THE CAPITAL AT VILLA MARIA.

The Senate of Congress has resolved by thirteen votes to 10 that the seat of Government shall be removed from Buenos Ayres and placed at Villa Maria, a station on the line of railway between Rosario and Cordoba.

Villa Maria is neither a city, town, nor hamlet, but a mere locality in the midst of a dismal swamp, surrounded by thick woods. Its only notoriety arises from the fact of its extreme unhealthiness, for in 1857 more than two-thirds of the Central Argentine railway staff died, even to the station master and engine drivers.

At a moment when such apprehension exists as to the salubrity of the coming summer, a church clergyman from the altar of his church has astonished his parishioners and the public in general by predicting that on the 25th inst. Buenos Ayres will be destroyed by a tidal wave that will run inland as far as the outskirts of the town of Moron.

The railway employees find a residence at Villa Maria so dreadful and unwholesome that they seldom remain long there; those who do not die obtain permission to exchange or remove to some other place of reasonable enjoyment such as Fraile Muerto or Tortugas, although the last-named comprises only a few mud huts with a deep trench to keep out the Indians.

At the former place there is some semblance of a town, and although the Plaza displays much irregularity of outline, the ranchos and grass roofs alternating with long mud walls where auctioneers have not yet marked out lots for building, still there is plenty of open room and fresh air in the square, fronting the Police, and the Fonda (at the corner) has not the wooden appearance of the hostelry at Villa Maria.

There is a Tienda or dry-goods store, the proprietor of which also sells liquor. Much of the day-time is given to Siesta, and life passes quietly and monotonously, save when news comes in from the Pampas that the Indians are making a raid; it is then the custom of the inhabitants in the outskirts of the town to crowd into their friends' ranchos around the Plaza, there being no hotel accommodation, and even if there were the people would be too poor to avail themselves of any quarters but such as were free.

Villa Nueva has air, sunshine and dust, which may seem recommendations for the future capital; moreover there is river, except in dry seasons, midway towards Villa Maria, and Messrs. Simmons of London are about placing a bridge over it. Villa Nueva may have been an important place at some previous epoch of a history that we venture to term obscure; at present it has rather a rambling look, and seems inclined some fine day to run away altogether, owing to the liberties taken by the Indians. Still it has immense advantages over Villa Maria, the average of human life being much longer notwithstanding casualties with Indians and other drawbacks.

If the seat of Government be transferred from Buenos Ayres to Villa

Maria, or even Villa Nueva, it is hardly to be supposed that the Foreign Ministers and Consuls will follow President Sarmiento with the same alacrity as the various European envoys at Florence have accompanied Victor Emmanuel to Rome. It is a dream to imagine that any outlay of money, however lavish, can render either of those places even habitable. The one is a dismal swamp, the other a collection of ranchos, where rats go about in the middle of the day, and dogs are more numerous than men.

Any attempt to move the capital thither would infallibly result as happened in California in 1853. There was a General named Velasco [I will rightly remember] who possessed immense estates and offered the Californian Legislature 100,000 hard dollars to be expended in public buildings on condition of their establishing the seat of Government on his estate, and calling it after him 'Velasco.' The bargain was concluded, the edifices were built, but before two months there was a general stampede of Senators, Deputies, Governor, Ministers, &c. and they never stopped till they reached Sacramento, which has been since 1854 capital of the state.

Perhaps to owe an apology to such enlightened legislators as ours for introducing a vulgar example like that of California; but let us beg of them to turn to Gibbon's valuable Handbook on the decline and Fall of the Roman Empire, and read the fatal consequences of moving the capital from Rome to Constantinople. The error of Constantine led to the disruption of the empire. It is easy to foresee that a similar attempt here would be a signal for the dismemberment of the Republic; Cepeda and Pavon would have to be fought over again, and in the year of grace 1881 we should be no further than we were in 1861.

THE PREDICTION.

At a moment when such apprehension exists as to the salubrity of the coming summer, a church clergyman from the altar of his church has astonished his parishioners and the public in general by predicting that on the 25th inst. Buenos Ayres will be destroyed by a tidal wave that will run inland as far as the outskirts of the town of Moron.

Only two short years have elapsed since the whole population of the city of Rio Janeiro fled 'en masse' to the mountains of Tijuca and Petropolis, to escape a similarly predicted catastrophe, which, after all the fuss, trouble, and demonstrative piety of the citizens, never took place.

Since the beginning of the present century these sacerdotal predictions have been of very frequent occurrence. Some 7 years ago, so fixed was the belief of the peasants in the South of France in the approaching end of the world, that superstitious fear kept them in many parts from sowing their crops. Dr. Cumming many years ago appalled the greatest matter of fact people on the globe, by publicly announcing the day and hour when the world would come to an end, and the public apprehension was not removed until it was discovered that the prophet himself attached such little faith to his own predictions that he took a lease of a house to run some five or six years posterior to the day when the world was to roll up like a sheet of parchment.

Real disasters are never predicted, or, at all events, the prediction is never heard of until after the occurrence of the catastrophe. The tidal wave at St. Thomas some few years ago was never even hinted at until the American men-of-war were carried over the tops of the houses and left high and dry in the street. Then it turned out that an old nigger on the island knew all about it years before. On the 1st of July, 1870, no man in Europe measured the result of the French and German war; no, not even Bismark himself; yet, when half of Paris was burned down by the Communists, we for the first time learn that a recluse had predicted the whole thing some 100 years ago. Pope Pius the Ninth was never to see his 25th anniversary, yet the day has come and gone, and his Holiness is as strong as ever.

The prediction of the Ranchos clergyman carries with it no greater weight than what people themselves are willing to afford it. There may possibly be accessories, such as peculiar sanctity or undue pious severity, which may account for or explain this country priest's assuming the mantle of the prophet, but we disown his knowledge, and impeach his power to read one iota of the future better than ourselves. There is no doubt an indefinable leaning of the human heart to the extraordinary. Disguise it as we may, there lives not a man who on one subject or other has not some pet superstition; but the age is opposed to Casanovism, and men, no matter in what walk of life, who arrogate the power of casting the horoscope win for themselves a merited ridicule.

ROSA RIO.

(From our own Correspondent.) Rosario, Aug. 13, 1871.

Please don't expect great things from your new Correspondent, and you will then be probably agreeably disappointed. My programme will be very simple. Your readers will only have dashed up for their delectation—1st. The news of the day. 2nd. Progress of Colonization. 3rd. Progress of Civilization. 4th. Scandal.

5th. Strictures on Political Economy. 6th. Pitching into abuses. 7th. Commercial Statistcs. 8th. Animalversions on the political opinions of the STANDARD (and you will get it hot and heavy at times). 9th. Social progress. 10th. Club news. 11th. Provincial Statistics (when they are to be had). 12th. Miscellaneous literary efforts on the part of your correspondents.

You will acknowledge that the programme is not ambitious. In fact, I am only anxious to become a humble follower of your former correspondent W. P., who is now considerably better employed than in writing for newspapers.

Now, wait a moment until I take a new pen, and then I shall plunge at once into—I know it—a sea of troubles. Thanks to our new Gefé Politico, Mr. Bayo, we are beginning to enjoy a period of tranquility. The morality of the Department is rapidly improving. Criminals are ferreted out and punished in a way quite new to the community since the revolution of the 'gauchos' against Oroño. The press is full of laudatory paragraphs in favor of Mr. Bayo, whose father, by the way, was the terror of the 'Gaucha malo.'

Mr. Bayo on accepting the position of Gefé insisted on having from the Government a 'carte blanche.' He was not to be hampered by red tapism, and I am happy to be able to corroborate in part the general opinion that we have the right man in the right place. Of course there is a great deal left undone yet; but crime is most notably on the decrease both in town and the camp.

We are feeling the commercial crisis in Rosario, probably more than you in Buenos Ayres. We have no bank like the Provincial to help us out of our difficulties. Here the banks instead of assisting the needy, and all are needy just now, become more stringent and exacting. In fact our banks do nothing to foment trade or to avert mercantile catastrophes. If Congress sanctions the establishment of a State Bank, with the proceeds of the five million loan already arranged for by the Provincial Government, we may expect a more thorough opening up of the resources of the Province.

There are eight English vessels in port, to wit:— Alice, loaded, Falmouth, for orders. D. Ricardo, Houkkip, Africa, ballast. Charlotte, loading for Falmouth. Camulet, discharging. Mary Falconer, do. Linda, do. Prince Arthur, do. Elizabeth Knowles, discharged. The cargo of the Alice is the following— 16 pipes tallow. 80 pipes melted do. 1800 caracues. 4476 hides, salted.

The papers here as well as in the capital are complaining of the class of immigration that arrives at Rosario. With the exception of the settlers for the Railway lands and those destined for the colonies about Santa Fé, they mostly belong to General Mitre's spontaneous immigration—gaul birds, organ grinders and orange-vendors.

Have you read General Mitre's pamphlet containing his speech in the Senate on this subject? It is a pity that clever people will insist on examining the public stomach with crude theories, when what we, as a young and vigorous nation war, are practical facts.

There is a jolly row in the Municipality just now about the question of public slaughter-houses. It seems that the government gave the privilege to some one or other, who has done nothing, and our Municipality want to override the action of the government, and call for proposals for the buildings. One party is right theoretically, and the other is right practically.

There is also considerable excitement in reference to the proper site for the new Custom-House. Of course every proprietor wants them in his back yard—the question of the capital on a small scale. It is probable they will occupy pretty nearly the site of the present buildings.

I read something in the STANDARD a few days ago, that the government was making a difficulty in subscribing for their shares in the new company. Is the government mad or only ignorant? They are cutting their own throats. I fancy there must be some mistake about your statement, and should be glad to hear the facts of the matter.

I have received an invitation for the ceremony of laying the first stone of the Catholic Church in Bernstadt, on the 20th inst. I shall certainly go, if only to report to STANDARD.

Mr. Cullen's colony of 'Jesus Maria' at San Lorenzo, as also Mr. Casado's in the Caracaña, is progressing very favourably. The first is Italian; none but Catholics are admitted—a distinction that only could have been made by a Sautafecino. Mr. Casado's is cosmopolitan, like the Railway Colonies, and has several Englishmen there. The Opinion Nacional gives the following as the value of the two great branches of the industry of this province in 1870:

Department of Rosario. Products of agriculture..... 700,000. Cattle..... 800,000. The rest of the Province. Products of agriculture..... 900,000. Cattle..... 800,000. In all..... 3,200,000.

If this be an approximate calculation for last year, an exceptionally bad one, we may safely calculate the produce from the same source in 1871 at \$6,000,000. The two theatres are open, but both losing money. Every one complains of the monetary and commercial crisis. Business is dull, and although there are no palpable indications of things becoming worse, the commercial aspect of Rosario is by no means smiling, and it is not surprising.

Immediately following the reaction on the close of the Paraguayan war we had the Enterrian war, and the yellow fever in Buenos Ayres. The innate vitality of this country is strongly evinced by the resistance offered to the ruinous circumstances above mentioned, which would have swamped almost any other country in South America.

I will close my correspondence with a good piece of news. Mrs. Biddy Brady has taken a farm at Caracaña. She did me the honor of calling on me, and when I told her I was your correspondent, she promised a racy letter now and again. All she asks from you in return is that you shall send her the WEEKLY STANDARD gratis, to Caracaña Colony, New Siding.

The Foreigners' Club will open in their fine suite of Rooms, corner of Aduana and Santa Fe, on the 1st of September, with about 70 members. There is every appearance of this club becoming an fait accompli.

The debate on the 2d reading of the government bill on Slavery commenced on the 10th instant. The opposition moved that the government bill be laid aside, and that the house take up the bill reported in the session of 1870 by the Special Committee on Slavery, which is analogous in its provisions. After a prolonged and very warm debate, the government carried, on the 11th, a motion to close the debate, and in the consequent vote on the question of preference carried it against the Opposition, by a majority of 62 to 38.

From the 11th until to-day the sessions have been occupied with the debate on the first article, that declaring all children born hereafter free citizens, which passed to day by a majority of 62 to 37.

ing four to five pounds are reported to have been picked up, but no loss of life, human or bestial, seems to have happened.

Around Rio Bonito a hail storm on the 6th did much damage to the crops, much of the hail weighing half a pound.

The trial of the notorious Juca Rosa (the negro prophet and high priest) ended on the 6th after a prolonged session, and resulted in a verdict of guilty. The sentence passed on him was 6 years imprisonment with labor, a fine of 20 per cent of the sums swindled, and the costs.

Dr. J. M. da Silva Coutinho has discovered near Tatuby, in the province of Sao Paulo, a number of fossil skeletons grouped on a calcareo-argillaceous flag. According to Dr. Carlos Rath there were a considerable number, but all headless, from the size of a hen down, and they belonged to the lizard family. An accumulation of cone-shaped teeth lay on one part of the rock, half of them with the enamel still remaining.

A bed of mineral fuel, supposed to be coal, has been found near San Francisco da Gloria, termo of Muriubá, in the province of Minas Geraes. In the province of Amazonas an earthquake was felt, on the 23d of May, on the north bank of the Amazon between Serpa and Manaos. The river rose and fell suddenly at the same time.

The Pará consul for the German Empire is now Mr. Gustav Sesselberg, Mr. H. Brambeer having returned to Europe.

EDITOR'S TABLE. While the inhabitants of the de facto capital of the Republic are trembling at the possible return of the awful epidemic conflagration of last summer, the National Senate, Nere like, keeps fiddling what may prove an overture to a second act of the horrid tragedy. Since the necessarily late commencement of the present sitting of Congress not a practical word has been spoken in either House of the Legislature on the Plague of '71, nor the slightest concern manifested as to whether it returns in '72 or not. Yet honorable senators have gone heart and soul into the inopportune Capital question, and having devoted what they are pleased to consider their minds to the subject, came to a decision on Saturday that has fairly astounded the public. In our leading columns we refer at length to this extraordinary display of legislative patriotism and foresight. The capital of the Republic at Villa Maria!! The thing will seem incredible abroad. We expect from the press and the public a cry of anger and derision at the apparent trifling of the Upper House of Congress with such an important question.

Monsieur le Comte Amelot de Chauvillon, French Charge d'Affaires, left yesterday morning for Montevideo, on board the gubon La Pique. We have intelligence by the last mail that a subscription is being raised in London to erect a monument in Rio to commemorate the Paraguayan war. A highly influential meeting was lately held to initiate the movement, the Emperor of Brazil, Prince de Joinville, Count Aquila, and a considerable number of the leading merchants of the British metropolis being present.

A very important land auction comes off to-day at San Martin, on the Western Railway, when 140 splendid building plots, quite close to the station, will be offered for sale by Mr. de la Serna, the well known auctioneer. This charming and healthy locality is just now attracting the attention of speculators, but chiefly of capitalists anxious to erect summer residences at a safe distance from the city. Messrs. Martinez de Hoz, Madero, Oromi, Kubli, Ramos, Dr. Drago, and others have splendid quintas and tracts in the neighborhood, and several new houses have been lately commenced by recent purchasers of lots in and around the town. Many consider that San Martin is destined within a short time to become the most aristocratic suburb of the city, as it has all the advantages of the open camp, though but half an hour's run by rail from town. The special train ordered for those who purpose attending the auction to-day leaves the Parquo station at a quarter past 11, and Mr. de la Serna places the discussion of an 'arrogant lunch' the first thing on the programme. Tickets for the express train will be given gratis.

We received yesterday from Mr. Cook, the talented manager of the Gas Works in Montevideo, two excellent photographs of that establishment, exhibiting it as it was in 1870 and as it is in 1871; the contrast is certainly notable. Also one of the Maua Dock, which appears a splendid and complete work.

The Philharmonic Society's concert for the poor of Buenos Ayres came off on Saturday night at the Coliseum. We have never seen a more brilliant audience in that concert room. The vast 'salle' was filled by the leading families of the city, and the receipts must have been considerable. The performance was in every way excellent, though neither the band nor chorus seemed to us as numerous as usual; both, however, were in excellent training, and very effective. Madame Anzon charmed the audience by her rendering of the exquisite 'Una voce poco fa,' from the Barber, and in the second part the impassioned 'Ernani, Ernani, involami.' The duo from Don Giovanni, on two pianos, was also a treat of the first order. Milles, Fernandez, Kier, Igarzabal, and Amadeo also took a prominent part in the concert, and drew down the most enthusiastic applause. Previous to the performance of the last chorus, each of the leading lady amateurs was presented with a bouquet, that laid at Madame Anzon's feet being of the most formidable dimensions. The talented musical director of the Society, Mr. Reinken, had infinite trouble to organize the concert, and we are happy to congratulate him on its success.

The information we received last week respecting the stoppage of the new saladeros at Eszenada by the Municipality of that place turns out incorrect. We now understand that they are working at full power, and that another will shortly be opened.

We find in a U.S. paper the following advertisement, a proof of the strange pranks adversity plays with gentle and simple alike: "A Russian nobleman who has taken degrees at Heidelberg and St. Petersburg, and who is entirely conversant with the English, German, French, Polish, Italian, Latin, and Greek languages in addition to his native tongue, and speaks them fluently, wishes for a situation as coachman."

Parties who have just returned from Entre Rios inform us that a very uneasy feeling as to the intrigues of the Jordanites prevails in that Province. An English gentleman who lately spoke with one of the officers of the Blanco Etat Major was informed by him that the revolutionary forces are at the present moment stronger than ever. Muniz is about to be made Commander-in-chief vice Aparicio.

In the published returns of deaths for the past few days we remark the ominous words *se ignora* after the names of several adults, some over 20 years of age. The public will not be slow in taking alarm from such evidence, and in attempting concealment. Such returns in a city where there are over 100 doctors are simply monstrous, and scandalous in the highest degree.

We hear that small-pox is raging in Concepcion, where the number of cases was 70 a few days ago, and the daily death rate from the disease increasing.

The mole at Concordia, at the construction of which our friend Mr. Peter Baere, C.E., presides, is progressing rapidly, and will be finished in three months. It will be 230 feet in length, and one of the finest things of the kind in the country.

The Rosario papers complain that very few people in that town send their children to school, and publish some stubborn figures in support of the assertion, which seems, unfortunately, but too true.

The Lynching affair at Pavon has had a wonderful effect on the criminal population of Rosario. Since that act of justice robberies and murders are much less frequent.

During the month of July the City of Buenos Ayres Tramway Company carried the enormous number of 191,810 passengers, in 4,588 trips.

The 'vasura' men have not been paid for 5 months, and most of them struck work on Saturday. City affairs have been going full sail to the dogs since the plague; they cannot be far from port now.

Dr. Rawson's speech in the Convention, though opposed to the State Church, did full justice to the noble conduct of the clergy in the recent epidemic. He said: "Full praise has not been given to the clergy of Buenos Ayres for their heroism during the plague; when the inhabitants fled on all sides, terror-stricken, and even husbands abandoned their wives for fear of contagion, the priests bravely stood their ground. At the dead hour of midnight we met here and there a man dressed in black, who steadily bent his steps to the bedside of the sick, and there himself imbued the poison of contagion. It was the Catholic priest who, in the fulfilment of his sacred duties, went to console the dying, and point them the way to Heaven. Sixty-seven priests died, half the number of those in the city."

The Rio de la Plata arrived in port yesterday from the Uruguay. When passing Villa Colon she was about to stop for passengers, but the people on shore made excited signals to the vessel not to stop, but to continue on her course. It is supposed by the passengers that some row or revolution was going on, but the next mail will, no doubt, bring full explanations.

We have to bring under the notice of the Directors of the Western R.R. way that their Sunday time table is neither calculated to develop the passenger traffic of the line, or satisfy the public. There are too few trains on Sunday to the nearer suburban stations. To take the edge off the approaching opposition by the Billing-

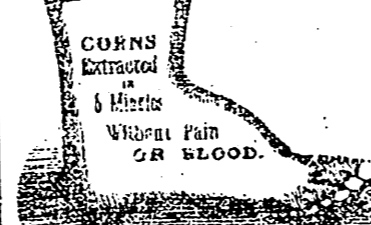

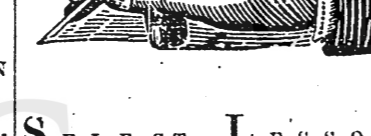
