A CHEMIST'S VIEW OF THE SEWAGE QUESTION.

To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen: I am about to address you on a subject, the treatment of which in a general newspaper is not without certain difficulties. The author of a recent pamphlet on 'the Epidemic of 1871, its causes and their removal,' has referred to this; and it appears he was induced to abandon his original intention of making your valuable journal the medium of communicating his views to the public.

tend, if you can afford space in one or two short articles, to reproduce in an English dress, a statement of my views on a question of the very highest importance to all of us who have fixed our abode in this city, and who must necessarily possess, whether we manifest it or not, a deep interest in all that relates to its sanitary condition.

The authorities, alarmed by the repeated visitations of epidemic diseases, have determined to introduce a radical change in the actual and generally condemned system of disposing of the solid and liquid 'excreta' of the population.

They have arranged with a well-known and thoroughly competent engineer to prepare plans and estimates for the improvement of the city, its drainage, sewerage, and water supply, and apparently have the will as well as the means of carrying out whatever these plans may be.

That these plans, from an engineering point of view will prove to be excellent, I have not the very slightest doubt, and I regard the appointment of a commission of civil engineers to examine and report upon the daily expected plans of Mr. Bateman, as a work of supererogation, or as another symptom of the two prevalent diseases 'commission on the brain.'

If, however, these plans include what is known as the water-closet system, and if their adoption necessitate the application of this system to Buenos Ayres, then, as a chemist, as a rate-payer, and as an individual desirous to live as long as possible, and hoping to bring up a family in this city, I most emphatically protest against their being carried out.

Buenos Ayres requires a good and abundant water supply, thorough drainage, and decently paved streets; these, of course, it must have; but water-closets, to waste the water, contaminate the drains, and spread the germs of disease broadcast over the land, I humbly think it ought not to have.

Why, I ask, are we about to leave the matter entirely in the hands of the members of the profession of civil engineering? Is it not also a question to be regarded from a medical, a physiological, a chemical, and an economic point of view? Surely, then, it behoves us to enquire, carefully and dispassionately, if the system about to be introduced, and whose influence, for weal or for woe, will be felt for generations to come, be one which satisfies the requirements, not only of mechanical science, but at the same time one which the physician, the chemist, and the social economist can conscientiously approve of.

Deeply impressed with the necessity of doing something, I would simply urge that we take care that that something be the best we are capable of doing. Delay in this matter is certainly dangerous; scarcely less so is the rushing blindfold into action.

I will, with your permission, endeavor to lay before your readers a clear statement of the sewage question, as viewed by the light of chemical science, examining in detail the several systems, their advantages and their defects, not because I feel that I have anything new to state, but because it is often profitable to call to remembrance that which is already known, and in the present matter is apparently in danger of being forgotten.

THE FOREST FIRES.

The following graphic description of the terrible forest fires in the States we received per last mail. Judge Barron, Fifth Auditor of the Treasury, describes a visit to his home in Wisconsin. The published reports of the widespread destitution and suffering in that region caused by the terrible fire, are in no respect exaggerated, and indeed no account can give an adequate idea of the frightful extent of the calamity. The loss to the lumbering interest in the destruction of mills, &c., is immense, but, not, however irreparable, as the pine forests are still generally left standing, though stripped by fire of their lighter branches and foliage. The Secretary of War has authorized General Sheridan to afford such relief as may be in his power to the sufferers by the fires in Michigan and Wisconsin.

to escape from the fire. It is now estimated that the whole number of people drowned and burnt to death will reach 500. Whole families yet remain unburied. The great difficulty seems to have been that the people inhaled what came from the fire, and hundreds are now suffering intense agony from this cause. No tongue can tell nor words describe such ghastly sights we hope never to see again. I will mention one case of a little girl 12 years old, who was visited by many to desist from the attempt lest she herself should perish. She heeded them not, however, but the most heroic efforts she succeeded in rescuing her little sister from the merciless flames. Her father, mother, brother, and other sisters perished in the flames, and after the fire had abated somewhat she worked her way back over the hot ashes and burning coals and dragged the dead bodies of her relations out into the open space, then stood watching their charred remains all day and through the long and desolate night that followed.

A gentleman who has been to Green Bay from Saginaw says, in a description of his voyage:— The boat was greatly detained on her upward trip on account of high wind and smoke, and the latter was so dense that the boat had to be steered entirely with a compass. The fire on the east side of the bay extended in an almost unbroken line from the eastern shore of Lake Winnebago to the northern extremity of the eastern peninsula, fully 150 miles, burning in its course fences, barns, houses, and an endless quantity of cedar telegraph poles and tan bark, the latter of which was piled in immense heaps on the docks. So deep and dismal was the darkness caused by the immense volume of smoke, that the sun was totally obscured for a distance of 200 miles. This midnight darkness continued for a week. The air was red with burning fragments carried all the way from Peshtigo and other places along the shore, a distance of nearly 50 miles.

If from the beginning of the world people had followed Mr. Dick's principles, we might enjoy ourselves yet in paradise; but this, unhappily, is no longer the case. Does Mr. Dick mean to compare myself to the 20 ounces theory? then I am sorry that he should judge in that way a person whom he does not know at all, and of whom, consequently, he cannot know whether he is more of a theoretical than of a practical character. Mr. Dick scarcely can expect to be thought a practical man in this business, because firstly the reader does not know who is the person hidden behind the name 'Dick,' and secondly he leaves altogether on one side my reply to his first article, and sticks nevertheless to his first opinion.

Does Mr. Dick still believe that the only possible way to realize my propositions is under the shade of a society, then I should take this as a proof of his impractical judgment; because up to the present I have not seen in South America one single society formed for this purpose of colonization, which would not sooner look after its own advantage before it would care about that of the colonists. Could Mr. Dick show me a society which considers the welfare of the colonists with the same firm purpose as myself, which accepts, my other ideas, and is willing to carry them through? then I shall be very glad to get a heavy burden off my shoulders, and will be very willing to work as the agent of that society. But I believe the experience I have had of South America up to the present, and the 50 summers that have passed over my head, give me a right to consider these as idle dreams and useless loss of time, and so I shall try and prove to Mr. Dick how by energy and perseverance I reach my aim.
