THE AMERICAN MAILS.

Yesterday we received our New York exchanges to 24th July, being nearly as fresh as our dates from Europe.

set forth as abundance of circulating medium, and lower rates of interest, placing within reach of all the acquisition of the funds necessary for their relative positions. This is certainly an enchanting picture of the happy millennium which the National Bank is to produce, but we do not quite see on what basis this institution is to be founded in the present financial state of this republic. Perhaps the idea is to imitate the Bank of England by depositing a large sum of government debt bonds as the capital of the bank, and authorizing an emission of notes to the extent represented by the bonds, considering such notes to be 'theoretically' founded on gold, but 'really' on the security of the state. What notes would be worth thus issued under the guarantee of this Republic it is easy to imagine, when the emission now in circulation, with guarantee of the state, besides the collateral security of the assets of the banks which stopped payment, is 1 1/2 per cent. discount. The injury done to this country by compromising its credit, and forcing into circulation the inconvertible notes of all the banks which failed some time back, will be, in the end, a greater loss of capital than the whole expenses of the much talked of nine years war. Experience may likewise show to have shown that a bank note circulation can safely stand only on the basis of the precious metals. A National Bank ought to be a sort of reservoir of money for supplying the wants for the trade and industry of the country, and, consequently, a National Bank must be so organized as to have the power of satisfying all legitimate demands on reasonable terms. This, and nothing else, is the true character and mission of a National Bank. There is no mistake more common, and at the same time so dangerous, as the popular error that the rate of interest depends on the abundance or scarcity of capital. After the discovery of the Californian and Australian gold mines, the amount of gold spread all over the world has greatly increased; the price of this metal and of silver have fallen, but the rates of interest in the great centres of commerce have remained the same. In an economical point of view, the rate of interest expresses the supply and demand of capital. In a political point of view, it is influenced by the relative situation of the class which possesses the capital and the class which employs it, of the greater or lesser dependence of the one towards the other, of the importance of wealth in the social position, and its influence in the administration of public affairs. Of course due allowance must be made for the influence which indirectly the state of public confidence may bring to bear on the rate of discount. And although it is perfectly true that supply and demand make the general law which fixes interest of money, and regulates the rate of discount, yet it is easy to show how, under the present artificial system of finances, this general law can be influenced so as to affect the interest of money and modify the rate of discount. The trade in capital or savings, it is now almost admitted, ought to be as free as the trade in any other commodity, else there is the danger of interfering with the business of the large capitalist or with that of the trader, by raising up difficulties in the way of one or the other. A national bank, if it were possible to establish and conduct it on such principles as would at all times and on all occasions 'support' the credit of this republic, by giving all possible facilities to the employment of capital, for the benefit of trade and industry, by keeping down the rate of discount at the lowest possible level, would augment the commercial importance of this country to an immense degree in a very brief period. The savings of a nation form the only portion of its capital properly available for the resources of a State. How many thousands of dollars are shut up in boxes or bid in holes and corners by 'quinteros,' small traders, and artisans? Yet this is all so much money lost to the trade and industry of the country. If the money was locked up as shown above were taken under the protection of a paternal and solid government, and were more usefully and with equal safety applied for the benefit of all parties, when lent out in the form of discounts and other commercial advances for giving additional employment to labor, increased wealth to the trading community and development of its resources to the republic, surely it would be a great step on the road of progress, and if this is to be obtained by a National Bank, then let the experiment be made; but let us gain our experience through the means of a thoroughly organized establishment with solid foundations. What organization appears to our mind the only one admissible in the Banda Oriental shall form the subject of a future letter. The fine steamer Araucania, of the Pacific and West Coast Company's fleet, arrived at Montevideo from Liverpool on Thursday, and her mails were delivered in this city yesterday morning. This steamer's dates are for the 24th ult. from New York, the 29th from Liverpool, and the 4th inst. from Lisbon. It is seldom we have such speedy intelligence from the States, and we extract from the New York papers in another column. The commercial intelligence from England is still favourable; all kinds of River Plate produce continue in active demand. The political news is of some interest. The Emperor of Brazil has fairly beaten the Londoners. His Majesty, according to the latest accounts, had advanced his hour for rising to four o'clock a.m., an hour when London 'bent ton' is winding its watch previous to retiring to rest. His Majesty is a prodigious favorite with all classes in England, but no crowned head has ever conquered in so short a time such thorough appreciation amongst the mass of the English people, and this is owing to his Majesty's simple and manly habits. The news from the Sister City yesterday confirms the defeat of the Blanco Colonel Fideles. The fight took place near Cuiapiru, and although there were only 50 men on each side, so sanguinary was the affair that all the White officers were killed. A large force of Blancos is said to be hovering near Rosario. The director of a large English school in this city writes to us as follows:—"The Municipality have collected for gas and serenos for our schools for the month of March, the first month they shut us up, and according to order we remained so more than three months. This is not all; it have doubled their charges. It is quite ridiculous charging extra for the gas; children don't attend school at night, and their parents pay for their own houses." In the National Senate on Thursday night the report of the Special Committee, recommending that Government should subscribe £17,000 to the Central Argentine Land Company, was discussed. Our distinguished countryman Dr. Sarsfield, Minister of the Interior, opposed the report of the Committee, recapitulating all the threadbare grievances the Government supposes itself to have against the Company. After some remarks made by Senators Oroño and Quintana, the debate was adjourned till the next sitting. We learn with very great pleasure that Judge Hollister, formerly so well and favorably known in this city as United States Consul, has been named Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Idaho. The Judge's numerous friends in the Plate will be glad to hear of his promotion. Dr. Irigoyen drank success to the independent joint stock enterprises, and recounted all the prosperous and independent private enterprises in the Plate. Mr. Nougouier proposed success to the Argentine Bank, whose President was present; Mr. Santa Maria drank to future meetings like unto the present, Mr. Guerrero Jr. followed in the same strain, stating that he was given to understand we should all have another trip to Montevideo when the Water-works pay 24 per cent.; he drank to a 36 per cent. dividend. At 11 o'clock the party broke up. The banquet was one of the most splendid, most agreeable, and most influential ever given in this city, although of a purely private character, and limited to those who formed the Montevideoan excursion party. The Rev. Father Leahy, our much esteemed Irish pastor, has been slightly indisposed for some days, but we are glad to hear not dangerously so. We are requested to state that the usual service with sermon, etc., will be celebrated at San Roque Church on Sunday next. In March, 1871, the Corporation of Preston, Lancashire, England, decided to purchase a steam fire engine, and, in order to secure the very best description, a competitive trial was arranged to be held at Preston on April 6th. Two engines entered for the test, one from Shand, Mason and Co., London, and the other from Merryweather and Sons. The engine of Shand, Mason and Co. weighed between three and four hundredweight lighter than Merryweather and Sons', consumed five hundredweight less fuel, raised steam three minutes quicker, delivered a larger body of water to a greater distance, and was superior in every respect. The final trial was adjourned to the 4th May, when in all the five tests to which the competing engines were subjected, a unanimous verdict was given in favor of Shand, Mason and Co.'s engine, which immediately became the property of the Preston Corporation. Rodriguez and Larrazabal, the auctioneers, will offer for sale 100 manzanas splendidly situated. All will be sold without reserve, and in smaller lots to suit purchasers. Free tickets on the railway, a free lunch, etc. will be given; in fact, everything will be free except the land, which will be sold for a good song if nothing higher is offered. Such an opportunity was never offered to the land buying public. A few thousand dollars will buy a plot whereon to build a house safe from epidemics, and enable the lucky owners To pass their lives in flowers and on flowers, and never know the weight of human hours. We regret to announce the death of Captain John Watson, native of Ireland, which took place yesterday at 3 o'clock. Deceased was for many years in the employ of Messrs. Lezica and Lanuz, by whom he was much esteemed, having risen from a sailor to be captain of the Enrique Connell. In this capacity he had full field for the display of his noble nature, and received testimonials from several Brazilian officers for his kind attention to the wounded in the Paraguayan war. During the plague he never left the city, attending night and day on the sick and dying, until himself stricken down from sheer exhaustion. His constitution never righty recovered, and about this month he was seized with small-pox, to which he fell victim, after 25 days' suffering. We understand his friends are about to raise by private subscription a monument to this champion of true charity. The time has arrived now for a very large amount of bonds to come on the market, but money continues so unusually cheap, and good investments for short dates so scarce, that discounters are actually buying bonds now, as the best employment that can be obtained for money. Exchange ruled to-day at 49 1/2, 49 1/2, but very little done, and it would appear that there will be little passed for the French picket. The exchange passed to-day was done for the Chilean steamer Patagonia, expected in Montevideo to-morrow. She sails on the 27th, and the mail leaves here to-morrow (Saturday night). M. J. de Poor has been named agent of the Antwerp Maritime Insurance Company 'The Bureau Veritas,' in place of M. Ubbes Hols, deceased. The office of the new agency is at 65 Calle Corrientes, and R. G. de Vries is the agent. The advices received to-day by the American mails are from New York to the 24th July, and give the following respecting dry hide— We have only had a moderate demand this month, partly on account of the unsatisfactory state of the leather market, as also on account of the usual dullness of the hide market during the summer months. Advices were received from Montevideo to-day of the sale of Mr. Newton's wool to an American buyer in Buenos Ayres at 4 patacons all round, bellies included—wool to be delivered red at Colonia, buyer paying shipping charges and duties. The wool will be delivered next week. Sheepskins are in active demand. M. Hernandez sold to-day in South Plaza— 125 doz. good sheepskins at 215 per doz. 100 do do do 205 " There were several other sales at lower prices. Great importance was attached to the sale of land to-day at Flores, near Carabala's quinta. Everything offered was sold, the best located sites selling for \$18000 mps per vara front with 69 depth. This land is on the opposite side of the railway from the town, and within a few squares of the station. On the city side of Flores, and not far from the main road, a square of land has been sold by a well known English merchant at reserved rates. The financial advices from Europe per Chilean steamer continue to be most favorable. Money in London rules at 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 Argentine bonds have improved 4. Southern Railway shares have risen to 26 1/2, and Central Argentine to 2 1/2. All produce reports are favorable, with the exception of the dry hides market, which is a little flat, owing to the season. The sale of the White chacha at Belgrano, on Sunday, by Messrs. Rodriguez and Larrazabal, is attracting much attention. The location of the property could not be better, and for next building sites in that neighbourhood there is now great demand. An offer of \$130,000 mps was made to-day to the Popular Argentina for 3 squares of land in the town of the Los Unidos. There is now enquiry for the admiral's two shares of this company. 160 pata per anar was offered to-day on the Bolsa for 10 shares and decl. ed. At after hours there was a great stir amongst the brokers in the bond market. A buyer for another 100,000 bonds, at 7 1/2 was offering, but there were no sellers. The rates for the end of the month and the end of September closed hard at a still further advance on the day's closing prices. The proposed bill in Congress to stop the Government's grant to the Central Argentine Railway, until the Company's obligations be established in the River Plate, proved much content. All agree that the House should at once three out such an impertinent and ill-considered measure, as it is calculated to damage the credit of the nation in England. Up to four o'clock p.m. a telegram had been received on the Bolsa from Montevideo. The inconvenient delays attending the improvements of the Bolsa are the subject of the greatest complaint of brokers and others affected, and are being to remain in the hall. A memorial to the Committee of the Bolsa is being drawn up, as, instead of having a large number of workmen at work to finish the job as quickly as possible, only ten men are at work, and thus the very eyes of Mr. Rom, the able manager of the institution, could not be fully availed of all the inconveniences caused by such unnecessary delays.
