patacons have been collected in San Juan for the sufferers from yellow fever in Buenos Ayres and Corrientes. The amount will be equally divided between the two cities.

The Provincial Government has named the 16th of July for the election of 10 members to the Convention, to fill the vacancies lately occurred in that body by death and resignations. We cut the following paragraphs from late English papers:— "The *Patrie* says that Count von Moltke is engaged in reorganizing the German army on the regular peace footing of 700,000 men. This is nearly twice its former strength.

"At a meeting of the Town Council of Southampton, held yesterday, it was resolved that the Emperor of Brazil, when he makes his intended trip to this country, shall be officially received and presented with an address.

"A magnificent secretary, which formerly belonged to Marie Antoinette, was sold by auction in London, last week for 2500 guineas. It has lately been the property of an English nobleman."

Mr. Adolfo Bahrioh held an auction of plants in the front 'patio' at STANDARD Court yesterday, and was, as usual, very successful in the prices he obtained; some very nice Camellias were disposed of and a host of other plants at enormous prices.

The increase of duties paid into the Rosario Custom House is attracting attention; on the 20th inst. the receipts on imports alone were 6503 patacons. A number of Baesque emigrants have found Rosario and have almost all secured employment. A new saladero is about to be built on the barranca; some Buenos Ayres capitalists are said to be the projectors.

There is a portrait of the esteemed Martinez de Hoz, by Aguyari, now on view at Fusoni's, which is attracting much attention.

Mr. Benjamin Ledesma has been named Peruvia Consul at Rosario. Madame de Bremon appears at the Colon Theatre to-night in the tragedy of Norma, and to-morrow night in the drama of Payaso. The price of boxes has been reduced to \$120 m.c. the 'entrada' being \$15.

The Pacific and West Coast Steam Navigation Company has now fourteen first class steamers constructing at Glasgow and Liverpool; when these ships are complete the company will have a fleet of fifty of the finest vessels afloat, independent of several that they have chartered.

A boy was nearly cut in two by falling under a car of the Northern R. R. Company's tramway line, on Thursday, while attempting to jump on to it. He is not expected to recover.

Dr. Vicente Lopez is about to deliver a course of lectures on 'Political Economy' at the University. It is said that a number of city editors and Government House men intend to profit by the occasion, and will ask permission to attend regularly.

It is officially stated that the Nat. Congress will open on the 1st July, Saturday next.

There were no cases of yellow fever reported on Thursday, nor up to two o'clock yesterday.

The Cordoba Executive has just presented an important immigration project to the Legislature of that province. The bill proposes to grant an extent of two square leagues of land to European settlers; in farm lots, the Government to keep a plan of all the new settlements, each of which is to have for headquarters a town, with plazas, streets and commons. No town lot will exceed 25 by 50 yards measurement, while the 'chacaras' will be limited to 20 square squares for each family, which must consist of at least three persons. This project if made law will attract foreign emigration to Cordoba. When are we to have a comprehensive Homestead scheme in this province?

No quorum' appears to be a chronic difficulty with all political bodies in this too political country. The Senate of Corrientes has devised an ascending scale of fines to meet the evil from which it also is suffering. For the future every tardy member of that body will be fined a bright gold ounce for the first case of 'absent without leave,' 2 for the second, 3 for the 3rd, and four for the fourth, after which culminating offence he will be put 'a porte.' Something of this kind might advantageously be adopted in Buenos Ayres, where 'no quorum' seems endemic in legislative regions.

We are obliged through want of space to hold over a very interesting letter received from 'our special correspondent' in London by the Gironda. He says the Tichborne case is certain to end in favor of the claimant, as, so far, the evidence (including some of a very amusing kind given by a tailor) is overwhelming in his favor. The Boulton and Park case has concluded with the acquittal of the defendants. The fine and swift steamer Edward Everett leaves this afternoon for Montevideo. Her agents are Messrs. Rubio and Foley, No. 83 Calle Reconquista.

Mr. Daws, the well known bookseller of 86 Calle Piedad, has now on sale some excellent photographic portraits of the Rev. Mr. Lett, the respected clergyman who rendered such invaluable services to the English community during the recent plague.

On the 18th May 'a Toum' was sung at a retired chapel in Ireland for the cessation of the plague in Buenos Ayres. The letters received by the French packet betray the most painful anxiety for friends in Buenos Ayres. It is reported that both Mr. and Mrs. Curtis, who left this in the midst of the plague, were attacked by the disease when nine days out, and both expired. Mrs. Curtis was well known here as a proficient music mistress, and it is with deep regret that we have to announce this sorrowful intelligence, which we are informed has been confirmed by the statement of a fellow passenger who has returned to the Plate.

We received yesterday a very able article on the application of the money subscribed in London to the building of a proper Lazzaretto. Owing to the press of matter we are compelled to hold this paper over for our next issue; the matter is every way important, and deserves ventilation.

A Parcels Delivery Company is being set on foot in the city by some enterprising countrymen. We wish the project every success, and have no doubt it will pay if energetically conducted.

We have not received our 'Paris Letter' per Gironda, and fancy it must have been delivered at some of the commercial-houses in town, by mistake; if so, we would feel much obliged by its being sent to STANDARD Court before Monday morning.

The Bond market ruled flat to-day; the sale of about 40,000 mortgage bonds yesterday, to a certain extent, damped the market. During business hours there were very little doing, 10,000 at 70 1/2, and for the 10th July 6000 at 70 1/2. In the liquidation there were some purchases, and prices at once stiffened; for the end of the month 10,000 were bought at 71 1/2, and for the end of July buyers were offering at 71. The bears worked hard to-day to drive the market down but the fact is that Bonds have not as yet got into the hands of people in the ring; when they do, a very large business may be looked for, nor will it be long before this occurs; but a month must elapse to allow time for the arrival of more gold, less produce business, and more Bond speculation.

A list of the heaviest holders of bonds in the hands of the bulls, shows beyond 900,000 bonds held by two speculators, the rest is for the market. The bears say that the new bonds of the six million loan will shortly be sold in this market, but they ignore the fact that these new bonds will not be held in this country; the coupons by a special agreement have been all cut off, so that the bonds can be hypothecated abroad. Exchange was done to-day at 60 1/2, 6 1/2, and 60 1/2, and on Franco at 5.30 to 5.35. Not much passed.

Money was offered to-day at 8 per cent. per annum on bonds at a valuation of 65, but there was very little taken up, as it is thought before the month closes money can be had on these securities at 7 per cent. per annum at the same valuation.

H. E. Baron Maua arrived to-day at Montevideo from Rio. This distinguished gentleman was foremost in the ranks of River Plate friends abroad when the news of the plague first reached the exterior.

The Once de Setiembre quotations for the week are:— Matadero hides 123-145; matadero do. 110-130 inferior 98-84; Morichair Kerth 155-170; South 170-185; tallow, 41-45; wool, burry, 48-55; do. clean 55-65; do. fine 70-75; wheat 180-210; inferior 140-160; maize 165-180; flour 37-35.

Col. Mateo Martinez has concluded a loan with the M. Vidon Government for 200,000 hard dollars, to be secured by the duties of Tabladis. The Saladeros of Barracas, to the number of 11, have submitted a petition to Government and deputed Messrs. Cambaceres, Santa Maria, Baudrix and Saavedra to represent their interests. We earnestly hope the Government will resolve to expropriate all the Saladeros and convert the site into a park, at a cost of 100 millions: it would be money well laid out.

As regards saladero produce we heard on 'Change' of the sale in the rivers of several cargoes. Ox and cow hides 45 ris, tallow 16, bonesh 20 pats, j-rked beef for Brazil 38, 39.

In the wool plaza there was very little done, owing to to-day being the same as Saturday, and much mud in the market. Advices from France state that River Plate shepherds are in demand in Havre, and have gone up in price.

A meeting of the Directors of the Popular Argentina is called for Monday at 12 o'clock.

The French mail has brought advices of much importance from the U. States respecting the enforcing of claims of Americans in foreign countries.

Advices from Washington mention that the U. States Government are likely forthwith to employ force to correct the dishonesty of the Republic of Venezuela. In 1868 awards were made by a mixed commission at Caracas, assigning \$260,000 as the amount due to certain American claimants—but up to the present moment only \$19,000 has been extracted from the Venezuelan Government, which is not equal to half the arrears of interest that have accrued on the principal sum. It is now believed that Congress will not hesitate at its next session to authorize the President to send a vessel of war to demand an immediate settlement.

The *New York Journal of Commerce* observes—"The great excuse urged in Congress against sending a vessel to collect the debt has always been that the indebted State is engaged in revolution and civil war. That thing has become chronic, and of late years has been regarded as a fortunate circumstance for Venezuela when she is in no more than one revolution at a time. In view of the facts there seems to be but one objection in the matter now, which is that the debt should be collected by force. France and England have both against Venezuela, and it is urged that if we do not collect soon they will, and that after they get through there will be nothing left for us."

The following respecting the new French treaty of commerce is important for the mercantile community of the River Plate. We translate the following from the *Patrie*— "We are assured that the French government has made known to the Powers interested, that the Treaty of Commerce, which has given rise to so many complaints, would at the proper moment be denounced; but, at the same time, the government has declared that it consented to modifications of the tariff on certain articles, and that these modifications would shortly become the object of special negotiations. These declarations have not met with an unfavorable reception, because the several governments understand that at the present moment France has need of her Customs duties in order to meet the enormous obligations she has contracted. The attitude taken up by France has made an excellent impression in her Commercial Ports, at which Maritime free-trade had levelled such a fatal stroke."

The Patagonas, as usual, made a splendid run out; she entered Montevideo this morning at daylight; her news is of the highest importance. Things seem at last settling down in Paris. The commercial news is, as usual, most favorable.

It was authoritatively stated on 'Change' to-day that the Argentine Legation at Rio will be abolished, and no successor appointed to the lamented Gen. Penrose. Economy is the only thing to recommend this step, which most people regard as ill-advised.

Attention is again called to the lamentable state of things at the Custom House; more than sixty lighters that cannot discharge their goods (to the old story) the want of sufficient hands and warehouses.

It was stated on 'Change' to-day that a most satisfactory arrangement for all parties has been come to with regard to the affairs of a wealthy estateholder whose bills were protested last week. A distinguished member of the bar, who has a seat in the Cabinet was mainly instrumental in bringing the negotiations between the debtor and his creditors to a happy issue.
