THE SENEGAL MAILS.

TWELVE DAYS LATER.

Lisbon, Jan. 10th, 1873.

The rumour of the Ex-Emperor Napoleon's death was contradicted by a Paris telegram of yesterday morning, although it was added that the advices from England gave little hope of his recovery.

Last evening a telegram from Madrid confirms the previous rumour, and it is generally believed.

Alarm of impending troubles between Russia and Great Britain, on occasion of the Czar sending an army to occupy Afghanistan on our Indian frontier, has now subsided.

Gordon who shot his lady's daughter because she would not marry him, and then shot himself. Mdlle. Schiassi was reputed a very beautiful girl.

King Amadeo gave a banquet at Madrid on Twelfth Day, but none of the Conservatives would attend, and the unhappy condition of the country weighed on the minds of the guests.

The Carlists are now in such strength in Catalonia that it is believed Count Alfonso, brother of Don Carlos, is among them; he formerly served under the Pope. The Government cannot ascertain the truth of the rumour. On the 20th they besieged Olot, but retired before some troops: on the 31st they entered Carders, headed by Tristany and Castells, and were joined by several of the villagers.

The new Hypothecary Bank of Madrid is to open on 1st February. Gen. Moriones was ordered to take chief command against the Carlists on the 6th, and pursue the column supposed to be headed by Don Alfonso de Bourbon. The trial respecting the assassination of Prim is at last concluded. The railway operatives have struck for higher wages and a pension for the families of such as are killed.

The Turkish Government wants a new loan from England, say 25 millions sterling, to complete the network of railways in European Turkey, and the canal from Nicomedia to Angora. The rumour of military movements by the Government of Servia was false.

President Lerio has prorogued the Congress of Mexico, and opened the railway from that city to Vera Cruz, 300 miles of mountainous country, the trip occupying 24 hours. The new ruler is not so inactive as his name signifies, and promises to re-model Mexico by means of railways. He is small, stout, fair as an Englishman, affable, crafty, and was born at Xalapa in 1825, graduating in law at Puebla. He made the treaty with Sir Chas. Wyke, and was envoy to Washington. He obliged Suarez to shoot Maximilian, saying it was necessary.

Two batches of Communists, 331 from Toulon and 540 from Brest, were despatched for Tahiti on the 4th Jan. It is thought Kocherfort will be among the next lot. The last French prisoner has been released from Germany; his name is Dutour and he was under the charge of poisoning Prussian soldiers; the Emperor William sent him a free pardon. The abolition of passports between France and Germany has had a good effect: the passports gave much trouble to Alsicians whose business led them into France.

Victor Emmanuel received deputations from the Chambers on New Year's day at the Quirinal. The president begged His Majesty to be more careful of his health, but the King replied that the fortunes of Italy did not depend on his life. The exportation of live stock from Italy to France averages 8,000 cows, 13,000 sheep, and 7,000 pigs monthly, which causes meat to be so dear in Italian towns that beef rules at a shilling per lb. The grazing farmers of Lombardy are making rapid fortunes.

The new Pacific steamer Santa Rosa called here three days ago en route for Brazil and Montevideo. The Kepler sailed from Liverpool on the 2nd for Montevideo, not touching at any Brazilian ports. Large numbers of emigrants have left Havre for Brazil.

Bank of England rate yesterday continued at 5 per cent. Consols 92, French rentes 52. At New York on the 8th exchange was 109, and gold 111.

MONTEVIDEO.

Friday.

As soon as the Senegal came in this morning there was more anxiety to learn the news from Rio Janeiro as regarded the progress of the fever, than any commercial or political intelligence from Europe. It seems there have been rains, which notably cooled the atmosphere, but caused no diminution of the epidemic. The Government ordered all the sewers to be kept closed during the day, and took other steps of this kind.

People who read the morning papers say that some of them are very slurs upon Mr Gomensory and all of them have long-winded dissertations on the advantages of Don Fulano or the iniquities of Don Mengano in connection with rival claims for the President's chair.

One of the bull-fighters was barbarously murdered at the Union on Wednesday evening. It is supposed the crime was committed by two men with whom he was seen after leaving the Bull-ring, where there was an amateur fight on the day's question. The poor man's name was Manuel Redondo. The criminals have escaped.

Next Sunday week (Feb. 9th) the Legislature holds a preliminary session, to examine electoral returns.

The election of President of the Republic takes place the following Saturday, and will probably pass off quietly.

The Japanese jugglers are drawing very full houses nightly.

A number of English estancieros are at present in town.

A grand funeral service took place at the Matriz for the deceased members of the Beneficencia Association, including Mlmes. Tomkinson, Lafone and other Anglo-Oriental ladies.

SCOTCH CHURCH, CHASCOMUS.

A numerously attended meeting of those connected with the Scotch Church, Chascomus, was held in the church on the 29th instant, to receive a very handsome communion service, the gift of Mrs. Henry Bell, and to

present their highly respected pastor with a pulpit gown and Bible, and the precursor, Mr. Welham Dodds, with a psalm book, from Mrs. Dodds and Mrs. Burnett.

The Rev. Martin P. Ferguson opened the proceedings with devotional exercises.

Mr. James Dodds, junior, presented the plate; Mr. James Dodds, senior, the Bible and psalm book, and the Rev. James Smith the pulpit gown.

Mr. James Dodds, senior, in accepting the plate on behalf of the congregation made an admirable speech. He referred in feeling and eulogistic terms to the labours of the Rev. James Smith, the Rev. Francis Gebbie, and the Rev. Martin P. Ferguson, in extending and maintaining religious ordinances amongst our countrymen in the camp. He also paid a well-merited compliment to the native authorities of Chascomus, who had been most kind and helpful in various ways.

The Rev. Mr. Smith, in presenting the pulpit gown to the Rev. Mr. Ferguson, expressed the pleasure he experienced in being permitted to take part in a ceremony so interesting to the congregation and to Mr. Ferguson, for whom he felt the highest esteem. He thought that the Scotch, in carrying out the mission in which they had been engaged for years, of providing religious ordinances for the Protestants scattered far and wide over the plains around Buenos Ayres, had been singularly fortunate in the clergymen they had obtained for the camp. In Mr. Gebbie and Mr. Ferguson they had men admirably adapted for the work to which God had called them. They had also been well supported by influential men in their congregations. Not a few of these Mr. Gebbie has lost by death, but in Mr. James Lavrie whose labours in the eldership have been equally valuable in town and country, Mr. John Davidson, whose liberality is well known, in Mr. Maxwell, Mr. Walker, and Mr. John Brown, he has still some who would be valuable in any congregation. Mr. Ferguson has lately lost one of his very best men in the lamented death of Mr. Ninian Johnstone, but he has still around him Mr. James Dodds, Mr. James Burnett, Mr. George Shields, Mr. John Dodds, Mr. Reid and Mr. Auld, men ready and able to assist him in every good work. He concluded by expressing the pleasure it afforded him to present Mr. Ferguson with a tangible proof of the esteem of his congregation, which he had well merited by his long and arduous labour, and he expressed a hope that he would be spared for many years to "Spout and be Spent" in his Master's service.

Mr. Ferguson in accepting the gown and pulpit Bible, made an eloquent and appropriate reply. He referred to the difficulties and discouragements he had encountered in the prosecution of his arduous labour, and to the kindness and support he had met with from the congregation, especially from such men as Mr. Dodds. This support had, but the Divine blessing, greatly contributed to the success of his labour, and had enabled him now to address them in the beautiful building in which they were assembled instead of in the humble rancho church in which they had so long worshipped.

The proceedings of this very gratifying and interesting meeting were brought to a close by the Rev. James Smith pronouncing the benediction.

HIGUENITAS.

31st Jan., 1873.

To the Editors of the STANDARD.

Gentlemen,

On the return of your correspondent from a forced residence in the camp, he had the pleasure of finding a pile of STANDARDS awaiting his arrival.

As the STANDARD is really the most readable paper published in the River Plate, the perusal of its varied and spicy articles drove away the blues—a disease that a great many suffer from when they are forced for any length of time to "live altogether on fat mutton."

The celebrated John Randolph said he would go a mile out of his way at any time in order to kick a sheep. I would not go two steps out of my way to eat one.

If you want to know how well you are off in the Argentine Republic, just take at this time a trip through the B. Oriental camps. The doubts in regard to the future, and the want of confidence in the ability of the Government to prevent an outbreak if the result of the coming presidential election be disastrous to those who have the power to stir up a revolt, discourage the enterprising, and paralyse anything like improvements.

On the Argentine side of the Plate every thing in the way of improvement is galloping ahead. Under the Sarmiento administration the Argentine Republic has made such immense strides in civilisation, power and wealth that the progress of the country under all its former administrations, as compared with the progress achieved under that of Sarmiento, is like the tottering steps of the child when first he begins to walk, contrasted with the vigorous strides of the grown man. Perhaps Mr. Sarmiento did not bring all this about, but what he did not bring about he brought about.

"There is a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at the flood, leads on to fortune."

Sarmiento took the school tide, the telegraph tide, the great loan tide, the railroad tide, the immigration tide, the agricultural tide; and I was going to say the National Bank tide, but I am not informed on that point,

and at all events, the good results of the National Bank scheme remain to be shown—Sarmiento had to finish the Paraguay war and he had to suppress various small risings in the provinces, and defend the frontier against numerous and formidable invasions of Indians deserters and bandits; besides having to put down a most formidable rebellion in Entre Rios that kept its footing in that rich and populous Province for nearly two years. But he has done it all; besides maintaining the right of the Republic to the "outage" it claims on the Paraguay river, which question threatened to produce a rupture with Brazil. But your President knew there was no danger. Intelligence gives courage, and he knew that he had nothing to do but to send a quiet General, who is also a scholar and a gentleman, to dream and smoke away the hours in Rio, and thus give time for all options to be known; when the threatening waves of this warlike storm would calm down, as suddenly as the wild waves of the ocean do, when oil is poured upon them.

Our little republic with a population of 400,000 souls has seven candidates for the Presidency. The Argentine Republic with 2,000,000 has four, and the United States with 40,000,000 had two. Our seven candidates are—Gomensoro, Bustamante, Varela, Mitro, Ellauri, Suarez and Chucarro. The three first named are serious candidates; they have telling elements in their favour to count on; but in the struggle of elections by divided factions it sometimes happens that a faction not being able to carry its candidate, suddenly unites with one or more of the opposing factions, and in this way, the most unlikely of all candidates to succeed, is the one elected. In this way we are much more likely to get an incompetent man for President, than we are to get an able statesman.

The immigration into the Argentine Republic at present is something fabulous; but she has room for all who come. She has an immense area of the richest land in the world, equal in extent to four times the area of France. Immigrants are now pouring into your republic at an average rate of something like 7,000 a month.

As your population is only 2,000,000 the number of immigrants that you receive is equal to what 100,000 a month would be for the United States; a number that, as yet, the United States has never received for any number of consecutive months; and this immigration to the Plate is increasing. Besides the immense number of large steamers at present engaged in bringing out immigrants, something like an arrival for every day in the year, they are forming new lines of steamers, and the lines already established are building more steamers. It is not at all improbable that next year the immigration to the Plate from Europe will very greatly overrun 100,000 souls. Some little streamlets from this immense current of wealth and prosperity must come over to us; but as we are governed our delightful climate, our fertile and undulating lands, our abundant streams of good water, and our magnificent geographical position, must always tell for something in our favour, and small as the area of our territory is, it is very nearly equal to that of Italy; with her 20,000,000 of souls; so that we also have room for now comers, and God grant that they may pour in upon us in sufficient numbers to form an insuperable obstacle to a future revolution.

Yesterday the Alcalde Ordinario elect for our section was installed in office, and as soon as the Escribano Publico comes—and he is daily expected from Montevideo—our newly established Juzgado Ordinario will be open to litigants. Besides the judicial proceedings in abeyance, there are a great number of private contracts for lands and lots to be legalised when the Escribano comes; and as the property is taking more value it is constantly changing hands, and an Escribano now would do a good business here.

The late abundant rains have left the camps in good condition, and both cattle and sheep are now in good order. The camp lands also are beginning to crawl up in price, and very soon many of those who rent camp must leave the lands—they have been occupying if they are not able to buy them.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The driest inhabitant does not remember such monstrously heavy wet as that of yesterday morning. About 3 o'clock a.m. the rain came down in torrents, the noise of the falling waters frightening sober citizens from their couches and even deafening the roar of heaven's artillery. The people along the line of the Terceros were greatly alarmed, as the water rose in a few minutes to the footways, and in some cases entered the patios. The "vigilantes" on night duty had a terrible time of it; but we hear from two or three subscribers living in different quarters of the city that the whistle signals of the drenched policemen were to be heard all through the night as regularly as if all was serene. This is greatly to the credit of the police; for really the night was one in which no one would turn even a dog out of doors. Jupiter Pluvius casual breakfast time—8 a.m. sharp—but began again like the very d—l! at 9 o'clock, keeping the bucket going till the afternoon. Many people are seriously apprehensive that we are going to have a spell of rainy weather and inundations such as Europe has lately suffered from. At one time yesterday the torrents were so terrific that Bullrich's furniture in our back patio ran imminent risk of being carried out to sea. Our cellar was flooded to the level of the patio, but, fortunately, there is nothing in it that damp can much affect.

A full description of the interesting proceedings at the Scotch Church, Chascomus, last week, will be found in another column.

The most cheering and sanguine accounts have been received from Asuncion respecting the working of the new tramway just opened under the able management of Mr. Horrocks. Everyone, young and old, rich and poor, rushed to have "a trial trip," and in the first seven days over 4,000 people were carried. Considering the population of Asuncion this is really a very brilliant beginning; and, as tramway travelling, like jealousy, dram-drinking, love, money or murder, "grows by what it feeds on," the prospect before it is to be congratulated on the prospect before it.

The passengers by an up Flores train car, about 10 o'clock, got a foot bath yesterday in the "Tercero" near Plaza Lorea. The car went at full speed, "curtained" tugging, driver yelling, and cattle galloping. "In we go!" Shssss! Up go merrigulle, professional, clerical and editorial legs in the air and into "vis a vis" faces, a general howl, and the Rubicon is passed. Most of the passengers were so immersed in the city article of the STANDARD that they were wet up to the knees before they perceived the danger. We regret to hear that some of the travellers had to go home early to be petted and gruelled in consequence of their "poor wet" getting wet in the morning.

The same on the Quilmes line happened yesterday, seems to have been the narrowest shave yet of a good "butcher's bill." The epidemic of railway mishaps now prevailing gives a pleasing excitement to travelling. No man, on leaving home in the morning, whether he head north, south, east or west, can tell if he may not return at night to the "buzum" of his family or a slutter, in "various small lots," his wife may be forced to don veils, reluctantly or otherwise, by a "cow on the line," and a good collision may save the moral, or at least pecuniary reputation of dozens of spendthrift sons by smashing their "governor's" back-bachelor uncles' heads, "bally" might to be encouraged to "travel" and travelling for their ailments. We don't like to recommend any line in particular for this purpose, but it is only fair to say that the Southern offers a very poor chance of a smart fatal accident, indeed of any accident at all; but all the others, judging from recent performances, merit the attention of aspiring expectant legates. We had another miss of getting a fair sum the other day by the escape of a travelling reporter in the smash up of the Northern line, as we have a stiff policy on his life, he missed the Boca collision on the New Year's Day by being one minute too late for the train, and has had several other "miraculous escapes of various dangers." It fact he is quite too lucky for his responsible post, and seems to bear a "charmed life." Some day, however, we are certain to attend his funeral, and he knows it.

The Pampa states that it had 250 new subscribers on Friday. It continues to publish thundering leaders and the documents in the Agrelo case which seem as if they will not be exhausted for months yet.
