Last week were reported the inroads of Indians on Mr. Coffin's estancia, where they murdered the mayordomo and carried off his son, within a day's journey of B. Ayres.

In matters of domestic policy we are slow to offer any suggestions to Government that may be resented as peculiarly inappropriate for a foreigner—but as it is likely that many of the victims are foreigners, we feel bound to tell President Sarmiento and his Ministers that they are at present too much occupied in questions with Brazil, Bolivia, and the European diplomatic agents, while bands of Indians or gauchos are laying waste with fire and sword our lands within the frontier, advancing their daring inroads after every fresh victory reported by the War-office.

The most appalling news was received yesterday by telegram from Rosario. The Indians are a few miles from the town ravaging and robbing, and 20 victims are reported murdered in their beds.

There was an average crowd on the mole yesterday afternoon to bid the passengers by the Neva good bye. The number of lady travellers was below the average, and the waiting, cart, business was consequently dull.

It was truly rumoured yesterday morning that the Bahia of the new Flamingo line has brought highly important despatches for the Brazilian Minister. The tenour has not yet transpired, but will, no doubt, to-morrow. Nothing else was spoken of on 'Change, but the Funds were not adversely affected.

The American mails bring the following startling intelligence respecting another probable Fichborn case: "Deputy Sheriff Judson Jarvis arrested on Tuesday night, Lord George Gordon, alias George Henry Gordon, alias Gordon Gordon, at the suit of Jay Gould, on an order of arrest granted by Judge Brady.
