The Douro's Mails.

"STANDARD" TELEGRAM.

O'Gorman to the STANDARD.

Montevideo, 11:30 a.m. The Douro arrived this morning (Monday), and brings no remittances for the Argentine Government. Bank rate 24. Nothing new in politics. Sovereigns at Rio, 10,400.

TELEGRAM TO THE BOLSA.

The Douro brings no political news of any interest. Bank of England rate of discount 24. Produce from River Plate still rising everywhere; hides in great demand. Money very abundant everywhere.

Have.—Wools from Buenos Ayres and Entre Rios have risen 5 to 10 centimes; salted hides, novillos, 74; dry ditto, novillos and cows, 122 1/2.

Antwerp.—Buenos Ayrean wools have gone up 5 to 10 centimes, and Montevideo 10 to 15 centimes. Salted hides, 72 to 78; dry, 125 to 133. Tallow, 25 1/2 to 25 3/4; mutton tallow, 24 1/2 to 25.

LIVERPOOL.—Salted hides, good weight, 7. Tallow, large transactions at 41 to 45; mutton ditto, 42 to 43.

Pernambuco.—Jerked beef, 5:00 to 5:50, with downward tendency.

Bahia.—5:600. The Irene, from the Falkland Islands, has arrived at Montevideo with 20 survivors, belonging to the crews of the six vessels recently lost off Cape Horn.

Peace negotiations are said to be again on the tapis.

CLUB TELEGRAM.

The Douro has brought no gold, Cotton, 9 1/2. Hides, tallow, and bones firm. The Cordillera arrived at Rio on the morning of Aug. 3.

CITY COMMISSIONERS.

Mr. Coghlan's paper, alluded to in yesterday's Nation, has appeared just at the right moment, and contains such wise suggestions and so complete a programme, for preventing a recurrence of the plague of last summer, or at least checking its progress should it unfortunately return with the hot weather, that we recommend it to the best consideration of the Government, Legislature and general public of our city.

It is painfully evident to all of us that no precautions have yet been taken, and that we are lumbering on a mine which may at any moment explode with fearful consequences.

At the same time it must be confessed that the only radical remedies, such as sewerage and water-supply, must necessarily require years in their construction, and it is in devising provisional measures for the cleanliness and health of the city that Mr. Coghlan does such good service, by proposing what is not only feasible and attended with little cost, but also admitted on all hands as the best means of supplementing the action of the authorities in a matter of such vital importance.

He proposes a City Commission, after the manner of a Royal Commission in England, to take evidence and draw up a report on the best means of preventing a return of the plague, to dictate suitable regulations for quarantine, lazzaretti, hospitals, wooden houses for the poor, clearing out of 'conventillos,' disinfection of dirty neighbourhoods and cemeteries, &c.; also to look after the 'basura,' cleanse the city, disinfect cesspools, enforce the use of earth-closets, and keep the markets and all public factories in the highest condition.

This Commission would be invested with the fullest powers in all that regards the health of the city, and we learn that Governor Castro accepts the idea with the most cordial good-will, recommending it to the support of both the Legislature and the Municipality as the best means of meeting the emergency.

The selection of the men to act as City Commissioners is a very important consideration, and although Mr. Coghlan apologises for venturing to suggest half-a-dozen names we incline to think that no one could have made a more happy selection, viz:—

The Ministers of the Provincial Government.

Brig. Gen. Bartolomé Mitre.

Dr. William Lawson.

Dr. L. M. Drago.

Mr. Henry O'Gorman, Chief of Police.

Mr. Narciso Martinez de Hoz.

If the health of the city be entrusted to these seven persons [of whom three may form a quorum] who shall sit every day for at least an hour, and receive, say 400 pats. each, monthly, in remuneration for their services, we may then look forward with better courage, and consider ourselves more or less protected against such a dire calamity as we have just passed through.

We may suppose that one of the first duties of the Commissioners will be to appoint a local committee in each parish to see that every house is disinfected and whitewashed before summer sets in. If they spend \$100,000 ft. in this manner they will probably avoid the necessity of establishing new hospitals and opening new cemeteries. Let us suppose even that the Commissioners find it expedient to spend a million patacons—will it not be, after all a trifle if it procure us the great boon of cleanliness and health?

It is needless for us to disguise the sad impression so general among the citizens, that Buenos Ayres will be again visited with Yellow Fever or Cholera the moment the hot weather returns. Most of the comfortable citizens of the middle and upper classes are putting their country-houses in order: while the artisans and laboring classes view the approach of summer as a season of danger when death is likely to rear a large harvest.

We must therefore bestir ourselves in time, to avert the threatened danger, to infuse confidence into the classes of our population who are most manacred by the evil, and to follow the sage council which is suggested in the pamphlet before us.

Mr. Coghlan's paper should be in the hands of everyone, and if necessary a public meeting should be convened at the Bolsa to adopt his programme and make it in a manner the law of the city for the next twelve months. He has rendered a service which it is difficult to exaggerate. Grant Heaven that his words fall not asidly as the prophecies of Cassandra with the fated citizens of Troy!

Salvini appears in Othello to-morrow night, and a fashionable and crowded house may be confidently expected. All the Germans in town have taken places, and we expect to see the British element muster in greater force than on the occasion of the production of 'Amleto.'

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

(Our own correspondent). August 5th, 1871.

The state of Montevideo at the present moment only admits of comparison with the dead calm of our River Plate after one of the mighty Pamperos has ceased to lash its surface into a succession of boisterous and foaming billows.—The excitement at the time of the festivities attending the inauguration of the water-works has now subsided; all is dull, and the monotony of our daily life quite disgusting.—At the same time there are the principal topics of conversation, the Central Uruguay Railway negotiation, the revolution, and the financial state of the country. In addition to the remarks on the first named topic, contained in my last letter, I have only to tell you that we are all impatiently awaiting the result of the Herrera-Obea mission to Buenos Ayres, and that I do not think there is any immediate probability of an armed intervention on the part of Brazil, as the Government of that Empire would at present appear to have its hands quite full enough with the settlement of the Slavery question, without interfering in the matters of other nations.

Relative to the Central Uruguay Railway loan and the contract entered into by Don Senen Rodriguez with the important firm of Waring Bros; you must be aware that some edifying articles have of late been appearing in our daily papers discussing the merits of this operation, and, if I recollect rightly, the Standard, only a short time back, contained a very well written article on this subject, signed C. E.—In the Siglo of yesterday a writer, signing himself H., again takes up the subject in a very powerful article, to which the editor of that paper briefly replies; but it is my opinion, after carefully perusing a legal copy of the original contract, that the talented Dr. Ramirez is in this case likely to be worsted. Considering that besides the importance of this subject to the shareholders in the line both in Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, the public generally must feel interested in the carrying out of such an enterprise, and knowing that the editors of the Standard are at present, or have been, shareholders in the concern, I feel it my duty as your correspondent to call attention to a few points.

Clause 1 of the contract distinctly states that Messrs. Waring Bros are to construct the line, commencing from Las Piedras, as far as the right bank of the river Santa Lucia, a distance more or less of 28 English miles, while clause 9 also plainly sets forth that the amount to be received by the contracting firm for this work is in all \$210,000 a sum equal therefore to £75,000 per mile.

Now I understand that some parties here have offered on the part of a great London contractor named Simmons, to contract for the making of the whole line as far as Durazzo at the price of £7,200 or £7,300 per mile, and as a convincing proof that the section from Las Piedras to Santa Lucia is the less expensive one to construct, and for which moreover there already exists a large amount of rolling stock, I may mention that the well known South American contractor M. R. P. Pealer, sent into the Directors some time back, in answer to an official call for tenders, a proposal to do the same work as Messrs. Waring Bros agree to do, at the price of £1,000 per mile!!!

Clause 3 of the contract sets forth that all lands required by the contractors are to be given to them free, but I see that in the Schedule accompanying the contract a sum of £3000 [forming part of the \$210,000] is set apart for the cost of such lands.

Clause 4—makes it a sine qua non that before commencing operations (pouer manos a la obra) the contractors are to receive the nice little sum of £20,000. As a set off to this condition I have been led to understand that in the proposal of the representatives of Mr. Simmons, this gentleman was ready to deposit £10,000 on the signing of the contract.

Clause 5 tells us that to avoid delays the monthly sum to be paid to the contractors is to be estimated at £10,000, which Messrs. Waring Bros may draw in advance of the receipt of certificates from this place, and settle the difference when these documents arrive.

Clause 8 arranges that the commission of 10 per cent is to be added to the amount of the monthly payments so that this trifling item of the profits on the operation enters the pockets of the contractors from the first set out.

Clause 9 comfortably settles that, in case the estimates set forth in the schedule are incorrect, and the contractors should find that in any item they have spent more than was presumed, they may modify the rest of the work so as to bring the whole within the £210,000.

Clause 11 gives the Messrs Waring Bros the option at the conclusion of the work to receive either in £ sterling or in Bonds of the loan at 70 per cent, or if they prefer it part in each kind.

Clause 13 Deserves especial attention because I see that all the writers of the articles against the Simmons proposal make their 'cheval de bataille' the condition, subject to modification, that where the arbitrators of any misunderstandings could not agree, the decision should be left to the President of the Institute of Civil Engineers in London. In the contract under notice, however is in the clause 13 determined that questions are to be decided in accordance with English law.

Clause 15.—Shows that Messrs. Waring, Bros, had not only the interests of their firm at heart but likewise the comfort and well-being of their employees. All the provisions and requisites for employees and workmen are to be imported free of duty.

Furthermore the contractors are, it appears by the schedule before referred to, entitled to receive 8 per cent interest on £100,000, whereas they before commencing work receive £20,000 in advance, and then £10,000 per month at least.

Finis coronat opus.—The moral to be deduced from all this is that the business ought to have been done on better terms, and when I tell you in conclusion, that out of the £28,000 interest, payable by the Government of this Republic for the 40 miles to Santa Lucia, no less than £24,000 will clearly be absorbed by the terms on which the loan has been negotiated, consequently that only £4,000 remain for you and your fellow shareholders, should the line fortunately pay working expenses, you will agree with me that the shares possess now an incalculable intrinsic worth, which must certainly recompense those who invested their capital in this undertaking; at any rate they have the consolation and glory of having contributed to the advancement of civilization and to the progress and prosperity of this Republic.

Mr. John McGill and Mr. Morton have obtained from the Government of this country a privilege for the manufacture of artificial guano from animal residues.

I have just received a kind invitation from Mr. W. H. Cock, engineer of the Gas Company, to accompany some mutual friends to the Gas Works, and there witness the trial of the Wire Tramway. In my next I will give you an account of this experimental trip of the aerial railway.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Douro arrived at Montevideo yesterday morning, and is expected in port this morning. She brings no political news of importance, nor, worse still, even a sovereign on account of the Varela loan. 'No news' is often considered good news; but 'no gold' is quite another thing just at the present moment. Every commercial and monetary countenance on the Bolsa yesterday was sickled o'er with the pale cast of thought, and astounding 'bolas' as to the cause of the delay in the arrival of the expected specie were in circulation. The letters by the Douro to-day will, no doubt, bring some explanation as to how the affair stands.

We received a letter yesterday from a B.A. of 'Cantab,' who finds him self in the slier city with a full purse and all the capacity for enjoyment acquired from his 'Alma Mater.' 'Cantab' has been reading the Hand-Book, and wishes to judge for himself of the beauties of the scenery on the Paraná and Paraguay, as therein described. The company of a fellow 'Varsity man' is, however, indispensable to our correspondent's peace of mind during his trip; so, if there be any Fellow, M.A., B.A., or even under-graduate in voluntary or involuntary exile in any part of the country, he may hear of something to his advantage by applying at Standard Court, as 'Cantab' wishes to have a 'companion de voyage' who can talk to him 'en route' of old times etc. We may mention, as a possible additional inducement, that 'Cantab' is willing to 'go halves' in the cost of the trip.

We received yesterday from an occasional correspondent a full description of the Lynching of three burglars lately at Pavon, Santa Fé. Our native colleagues gave a description of this affair last week, in which it was made to appear that the police killed the robbers in a fight, but it appears the country people round had a finger in the pie, and it was with difficulty a fourth scoundrel was saved from them. The neighbors of Pavon, seeing the miserable neglect of the authorities for the lives and property of the people, have formed a Rural Society, which has worthily opened its career by this 'coup de Lynch,' and which, it is hoped, will have a salutary effect on the criminal classes of Santa Fé. We have to inform our correspondent that he forgot to enclose the statutes of this new society, though his letter states that he did so.

We visited Floravia, the West-End of the metropolis, on Sunday. Progress has made this charming spot 'its future care.' Capital, British and Argentine, continues to drop on it like the gentle rain from heaven, blessing him that gives and him that takes, for both buyers and sellers in the numerous dealings in building plots that daily take place, seem equally contented. Villas, Swiss cottages, and every imaginable species of structure, are rising from the ground as if by magic. In a year Flores will be joined to Buenos Ayres. Amongst the prettiest rural retreats now building at Floravia is Ooked-Hat Cottage, the property of a leading ship-broker, and hard by is the delightful Hope Cottage, famed for being a favourite resort of Terpsichore. Brick and mortar is in prodigious demand at Floravia just now, and the motto of all seems to be 'every man his own architect.'

The programme of the Philharmonic Society for its concert in aid of the poor, on Saturday evening next, is a most attractive one, and augurs well for the success of the entertainment. Some of the best efforts of Bellini, Rossini, Donizetti, Verdi, Flotow, Auber, and Pacini, have been selected for performance on the occasion, and

amongst the amateurs who appear we hail with pleasure the names of Madame Auzon, Meslles, Julia Fernandez, Laura Igarzabal, Arminia Escobar, V. Rojas, G. Amadeo, and Luisa Xier; Messrs. Ockelmann, Vache, Miles and others. It can be seen that the concert promise to be a veritable treat.

A fatal accident occurred at the Tigre a few days ago. Two of the crew of the steamer Leopoldo got about three sheets in the wind, and while in this condition went to visit the English steamer Recruit, near which some canoes belonging to our friend Turmeau, the Tea-man, are moored. One of the men, when in the act of getting on board the steamer, lost his balance and fell overboard, catching at one of his companions and dragging him with him. The latter, fortunately, caught hold of one of the Tea-man's canoes. The captain of the Recruit, Maina by name, and humane by nature, rushed from his cabin to the rescue of the drowning man, and after great exertions succeeded in getting him on board in an almost dying state. The poor fellow (an Irishman) when he recovered his speech thanked his rescuer, humorously exclaiming, "Captain, it's all right; I shut off all the valves." Notwithstanding every attention, the unfortunate man expired a few hours afterwards from exhaustion.

Proof of the indifferent way in which the Municipality kept the death register during the epidemic is daily coming to light. The Rev. Father Leahy, Irish pastor, brought a very hard case under our notice yesterday. Two Irishwomen belonging to his parish died during the plague, and were buried in his knowledge in the Southern Cemetery; but now, when official documents to prove the fact are required for 'testamentary' purposes, it turns out that there are no such names on the list of deaths, either at the Municipality or the Cemetery, and the heirs are naturally in a difficult and anomalous position, expecting interminable trouble and annoyance. This is not the only case of the kind, as the Rev. Mr. Lett, we believe, had similar experience in the case of some of his flock. In the face of these facts our colleagues and the Government will, no doubt, continue to declare that their version of the number of victims of the late plague was the correct one, and that given by the STANDARD purely imaginary. Facts are stubborn things.

A pair of jibbing horses under a cart caused a 'dead-lock' in the street traffic yesterday, about 2 o'clock, at the corner of Calles Cangallo and San Martin. Far as the eye could reach, down Bond-street and up Calle Cangallo, were strings of carts, carriages, tramway cars, brokers' and barragers' trucks, and coster-mongers' trucks, all waiting to pass. In vain the tramway 'conductor' tried to vain the stubborn brutes out of the way; drivers kept shouting and flourishing their whips; 'the lower ton' jostled and poked inn at the 'Jebus,' while we never heard the police force 'reverse their prayers' so vigorously—but this was about all the aid they seemed capable of rendering. When every effort to 'clear the course' had failed, the sinning horses repented, and went on their way.

Next week a steamer will take the Waldense colonists from the port of Colonia, B.O., to the Alexandria Colony, Santa Fé. Those settlers have resolved to emigrate 'en masse,' to Messrs. Thompson, Bonar, & Co.'s new colony, owing to the terribly insecure state of the Banda Oriental; and it is believed the Swiss colonists will shortly follow their example. Two of the Waldense settlers have just returned from inspecting the Alexandria Colony, and report most favourably of it. The Montevidean Municipality is wiser in its generation than that of Buenos Ayres; it has given all dwellers in 'conventillos' 30 days' notice to evacuate their dangerous dwellings, which will be all razed. This is the proper way to deal with such a death-breeding nuisance. 'In this miserable city those 'fever deus' are now more dangerous, more filthy, more crowded, and it is whispered, more numerous than during the late plague.

A Blue Book has been published by the English Royal Commissioners of Health, which is worthy the serious attention of the authorities here. The report is exhaustive, and shows the frightful difference unhealthy dwellings and defective drainage make in the death rate of large cities. The poor and badly housed in London [the healthiest city in the world] die at four times the rate of their more favored fellow creatures.

Yesterday was the eighteenth anniversary of our colleague La Tribuna. We salute the editors of that paper on the auspicious occasion, and wish them a long continuance of prosperity and happiness.

The Provincial Chambers were to discuss the saladero question last night. It is well that some legal settlement of the matter be arrived at, but practically the opening of the new saladeros at Ensenada has put a stop to all further discussion on the subject. The best thing the saladeristas can do is to pack up their traps and be off to En

that during the Prussian siege, it was the middle, not the poorer classes, who really suffered. Positions are changed now—it is only necessary to throw a glance at the crowd before one of the public soup-kitchens. Most women are collected there, but even in their faded dresses there is a fashion and coquetry—a doing of the best. No woman but ever tries to dress well, above all, "une Française." Yet well-to-do people, make no secret of their being now poor, and must practise a rigid economy. This is one of the best traits of French character, no hollow show, no pretence to be rich when the purse is empty.

When the theatres are in operation it is a fair sign of prosperity—they will all open their doors as soon as the siege-laws are removed, which may be on Monday next, if citizens meet the Assembly half way at Sunday's review, and embrace like a brother each other. "We have both been wrong." At the Variétés theatre, we truly the laughable Pupazzi, photographs truly of leading men, but the puppets steer clear of political allusions. The Ambigu theatre represents a piece, "The Midnight Angel," to be witnessed at their itching hour, for nothing, in the shape of a soldier-policeman, armed like Robiusion Crusoe when taking to the war-path. Paris is regaining its life, "poco a poco"—the Ministry of police is reorganized, and Cabbys, whose band of late has been against every one, is being trimmed. He has to restore his registered number, which he effaced from his vehicle in a moment of innocent play, and stich the tariff of his fare in the lining of the cab; the public need no longer approach him as if he was a grand seigneur. The Exchange is being rapidly populated, and it is regaining its Babel character. Several German brokers have appeared—are unmolested. The Commune has absorbed all hates. Three months ago, I saw there a few Prussians next to being "lynched." But Prince Bismarck in the definite treaty of peace stipulated for the favored nation clause, and secured it. To assail a Teuton now, would involve compensation, and France has enough to pay in five milliards; does not forget, although a patriot demands a plate with the fact painted thereon, be dailed up at every street corner, for those who run to read. The new and increased taxes will not let one forget—nothing will likely escape the Argus-eyes of the Finance Minister—billiard tables will contribute four sous a day to the Treasury, which may lead fathers of families to enjoy their fire sides rather than the cafs.

The great excitement as to the ruins is wearing away, and active preparations are on foot to remedy immediately as much of the damage as possible. Strangers seem afraid to visit us, just like the members of the Assembly, as if the "most enlightened citizens of the world" were anthropophagi. Cast a glance at the cafs and halls brilliant with dazzling gas lights, and you will observe Mesalina, Phryne, Aspasia, and Lais decked out in the newest gorgaws, and quite forgetful of modern history since July, 1870. The frail sisterhood are not all well off. There is the queen of vice, Cora Pearl, writes to a well known prince, whose papers (the Commune published, as a "model girl"—the barridan counts 40 summers,—and a "perfect mother"—as much as Margaret Balleger. Said prince marks on the margin of the "billet doux" given her five francs,—she that enabled many souls to disperse a patrimony in a few months. But the Prince Napoleon is not a rich man, and his father-in-law gave him an estimable wife, but a penniless one with a long pedigree. The Communist leaders were as bad as imperialists; they selected mistresses, decked them out in silks and satins, ordered Lucullan repasts—what wonder that these "one more unfortunates" became "petroleuses," preferring death to a life of repentance and work!

In the burial of the poor soldiers who die in hospital from wounds, there is much to be desired. A Quaker-like simplicity of the hearse, the pall being surrounded by the deceased's great coat. Sometimes two or three of these hearse move in procession, followed by a friend, but never by any soldier, no brothers in arms! The dead Prussians and French are being buried where they are interred; at night thick fumes of smoke and flame can be discerned at the suburbs from the city. Paris has been thoroughly relieved of the slain in the recent fights. The exhumations are finished, and the wallows are neither emigrating nor dropping down dead as formerly.

There is an extensive system of fraud going on in the sale of photographs of the leading Communists, which are not genuine; to give a name to any "carte" is the sole claim to sell it. There is also quite a rage to buy up files of the late Communal journals, and they command high prices. In passing down the Rue Rivoli, there can be read the card of "comfortable apartments to let; inquire within," the house being as perfect a ruin as the Hotel de Ville facing it. The bar-risters have received notice that the war being now over, they must appear in court without mustaches. The clergymen, who for safety allowed their beards to grow, have faces now as bare as a billiard ball.

Julius Favre, on being presented to the Duc d'Aumale a few days ago, inquired after the Duchesse and was told by the Duke she was dead since two years. M. Thiers has condemned his ignorant Foreign Minister to learn the Almanack de Gotha by heart.

THE CLOSED FEVER DENS.

To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen: Notwithstanding the remonstrances which have from time to time appeared in your columns, and in those of your native contemporaries, the houses in this city in which the subtle poison of Yellow fever lies dormant remain shut as close under the seal of municipal authority as the eyes of that body appear to be to the danger that exists, first, in not immediately disinfecting them; secondly, of venturing to do so when the summer heat is upon us. Do the sanitary authorities imagine that there is no danger—that because the seeds of yellow fever are now, as it were, ice-bound by winter, that they will never germinate afresh, that it will be just as safe and more pleasant to open these houses when the weather is more agreeable? Cuidado, gentlemen; the snake is scotch-ed, not killed. One very striking example of the necessity of careful fumigation, and the great difficulty of eradicating the germs of fever was related to me yesterday by a gentleman, an eye witness. A ship of the Royal Mail W. I. Line some years ago became infected with yellow fever at one of the West India Islands, and lost 75 of her complement of officers and crew. Arriving at Southampton she was put in quarantine, and the vessel stated to be disinfected (probably not however fumigated with some searching gas) a new crew was engaged and the voyages of the ship renewed—when, however, she reached the tropics fever again broke out in her, and before arriving at her destination half her crew had succumbed. The moral of this story needs no pointing. It is not so easy to render these houses safe tenements, and they had better be burned than opened as they are in the summer. Now is the time to act.

The relative value of disinfectants can only be estimated by their effects. I have used many, and I have the greatest faith in sulphurous acid as being the most searching in its action. I have never known cholera to recur during the same epidemic in India, in a barrack room thoroughly disinfected by it. The method of making and using it is simple. Let the houses be opened at nightfall, and braziers of charcoal introduced into each room; these should be fed during the whole of one or two nights with sulphur, and kept burning, the rooms in which the operation is proceeding being closed. This in my opinion holds out the best and surest prospect of eradicating the germs of infectious disease.
