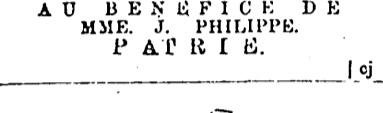

THURSDAY, AUGUST 1, 1872. STEAMBOAT SUBSIDIES. PROPOSED ARGENTINE MAIL PACKET COMPANY.

It is a splendid sign of the times that Congress is now called on to discuss a National Oceanic Steam-boat enterprise, instead of such unprofitable matters as the federalization of Villa Maria, the conversion of Argentine consuls in England, the amendment of the Austro-Hungarian treaty, and the like. Good example is producing an admirable effect with our legislators, and as they were at first slow to adopt the English system of giving subsidies for the maintenance of national mail-packet companies, we may suppose they are more ready to take a lesson from the U. States Congress, which has just voted one million dollars per annum to the San Francisco and Japan line of steamers.

Why should we not have a line of first-class steamers under the Argentine flag? Why should B. Ayres be worse off than Australia or South Africa, and under an obligation to English or French ship-owners? If we are able to pay subsidies to railway companies, why not also to ocean steamers, with the express purpose of giving assisted passages to suitable emigrants from Germany, Belgium or England?

It is true we have refused subsidies to new lines from Liverpool and elsewhere, but English companies have more reason to look for such from their own Government. It is not to be supposed that the Argentine Mail-Packet Co. will ask the British Parliament for a subsidy. It is true the existing lines from Southampton, Liverpool, London, Glasgow, Bordeaux and Marseilles will probably feel jealous at any subsidy Congress may grant the new Argentine line; but we must pay little regard to jealousy and personal interests when any measure affecting national welfare is at stake.

It is true grumblers will be found to protest against an extraordinary outlay of two or three hundred thousand dollars yearly; but the mere gain from 3,000 picked emigrants yearly will far out-balance such considerations: the increased production at 50¢ per head will enrich the country by 300,000, thus paying the cost of their passage in the first year; and if we accept the U. States calculation of 800¢ per head as the value of an English or German immigrant we shall be gainers to an amount too flattering for financial estimates.

Even supposing that the whole outlay of 200,000\$ were a dead loss to the treasury of the Republic there are still advantages which we must not overlook in establishing a National Argentine line of steamers. When the recent subsidy of 500,000\$ for the San Francisco and Japan line came up for debate at Washington the members of Congress rightly said "this is not a question of dollars; we must keep our flag in the Pacific at all cost," and the vote was increased to a million dollars. The same feeling should animate our statesmen, if they would have the country thrive as her resources and destiny demand. We must look at the matter in a broad view. We know that from the days of Carthage down to the present those countries that sought excellence on the high seas have risen unerringly to greatness, and when they allowed their maritime interests to decay it was the precursor of national decline. Compare Spain, Portugal and Holland of to-day with what they were in the 16th century when their flags were met with in every sea.

We hope Congress will take up the matter in the same patriotic spirit as the Press have accepted it. The vessels will be called after Belgrano, Brown, Rivadavia and San Martin, perpetuating in an useful manner the noblest names of the Epopee of Independence.

ARGENTINE BOTANY.

The distinguished German botanist, Dr. Lorentz, Professor in the Cordoba University, has just published an interesting account of a six-months' tour made by him in the Upper Provinces by order of the Nat. Government. The report is lengthy and may be condensed in these words:

I left Cordoba on November 23rd, 1871, in company with my colleague, Professor Stelzner, the geologist, and two peons, taking with me a two-wheeled cart to carry myself, servant, and cases for specimens. Most part of the road towards Tucuman I went afoot, picking up herbs or plants as we went along, for our progress was slow, and we stopped to rest wherever there were water and pasture for the cattle. The Province of Santiago is so poor that when we reached there [Dec. 13th] the horses were nigh starved, and we should have ourselves perished of hunger but for some American biscuit and German preserved meats that we had with us. We reached Tucuman Dec. 22nd, and started again on the 26th with Mr. F. Schiekenantz across the Sierra Aco-quija, passing through San Javier, Siambon, Antoma, Sierra Tafi, Santa Maria, Arenal and the Capillita mines, reaching Fort Andalgalá on January 8th.

I spent 12 days hereabouts in various excursions and intended to make the ascent of the Peak of Aco-quija, but no horses could be found for the journey. On January 20th we set out for Mr. Schiekenantz's estancia of Yavental, via Belén; I made two excursions hence, one to Valles Altos, 17,000 feet high, another to Laguna Blanca, on the frontier of Bolivia.

When Dr. Stelzner and Mr. Schiekenantz returned to Tucuman by way of Famatina, I took a different route, by Pelicá, Puvuro and the Escabá range. I was 11 days (Feb. 17—28) at Tucuman, dissecting my specimens.

Having started again for the Sierras I remained nearly three weeks in an empty rancho at Siambon, making fresh collections, "wandering about till I reached Tafi on April 1st and returned to Tucuman (4th) by the magnificent Monteros defile. Subsequently I spent a week at Alto de Salinas, enjoying the hospitality of Juan M. Teran, who also gave me much information, enabling me to increase my collection.

The winter having set in [May 14th] and preventing my further researches towards Cordoba, passing [nearly] by the route of the proposed railway] through Monteros, Medina, Recreo and San Jose, and reaching home by May 31st.

My collection comprises nearly 10,000 samples, including from six to seven hundred different plants, none of which are known in the country around Cordoba: some I intend to preserve here for our Herbarium, others to send to Germany for scientific study, others to exchange with the botanists of Europe, Chile or Australia for the products of those regions. I was specially careful to pick up any plants useful for medicine, dyeing, tanning, &c., but the "paisanos" were always slow to tell me the names or qualities of the herbs, either jealous of my enquiries, or ignorant of what I asked them. Educated natives gave me valuable information, besides treating me with the greatest kindness. Seeds, nuts, roots, barks, &c., I also collected, observing the altitude and geographical position where they flourished. During these winter months I shall have to arrange them, besides preserving the mosses and lichens; but as our stock of botanical works is so scarce I have to send all to Europe to be classified. This is slow work, often requiring a life-time. Professor Philippi, the Chilean botanist, made a tour of Araucania in 1853, and published a classification of the Flora in 1860.

Meantime I have the manuscript notes of my journey, treating in general of the climate, soil, productions, habits of the people, &c., for the publication of which I am in treaty with a German house, to present to Government next year.

As I can be of much more service to the country in making explorations than in attempting to form a class of Botany (which would be an absurd possibility in this University of Cordoba), and as I do not mean to receive public money without giving value for it, I mean to start again by the beginning of Spring (Sept. 20th), leave my assistant at Tucuman to complete my collection with Spring flowers and fruits, push on to Salta to meet Dr. Hieronymus, extend my explorations through Jujuy and Oran, descend the Bermejo and study the Flora of the Gran Chaco in my route, returning to Cordoba by way of Corrientes and Rosario.

If the Government mean to carry out the proposed military expedition to Rio Negro and Patagonia I should feel happy to explore the botanical riches of that unknown land. Meantime the Sierras around Cordoba will offer me abundant study for some years, as well as the adjoining Provinces.

My travelling expenses for the six months have amounted to 404\$ say two dollars a day, including wages to servants, but not including the cost of my dog-cart, mules and harness (1,063\$). One of my chief expenses was paper, as the wrappers around the plants have to be changed daily.

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EDITOR'S TABLE.

Our colleagues were again slightly in the rear yesterday morning (in re 'Pacific Telegrams') with one day's later intelligence from Europe. We suppose, like British soldiers, they never know when they are beaten (?) and, with one exception, abstained from copying our despatches: 'tant pis' for their readers.

The Santa Fé scurrage has ended most ignominiously for the insurgents. Accounts received yesterday describe the whole business as a gross imposition got up for some local political purposes. As for Entre Rios, 'order reigns at Warsaw' and in all other parts of that province.

To-morrow L'Affraime will be given at the Colon Theatre. The last time this opera was performed here poor Madame Gase, since dead, took the leading role. Piccioli will sing the role of Vasca de Gama, vice Lemli, still indisposed. There was a rush to secure places yesterday, and we expect to see the most brilliant and fashionable audience of the season at the Colon to-morrow.

'Ermani' was performed at the Opera House on Tuesday evening before a full audience, Madame Passerini, who played 'Elvira,' brought down loud applause several times during the night by various impromptu 'tours de force.' Ghelli was a fair 'Don Carlos,' but 'toujours Ghelli.' Perotti was a good 'Ermani,' but evidently suffering slightly from hoarseness. The only aria thoroughly murdered during the evening was the magnificent 'Fidelle,' which the audience courteously allowed to pass unnoticed. We must compliment the orchestra on its efficiency—also the male chorus; the dresses were good.

The New York Albion says— "It is stated that a Mr. Burrus, of Wisconsin, has issued a scheme for a railroad from the Atlantic to the West, to be built with a gauge of 30 feet. The road is to run from the East by the most direct line to Lake Erie. When it reaches the lake the road is to be built out into the water about 25 feet below the surface for some distance, and there end. It is to be operated with a machine which is even more wonderful than the road, and which will navigate the water as well as traverse the land. When this ambitious locomotive arrives at the jumping-off place at Lake Erie it is to slide gracefully into the water, and by slight transposition of its machinery become a steamboat. When it has arrived at Monroe it resumes its character of locomotive, and rolls off another broad gauge road to Lake Michigan, whence it is to take water for Chicago. The machine is to be sufficiently large to carry a vessel of 500 tons, so that all necessity for ships' canals will be done away with. The inventor expects to attain a speed of 125 miles per hour on land and 25 miles in water."

The proposed new Argentine Transatlantic mail steam navigation service is attracting great attention in commercial circles. There cannot be a doubt as to its success, but the Government must not allow itself to be misled by the otherwise grief-motivated look of the new line will afford a great stimulus to emigration to the Plata, by bringing out settlers at very moderate rates.

Mr. Benitez, the new Paraguayan Minister to Europe, Asia, Africa, North America and Ireland, is likely to create a sensation at home. Eight thousand a year for a "poor Paraguayan" Minister! What will he do with it? The diplomatic natives in all the countries and continents to which he is accredited, no doubt, Talleyrand or Metternich would have been put to "the pin of their collars" to discharge such a vast mission, but there were no telegraphs in their days. Sr. Benitez, we believe, will take up his headquarters in London (near Capel Court) and do all his diplomatic spitting by wire. Standard look him!

All our morning contemporaries declare the melody "Les Pirates de la Savane" now being performed at the Alcazar, to be one of the best pieces ever given in this city, abounding in thrilling interest, yet free from anything objectionable in either plot or dialogue. We have not seen it, but mean to do so. If it be such a 'hit,' the empresario should give it a run on the off nights at some other theatre, as it is not 'la mode' for families to patronize the Alcazar. One swallow does not make a summer, and one legitimate 'hit' at the Alcazar will not take that pleasant place of amusement on the Bohemian category.

The Cordoba papers announce the arrest of a foreign quack up there; he is said to have performed some astounding operations and cures, particularly when he was drunk—which was generally from the time he got up till he went to bed.

Mr. Jones's project for a new network of railways through the city is the biggest thing in the tram or any other way, yet to be done. All the streets in town, and a few out of it, are embraced in this new tramway plan. There, back, and anywhere one likes, all for two paper dollars, R.M.D. Wonderful.

The Indian Ambassadors are shortly expected in town, say a contemporary, to treat with Colonel Gauza for a permanent peace. King Caluenera has given them full powers. They are expected to bring lots of presents, and as the War Minister is not afraid of Greeks or Indians, even under such circumstances, something may be arranged.

The sensation drama, 'William Tell' will be performed at the Victoria Theatre this evening, for the benefit of Sor. Candel. All the Swiss in town are going.

We shall have to break up the STANDARD if the new project laid before the Municipality by Sr. Urribarrea, Alderman for the North Cathedral ward passes. This gentleman proposes to put a crushing monthly tax of 25 m/c. on every horse kept within six squares of the Plaza Victoria, \$20 on those within ten squares, and \$5 on those further out. It is not stated what is to be done with the amount that will be derived from the new tax, which says nothing about ponies or mules.

A North-American paper gives the following account of a curious funeral service in Indianapolis. We hear that Voss is looking out for "rib" No. 3— "A gentleman from Centerville yesterday told of a strange funeral service held in the church of that town lately. About eighteen months since the wife of a rather prominent citizen of Wayne County, named Voss, died and was buried without a funeral sermon having been preached over her remains. If married again, and last week his second wife died, and on Sunday she was buried from the Church of Centerville.
