RAILWAY TO BAHIA BLANCA

CONCESSION TO ZUMARAN & CO. On Monday evening the Provincial Senate passed the concession sent up from the Deputies for the above railway with the alteration of £1,000 a mile bonus instead of £500 as voted by the Deputies. The bill will probably be accepted in its new form by the Deputies, the text being as follows:—

Art. 1. The Government is authorized to grant Zumaran & Co. a bonus of £1,000 a mile (say £190,000 sterling) for the Tandil and Bahia Blanca section of the railway which they propose making from B. Ayres to Bahia Blanca; as well as a free gift of 60 square leagues [400,000 acres] subject to such conditions of colonization as may be deemed expedient.

Art. 2. The above bonus shall be made in Provincial Bonds at par, the interest and sinking fund to be paid out of the proceeds of state-lands sold outside the frontier, or if such be insufficient out of the general revenue of the Province.

Art. 3. The contract shall be made in conformity with the new Railway-law. It would appear from the above that Messrs. Zumaran contemplate making a railway from B. Ayres to Tandil [say 190 miles] instead of connecting with the Great Southern line at Carmen de Las Flores, which is only 60 miles from Tandil. Nothing can be more idle than to make two parallel railways for 100, southward from B. Ayres, apart from any consideration of the injury it would needlessly cause to the Great Southern railway, whose interests ought to be protected if even there never was a concession in the Company's favor. Let us hope that some arrangement will be made to obviate this absurdity, either by the Southern Railway prolonging the Las Flores branch to Tandil in consideration of a similar bonus per mile, or else handing over the task to Messrs. Zumaran & Co.

The law does not say whether Zumaran's line is to be the broad or the narrow gauge, a very important point as regards the cost of the line and the general railway interests of the country. But if we suppose the Irish gauge, as in all the existing lines in this Province [5 feet 6 in.], taking into account the rise in iron, the contractors can hardly hope to make the line under £7,000 a mile, of which the Government pays £1,000, besides the land-grant of 2,200 acres per mile worth about £500 more. The cost of the Tandil and Bahia Blanca section would stand thus:—

If the line as much traffic as the present Las Flores branch it will give a handsome dividend to the shareholders, and be free from all bother about calculation of guarantee or questions with the Government. Included it is now frankly admitted on both sides that the system of a fixed bonus for every mile of railway constructed is much more satisfactory to all parties than the old method of guarantee in which so much money was needlessly wasted and a never-ending source of difficulties created.

There will be no engineering obstacles of any note between Tandil and Bahia Blanca, the country being rather undulating than hilly, and no rivers of any note to be crossed except the Naposta. The total length, 60 leagues, in a W. S. W. course, may be divided into 3 sections, viz.—

Miles. Tandil to the frontier... 74 Indian country to Sierra Pillahuino... 75 Pillahuino to Bahia Blanca... 50 199

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2nd Section.—Indian country to Pillahuino. Bare pampas now intervene for a stretch of 56 miles, without signs of habitation or of pastoral industry, till we reach 3 lagoons which may be considered the head-waters of Pillahuino Grande. From this point we leave the pampa and enter the hilly region, reaching Sierra Pillahuino about 20 miles from the lagoons above stated. Length 76 miles.

3rd Section.—Pillahuino to Bahia Blanca. Skirting the base of the Sierra Pillahuino, the line will leave the Vela estancias to the left and cross the Sauce Grande with the famous range of Sierra Ventana on the right. This point is ten leagues higher up the valley of Sauce Grande than Mr. Newton's estancia, Casa de Pterro, and will probably be fixed on as a station for the English colony of El Sauce. Pushing onward in a straight line across the rivers known as Naposta Chico and Naposta Grande, the route will lie through the fertile valley where Euro-pean settlers, such as Calvento, Fuso, Jui, Carontia, Baron, Arnold, &c., are found almost the whole way from Paso Correntino to Bahia Blanca. Length, 50 miles.

This line would open up a country as large as Belgium or Holland, of splendid camps, well-watered and everywhere suitable for agriculture or pasture. It would bring Bahia Blanca within 12 hours of Buenos Ayres, instead of the monthly sea-voyage which at present forms the sole communication.

Every praise is due to the Legislature of Buenos Ayres for its liberality in the bonus and land-grant conceded to Messrs. Zumaran. Of course similar inducements may be looked for henceforward with respect to all projects of this kind for stretching out our iron roads, north, south, and west. And it may be safely predicted that with £1,000 a mile and a land grant as above there will not be wanting English companies to lay down railways outside the frontier, or if such be insufficient out of the general revenue of the Province.

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PARIS LETTER.

(From Our Own Correspondent.) Paris, Aug. 17th. M. Thiers inclines to take a leaf out of the proceedings of the Geneva Court of Arbitration, that of observing secrecy. He left Trouville for Paris, and his movement was unknown till he was on the road. This was not respectful to the journalists told off to chronicle his doings. His object in coming to the capital was to pay it a complimentary visit, to prove that his love had undergone no change to have the Assembly sitting here, although the "parrots" believe the palace of Versailles is alone proof against Guy Fawkes and petrole. The President also had for object, a chat with the architect and builder, respecting the reconstruction of his house, for though getting well on to fourscore, M. Thiers, after accomplishing his mission, intends to pass "the evening of his life" in lettered ease. One of the charivari journals represents M. Thiers, jaunty and juvenile, with a carpet bag and smoking pipe, at the railway station, demanding the price of a ticket to Trouville, and on being told 25frs., presents a bank note, taken from a bundle of same, for one milliard. The clerk is of course astounded.

Trouville has become the Biarritz of the north of France, and if anything, is out-going that once celebrated health station in fashion and cost of living. The rent of the President's villa is 6,000 frs. per month, but this is nothing for a nation that declines to accept 35 milliards of francs more than the little accommodation asked for. Trouville and the adjacent seaboard are enjoying just now the full tide of prosperity. Cabbly alone appears to be equal to the occasion; he is monarch of all he surveys, and charges what he pleases. As for the telegraph and post-offices, they have nearly ceased work under the pressure of an expected business. Deauville with its racetrack and Trouville in balls and concerts. A theatre has been inaugurated in the latter town; all that is wanted is a German band to prove that old times have come again. A little play is indulged in; the "demi-monde" has decided the locality to be a superior hunting ground to Baden or Hombourg. A Russian yacht is reported to have stood in for the shore, and its merry crew indulged in a few "vives" for the ex-Emperor and something like "a bas" for M. Thiers, who "saw from the beach" and heard as well. Then there has been a case of love-sickness, a young girl throwing herself into the sea, and being saved in time by a party of ballasts.

The various opposition parties continue the dropping of buckets into empty wells. The voice of the charivari is not hearkened to, charm they never so wisely. M. St. Marc-Girardin, who, in addition to wearing the highest shirt-collar in the world, is the factotum of the Orleansists, asserts M. Thiers has become their leader once more—in fact returned to the fold—and that he has hitherto been only duping the Republicans, or using them in his political battles and shuttlecock amusements. The President's journal hints that the writer of that edifying letter in charity by the way, looked after by his friends, as he displays symptoms of mental derangement. On the other hand, the Republicans believe to have captivated M. Thiers. The latter is like Don Juan between his two jealous mistresses, on both of whom he has bestowed his heart, happily with either, were the other dear charmer away?

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Advices from the Mount report everything in a social way down there as surpassingly dull. Business is fair enough, but there is no fun going on. The theatres are done up, and so are the public. The Brazilian question and whether the coming summer will pass over without war or pestilence are the only subjects that awaken the interest of the general public.

There was a slight breezy debate in Congress on Monday on the subject of allowing the Special Committee named to investigate the negotiation of the Thirty Million Loan to continue its labours during the recess. The House decided that the Committee should report before Congress is prorogued.

The following characteristic story of Her Majesty's Queen will interest our countrymen in the Pill and the Queen's Guard of the 93rd Highlanders at Edinburgh have been teaching her Majesty how to boil potatoes. During her stay at Holyrood, the Sovereign went on foot to the quarters of the troops, who are posted near the Palace. When she entered the guard-room, most of the men were absent and going through drill; but a few were engaged, with their coats off and their shirt sleeves tucked up, in the highly useful occupation of boiling potatoes. One, indeed, was practically trying whether they were sufficiently boiled; and, in answer to a quietly boistered, the embarrassed cook could with difficulty articulate the words, "Potatoes your Majesty." The soldier may congratulate himself on the fact that he was found so well employed, and certainly his reply displayed a brevity and point which might serve as models for the addresses that Town Councils present the Royal House. The three words were so admirably expressive and explanatory that the hero of the potatoes ought at once to be raised to the rank of sergeant. Her Majesty was curious about other things beside the vegetable food of her defenders; stopping to see how the soldiers were housed, and asking our hero with the "mouth-full" what was his name, where he was born, and how long had he been in her service. Such little acts of regal courtesies cost nothing beyond kindness of heart; but, because they are so common, they are so sympathetically well as because they come from a Queen, they are deeply prized by the recipients. The visit of Her Majesty during the boiling of the potatoes will be a red-letter day in the memory of the 93rd Highlanders who were on guard at Holyrood.

Further particulars of the defeat of the Indians by Colonel Borges have been received. It appears the gallant Colonel and the valiant Commander Malone had only 90 men wherewith to "polish off" 800 Indians. After a ride of 24 leagues in 14 hours the Colonel came up on the savages, who were equipped at night, in the Marat fashion, not straight into them; his men cheering and yelling to lead the foe to imagine they were more numerous. The ruse succeeded, the children of the Lampa bolting for bare life in every direction. Several of them were sabred white looking for their horses in the dark, and 15,000 mares and horned cattle fell into the hands of the victors, Coliqueo and all his men, women and children, as also some Christian captives escaping during the melee. Another Irishman, Commander Timothy, distinguished himself by rescuing 6,000 more cattle and mares and several captives. On the side of the troops the butcher's knife killed and two wounded; the loss of the savages was considerable.

THE USE OF TREES TO THE RIVER PLATE.

The use of trees to the river plate is a subject which should engage the serious attention of its inhabitants.

Trees have various uses, and not the least important of these is that of guarding the public health by purifying the air.

It is not to be inferred, however, that because certain kinds of trees possess this great quality all should be likewise.

Commencing with the first mentioned class we observe that its utility is greater than that of any other.

Once having done all in our power in this line, to render our country healthy we should next devote our attention to the construction of number trees which exist in most adjacent countries.

The woods at present produced by various Provinces are eminently fitted for their great usefulness, for various important uses, but their great distance from the sea board and the expense of transport, combined with their extensive other causes, render them almost impossible.

It would be desirable that such classes of trees as would best thrive in the climate of Buenos Ayres and Santa Fe, and on those Islands of the Paraná which at present merely produce the willow.

Class No. 3 is to a certain extent important, though in a lesser degree than the two first.

Instead of seeing our markets in Summer so over-crowded with peach, peach and nothing but peach, why not introduce some sort of tree which would cause a far superior fruit?

Nothing that can tend to the improvement of a country should be disregarded by its inhabitants, and at least of all trees, whose fruit delight the palate, and whose flowers and outward beauties combined with much intrinsic worth clearly indicate their great use to man.
