It will probably cause some considerable astonishment to many of your readers to observe that although we have received, per Magellan, the confirmation of the successful launching of the Oriental loan in the London Market, and have moreover the knowledge that Don Duncan Stewart, the Minister of Finance, has received advice both from Messrs. Thompson, Bonar, & Co., and the Government agent Mr. Alexander Mackinnon, that the Neva will bring out £250,000, the price of gold is still firmly sustained at about 5 per cent. The explanation of this apparent anomaly is, that speculating on the contingencies of the realization of the loan and of the restoration of peace, an enormous amount of gold had been sold on time, "disposable" for the seller, at rates varying, as far as I can see by reference to the *Telegrafo Maritimo*, from 9 to 10 1/2, and as these prices leave a very handsome profit, the sellers are all anxious to buy at cash, deliver their gold, and receive their profits; a half or one per cent. difference in price being but a trifling object to these parties when they make 4 or 5 per cent. by their speculation. Under these circumstances it would seem probable that the value of gold is not likely to depreciate during all this month, although the arrival of more than a million of dollars by the Neva on the 6th prox. may produce a fall.

The money market, too, is in a peculiar position, notwithstanding the conviction that when the proceeds of the loan come forward there will be an abundance of disposable capital. But there is a fear abroad that the arrival of so much gold and the subsequent obligation of the private banks to convert their notes in circulation, for "papel nacionalizado," or in default of this in gold, may bring about some disturbance in the money market, and perhaps a bank crisis. We presume that it is under the influence of these ideas that the management of the London and River Plate Bank declines any longer (so it is said) to discount even the best commercial securities for paper, and that the Commercial Bank, which for the present still continues to discount, has raised the rate to 15 per cent. annum.

The man Pereira, agent here for the *Mala de Europa*, who bolted to Valparaiso in the Lusitania, with about \$40,000, was arrested on the arrival of that vessel at the above port, but the telegrams advising his creditors of the fact do not state if any of the money has been recovered.

Angel Valdez, the renowned Peruvian "primer espada" (a man of color), has arrived here, and in combination with some other colleagues, professors of the "taurinaquian" art, proposes to give us a few bull-fights, the first to take place on the 3rd prox.

Don Ignacio Raybad, a person of considerable influence in commercial circles, has opened a subscription list for the unfortunate victims of the earthquake at Oran, and forwards to the *Telegrafo Maritimo* a letter which he received from the Comision de Socorros at Rosario de Santa Fé. There can be no doubt that Señor Raybad's appeal to our public, backed by our friend Buela, will meet with a liberal response, and Montevideo once more show herself worthy of her fame for liberality in all cases meriting her charity.

It is said among the initiated in the secrets of the Produce Market, that Wool is looking very weak, and a considerable fall in prices is anticipated shortly by the exporters of this article. Produce has been coming in pretty freely of late but there are very few vessels loading and a want of suitable crop is observable.

I have not written to you of late as frequently as I could wish, but "Othello's" occupation is not yet gone, neither have I succumbed to the "flirtation of the heart," which drew from you such kind and sympathizing remarks a few days back in your Editor's Table, so I will endeavor to keep the pot constantly boiling in future, and will strenuously labor to find the necessary fuel to render the fire hot and bright.

OUR LONDON LETTER.

London, Oct. 21st, 1871.

The cartoon in this week's *Punch* is entitled "nothing in the papers." The hump backed gentleman is represented in person flinging away a *Times* and *Morning Post*, and kicking the penny dailies. *Punch* as representing an average reader is right. The Stockwell murder is the only horror, and that is now exhausted until the trial of the reverend criminal. And as the *Times* says itself, there is not even a Congress this week. The Church Congress closed last Saturday at Notting-ham with a meeting crowded to suffocation to hear a discussion on hymns and hymn tunes. Dr. Gaultlett, the veteran critic and composer managed to edge in a little humour into the solemn questions, and made his clerical audience roar with his description of Gregorian music, which the learned doctor does not appear to appreciate. You will find in the *Guardian* of this week a summary of the discussion on the several subjects introduced by the great lights of the Church. But as each light was by the rules of the Congress only allowed to shine for twenty minutes we are not much the wiser, and certainly as far off religious unity as ever; and that was the primary object of the Congress. The General result was very like that of the Peace Congress at Geneva. In the one case

the sowers of discord were the Communists and in the other the Evangelicals. It is creditable to both Congresses that the madmen were caught down.

The "social movement," the alliance between the Conservative Peers and the leaders of the Proletariat is still a subject of interest and mystery. No sooner was it announced that Lord Salisbury, Carnarvon, the Duke of Richmond, &c., had signed a treaty with Mr. Howell, Mr. Applegarth, Mr. George Potter, and others, to introduce into Parliament sundry measures of a socialistic tendency, but nominally for the improvement of the material condition of the working classes, than the very next day we saw a meeting held under the auspices of the last-mentioned gentleman, for the disestablishment of the Church. The Liberal press made merry at the expense of the Conservatives, who had been "crowing over the new alliance as a victory over the puritanical and middle-class radicalism of Messrs. Gladstone, Forster, and Co. But the peers of the "stupid party" and never was the sonnet better deserved than in this last instance—rushed one after the other into the columns of the *Times*, disclaiming any knowledge of the political treaty. Meantime Mr. Barry, the secretary of the working Men's Association, writes to say that he has the names of the nobles who have signed the treaty. The editor of the *Times* appends a comment to Mr. Barry's letter, accusing him of mistaking a correspondence on the subject for a consent on the part of the peers to the projects of the Proletariat.

The public is waiting for the clearing up of the joke, but feels confident that something in the shape of the alliance has been mooted by the Conservative leaders. It is an old craze of theirs, and dates from the days of Col. Pakenham, and the youthful aspirations of a notable political failure—Lord John Manners, the prototype of the hero in Disraeli's novel. The *Daily News*, half in earnest and half in irony, laments the premature disclosure of the movement. Certainly had the stupid Peers gone on with the plot against our radical but somewhat vulgar Ministry, we should have had that Socialist raising its head in England in twelve months hence. The movement is rather confirmed by Sir John Pakenham's socialistic speech at the Social Science Congress at Leeds. The idea of these country gentlemen that the working classes would allow things as they are, on the condition of certain palliations being granted in the shape of State aid, is the most astounding example of political ignorance and blindness in our history. It only proves the distinct social atmosphere in which these lords and gentlemen live, and the utter impossibility of their understanding the wants and aspirations of the lower classes. That these gentlemen have an earnest and generous desire to better the condition of their inferiors is beyond doubt; but they will not see that the sense of inferiority is the principal grievance, and that it is increased by feudal patronage and charity. What the working classes want is a voice, and a loud voice, in the management of affairs and the removal of artificial superiorities and the artificial barriers of caste. They love and will serve a lord or gentleman, and hate snobs; but that is only because the latter are nearer relations, and are sometimes harsh masters. The snob they know instinctively is not a permanent evil, but a defect with roots in the soil, is Messrs. Peers, Applegarth & Co. ask for help, in the management of affairs and the removal of artificial superiorities and the artificial barriers of caste. They love and will serve a lord or gentleman, and hate snobs; but that is only because the latter are nearer relations, and are sometimes harsh masters. The snob they know instinctively is not a permanent evil, but a defect with roots in the soil, is Messrs. Peers, Applegarth & Co. ask for help, in the management of affairs and the removal of artificial superiorities and the artificial barriers of caste.

It is useless for the Peers to tell us that the most cruel game preservers are the men from Lombard-street, Liverpool, and Manchester, who rent estates. That we all know, just as the most detested officer is the man who rises from the ranks; but that is a temporary and sentimental question, neither here nor there. We have now learned that gentlemen officers, however kind, are useless if not up in their profession. In the same way the adorable manners of our aristocracy will not save them as an institution, if it be proved to be an economic evil. By the way this is a very bad year for game. Many men are returning to town because there is nothing to shoot. The first brood of partridges were destroyed by the cold and damp weather in June and July, and the second brood is so weak on the wing that they give no sport, and nothing for the pot. Young birds in the market are worth 4s. 6d. and 5s. a brace. The birds we see at 2s. 6d. are old, and tough as leather. The pheasants are much the same as to wing. You can knock them down with your hat; and many men who have good covers will not commence work this year until the end of the month. The evening papers of last night tried to startle us by the intelligence that owing to the cutting out of a schooner captured by the British cruisers in the Canada fisheries, a ship of war had been sent to intercept her in Gloucester bay, and that the American Government had retaliated by sending another war ship to look after the Britisher.

The Mormon business seems serious. The Federal authorities are determined to prosecute Brigham Young for bigamy—I am not Grecian enough to coin a proper word for a man who is guilty of having sixteen wives—we will call it polygamy; and the legal

question arises, although you can prosecute a man for bigamy, can you prosecute him for polygamy? Judge McKean, of the U. S. district court at Utah, has indicted Mr. Young for "lewdly and licentiously cohabiting with sixteen women." That of course is a horrible crime, but good gracious there are respectable men in London, and particularly in the parliaments of Temple and Gray's Inn, who would be very nearly liable to an action, unless there is some specific virtue in the number sixteen. The fact is if all accounts are true, Brigham Young is more likely to be tried for murder; and the Atlantic railway and pressure of civilization will do the rest for the extinction of Mormonism.

Judge Barnard has managed to stop the Tammany ring scandal. Mr. Connolly has been turned out of office. He is succeeded by Mr. Green, in whom all parties have confidence. There are however fears that the political degradation of New York is such that the return of Messrs. Tweed, Connolly & Co. to the municipal treasury is only a question of time.

A project has just appeared for rendering the journey from Liverpool to New York a question of seven days. The people of Newfoundland propose to make St. John instead of Halifax the destination of the Liverpool steamers which will cross in four or five days. A railway is to be made from St. John across the island to St. George's Bay, a distance of 168 miles, and joining the intercolonial railway it will unite with the network of lines in the States.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The great news of the day yesterday was the promulgation of the new Mortgage Bank Act. The law is now out, the books and cedulas are being prepared, and on the 1st of the new year the bank will begin operations. It is yet difficult to say how the new concern will work, but we saw the new books yesterday, and estancieros will doubtless be delighted to hear that the working of the new bank will extend to the camp, and all the estancia land can, to the extent of half their value, be brought into the market in the shape of cedulas, bearing 8 per cent. interest. The value of these cedulas may be estimated as follows:—

1st year 90 to par. 2nd year 85 to 90. 3rd year 80 to 85. In the event of a tight money market these cedulas, being the most speculative stock in the market, will be the very first to feel the shock. Parties well up in money matters think that the first year the emission of cedulas will touch five hundred millions currency.

The French mail steamer *Sindh* clears to-morrow with the mails. She will take a large third-class list of passengers, besides cargo. Next year, according to our Montevideo colleagues, we shall have almost daily communication with Europe by steamer, and when the Brazilian cable is laid we may look for European news as fast as our colleagues in the States. Our Royal English mail will run two steamers per month; the French the same; the Lampart and Holt line once a fortnight; the London and Antwerp once a month, and the Chilean Company once a week. The count will stand so that between the French and English mail, and the Chilean line, we shall have two steamers a week, not to count any of the other splendid steamers now plying to the Plate. This excess of communication will, as a matter of course, immensely increase the work of merchants and clerks; the terrible night work for the packet which we all so well remember, first once a month, then once a fortnight, and now three times a week. Better after all the old plan; then there was a rush for the news, and a bracing up for packet work, but the good old times are passed, and more's the pity.

Letters from the Crawford Trans-andine Railway Expedition were received yesterday; all goes on well, but the work is so great that it is disheartening. Better to have done something towards improving this neglected matter than attempt this year-long railway scheme; it is, however the same old 6s. 8d. with us, the cart before the horse.

According to the *Actualidad* of Salto, B.O., Lopez Jordan has already left Brazilian territory with the intention of crossing into Argentine territory; and the *Telegrafo Maritimo* of Montevideo announces, on the authority of a telegram, that a Colonel Ocampo had passed over to the neighbourhood of Gualeguaychu with some 400 men. For some weeks past uneasy rumours have been in circulation as to revolutionary movements in Entre Rios, which we sincerely hope have no foundation, still it behooves both the National and local Governments to take most careful measures.

We are informed that Messrs. Llavallol and Sons of this city have applied to the Entre-Riano Government for permission to establish a Bank with a capital of six million hard dollars.

The "eresiente" in the Uruguay has begun to abate considerably, so much so that the pile heads of the Concordia Mole are again visible. We regret to announce the deaths of two public favorites of Buenos Ayres—the prima donna, Madam Gase, who has died recently in France

and the baritone Celestino in Rio Janeiro. The *Siglo* informs us that the oldest newspaper in the world is published in Peking, adding that some numbers printed on strips of silk are to be seen in the Paris Library.

Mr. Pritchard, who had been for a number of years in this country, left by the Douro. He formerly held the office of cashier in the Montevideo Telegraph Office including the period of the epidemic, and subsequently a similar position in the *Telegrafo del Estado*; he was well known to the commercial public, and carries with him the esteem of many friends. He takes valuable letters of recommendation from parties holding high positions in the city.

The German Schooner *Anton* which some of our readers may recollect was captured off Maldonado by a French man of war and taken to Brest during the late war; arrived here on the 23rd inst with her original cargo. On Monday night in swinging she got foul of an anchor and immediately began to fill with water; she was run aground with 9 ft. of water in her hold close by the Gasworks, her cargo, consisting mostly of spirits, is likely to be all saved.

We are informed that the first opera to be produced at Sr. Pestalozzi's new Opera House, in Calle Corrientes is "El Guarani," and that Sr. Tambeidick, a former favorite of the Buenos Ayren public, will be engaged for the opening season.

The trial of Messrs. Thomson's road steamer, *Rosario* on Sunday last, under the supervision of Major Dickard, proved a signal success in every way. The steamer, with a couple of omnibuses attached, in which were several high authorities of the province, went up hill and down dale, turned round sharp curves, stopped and started again with an ease that surprised both the travellers and the spectators. The road steamer is an invention that should succeed in this country above all others, and the benefits its adoption would confer on the Interior can easily be estimated by the success of the experiment on Sunday last.

On the 8th prox., we hear, there will be a grand German picnic somewhere in the neighborhood of the Tigre. The picnic will not start at break of day, but at 4 p.m., and the excursionists will return the following morning. This will be an innovation in the picnic line, but certainly a desirable one, as it will rescue the fair members of the party from the scorching sun of midday.

The new board of directors of the W. Railway has been duly installed, and Mr. Francis Madro elected chairman of the board, a good and capable man, and whose long connection with the railway has rendered him doubly eligible to so important a post.

The mails from Montevideo yesterday brought up nothing very important, beyond the fact that peace is talked of by everyone, and believed in by two-thirds of the population. The loan, after all, means peace, so we may all say God bless the loan! We have again to intrude on our readers a letter about the Cordoba Scandal. The only excuse we can offer is that the letter speaks on behalf of the Cordoba clergyman, the only party who to the present has said nothing in the matter.

One of our colleagues reports a case of abduction yesterday. Two young ladies of respectable family have been swept off to the Provinces. We know nothing of the matter beyond the fact that the rumor of our colleague was confirmed yesterday, and the authorities are now in hot pursuit of the supposed offender.

It will amuse our readers to hear that yesterday there was a trial by jury in this city. It was a press question; the editor gained, and the plaintiff, who is the Judge of the Corrales, has to take his case, now by a writ of certiorari (if any such writ exists in Argentine jurisprudence) to another court. The point decided by the jury was important, namely, that to attack in the public press a public employe is not a press offence. Dr. Pellegrini defended our colleague, and made a very brilliant speech.

Mariano Billinghurst & Co. yesterday deposited in the bank forty thousand patacons, in part payment of the guarantee for the construction of the Rosario Railway. This is a pretty stiff business, but it will be stiffer still next week, when the same firm deposits sixty thousand patacons more on the same account. Such deposit is unnecessary; the name of Mariano Billinghurst, whether as auctioneer or railway contractor, is worth more than all this gold deposited in the bank. The pocket-book found by us a few days ago is still in our desk; it does not answer the description sent to us by Messrs. Chute & Brooks, of Montevideo.

If Mr. S. were not so grossly ignorant of the history of countries where his own tongue is spoken, he would pause before he threw a stone at Cordoba for her intolerance.
