We are in possession of a view of the gasworks as existing some years since, and a more unpleasant looking chaos of tumble down sheds and heaps of old iron could scarcely be imagined.

Instead of being considered, as heretofore, collocated in some unknown region, the gas establishment is now, thanks to well paved streets (the result of municipal bonds, which, for private reasons we are sorry to say are unpaid) one of the most frequented before dinner lounges of the 'élite' of Montevideo society.

Mr. Cook guided us through all the intricacies of the gas establishment, explaining everything, so that we now feel perfectly 'au fait' in regard to any question in reference to the manufacture, purification, or testing of gas, and have decided to our own satisfaction why it is, as stated in a former

paper, that here in Buenos Ayres at present the only thing made visible by the gas is the darkness.

There are two gasholders on the works, now supplying over 200,000 cubic feet of gas per diem, the larger of which is peculiarly solid and substantial in appearance.

We inspected the large workshop, - lect x -, where all the lamps for the public illumination and fancy lamps for private consumers are made, and where the re-brazing, repairing, and making up of fittings are carried on.

Leaving the works, we crossed the street and examined an undertaking which, perhaps more than any other, will in future time identify the name of Baron Maua with Montevideo progress.

During our short stay in the sister city we had a chance of visiting the Gasworks, and could not but admire the able manner in which this establishment is conducted.

We remember some 5 or 6 years ago that it was supposed a gasworks existed somewhere, but we saw very little to justify the supposition.

The depth of water on the sill of this dock at low water will be about 14 feet, and at high water 20 feet.

We could not but notice the labor required to excavate the solid rock, but, from what we saw, we should have felt more satisfied in regard to the future of the port of B. Ayres if Mr. Bateman had to do with rock instead of mud.

In connection with the discharging basin a wire tramway has been erected for the purpose of carrying the coal from the vessels over the roof of the front building of the Gas-works into the coal sheds behind.

DEPARTURE OF DR. NEWKIRK.

GENERAL OSORIO'S MISSION IN BANDA ORIENTAL. The Republic of yesterday contains the following letter, which is anonymous, but contains so many strange particulars about the Osorio mission that we reproduce it, without offering any opinion as to the merits:—

Montevideo, July 27th. While the people of Montevideo are getting up an abut for Gen. Osorio it may be well to explain something about his noble but unsuccessful mission.

At Port Alegre Osorio was received with a popular ovation, and at Bagó he found letters awaiting him from Pres. Sarriente and Sr. Braga of Montevideo.

Osorio accordingly started for Cerro Largo, to see if Lucas Moreno and Aparicio were willing to seek an arrangement, and agree to a suspension of hostilities pending the mediation.

While Osorio was waiting for the appointment of the Colorado commissioners he received a note from the government in the writing of Dr. Herrera Obes, requiring him before hand to make a written declaration of the previous day's conference.

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CHILIAN MAILS.

THE ELECTIONS IN CHILE. The elections in Chile for President of the Republic have resulted in a great majority for Don Federico Errázuriz, the government and clerical candidate.

Mr. W. Deichert, the well-known pianist, who had resided at Santiago more than 20 years, is dead.

Advice from Peru mention 5 candidates for the Presidency; Dr. Manuel Ureta, Dr. Pardo, Gen. Echénique, Gen. Segura, and Dr. Sanchez; the chances are with the two first-named.

Paris, June 23. It was at a late hour on the previous day that the city became aware of the postponement of the review, fixed for the 18th.

A very excellent, if not humane measure is to be adopted—that of a register in the High Court of Justice, where the names of all prisoners arrested by the Government will be alphabetically arranged, daily revised and corrected, and open free to the public.

The Assembly, not having any serious work to do till after the elections next month to fill up the 115 vacancies in its body, is naturally inclined to give a hearing to everything, and the number of more or less prominent men desiring to explain their positions with recent events is numerous.

Trochu is a vain man, and his speech seemed to exhibit, "I am a prophet, a genius, and a martyr." He always harps on his book, in which he laid bare the bad organization of the Army of France—which the Red Prince also exposed—and of its unpreparedness—that Thiers also asserted, and at the time to his cost.

General Chanzy, in his short reply, was more of the 'militaire'; he demanded for election to the Assembly, and neither the press nor the public holds their conduct up to detestation—more and more so day by day.

Nearly 400,000 denunciations (anonymous, of course, and consequently more disputable) have been made to the police authorities of persons implicated in the affair of the Commune; that is, the whole able-bodied population, women and children excepted, have turned informers; so that the informers themselves must be insurgents at the same time.

The three proclamations which are said to have been placarded by the rump of the late Commune in the city are only important from the fact that such could be printed and posted up under the very noses of the authorities; recalling the halcyon days of the Secret Committee at Rome, or those of the conspiracies during the reign of the late Czar, when Polish addresses for independence were found suspended from trees in the most reserved portion of the imperial gardens.

Chanzy added that two circumstances contributed to the disasters of France: that of Gambetta believing himself to be a general and engineer, and Trochu flattering himself to be a lawyer.

When the National Guards at last 'gave,' as the French express it, 'at Buzenval, the General admits that they marched with all their household gods in their knapsacks, and quite a 'batterie de cuisine' but, instead of shooting Prussians, they brought down ir mistake their own engineers.

Our young friend Mr. J. Anglier, who left here on the 9th ult. in the fine steamer Tycho Brahe, writes to us as follows from Tijuca, under date July 15th:—"We arrived here this morning. The voyage from Montevideo has been very pleasant; the attendance, 'cuisine,' in fact everything on board being first-rate. We anchored before daylight, and I was up to see the sun rise upon Rio—a sight not to be forgotten. All that I have ever seen, imagined, or dreamt of natural beauty falls infinitely short of the glories of this enchanting place. I will not attempt a description. I could only fail. Tijuca is charming. As I write the noise of two natural cascades falls like enchanting music on the ear, and the night is brilliant with countless fireflies; gigantic mountains, covered with tropical vegetation, rise on every side, and only 'lovely woman' is wanting (just at the moment) to make an earthly paradise fairer than even false prophet dreamt of. I felt much at leaving 'dear dirty' Buenos Ayres, even for a time. Though Nature has not 'shed o'er the scene her purest of crystal,' or her 'brightest of green' in 'our adopted country, yet there are friends there who will always make it very dear to me."
